

Producers hear current crop assessed on field day tour



Area producers hear Dr. Randy Boman assess a county cotton field.

Several dozen agricultural producers toured county cotton and peanut production sites last Monday on the Ag Extension Service sponsored Field Day. Dr. Randy Boman, Area Extension Agronomist, assessed this years cotton crop as slightly above average, but probably not as good overall as the 1996 crop. Phillip Kidd, Extension Agent-Integrated current and predicted insect problems cotton producers face this year (See Kidd's column on page three).

Dr. Mike Schubert, Extension Peanut Specialist, described this years peanut crop as better than average. All of the specialists indicated both the cotton and peanut crops currently need more heat units, and a late frost and freeze to reach maximum yields.

The area of Gaines, Dawson. Terry and Yoakum counties are experiencing rapid growth in acres planted to peanuts. Estimates indicate as many as 90,000 acres in the four counties are planted to the nuts. In Terry County alone, peanut acreage increased from some 7,500 to more than 25,000 acres, with even more acreage probably going to peanut production in 1998.





Bryan-College Station was the highest-ranked of four Big 12 university cities listed in the ranking, including Lawrence, Kan., Boulder, Colo., and Columbia, Mo. Those cities are house to the universities of Kan-

The study was conducted by Moran Stahi & Boyer, a consulting firm that specializes in business location selection. It concluded that so many Midwestern cities made the list because people attend state universities and then "stay because of the low cost of living and abundance of jobs."

Joe Brown, city of Bryan spokesman, said that while Texas A&M's proximity definitely helped, another factor was the high number of college graduates who work for the school districts and other governments entities.

So what does it all mean? According to firm consultant Will Heam, "Companies dependent on formally educated employees might do best in these locations."

the Council, and they no longer express an interest to acquire the system. Brunson reported two other electric companies, Southwest Public Service and West Texas Utilities, have shown interest in the City system, but formal offers have not been presented to the City.

The Council will continue to study a number of options available to secure lower wholesale rates, and are seriously concerned with protecting the citizens sizable investment in the city owned electric system.



Sharp said the information contained in "Texas, Where We Stand" is compiled from a variety of federal and state agencies, private sector groups, and nonprofit organizations.

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

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
