

# Dukakis, Bush, favored by Hispanics

In this year's presidential race, the growing Hispanic vote could make the difference in key races in big electoral vote states like California, Texas, New York, Florida and Illinois. It could also be the deciding vote in New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, New Jersey and Connecticut.

Therefore, the appeal that Democratic and Republican contenders have to Latinos will be an important factor.

With the focus now on the Iowa caucuses and the New Hampshire primary, there have

been few chances to assess the candidates' Hispanic appeal. The March 8 "Super Tuesday" Southern primary, however, will see the candidates stumping in Texas and Florida.

For now, judging the candidates' popularity with Hispanics is a highly subjective exercise. Still, some interesting things can be pointed out.

For the Republicans, George Bush wins hands down. When the vice president, an adoptive Texan, announced in Houston last October, he addressed some of his remarks in Spanish. Bush has visited

Florida frequently; son Jeb until recently chaired the Dade County Republican Party. Jeb, who speaks fluent Spanish, is married to Columba Garnica, a native of Mexico.

The vice president has traveled a good deal to Puerto Rico, and his first legal adviser in the White House, Rafael Capo, is from the island. Bush may lose a few points on his preppie image, but overall, he's the top Republican.

Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole of Kansas comes in second. He had Hispanics in key staff positions long before

anyone started keeping score. When he became majority leader in 1984, Dole named longtime aide Ernie Garcia as Sergeant at Arms of the Senate. Dole, too, has traveled often to the commonwealth of Puerto Rico and to Florida, Texas and other states of significant Hispanic concentration. But he does not speak Spanish and comes across as less simpatico than Bush.

In terms of Hispanic concerns and appeal, the other Republicans; Kemp, duPont, Robertson, Haig are not on the

radar screen.

The Democratic Party has long been home to U.S. Hispanics. Some attribute this to a strong labor base and advocacy of social programs. Liberal Sen. Paul Simon is an excellent example. The former representative from downstate Illinois has little reason to cultivate Latinos. But his concern for jobs, training, bilingual education, the drop out rate, housing and other issues springs from the heart, not expediency. Simon's politics, however, can cut both ways. They may be at odds with the mainstream values that gave Ronald Reagan record Hispanic votes in 1980 and 1984.

Jesse Jackson long ago saw Hispanics as soul mates, as kin whom full opportunity had passed by. He began building a black/Hispanic coalition in the '70s with Raul Yzaguirre, president of the National Council of La Raza. He says most of the right things for Latinos; he is simpatico. But unable to gain the nomination, he will be limited to brokering his power.

Former Arizona Gov. Bruce Babbitt, who speaks Spanish and has been popular regionally, has yet to catch on nationally. Sen. Albert Gore of Tennessee, and Gary Hart, back again, seem to have very little support among Latino voters.

The highest marks go to Gov. Michael Dukakis of Massachusetts. The son of Greek immigrants, he has

ethnic appeal. His state has a sizable and growing Latino population, one to which he has paid considerable attention for two decades as a state legislator and three terms as governor. Dukakis studied in Peru in 1956, is fluent in Spanish and likes to use it frequently in his public appearances.

I remember that in 1983, Dukakis, then running for the governorship he had lost previously, attended a Hispanic fund raiser at a Mexican restaurant in Washington D.C. The money could not have been a major motivator; yet he was there, at ease, enjoying the companion ship.

Dukakis points proudly to several Latino projects in his state. He has been enthusiastically received at several national Hispanic conferences. Finally, his politics, with emphasis on jobs, training, urban renewal and improved relations with Latin America, have won him applause.

So for now, as we begin a new year and before the candidates test their mettle in the South, Dukakis wins the Hispanic appeal contest in several categories: ethnicity, language, experience, concern, politics and sincerity. It remains to be seen how he can use these assets to advantage regionally and nationally.

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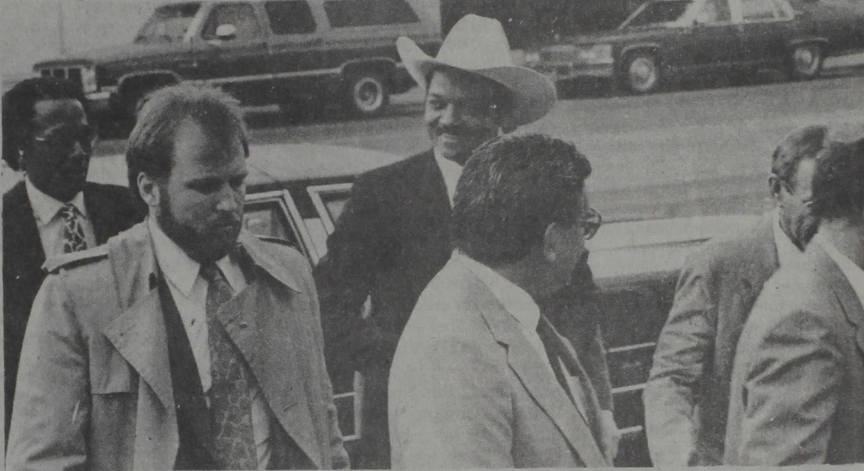

## Statewide Hispanic Women's Network

More than 200 of the state's most active Hispanic women joined in creating the Hispanic Women's Network of Texas (HWNT), the first organization of its kind in the state, during a recent day long conference at the Colony Parke Hotel in Dallas.

The conference, funded by a grant from Anheuser Busch Companies, was designed to address issues of concern to the Hispanic women of Texas, officially adopt the by laws and mission statement of the organization and elect its first board of directors and officers.

Participating in the event were 20 member delegations from Austin, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Houston, Laredo, Lubbock, Midland Odessa, Rio Grande Valley and San Antonio.

"As one statewide association, the Hispanic Women's Network of Texas can speak a unified voice on behalf of Texas Hispanic women," said newly elected president Maria Luisa Mercado and the assistant attorney general of Texas from Lubbock.

HWNT's other newly elected interim officers are: first vice president Amalia Rodriguez Mendoza, director of Voter Registration for Travis County, Austin; second vice president Dr. Diana Mendoza Freeman, executive vice president of the Laredo Chamber of Commerce; third vice president Olga "Cookie" Mapula, president of Communications Group, El Paso; secretary Delma Avalos, Odessa; treasurer Sylvia Rodriguez, San Antonio;

and historian Martha Hinojosa Nadler, Southwestern Bell, Austin.

"We at Anheuser Busch are very proud to have participated with this landmark event," said Jim Estrada, Corporate Relations manager for Anheuser Busch Companies.

The conference, was hosted and coordinated by the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund (MALDEF). Representing MALDEF were president and general counsel Antonio Hernandez and Texas state policy analyst Dora Tovar, who also served as conference coordinator.

In delivering the afternoon keynote address, Hernandez stated that MALDEF believes the aims and objectives of HWNT will educate not only other Hispanic women, but all Texans. "And education is the key to the advancement and improvement of the quality of life for all of the Hispanic community," she said.

HWNT will reconvene shortly to plan its specific activities and goals for 1988. Permanent officers will be elected after the organization has received its official tax exempt non profit status.

## Last Week to Register

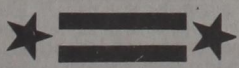
The Hispanic Association of Women (HAW) led local organizations in registering new voters during the past 3 weeks. HAW has surpassed its goal of 200 by 33 and reached 116% of its goal. During the program 13 organizations were asked to register at least 200 new voters each in order to reach an overall goal of 2,000. In contrast to HAW, the American G.I. Forum has not registered any new voters in the past 3 weeks.

The other organizations level of achievement of its own 200 new registered voters in order of achievement are as

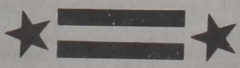

## Latino Media Groups Must Be More Confrontational

In January, 1981, when I became involved in the struggle for Hispanics to attain employment parity and fairer treatment in the media, there existed two or perhaps three local associations of Hispanic media professionals. Of these, none were national or even statewide in scope, and only one had adequate financial support and an active membership. Then, in the span of a few years, there was an explosion of such organizations. By the end of 1984, there were more than two dozen associations, including three that were national.

Now there are five national associations plus local groups in almost every U.S. city with a sizable Hispanic population. But the proliferation of these groups has subsided, and some critics have argued their impact has diminished as well.

What has been accomplished? What does the future portend for these associations? What is the current situation of Hispanics in the media?

One significant accomplishment has been the developments of a national consciousness; another is greater communication among Hispanic media professionals throughout the country. Traveling around the United States in the early 1980s to meet with Hispanic journalists, I learned that the few who were out there knew little about each other. This hurt Hispanic journalists, for in their disunity, they had virtually no voice or visibility with the media decision makers in this country. They were alone in their struggles to build careers.

This growth in networking is evident in the positive response to the annual Hispanic media conference. Since the first conference in 1982, which drew 250 participants, to the one in 1987, attended by more than 1,500 people, I have had countless Hispanic media professionals and students tell me how thrilled they were to meet so many of their peers. That excitement spawned many of the Hispanic media organizations around the country.

A second accomplishment resulted from our growing unity and communication. We gained

the attention, and to a limited extent the cooperation, of most of the principal media companies and associations. In the early 1980s, Hispanics were nonexistent in the minds of media executives, especially in the East, which remains the intellectual and financial heartland of media power in this country.

But now, Hispanics are regularly included in scholarship programs, job fairs, internships, and editing and management training programs.

Although we have made these gains in the past half dozen years, we remain far from our goal of proper representation in all areas and levels of print and broadcast media. In fact, there is reason to fear that we are losing ground.

One obstacle is the negligible financial support Hispanic media groups receive from most media companies. What support has been received by our media associations has come from the same small number of media companies and foundations, Gannett outstanding among them. The vast majority of these supporters have been newspapers; hardly any have been TV or radio stations (a disturbing fact, given that radio is the most relied upon medium among Hispanics).

Because of the recent stock market crash, the problem of financial support will likely get much worse. Those companies that have provided support will now give less. Those that never gave will now attribute their callous stinginess to the stock market.

Two thirds of the nation's daily newspapers employ no minorities an indictment of that industry. But there are signs of hope.

Two of the principal newspaper associations the American Society of Newspaper Editors and the American Newspaper Publishers Association have created strong minority committees, hired full time staff (no Hispanics until this month) to address minority issues and conducted numerous minority job fairs throughout the country. There has been no effort remotely comparable to this in broadcasting, and we are losing ground.

Admittedly, minority employment has long been much higher in broadcasting than in print

media. (Currently, the minority newsroom employment figures are 13 percent in TV, 9 percent in radio and 7 percent in newspapers). Studies for the Radio & TV News Directors Association, however, document the consistent decline of minority employment in broadcasting since 1980.

As the Reagan administration has taken the teeth out of the Federal Communications Commission's initiatives to offer opportunities for minorities in the industry as well as stripped other affirmative action efforts of their effectiveness broadcasters have had less outside pressure to hire minorities. Now, the situation for minorities looks particularly grim because of the major "restructuring" all TV networks have undergone the past couple of years. Broadcast executives today are increasingly bottom line oriented; the networks are cutting back on staff in areas where minorities have always been most highly represented reporting and community affairs.

Faced with the prospect of diminishing financial support and growing employment problems in broadcasting, Hispanic media associations need to consider new strategies if they are to remain viable and productive.

One option they must consider is to become more confrontational with the "powers that be" in the media. For example, they can publicly list those media companies that are most recalcitrant about hiring or promoting minorities. They can develop ties with other minority media associations, strengthening cooperation between Hispanic, black, Asian American and Native American media organizations.

They can also link with Latino professionally based and community based associations that are concerned about the damage caused to Hispanics by the present level and quality of coverage. Community based activists may be in a better position to be aggressive with obdurate media officials, and their efforts would be more successful with the advice and support of minority media professionals who understand the workings of the business.

These strategies recognize the fact that media companies often must be forced to do what's right. No Hispanic media association relishes the prospect of confrontation, but to achieve the

parity and fair treatment we seek, we will need to become more assertive or face diminishing strength and effectiveness.

The media industry has certainly demonstrated that its commitment to social equality is no greater if as great than that of other businesses. By its failure to act with real commitment in the '70s and '80s, it has proven that it does not even understand its own professional need to include 20 million U.S. Hispanics in its family. project has now achieved 50% of its very ambitious goal of 2,000 new registered voters," said Dr. Maria Rivas, director of the project. "The approximate 40 volunteers who have worked very hard for the last 3 weeks represent various civic organizations in the Lubbock area," said Rivas.

The Voter registration deadline for people who want to vote in the super Tuesday primary is February 7th at midnight. A last drive is scheduled for the organizations this coming Saturday the 6th. "In order to achieve our goal of 2,000, we need to have at least 60 volunteers out on Saturday in order to go door to door from 9 am until at least 4 pm and register 915 new voters," said Rivas.

# Analizador Latino Cataloga a Bush y Dukakis

La votacion hispana podría significar la diferencia en las contiendas principales de los estados con gran cantidad de votos electorales, como California, Tejas, Nueva York, la Florida e Illinois, así como en Nueva Mexico, Arizona, Arizona, Colorado, Nueva Jersey y Connecticut. Por lo tanto, el atractivo que los aspirantes presidenciales de este año tengan para los latinos será un factor importante.

Con el enfoque ahora sobre las asambleas electorales de Iowa y las elecciones primarias de Nueva Hampshire, ha habido pocas oportunidades para evaluar el atractivo de los candidatos para los hispanos. Las elecciones primarias del sur, en el 'supermartes' del 8 de Marzo, sin embargo, verán a los candidatos marchar en Tejas y la Florida.

Por ahora, el evaluar el atractivo de los candidatos en los hispanos es un ejercicio profundamente subjetivo. Empero, se pueden señalar algunos detalles interesantes.

Para los republicanos, George Bush gana sin problemas. Tejano adoptivo, cuando el vicepresidente anuncio su candidatura en Houston, en Octubre ultimo, hizo algunas observaciones en español. Bush ha visitado a la Florida con frecuencia; su hijo Jeb, que habla español con soltura, esta casado con Columba Garnica, oriunda de Mexico. El vice presidente ha viajado bastante a Puerto Rico, y su primer asesor legal en la Casa Blanca, Rafael Capó, es de aquella isla. Bush puede perder unos cuantos puntos debido a su imagen de "preppie," pero en conjunto el es el republicano principal.

El dirigente senatorial minoritario, Bob Dole, de Kansas, viene en segundo lugar. El ha tenido a hispanos en plazas primordiales de su personal mucho antes de que se empezara a llevar cuentas. Cuando llevo a ser dirigente de la mayoría, en 1984, Dole nombro a su ayudante de largo tiempo, Ernie Garcia, para

Sargento de Armas del Senado. Tambien Dole ha viajado a menudo a la Florida, a Tejas, a Puerto Rico y a otros estados.

Pero el no habla español y resulta menos 'simpatico' que Bush. En terminos de intereses y atractivo hispanos, los demas republicanos (Kemp, DuPont, Robertson y Haig) no aparecen en la pantalla del radar.

El Partido Demócrata ha sido, durante largo tiempo, la casa de los hispanos estadounidenses. Algunos atribuyen esto a una fuerte base sindical y a la defensa de los programas sociales. El senador liberal Paul Simon es un ejemplo excelente. El excongresista de la parte baja de Illinois tenia pocas razones para contejar a los latinos. Pero su preocupacion por los empleos, el adiestramiento, la enseñanza bilingue, la tasa de abandono de los estudios, la vivienda y otros asuntos se derivan de su corazon y no de la conveniencia. La politica de Simon, empero, puede ser de doble filo. Puede estar contrapuesta a los valores de la corriente principal que dieron a Ronald Reagan un numero de votos hispanos sin precedentes en 1980 y 1984.

Jesse Jackson vio a los hispanos hace mucho tiempo como "hermanos de alma," como parientes cuya plenitud de oportunidades los habia soslayado.

El empezo a edificar una coalicion de negros e hispanos en el decenio de 1970 con Raul Yzaguirre, presidente del Consejo Nacional de La Raza. El dice la mayor parte de las cosas correctas para los latinos; es "simpatico." Pero al ser incapaz de obtener la postulacion, se vera limitado a servir de corredor con su poder.

El exgobernador de Arizona Bruce Babbitt, que habla español y ha sido popular regionalmente, no ha prendido como candidato nacional. Y el Senador Albert Gore, de Tennessee, y Gary Hart, ex senador de Colorado, parecen haber ganado muy poco apoyo

hasta la fecha entre los electores latinos.

Las calificaciones mas altas son para el Gobernador Michael Dukakis, de Mass. Hijo de inmigrantes griegos, el tiene atractivo etnico.

Su estado tiene una poblacion latina considerable y cada vez mayor, a la que el ha prestado una atencion considerable durante dos decenios en calidad de legislador estatal y sus tres periodos como gobernador. Dukakis estudio en el Peru en 1956, habla español con soltura y le gusta usarlo a menudo en sus comparecencias publicas.

En 1983, Dukakis, que entonces se hallaba postulado para la gubernatura estatal que habia perdido anteriormente, asistio a una fiesta hispana para recaudar fondos en un restaurante mexicano en Washington, D.C.

El dinero podría no haber sido el motivo principal; sin embargo, el estaba alli comodamente, disfrutando de la compañía.

Dukakis señala con orgullo a varios proyectos latinos de su estado. Ha sido recibido con entusiasmo en varias conferencias nacionales hispanas.

Por ultimo, sus cursos de accion que hacen énfasis en el empleo, el adiestramiento, la renovacion urbana y el mejoramiento de las relaciones con la America Latina, le han ganado aplauso.

De modo que, por ahora, mientras damos comienzo a un nuevo año y antes de que los candidatos pongan a prueba su temple en el sur, Dukakis gana el concurso de atractivo entre los hispanos en varios aspectos: el etnico, el idiomático, el de la experiencia, el interes, los cursos de accion y la sinceridad. Queda por ver de que modo el puede usar estas ventajas para su ventaja regional y nacionalmente.

Such a person, thing, or activity would be an idol. Look through your conscience and look over your life. Do you love God more than any person, thing, or activity? You will have to do so if you are going to have a renewed mind.

May God guide you so that you may get to the point where you think as God thinks/that is, to the point where you will have a renewed mind. May God bless you this week so that you will be a blessing to others.

# Johnny, Martin Brothers Pace Warrior Winners

Revenge doth not rank highly among Christian virtues, but Johnny Almaguer's get even victory over Michael Hernandez ranked first in the hearts of nearly 1,000 boxing faithful who jammed the Christian Renewal Center Friday night during the Lubbock Warrior's annual Tournament of Champions.

Two other students of Warrior Coach Edward Hernandez, light heavyweight Farrell Martin and his brother, lightweight Freeman Martin, scored second round technical knock outs, but Almaguer's clear if close triumph was what the people came to see and cheer.

Hernandez, a rangy left hander from Olton, decided Almaguer last May 24, and the former Texas Golden Glove champion spent the summer and fall waiting to even the score.

He did. Almaguer charged from his corner at the opening bell and chased Hernandez throughout the first two rounds like an attack dog charging a stranger walking the streets of a North Lubbock neighborhood.

Early in the first round, though, Hernandez counter boxed Almaguer effectively, beating him to the punch with retaliatory left and right hand blows. But midway through the round, Almaguer rocked Hernandez with left hooks and right crosses and drove Hernandez against the ropes.

And early in the second, Almaguer exploded a left and right combination to the chin guard that buckled Hernandez' knees. Moments later, Hernandez seemed close to a knock out as the fans rose to their feet in anticipation of the kill. But Hernandez twice escaped oblivion by turning his back and running away.

Still, Almaguer sent Hernandez reeling into the ropes just before the bell saved Hernandez.

The ever game Olton left came back to effectively box Almaguer in the third, but Almaguer boxed out of clinches and kept chasing Hernandez until the final bell.

Light heavyweight Farrell Martin, following his vicious lead left hook, rallied from an opening assault by Jessie Barrios of Fort Stockton to batter Barrios hard and often later in the opening round.

Martin staggered Barrios with a left hook early in the second,

causing his opponent to cover up with both hands. Martin found openings, though, and pounded the now nearly helpless Barrios into a neutral corner and bobbed his back and forth, spraying blood and sweat across the laps of ring side spectators.

After a clinch, Martin set his feet flat on the canvas and banded away to Barrios head and body with both hands before the loser's corner tossed in the towel, the boxing equivalent of the white flag.

Martin's brother, Freeman, also scored a second round technical knockout, stopping an exhausted and visibly out of it Oscar Hernandez with only five seconds remaining in the round.

Like several other losers during the evening, Hernandez started with a flurry but then tired.

Although some of the more inexperienced fighters put down their heads, closed their eyes, and wound up with looping, windmill punches, most of the other sixteen fighters lived up to their tournament billing as champions.

Flyweight Anthony Boney proved a more polished boxer and a better conditioned athlete than Charley Guerrero. Guerrero opened fast but his feet and fists lost most of their speed before the end of the second round.

In a razor close decision, Anthony Almaguer of Seminole edged Willie Mays of Guymon, Oklahoma. The comparatively unskilled Mays was the aggressor but often telegraphed his punches, allowing Almaguer to step away from or inside of them.

Flyweight Jay Brown proved he could absorb as well as administer punishment by rallying to punch out a close decision over Ray Reyna of San Angelo. Both fighters went at each other for the full six minutes of their private war.

In what may have been the best fight of the night, slugger Sergio Vela of El Paso, built like a welterweight, scored a close victory over boxer Raton Perez of Olton, built like a lightweight.

The two junior lightweights stood toe to toe for all six minutes, with Perez landing more punches but Vela landing the harder blows.

Perez may have carried a slight lead into the third round, but Vela cornered him against the ropes and in the corners to hammer out his hard earned win.

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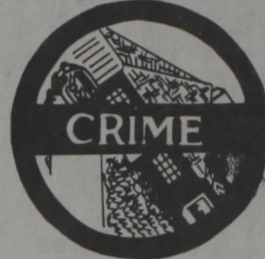
