WILL MONEY BE WASTED?

The writer feels that most of the facilities will be enjoyed and will be available to only the wealthy people of this area and that the project is a waste of money. He also complained because he believes most of the fish in the lakes have been killed by poison washed into the lakes by recent flooding when water came into the reservoirs from the odorous feeding lots in the area of the lakes.

With faint hope of having influence on the problem, attention should be called to the fact that excessive congestion will soon be boiling and stewing around all of the public schools in Slaton unless much better controls are put into effect than have been enforced in many of the past school periods.

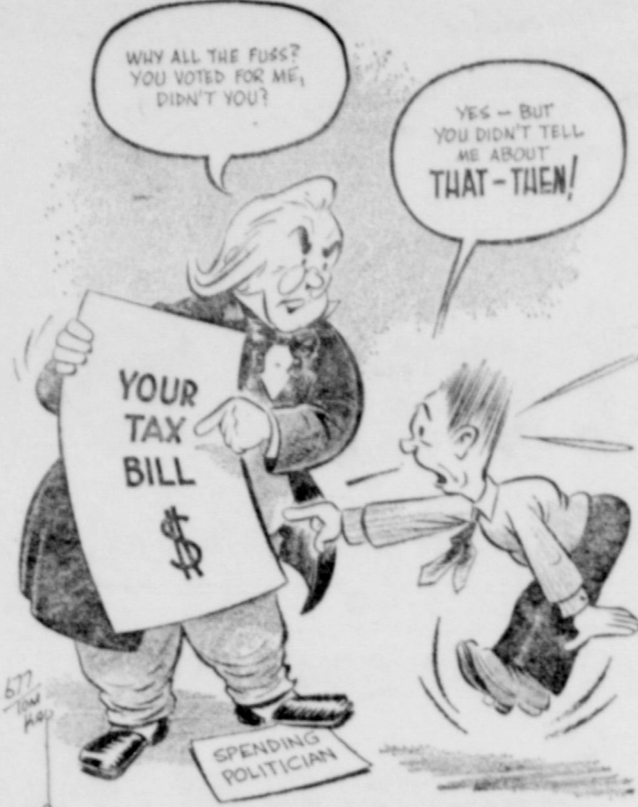
It is true many safety signs and rules to control such congestions are on display and on the city law records and most of them have been served as long as the children were inside the buildings but when the children and teachers arrived or left the buildings all rules have been ignored and there has seldom been a day when school has been in session that most all of the basic rules for safe driving have not been broken at every school building in Slaton.

This is not a new problem nor one that is unique in Slaton. It is one that requires drastic attention in the larger towns demanding constant attention and enforcement of specific laws pertaining to the problems.

It would seem that the parents of the children would be particularly interested in the childrens safety and that they could be depended upon to observe the safety rules but a one eyed idiot who has observed the traffic around the Slaton schools in the past few years could tell you that no dependance can be placed on the folks who drive the local youngsters to and from schools.

If past performances can be used as a criterion of what can be expected then those who are responsible for the traffic near the Slaton schools will have to have and use better regulations than have been in force for many years past. Dependence may be headed our way again.

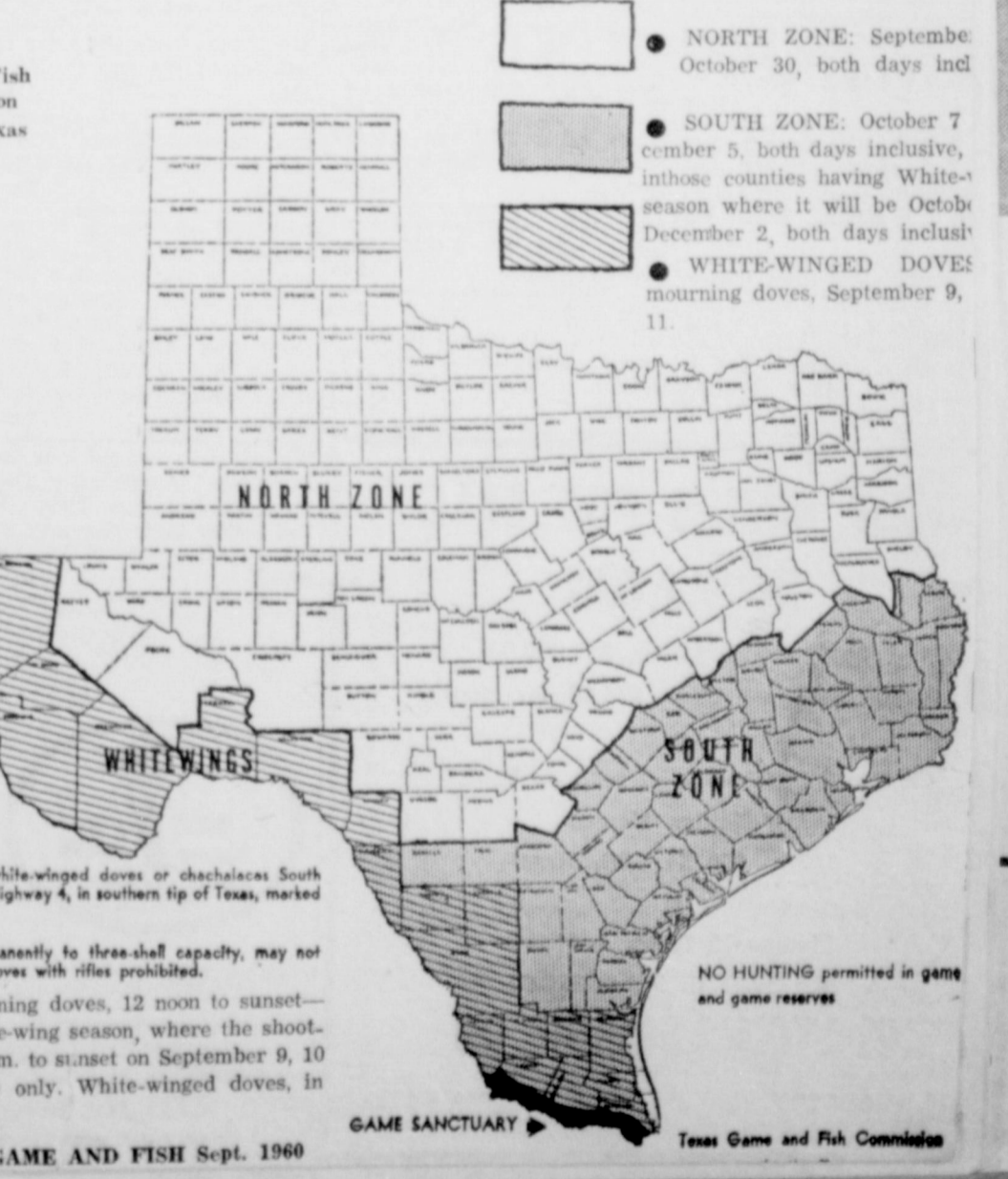

fore the end of the year. No ac-
tion was taken.

The Commission did vote to
purchase a book on eminent
domain, authored by Madison
Rayburn of Houston, a former
Slaton attorney. The book will
be use by the City's legal de-
partment and will remain the
property of the City. Its esti-
mated cost was \$20.

City Secretary J. J. Maxey
reported that he had received
a complaint from a local re-
tail businessman, caused by ex-
cessive distribution of circulars

or advertising pamphlets in the
city. Though the Commission
took no action, it suggested that
The Slatonite publish excerpts
from an ordinance covering such
nuisances.

Ordinance No. 44, passed on
December 10, 1926, prohibits
distributing on any street, side-
walk or alley in the City Limits,
of circulars, handbills or other
printed or written advertise-
ments, or placing them in any
car not his own by any indi-
vidual. It also prohibits throw-
ing or depositing them on any
street, sidewalk or alley. Vio-
lators of the ordinance are gui-
lty of a misdemeanor and sub-
ject to a fine not to exceed \$100.

Other action in a productive
but draggy session included a
report from the Fire Insurance
Checking Office that the City
would be penalized for lack
of overhead storage facilities,
lack of sufficient size water
mains in some areas, lack of
sufficient number of paid fire-
men since recent increases in
the city's population, and that
the City's 1929 model American
La France fire truck was no
longer acceptable.

Though the penalty action is
not expected to be instituted for
some time, allowing correction,
the secretary was instructed to
write the Fire Insurance Commis-
sion for information concerning
costs to the city in relation to
penalties on our key rate.

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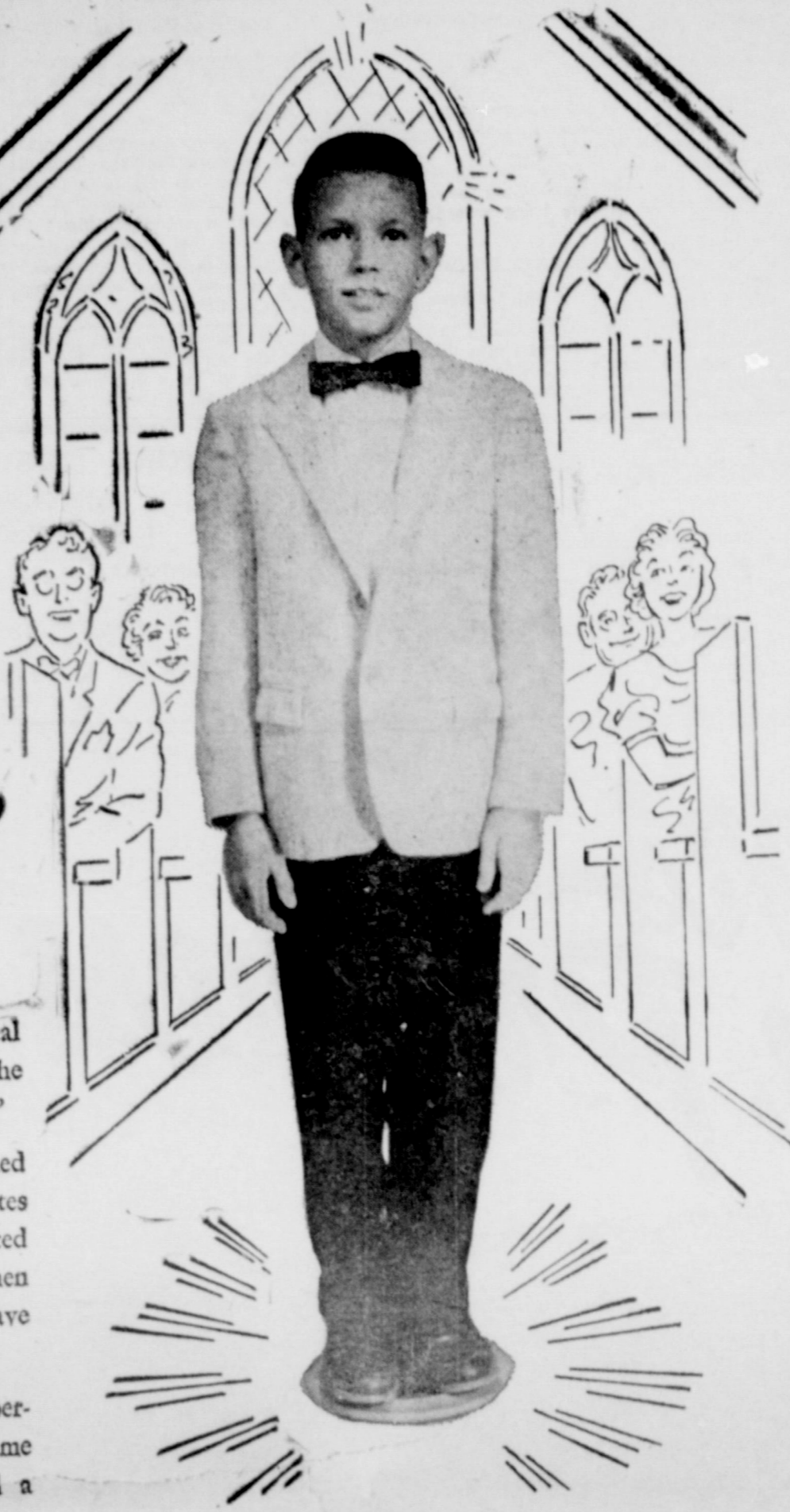

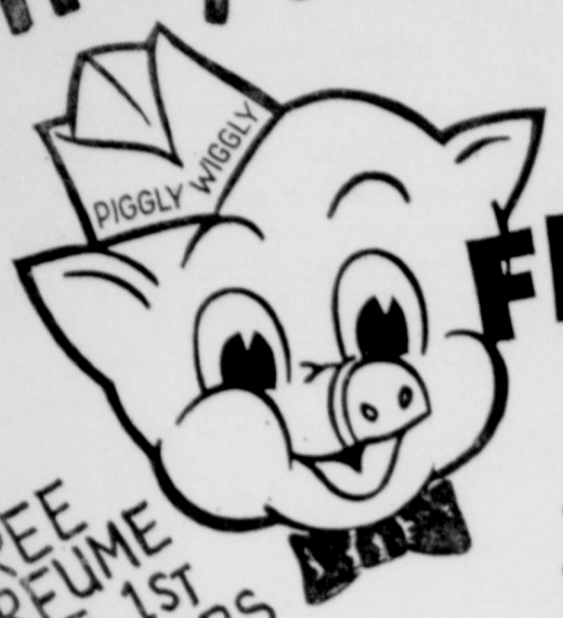

Half-Moon Pie With Fresh Pears



You might describe this Amish Half-Moon Pie as a man-size turnover, wholesome as a Pennsylvania countryside. It is filled with fresh California Bartlett pears and cottage cheese.

Amish Half-Moon Pie
There's a trick to rolling out this mammoth turnover, but the reward in praise is well worth the trouble. Make up pastry for a double crust 9-inch pie. Chill thoroughly. Now core and slice 4 medium-sized fresh California Bartlett pears. Mix with ¼ cup sugar, 2 tablespoons flour, the rind and juice of ½ lemon and a dash of salt. Lightly stir in ½ pint creamed cottage cheese. If you like a spicy pie, sprinkle with cinnamon and nutmeg.

To Roll Out Pastry
Put a large sheet of waxed paper under a cookie sheet, extending about 12 inches beyond the sheet. Sprinkle with flour. Now roll out pastry in one big circle, half on the cookie sheet and half on the waxed paper. Top the cookie sheet half with the pear mixture; dot with butter or margarine and carefully fold over other half (use to allow steam to escape. Bake in hot oven (425°) 40 to 45 minutes or until crust is golden.

Law School. "This volunteer committee, which will work for the adoption of Constitutional Amendment No. 4 on the November 8th ballot, has an initial membership of 92 civic, professional labor, farm and religious leaders from all sections of Texas," McCall stated. "We expect that many others will join with us in bringing this vital issue to the attention of the voters of the State."

"Texas is one of the few states that does not have adequate laws to regulate the small loan industry. As a result, the State has been so notorious for abuses of small borrowers that we have become known throughout the nation as 'The Loan Shark State,'" McCall added.

"Adoption of Amendment No. 4 is essential to the elimination of this evil and the removal of the stigma from the fair name of Texas."

Tom Reavley, Austin attorney and former Secretary of State who has devoted years to actively combating loan sharks, will be vice-chairman of the Committee.

Honorary members of the Committee include Governor Price Daniel, Attorney General Will Wilson, and Lieutenant Governor Ben Ramsey, each of whom has had an interest in this problem and has declared support for the Constitutional Amendment.

Social Security Disability Provisions

"Many people are asking about the disability provisions of the Social Security Act," John G. Hutton, Manager of the Lubbock Social Security District Office, declared today.

"These provisions have drawn the interest of some people who are temporarily out of work because of an injury," Hutton continued. "However, the law was not written to insure the risk of temporary disability."

Hutton explained that under the law the definition of disability is "inability to engage in any substantial gainful activity." The condition must be expected to continue indefinitely or to result in death. It can be either physical or mental, but it must be so severe that it is not likely to be improved by medical treatment to the point of making it possible to return to work.

An example might be a worker who breaks a leg. He knows he will probably be off the job for as much as three months. This might have some effect on his social security record, but when his whole working history is considered upon retirement, the effect would be small. This worker would have every reason to believe he would return to work within the foreseeable future. For this reason, his disability, because it is temporary, would not qualify him under the social security disability provisions.

On the other hand, a worker who discovers he has a severe case of tuberculosis that prevents him from doing any kind of work, has no way of knowing when he will be able to return to work. When he has been disabled six months, he can apply for benefits if he is age 50 or over, or to have his record frozen if he is under age 50.

Hutton noted there are other requirements that must be met before a worker's social security record can be frozen or benefits can be paid. Among these is the work requirement which states that a worker must have social security credit for at least five out of the ten years prior to his date of disability.

Food Sense—Not Nonsense



Enough Of A Good Thing Is Enough

Protein has become a household word. Protein, like June, is busting out all over, wherever the topic is food for health and energy.

What is protein? "It is the stuff our bodies are made of." It is found in every living cell, in hair, bones and muscles. Tissues continually are being rebuilt, and in children, new tissues formed. The emphasis is on protein because only food protein builds tissues. Fortunately, it is distributed widely.

Important animal protein foods are meat, fish, eggs and milk. Vegetable protein foods include those products made from grains. A top quality one is enriched bread. Beans and peanut butter are other good protein foods.

Science has shown that a combination of two or more proteins gives greater benefit than if the same foods are eaten separately. Furthermore, a small amount of animal protein in each meal improves the body's use of all protein eaten. A good example is a sandwich made of enriched bread with a meat filling; the bread and

meat proteins supplement each other.

Protein serves not only as a builder of tissues but it also provides a generous amount of energy. Equal weights of protein and carbohydrate produce exactly the same number of calories—four calories per gram. If an excess of energy is provided by eating either more protein or carbohydrate than is needed, this excess is stored by the body as fat. Enough protein to satisfy tissue needs and furnish a moderate safety factor is enough—excesses become expensive fuel and fat.

Popularity and importance of protein have resulted in a high consumption of these foods. Currently, the average adult diet exceeds the generous protein allowance recommended by the National Research Council.

A simple guide for grownups is found in the Basic Seven Food Chart. Daily, eat a good serving of meat, poultry, or fish, one of the following—eggs, cheese, or legumes; six slices of enriched bread and one pint of milk.

Official Reminds Farmers About Child-Labor Law

DALLAS - Farmers who hire workers for harvesting fall crops were reminded that the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act sets a 16-year age minimum for the employment of children in agriculture during school hours.

The reminder came from Regional Director William J. Rogers of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions here, the agency which administers this law.

"Today and in the foreseeable future, the need for youngsters to meet even higher educational standards is beyond question," he said. "The child's chance for success in later years can depend on whether he enrolls in school this fall."

Rogers pointed out that children may lawfully work on farms before and after school hours or on weekends, but that their place is in the classroom when school is in session in the school district where the child is currently living.

"The law protects the child," Rogers said. "If a child is 23, in the Red Cross Room, City Hall at 1:30 p.m. and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to social security."

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Smith Named To Legislative Conference

Sen. Preston Smith who represents this County and 10 others in West Texas, has been appointed a Delegate from Texas to the National Legislative Conference to be held in Chicago Aug. 31 through Sept. 2.

Sen. Smith was appointed to the post by Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey.

The National Conference is sponsored by the Council of State Governments.

Sen. Smith, appointed to serve on the Texas Legislative Council last year, is the first West Texas Senator to hold such a position.

The Legislative Council Functions as one of the State's most important groups. Serving as a fact-finding body to investigate Departments, Agencies and officers of State Government as the occasions demand. The Council makes studies and gathers information for use in organizing bills for presentation to the Legislature, and makes recommendations, and frames drafts of Legislation as it deems proper.

Sen. Smith is one of five Senators and 10 representatives who with the Speaker of The House and Senate President make up membership of the Legislative Council.

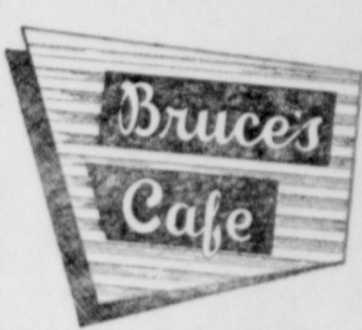

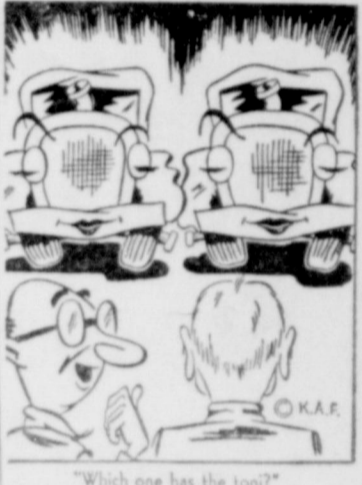

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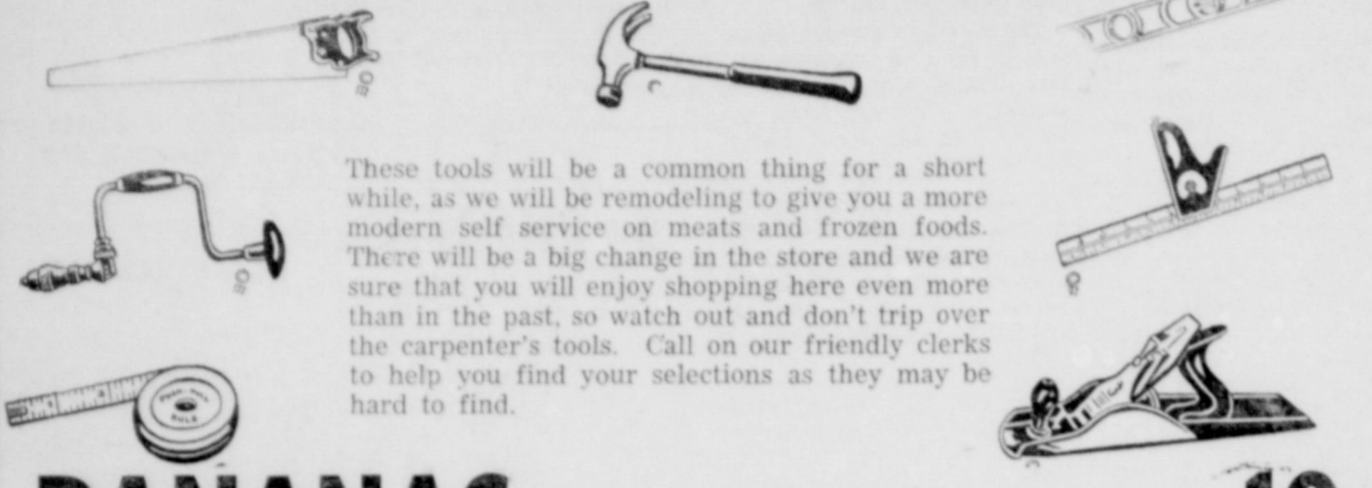

This year the PCG program will feature speakers from the cotton textile industry and the National Cotton Council of America plus a member of the House Committee on Agriculture and an official of the Cotton Division, U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Fortenberry said the PCG was indeed honored this year to have as its annual meeting speakers J. Graig Smith, President of Avondale Mills, Sylacauga, Alabama, and president of the National Cotton Council of America; the Honorable Harlan Hagan, Representative of the 14th California District, who is a member of the House Agriculture Committee; and Ralph H. Raper, Director, Cotton Division, Commodity Stabilization Service of the U.S.D.A., Washington, D. C.

Directors of the PCG will meet at 9:30 A.M. September 2, prior to the annual meeting for the election of officers. Present officers include Fortenberry as president; Wilmer Smith, New Home, vice president; and Roy Forkner, Lubbock ginner, secretary-treasurer.

Free door prizes will be awarded throughout the day and a free barbecue will be held at noon. As a special feature this year, the PCG in thanks for the cooperation and help of South Plains ginners, are awarding a grand prize to some lucky ginner and wife of a free trip to the Texas Ginners Association annual meeting in Dallas next April. To be eligible, the ginner must be present at the annual meeting September 2 and be a cooperating member collecting dues for the PCG.

Fortenberry stressed that all cotton producers, their wives and families are invited to the annual meeting, September 2. "We hope we can have a good attendance from all of our 23 county members", Fortenberry said.

"These projects were done in addition to regular programs of the PCG, Pfeiffenberger explained.
