Local Option Liquor Election Saturday; General Election 8th

The voters of Slaton have two elections facing them within the next five days. Each of the elections is important in its own right. This Saturday, voters will mark their ballots in favor of or against permitting the sale of all forms of alcoholic beverages within the City Limits of Slaton, for off-premise consumption.

Next Tuesday, General Election will have them deciding on their choice for President and Vice-President, senator and a host of other offices from the national level on down.

Saturday's wet-dry election has held the emotions of local voters primarily during the last few weeks, even though the national election has been described as one of the most important in the history of our country.

Chief In Statement On Equal Law Enforcement

Police Chief Eugene L. Martin made a statement to the public this week concerning recent complaints of "discrimination" by the local police department.

Chief Martin's statement: "At this crucial time just before an important city election, your police department's handling of arrests has been questioned in a manner that reflects

on our judgement of fair and equal law enforcement.

"I do not think that it is the desire of the majority of Slaton's citizens to see their police agency placed in a position so that its efficiency may be damaged. Of course we want fair and impartial law enforcement, and we are entitled to just exactly that and should be satisfied with nothing less.

"Your police department is not a tool to be used for personal gain by anyone, but is an agency that is sworn to protect your life and property and to enforce the law to the law violator, regardless of his race with equal firmness and courtesy to all.

"This describes your police department practices in the past and will continue to be true in the future, that law enforcement will be administered where necessary with equal fairness to all, regardless of social position or regardless of race."

Saturday's election will have only one issue to be resolved, that of the legalization of sales of alcoholic beverages. The ballot in this election instructs voters to stratch or mark out one statement so that the one remaining shall indicate the way they wish to vote.

First two lines on the ballot say, "For the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only." The second two lines say, "Against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only."

An estimated 2,000 persons within the City Limits of Slaton have paid their poll tax and estimates of persons who have exemptions have run as high as 800, so the possibility of an election in which 2,800 persons vote exists.

There will be three boxes in the Saturday election with Box 26 being in the Retail Merchants office in City Hall, Box 27 in the Chamber of Commerce office in City Hall, and Box 28 in the City Secretary's office in City Hall.

Judges will be J. C. Smith Jr. in Box 26, Charlie Whalen in Box 27, and Joe Walker Jr. in Box 28.

To be qualified to vote you must have paid your poll tax or be exempt and be a bona fide resident of the City of Slaton for the last six months and the State of Texas the past year.

The polls will open at 8:00 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. A decision should be forthcoming by about 9 p. m.

Absentee voting in the two elections has been heavy, with the County Clerk's office placing Mrs. Arlona Short, deputy county clerk, in Drewry's Insurance office here to take absentee votes.

A total of 155 persons had voted absentee in Saturday's election in the box at Drewry Insurance, and 47 at the County Clerk's office in Lubbock for a grand total of 202 absentee votes, heavy enough to indicate a probable good turnout Saturday.

In the General Election, 126 voted here absentee by late Wednesday morning and the Clerk's office in Lubbock reports a total of 1,034 absentee votes across the county, including Slaton.

The same boxes will be voted in the General Election as in the local option election in Slaton, with the same judges and the same opening and closing hours for the polls.

EDITORIALS

One Final Word

The politicking and campaigning are about over. Now approaches the day on which our whole political system is based, the day when the free choice of the people will decide the course of government.

If you haven't paid your poll tax, it is too late; hang your head in shame. If you haven't decided between candidates, do it now. If you have made your choices, review them to be sure they are the best that can be made. Ask: if I knew that the entire election hinged on my single ballot, how would I vote?

We hope you will vote for candidates who combine strong purpose with careful judgement. It is essential to keep a high level of national defense. It is equally essential to avoid excessive government spending which would lead to economic weakness through higher debt, heavier taxes and more inflation.

On Election Day let no petty dissatisfaction with candidates or parties, no minor inconvenience of weather, or health, or distance, or other business, keep you from the polls. Our ballot was bought with blood and sacrifice by past Americans. Using it — and using it wisely — is a debt we owe our nation and the future Americans who will inherit it.

Dangerous Distractions

The next administration will have to deal with two crucial responsibilities — national defense and foreign policy. It seems likely that the survival of this nation and of the free world will depend upon how successfully these responsibilities are met.

Defense and foreign policy are true national responsibilities, since they can not be handled by any branch of government below the federal level. Because of their importance, they need the fullest and most skillful attention of both the Congress and the Executive. Yet in dealing with them, the national government will be hampered by a surplus of "national" problems that are not truly national. Most of these problems can and should be handled at the state, county and city level where they originate.

Lack of local funds is most often given as the reason for not dealing locally with problems such as slums, roads and schools. Yet, except for import duties, the federal government has access to no tax sources that are not available to the state and local governments. The total of national wealth is no greater than the sum of local wealth in the nation.

Putting more and more burdens on the federal government — as many political candidates have advocated — is dangerously shortsighted. Every secondary duty that distracts the national government from its primary responsibility for foreign policy and defense increases the danger of war and disaster.

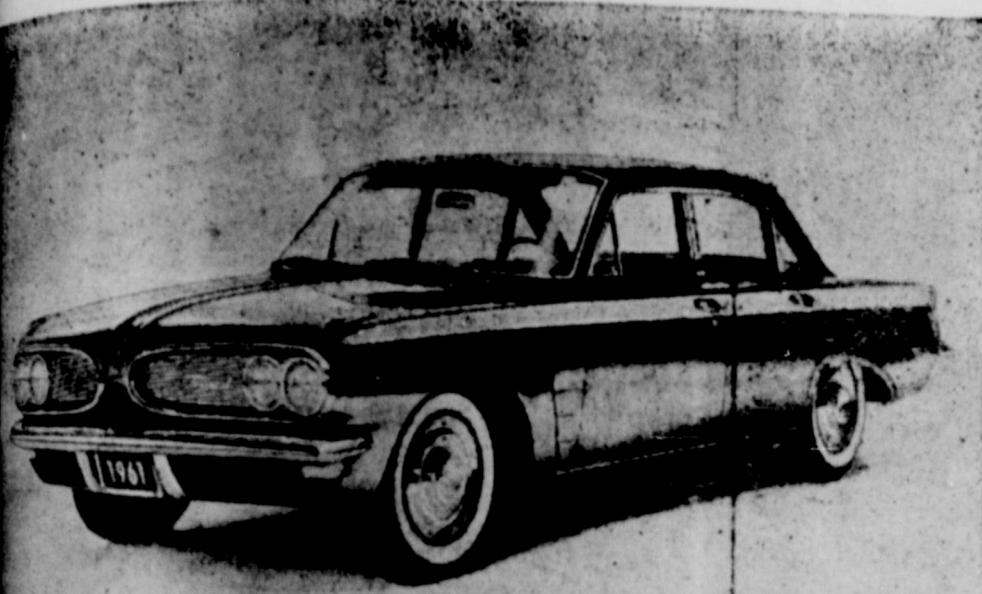

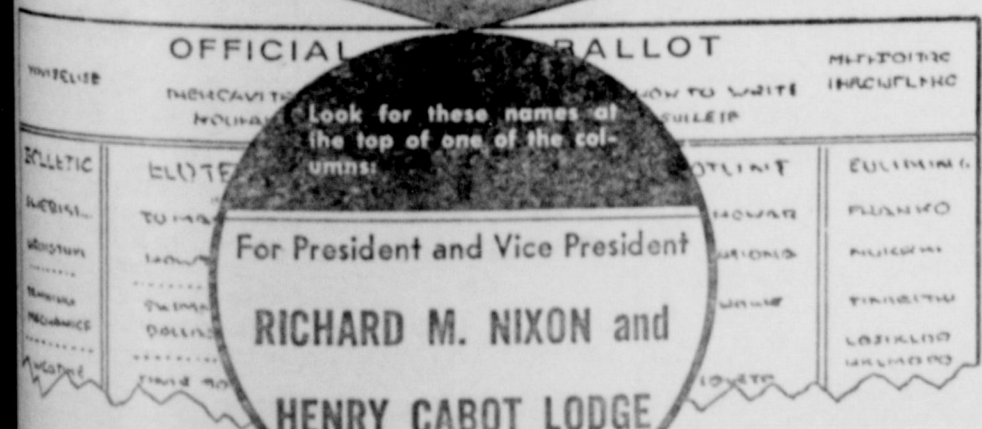

everything else. But, the percentage of alcoholics is only a fraction of the people who use alcohol beverages of some description. Hundreds in the average age income group, who are citizens paying taxes, owning homes, cars, and living more or less on an average keel with the high American standards, use alcohol as they desire with ill effects to no one. Anyone in the above group will be the quickest to tell you that alcohol to excess is no good and readily subscribe to the proper control which the law outlines.

As for the financial end of the beverage question, the figures represented for licenses are only the token advantages. At present several hundred persons are directly or indirectly in the beverage industry in Amarillo alone. These people are earning a living and placing that money back into the city where they live.

One last paragraph before we vote. If our forefathers left this issue a question for voters to decide, the amusing aspect to me is that a person who votes wet should be allowed to vote twice. If the dries win then I have lost my choice. If the wets win then a dry voter still has his choice left. He can stay dry as long as he desires, unless, as some say, the gutters will run bank full and he falls

numerous letters in regard to the legal alcohol situation.

It must be a wonderful feeling to be on the "right" side and be able to write or say anything you might desire without running the risk of public criticism. However since the question has speedily become a question of just who is on the "right" side, I keep having the desire to write you how one individual feels.

I would like to start with the well-known phrase, "Fourscore and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, etc."

A beautiful phrase and the old chaps did a wonderful job right along. The freedom of religion, freedom of the press and speech, and all the other wonderful freedoms inserted in the Bill of Rights were and are the most sacred thing to American

heritage today. But, and I do say but, if they had inserted restrictions against moral legislation it would have been to the better interest of the American cause. In other words, I for one do not believe in moral legislation and that is what the entire alcohol question is. If a person desires the use of alcoholic beverages why should anyone have the right to suppress their desire? Control, yes, but to forbid, no. The laws, both federal and state controlling alcohol beverages are fine and when given an opportunity can and do handle the problems that arise with legal alcohol sales and use.

The entire question is an adult problem, please, do not drag our young people into the question. If you are capable of teaching and raising your children properly, then you have nothing to fear regardless of where you live. There are just as many fine young people in legalized wet areas of the nation as there are in the dry areas.

With an open mind I read the ad appearing in last week's Slatonite presented by the dry forces of Slaton. Statistically, the figures prove nothing. The rate of alcohol violations in wet counties of Texas represent a very low average when broken down per county and per population. Statistics in the alcohol question prove very little for the dries or for the wets. As far as the position taken by the dries about what a "drinker" will spend for food, clothing, and other essentials of life, I agree with you that a drinker or alcoholic may and usually does place the bottle ahead of

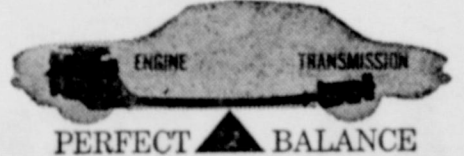

To all qualified voters who reside in the Cities of Amarillo, Borger, Brownfield, Lamesa, Levelland, Lubbock, Pampa, Plainview, O'Donnell, Slaton, and Tahoka, Texas, and within the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

Take notice that an election will be held on the 22nd day of November, 1960, within the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority in compliance with resolution and order duly enacted by the Board of Directors of said Authority on the 12th day of September, 1960, and which resolution and order is a part of this notice being in words and figures and follows to-wit:

"A resolution calling an election to be held on the 22nd day of November, 1960, in the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said Authority who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation the question of whether or not the Board of Directors shall have the authority to enter into a contract with the United States of America for the construction of the Canadian River Project as authorized by Public Law 898 an Act of Congress which became effective December 29, 1950, and for payment by the Authority of the reimbursable cost of the construction operation and maintenance of the project in accordance with the reclamation law."

Whereas the Board of Directors of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority has determined upon the construction of certain facilities commonly known and referred to as the "Canadian River Project" for the purpose of providing a source of water supply for the member cities of the Authority for municipal, domestic, industrial and other useful purposes permitted by law, to-wit:

A dam and reservoir on the Canadian River at Sanford, Texas; Pumping stations, pipe lines or aqueducts;

And other works and facilities designed for the purpose of impounding, processing and delivering water for the aforementioned purposes;

And whereas, this board finds that plans have been filed in the office of the Secretary of the Authority as well as a report of the United States Department of the Interior, Bureau of Reclamation, covering the plan, plant's facilities and improvements to be purchased and constructed, together with maps, plats, profiles and data fully showing and explaining same, which report is open to inspection by the public;

And whereas the aforesaid report contains among other things a detailed estimate of the cost of such improvements and an estimate of the time required to complete same so that service therefrom can be commenced;

And whereas, a summary of said estimate of the cost of said facilities and improvements including the cost of property to be purchased, as shown in the report aforesaid, is as follows:

Canadian River Project, Texas, estimated reimbursable construction costs, Sanford Dam and reservoir, 1% main structure and reservoir, \$26,097,000; relocations (gas wells, pipe lines, etc.) \$4,963,000; sub total \$31,060,000 less non-reimbursables (flood control) \$3,130,000; \$27,930,000 11 aqueduct system 1% pumping plants \$10,060,000; 2 pipe lines and chlorination system, \$54,170,000; 3% remote control communication system \$800,000; sub total \$65,030,000; total reimbursable cost \$92,990,000.

Whereas, this board has received from the United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Reclamation, a form of contract whereunder the United States Government is to construct the facilities embraced in and at the costs estimated by the aforementioned report and whereunder the authority shall be obligated to repay all reimbursable costs incurred in such respect by the United States Government;

And whereas, copies of said form of contract are on file in the office of the Secretary of the Authority, have been placed in the hand of the governing body of each member city and are available for examination upon request of any interested party at the office of Secretary of the Authority;

And whereas this Board upon deliberation, considers that such contract is in the best interest of the Authority and its inhabitants and that same should be entered into when authorized by an election held in the manner provided by the laws of the State of Texas;

And whereas, this Board finds that due notice of its intention to call the election herein ordered has been duly given by mailing and publication as prescribed of section 15 (1) of article 8280-154 RCS of Texas, as a condition precedent to the enactment hereof;

That no resolutions have been received from the governing body of any member city requesting withdrawal from the Authority under the provisions of the aforementioned statute;

And that accordingly through-out the Authority and in each of the member cities of which it is comprised;

And whereas, this Board has concluded that it should now proceed to submit the proposition for its Authority to enter into said contract to an election as provided by law;

Now therefore, be it resolved and ordered by the Board of Directors of Canadian River Municipal Water Authority:

Section 1: That the aforementioned report of the Department of the Interior of Reclamation is hereby in all things approved and adopted.

Section 2: That the aforementioned form of contract presented this board by the United States Department of the Interior, Bureau of Reclamation, be and same is hereby approved for submission at the election herein ordered.



Approximately 90 acres of the cotton is under irrigation and 90 acres dry land. Fifty acres of milo are under irrigation while the remainder is dry-land.

Church Group Agrees Alcohol Not "Evil"
DALLAS (AP) — Episcopal clergymen in Oak Cliff have unanimously agreed that alcohol may be misused but is not "essentially evil."
The clergymen said they were opposed to outlawing the sale of alcoholic beverages on the grounds that it "imposes a spiritual despotism."
"Prohibition of the use of alcoholic beverages impose a spiritual despotism which, violates the doctrine of man's free will to choose between right and wrong," they said in a statement.

WHENEVER there is a "wet-dry" election in these parts, the public is treated to an example of the "irresistible force meeting the immovable object."
The argument concurrently on in Slaton—and which is being engaged into some extent in Lubbock—is a case in point.

If Slaton OK's "off - premises" sale of alcoholic beverages, say its proponents, every taxpayer in Lubbock County—as well as those in several adjacent counties—will benefit. This is because "there will be fewer arrests for bootlegging, less time spent in investigations and trials, hence a saving to the taxpayers." Also, say proponents, "officers and prosecutors will have more time to spend on serious crimes, of which especially Lubbock has no shortage."

Opponents of legal sale say the argument of the other camp is "so much hogwash." They say that if Slaton legalizes the beverages, "the easier and quicker availability of liquor and beer in Lubbock will increase the amount of drinking and automatically increase automobile accidents and crime."

The "drys" in Lubbock contend that legislation in Slaton will increase bootlegging here because 'leggers' "will have an unending supply close at hand and will thus make their wares more readily available here than now is the case." This argument, however, doesn't stand up. Without question, legalization in Post—and to a less extent at Nazareth—has cut deeply into the bootleg business here. Legalization in Slaton may be expected to do likewise or more-so.

The "wets" say that the question isn't one of keeping alcoholic beverages out, or letting them in; but, in stead, of substituting legal sale for the illegal kind.

Ever since the legalization in Post, the saving has been in Slaton: "Post gets the money, Slaton gets the empty cans—and Lubbock gets the drunks."

In the endless row over how best to handle alcohol, it's been going on ever since the first man tromped up a mess of grapes—on may marshal statistics which will prove any point.

Actually, when it comes to crime, and even, the incidence of drunk driving, whether a place has legal liquor, or not, is of no visible import. What is of import is the efficiency of law enforcement officers, prosecutors—and the attitudes of citizens on juries.

Connecticut, for instance, is wringing wet from one end to the other. However, its DWI record is far from smaller than that of any "dry" area, and so is its safety record insofar as automobile mishaps are concerned.

The upcoming decision in Slaton is no different from any like it that has been seen in these parts since national prohibition went down the drain. The question is, "can alcoholic beverages be better controlled under legal or illegal methods?"

And no matter what the verdict in Slaton—or anywhere else — everybody will not be satisfied.

ATTENTION FATHERS AND MOTHERS

Are you against the legalizing of liquor in Slaton? Do you think this is protecting your children from liquor? Do you realize that nearly 60 per cent of the Slaton youth, at some time, buy some type of liquor from the bootleggers in Slaton?

There is no age limit, no need for identification; all they need is the amount of money to buy the beverage.

There is definitely no control over the sanitation and moral characters of the operators of these illicit places. ARE YOU SURE YOUR CHILD IS NOT ONE OF THE MANY?

The teenagers make a joke of the election. They know that dry, they can get liquor at nearly anytime, with little trouble at all. If Slaton were wet it would be almost impossible for them to obtain liquor. And yet, you see them work for a dry Slaton, when this is what they want, so they can continue on their merry way. Is this what you are supposedly protecting your children from, LIQUOR? You are causing them to form a law - breaking habit, which leads to one of the worst forms of delinquency.

To buy liquor from bootleggers is exciting and daring, but if Slaton were wet it would be almost impossible to buy and take the fun from their drinking.

The youth of Slaton have no real way to show how they would vote. As their parents you say dry, so what can they do but follow you on that subject, but something they are told not to do is exactly what they will try to do. And if this liquor is brought out in the open it will lose most of its attractions.

Liquor is here in Slaton, so why try to pretend you don't know, bring it out in the open, make it LEGAL, and protect your children from the trouble caused by anything unlawful.

As parents it is up to you to teach your children right or wrong. Is it right to allow them to buy from bootleggers, not with your permission, but they do buy it. If it were legalized you could or should be able to teach them whether to use liquor or not. And when they are of the proper age to buy liquor it will be your guidance through their younger years that stops or permits their drinking and not that they are in a wet town.

When you start to cast your vote, stop and think of your children. Wet, it will be nearly impossible for them to obtain it, dry, and it will be there for them at any time.

Professional Man —

People act just like ostriches. They hide their heads and won't look up or around to see things that the teenagers are doing. I also don't like for the teenagers to be telling grown people how to vote. I think it's time we grownups wake up to face facts, as they are. And stop being hippocrits. Don't look on liquor as a "Moral Issue." I do not think it is sinful to vote for liquor. There is no question of sin involved in this subject.

Tavern and Liquor Store Owner —

I am from a dry city. I have seen 95% more drunks in that town than I have ever seen in my Tavern or Liquor Store, or furthermore more in this town since it went wet. We had a very few drunks when it first went wet but there are none now. I think this is a real good percentage, well it is a good percent. It is 100% better than people who live in dry towns see.

As for the minors that come to our business, we tell them to leave quietly as quick as possible, then if they don't we put them out. We don't want them trying to start trouble. The legal way is far the best way to handle liquor.

Sheriff Officer in a Wet Town —

It is the best thing that ever happened to our city. The Juvenile Delinquent problem has solved itself. The teenager can't get liquor at all. We do very little worrying about the teenager getting liquor. The person who should happen to buy liquor for Minors is in very serious trouble. It is a severe penalty for persons who do this. There are no bootleggers at all in our city now. There were always so many things we had to do rather than trying to keep the bootlegger out of business. Now that we don't have to keep them

out of business we can give all our attention to the other things now and help make our city much nicer to live in.

Banker — Professional Business Man —

I don't want it to be wet in the Precinct. But I do want the city to go wet, for Package Stores Only. I do not think we could handle or control the sale of Precinct liquor. I do think people should vote to their own rights, without hurting the business. I think they should vote the way they desire.

A Farmer —

Slaton going wet will help business in general. As for the traffic, it is fearful from Friday afternoon till Sunday. A person can hardly get on the highway there and when they do get on it they can hardly get off of it. The Spanish people are going to Post to work because Post is wet. That has made us farmers looking for workers. Whereas they were close around where we needed them.

A Doctor —

My business isn't hurt by Post. But something is hurting my collections. I am going to vote wet. I am for it for several reasons. One of the reasons is the teenage problem. The teenage problem will solve itself when Slaton goes wet. "You cannot have an island of dryness in a sea of wetness." People should back their convictions of dry with their drinking habits.

A Groceryman —

Business is being taken elsewhere out of town. I believe the farmers are taking their Spanish people to Post to get their week's supply of groceries because Post is wet, therefore it is taking our trade out of town. We do not have the Spanish people here this year and I believe it's because the Spanish people have gone to Post to work because it's wet. The traffic is awful, so many people have been killed that shouldn't have been.

A Groceryman —

Something has hurt my business. There aren't as many Spanish here. I don't know where they have gone but they are not here. The traffic has increased from 25 to 35 percent on the highway after 5 in the afternoon. A person can't hardly get on the highway in the afternoon. It is really dangerous.

Department Store Manager in Post —

She said that she thought it was the best thing that had ever happened to Post, for more than one reason. She said that the problem of the teenage children had been solved. The kids are staying out of the colored section of Post and they are also staying out of our Spanish part of Post. It has also helped the business of the stores. The business of the store has picked up several percent. The credit is better and the collections are about the same.

A Cafe Owner —

I want it to go wet. The reason I want it to go wet is for business reasons. I also think it would be better for the town. The traffic problem would be solved. The people would stop at the city limits or close to the limits and then go home. I don't think there would be as many drunks on the road or possibly no drunks on the highway. They would get home before they had a chance to get too much liquor. I also think the young people's problem would be solved. People, don't you know that if you give something to someone, he doesn't want it. If people would realize what they will be doing if they vote dry they would hide their heads in shame.

Professional Business Man —

I think we should have an election to see what the people want. As for liquor, I am for it 100 percent. One reason is because we have liquor here at all times and I think we should legalize it. I think people should stop putting their heads down like ostriches. It is so silly for people to be like this. Why don't they get around and see what is going on in our little town. They say they do, but they won't really get out and find out because they know they are going to be shocked. It is really fearful if people could realize it. It is time to do something about it. I think this is one of the first steps.
