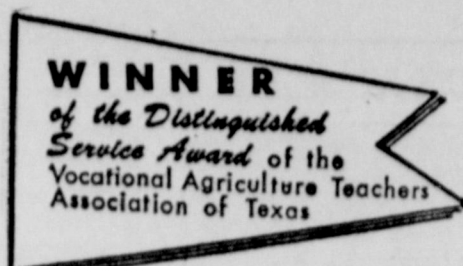

## George Culwell Dies In Hospital

George W. Culwell, 61, of 720 South 9th St., Slaton, a resident of Slaton for the past 37 years, died in Mercy Hospital here late Sunday.

Funeral services were held at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday in the First Methodist Church here with the Reverend Rollo Davidson officiating, assisted by the Reverend Elmer Crabtree of Plainview.

Interment was in Englewood Cemetery.

A native of Jones county, Mr. Culwell had resided in Slaton since 1922, at which time he was employed by the Santa Fe Railway Company as Carman apprentice. He held various positions in the Mechanical Department. He became car foreman of the Slaton Division, September 1, 1943, which position he held until his retirement May 1, 1960. His railroad service amounted to 37 years and 5 months. Mr. Culwell was a member of the First Methodist Church and the Busy Men's Bible Class.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Maurice Middleton; two grandsons, Tracy and Jerry Middleton of Stamford, Connecticut; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Culwell of Avoca, Texas; four sisters, Mrs. Walter Winberry, Denton; Mrs. Floyd Campbell, Ft. Worth; Mrs. R. M. Tupper, and Mrs. E. V. Harlan, both of Sherman; and one brother, I. C. Culwell of Electra.

Delegate To GOP Convention

## Klattenhoff Sees Aid To Education Fight

W. J. Klattenhoff of Slaton, delegate to the 1960 Republican National Convention in Chicago, wired The Slatonite yesterday afternoon that a floor fight on the aid to education plank in the party's platform appeared certain.

Klattenhoff had just come out of a three-hour Texas caucus Wednesday when he wired concerning the Texas delegation's activities. The delegation had freed itself from the state convention decision to vote under the unit rule for Vice-President Richard Nixon on the first ballot for the party's Presidential nominee. Many in the delegation favored casting their votes for Arizona Senator Barry Goldwater.

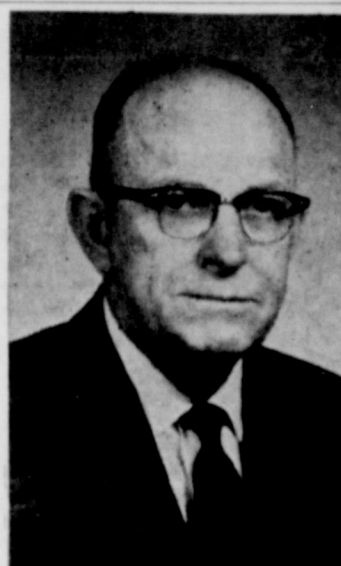
In his wire, Klattenhoff praised Texas' actions on Civil Rights, calling the delegation's actions, "an outstanding job." The Texans had earlier expressed disappointment in Nixon for his liberal tendencies on the rights plank, as well as federal aid to education and other items. Congressman Bruce Alger of Dallas called the split a fight between conservatives and liberals and not just a north vs. south matter.

Klattenhoff's wire said the Texas group would oppose the aid to education plank in the platform and that a floor fight

appeared certain at that time on the issue.

Any prospect of preventing Nixon from being nominated appeared extremely slim, however, and the Texans were mainly interested in keeping the party's platform from becoming even farther to the left than that of the Democrats.

Klattenhoff will return to Slaton this week end, after the convention draws to a close.

## Move Provides For Progress On Project; Election Date Not Set

The Slaton City Commission, in its meeting Monday night, passed a resolution committing itself to hold an election for the people of Slaton to decide if they want to enter into a contract with the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority.

The election, the date for which has not been set, would authorize the City to enter into a contract for Canadian River water at a price of 21.26 cents per thousand gallons, if it carried.

The resolution places no further obligation on the City other than to hold the election and was passed at the request of Lubbock Mayor David Casey, who reported that all other South Plains cities in the authority had agreed to call elections but Lamesa.

If all cities involved hold elections and they carry in favor of contracts with CRMWA, work will begin immediately toward getting engineering and construction underway.

This is the first time in the long and stormy history of the authority that developments have progressed to the point of having elections in all member cities.

The feeling in the meeting Monday night was that Slaton would not call its election until after Lubbock had had its election and the results were known. Obviously, if Lubbock failed to carry, there would be no necessity in Slaton having an election because the entire financial structure and cost of water

would change.

In other action Monday night, the commission passed on second and final reading its Nuisance Ordinance, which prohibits uncontrolled growth of weeds in the community, offensive odors, unsanitary drainage or storage or anything which would be injurious to the health and welfare of the community and sets a penalty for violators. The caption to the ordinance is published in this week's Slatonite, together with enforcement methods and penalty. The ordinance may be read in its entirety in the office of the City Secretary, City Hall. It goes into effect in five days.

In connection with the ordinance, the City decided to get all weeds cut on City property and rights-of-way before forcing anyone else to cut their weeds.

## Red Cross Fund Drive Underway

As this newspaper goes on the news stands this morning, a Red Cross fund drive will get underway here to raise money for victims of the flood disaster this month.

The campaign, headed by Melvin Kunkle, will bring in money to help defray the cost of losses by many in Slaton and the area.

The Slaton Disaster Advisory Committee approved grants for \$4,565 in flood relief money for Slaton victims in a meeting in the Red Cross disaster headquarters here Monday. The grants include payments for lost furniture, clothes, food, etc., and were made as the result of claims made since the floods three weeks ago. All claimants lived in Slaton or surrounding area.

Money contributed to the fund drive which starts today will be used in Slaton, Kunkle said, and will be used to help meet the \$4,565 in grants.

Kunkle said that all persons not contacted for contributions are asked to mail or bring their check to the Southwestern Public Service Company office

here, at 145 W. Lubbock. The checks should be made payable to American National Red Cross, West Texas Floods, DR002.

He added that he would appreciate volunteer help in the campaign.

## Two Youths Drown In Rain-Made Lake

WOODROW—A near 26 hour search ended Tuesday with the finding of the body of James Hill by a member of the Lubbock Skindiving Club. Hill, 13, and Ronnie Taylor, 14, drowned Monday while paddling on a homemade raft on a "rain" lake about 1 1/2 miles southwest of Woodrow on the property of Cecil Dickey.

The youths were believed to have drowned about 2:45 p.m. Monday. Also on the raft with the drowned pair were two of James Hill's brothers, David, 16, and Johnny, 14. The fifth youth was Jimmy Dickey, 18, son of the property owner.

The lake, empty most of the time, is at a near record high following the early July rains. It is approximately a half mile wide in most points and 18 to 20 feet deep a relatively short distance from the bank.

The mishap began as a trial run for a homemade raft and ended as a nightmare when the raft pitched its passengers overboard. The raft was made of two 55-gallon oil drums fastened together with wire and a frame of 2 by 4 lumber. A plywood seat was nailed across the wooden frame between the oil drums.

They were about 100 feet from the bank when the incident occurred. David Hill said the boat began to rock when the youths paddled with their hands and the boys were pitched from the raft.

## EDITORIALS

### US AND THE NEXT PRESIDENT

With all the fire and brimstone, the high blood pressure and the fireworks about the coming presidential race, it seems the right time and the right place to take some notice of the conditions and make some comments upon the national situation and what effect the outcome will have on our town and its prosperity.

From the local view point and from observations of magazines and newspapers, it seems the next president will be a Democrat. Admitting that the religious question is of considerable consequence, it might be that having all the Catholics on his side will benefit Kennedy. He will likely get most of the Negro votes and also be a favorite with the labor unions as well as the farmers, all of whom he promises a lot of pie in the sky. The Republican president is getting most all the blame for present conditions and it seems that people want a change. We will probably get one.

If Kennedy gets in and the Congress goes along with him, another era of inflation will come and we in Slaton will get our share of it. Keep what you have if possible and buy what you can if you think Mr. Kennedy is the man. If you believe Mr. Nixon will be next to occupy the hot seat in Washington, perhaps you should be more conservative. But regardless of the outcome, things are going to be different from now on. A new era with more government and domination by men with ideas that have never been tried before.

### WHAT'S COMING??

A glance backward in time by those who have been familiar with Slaton for the past ten years should bring into sharp relief the fact that Slaton has progressed substantially in growth and appearance.

Ten years ago, Slaton had the looks and in many ways, the atmosphere of the twenties and of earlier times. The present Post Office building was not here at that time, neither were half the buildings on the South side of the square, the old Forrest Hotel occupied the South west corner of the square where the new and attractive Cobb building is.

Practically all of the buildings in the main business district have been remodeled and have modern fronts. The residential districts have been greatly expanded. Slaton today is a modern town in most every respect.

It is most probable that the entire nation is facing a new era. Business methods show many signs of changing radically. Expansion of the shopping center ideas appear to be the style and the scattering of business institutions away from crowded and high rent centers seems to be the way of the near future. This trend has not developed here yet, but it may be counted on if Slaton increases in size as it has every sign of doing.

To take care of this condition, some plans should be made now so that the present business district will not become a dead weight upon the owners of the buildings and in future years be as run down and desolate as many of the buildings are now in Lubbock and other larger communities over the nation.

Slaton is in an excellent position to plan for its future. All that is needed is action by those who are in position to influence its future growth. If there is no such group, then a planning group should be formed of young men who will reap the benefits if such planning is done right.

Then it tells about how Opal and Ralph were childhood sweethearts when they were young'uns back in East Texas and how they went through high school together and she went to Texas Women's University and he went to the University of Texas and they got married in 1923 — a June wedding, too.

Doesn't your heart LEAP with true JOY to know that Opal is first vice president? Did you shout HOORAY when you read those paragraphs and did you sigh THE EYES OF TEXAS?

Next time somebody asks you what's new, you lean over close and whisper in a confidential manner that you just read where Missus Yarborough, Ralph's wife, has just been elected first vice president of the Democratic Congressional Wives Forum, and ain't that something?

If the guy you tell that to makes light of the information you tell him it's a real gem of knowledge, a golden nugget of factual information.

### Three From Slaton Are Attending Texas Firemen's Training School

The following members of the Slaton Volunteer Fire Department are attending the 31st Annual Texas Firemen's Training School on the Texas A. and M. College campus. They are Bennie Moeller, Fire Marshal Course; Don Kendrick, Basic Firefighting Course; and Peter Williams, Basic Firefighting Course.

Community savings amounting from three to five per cent key rate insurance credit will be earned by Texas cities and towns who have firemen attending the 31st Annual Texas Firemen's Training School, being conducted this week on the campus of Texas A. and M. College, according to Henry D. Smith, Chief of Firemen Training for the Engineering Extension Service, Texas A. and M.

College System. These cities and towns will receive this credit if their firemen successfully pass the test for their selected course, Smith stated.

The School, sponsored by the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association of Texas and conducted by the Engineering Extension Service, is now in its 31st year, and attendance at the school has increased from the 196 who attended the first school to the anticipated 1600 who will participate this year. More than 250 instructors and Administrative personnel will take an active part in conducting the school this year.

Over 35,000 gallons of gasoline, oil, butane and propane fuel, plus thousands of dollars worth of chemical extinguishing agents and equipment will be used during the week of training for the student firemen, in ten different courses.

The 1,600 students, instructors, administrative staff and visitors, representing city, county, state, industrial and armed services will come from 20 states other than Texas and registrations have been received from four foreign countries. The school, held from July 18-22, will be conducted on a new 26 acre training area, recently dedicated by Texas A. and M. College as "Brayton Firemen Training Field" as a memorial to the late Col. H. R. Brayton who served as Director of the school from its inception until 1955.

Courses offered this year to the firemen include Basic Firefighting, Advanced Firefighting, Basic Fire Marshal, Advanced Fire Marshal, Firemen Instructor Training, Fire Department Officer Training, Industrial Fire Protection, Armed Service Fire Protection, Fire Department Pump Maintenance and for the first time a new 30 hour course, Fire Department Pump Operations.

As I understand it, a storm system to eliminate the problem of the three flooding lakes has been pretty well discounted principally because of the tremendous cost involved. Unofficial estimates place the approximate cost of such a project at over a million dollars. There exists considerable doubt that the residents of this community would vote bonds in such an amount and, even if they did, the possibility of selling the bonds would probably be greatly reduced simply because the City would be over-obligated. In other words, it would owe more money than its income would justify.

Your canal suggestion, however, might be feasible. It might even be relatively inexpensive. In any event, I'll bet your idea is considered by those responsible for making decisions affecting the City.

## Warns Against Discarding Cabinets

"One death a year in a discarded icebox or refrigerator is one too many!"

With that thought in mind, J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, warns against discarding cabinets — preservers of food when in the kitchen, but so often destroyers of young lives when put on the back porch, in the back yard or on junk heaps.

"The suffocation of children in discarded refrigerators and iceboxes, though declining because of the public's increased awareness of the problem, is an especially needless form of accidental death," Musick said.

Nearly 50 million refrigerators, iceboxes, freezers and other airtight cabinets are in use today. And they're being carted to junk piles — or, worse yet, kept in the basement as an extra cabinet, or left in the back yard, — at rate of about a million a year.

Typical of the tragedies was the suffocation of two boys 5 and 3 years of age. They crawled into a refrigerator and pulled the door shut, locking themselves inside. The cabinet's insulation probably muffled their cries for help, authorities said.

How can such mishaps be avoided?

1. Teach children to stay away from discarded cabinets.
2. Remove the door if you discard a cabinet.
3. Remove latch stops so the doors can't lock. This can be done, usually, by removing a few screws.
4. Drill holes in the cabinet and remove the rubber gasket around the door.

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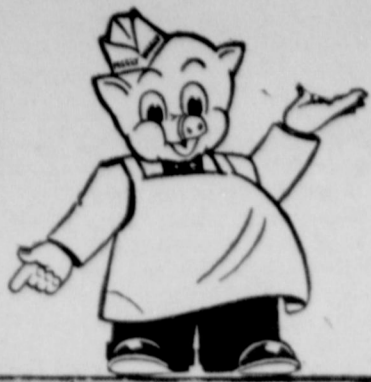

**Beware of 'Staph' Germs During The Preparation of Meals During Summer**

Almost a quickly as you can say "please pass the potato salad," a tiny, microscopic speck of bacterial life can make a shambles of the great American summer time institution, the picnic.

Called staphylococci—"staph" for short—these pernicious bits of living matter are said by far the most common cause of food poisoning. Closely related strains, called "epidemic" or "hospital" strains, have caused fatal infections in hospital nurseries.

About the picnic—if you're careless in preparing the food staph may invade and multiply in stems on the bill of fare. The ham, for instance, or the chicken salad. Or the cream-filled layer cake. In a matter of hours, once eaten, they can turn a strong man into a cramped, tormented weakling.

But it's easy to prevent this fun-wrecking development: simply keep the foods chilled between the time of preparation and service, and serve as soon as possible.

State health authorities are quick to point out that staph-caused food poisoning isn't limited to summer nor to picnics, but can occur when ever conditions are right regardless of the time or place. Conditions are more apt to be right during summer when outdoor eating is in vogue and staph can team up with the heat and lack of refrigeration to spoil food.

As a point of academic interest, it isn't the organism themselves that do the damage, but a toxin produced by adult organisms. Admittedly, the point is of little consolation to the wrong-out victim, but it does provide a clue to preventing other cases.

Staph germs are so widely distributed in nature—in nose and throat secretions, in exudate of boils and carbuncles, on skin and clothing, in the very air—that there is little chance of avoiding them completely. The trick is to keep them from growing and multiplying so they cannot produce the toxin.

Refrigeration is the key to stunting staph germs. They can't grow in cold temperatures, but thrive in bountiful profusion at room temperature. Therefore, refrigerate susceptible foods at 40 degree temperatures. Use shallow pans so the ingredients will chill through.

Keep these facts in mind when you plan your next picnic. Remember, there is no point in contending with more than the usual ants and wasps. (A feature of the Health Education Division, State Department of Health.)

The contestants will fly their models in events such as free-flight gas to radio-control, team racing contests. In the Navy carrier events, the modelers will fly their gas engine

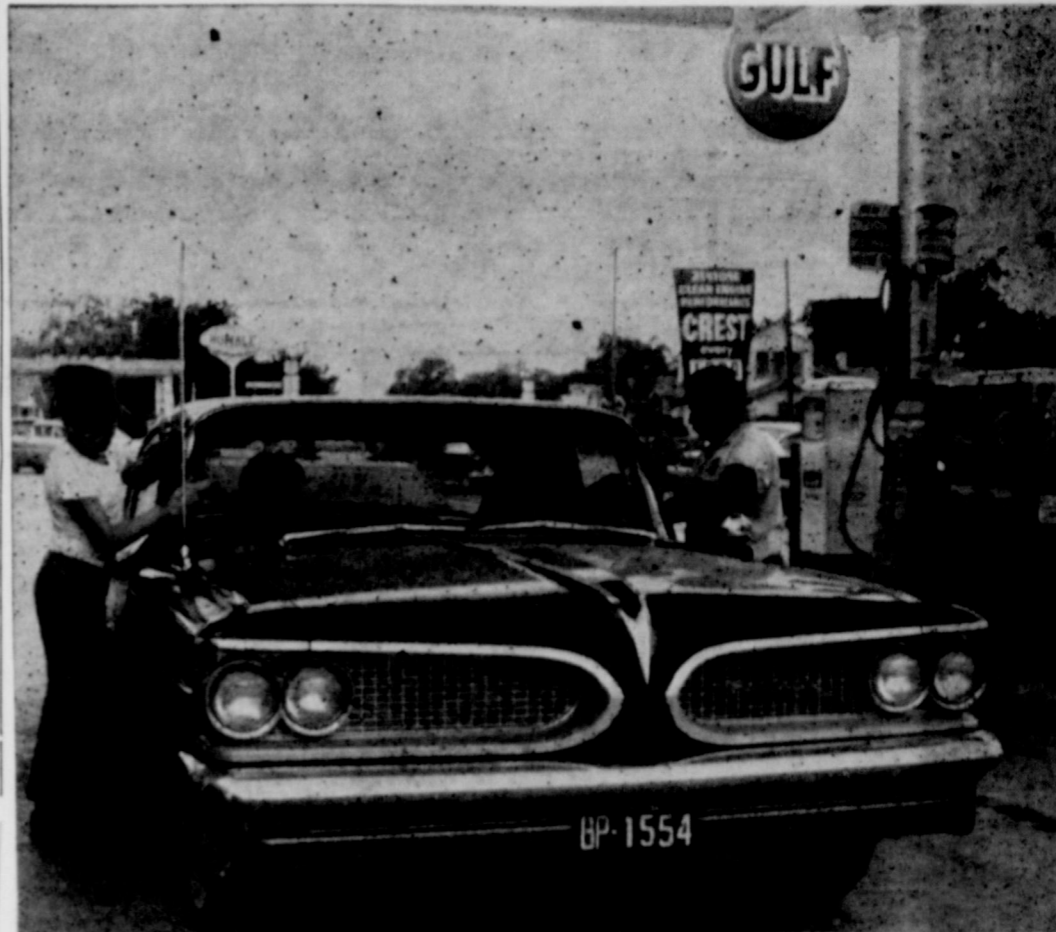

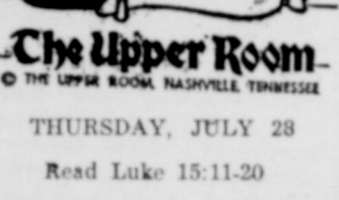
