

Elementary Principal Haragan To Leave


Accepts Top School Spot In Grady, NM.

Plains Independent School District's loss is the Grady system's gain. Joel Haragan, Principal of Plains Elementary since June, 1994, was recently named Superintendent of Schools in Grady, New Mexico.

He graduated from Eastern New Mexico University, and did his post graduate work there and at Midwestern University, Wichita Falls, and earned his Master's Degree and Mid Management Certification from Sul University in 1992.


Community, Out Of Towners, Crowd Auditorium

The local American Legion Auxiliary Club decorated the final resting place of deceased area veterans by placing memorial poppies on their headstones at the Cemetery here. Mary Jo St. Romain, Aux. President, reports the poppy placement is an annual project.

Most cotton producers reported the hail in the area certainly didn't help the crop, but apparently no great damage was done to the young plants in most locations. In the Denver City area, particularly west and south of there, the rain and hail was much heavier, and reports indicate large scale damage to crops in the area.



signment of interest in American Information Systems, the new, automated election tabulation system lease purchased by the County.



Property Owners Receive 1996 Value Notices

Texas Property owners have the right to information about changes in their property's value by local appraisal districts. On May 8, 1996, Yoakum County Appraisal District mailed 6,129 appraisal notices showing the owners their 1996 proposed values.

Saundra Stephens, chief appraiser of the district, reminds property owners that the notice of appraised value is not a tax bill. "Please do not pay from this notice," Stephens said.

Stephens emphasized the importance of the notice and the key information that it contains for a property owner. "A property owner has the right to appeal to Yoakum County Appraisal Review Board on any disagreement with the property's value, exemptions, ownership and other areas," she said.

The appraisal review board, more commonly called "ARB" is an independent panel of citizens responsible for hearing and settling protests from property owners who disagree with some action by the appraisal district

What should a property owner look for on the notice? "Look at the .disparately needed Day Holiday, and our proposed vale for 1996," Stephens said. "The notice shows the land's value and any improvement value for the property for the current year." An improvement is a building, structure or any other type of fixture to

The appraisal notice also includes current year information on exemptions granted tot he property. It provides last year's value, too.

Notices to property owners whose values increased more than \$1,000 will also include "estimated" taxes. These "estimated" taxes are based on the new value & estimated tax rate for the same amount of operating dollars as last year. Generally, taxing units set final 1996 tax rates in August and September The appraisal district does not set

Stephens ask that a property owner look carefully at the legal de- acres of fledgling cotton scription and mailing address to be sure that there is no mistakes. "We send all mobile home owners (personal property) a notice. If you no longer own the mobile home, or any type property that you receive a notice for, now is the time to let us know. If the notice contains an old address, please provide the appraisal district with the current address. The post office forwards mail to a new address for a short time only, and tax bills do not go out until October," Stephens added.

A property owner is responsible for informing the appraisal district of the correct mailing address. A property owner is liable for additional penalties and interest on a tax bill not paid timely.

Not everyone will receive a notice. Notices will be sent only if there is a name change, a value change or the property has been rendered. Stephens added, "If you did not get a notice and want 1996 information about your property, please call the appraisal district at 806-456-7101. The general deadline for protesting to the ARB is **June 8** for this







Year Ending Library Filmtime






