K-9's PLAY BIG ROLE IN FIGHT AGAINST DRUGS

Richard Dickson and his wife Nancy presented an unusual and fascinating program to the Lions Club Meeting January 20.

Richard, an officer in the Permian Basin Drug Task Force, showed a video outlining that organizations role in combating drug traffic, the equipment used, and the role drug sniffing dogs play in the on going war on illegal drugs.

Dickson explained the Task Force is funded by Federal Grant money to the State and distributed by the Governors office. The Force originally started as a five man undercover operation, and has grown to a twenty person force. Dickson principally works in Yoakum, Gaines, Terry and Cochran counties, but is frequently assigned to other areas in the 20 county area the Force serves. Their territory stretches from Sanderson to the south, and to the north in Cochran County.

Dickson said the Task Force now places more emphasis on drug interdiction on the areas highways. "There Are certain profiles and characteristics we look for when we are on Patrol. If we see a vehicle driven by someone displaying these traits, we watch for the driver to make some infraction of the driving laws, and we stop them," he explained. "If we see anything suspicious in the vehicle, we ask for permission to search it. Almost always, a drug carrier will give us permission. I suppose they think we will only do a half hearted search, or they think their drugs or drug

money is so well hidden we won't find it. If the search officer has one of our drug finding dogs in his patrol car, that druggie is in for a shocking surprise".

Dickson has served on the Task Force five years, and has a total of 14 years law enforcement experience. He started the task Force canine program in 1992, with a dog furnished the Force by Denver City Attorney Jerry Corbin.

There are now four dogs in the area Task Force. They were all purchased in Germany, and trained for six weeks at a special narcotic finding school in Kentucky. When they are assigned to an officer in the Task Force, they receive more training. Dickson explained the dogs are bought in Germany because their commercial dog breeders there have better quality animals than those in this country, thru stringent selective breeding methods.


Dickson's dog, a large Belgian Malinois breed named Audin, originally cost \$4000.

"That sounds pretty steep for a dog," Dickson said, "but these dogs have proved to be a great investment. They have helped us find and recover literally millions of dollars of drugs and drug money. Any time we recover drug money, we can legally use those funds in the Task Force program. It's pretty effective when we can use criminal money to catch criminals."

He said the first dog in his four county area was

STATE BUDGET FUND INCREASE

On January 6, Comptroller John Sharp delivered his Biennial Revenue Estimate to the Legislature. The Review is required because of the State Constitutions' provision prohibiting lawmakers from spending more than the Review of the Comptrollers forecast.

Over the next two fiscal years (1996-97), the Legislature will have \$43.6 billion available for general purpose spending--an increase of \$4.5 billion over the \$39.1 billion that was available for legislative appropriation during the 1994-95 biennium.

The \$43.6 billion in available revenue includes a cash balance of \$3 billion at the close of the current biennium on August 31 and \$40.6 billion in

major fund revenue. Lawmakers will also have some \$3.3 billion from sources that were once dedicated but are now available for general spending.

State tax revenue during the next two fiscal years will amount to \$35.5 billion. Nearly 80 percent of this total will come from three sources: the state sales tax, motor vehicle taxes and the corporate franchise tax. The Texas Lottery will also generate almost \$1.7 billion.

Finally, investment earnings, federal funds and miscellaneous fees will bring in another \$34.2 billion.

The substantial increase in Legislature spending funds, according to Sharp, are a reflection of recent improvements of the State economy, and projected continued economic growth.

SALUTE TO A CLUB PRESIDENT

91 year old "Sit" Jones

Mrs. R.B. (Sit) Jones has been a resident of Plains, Texas since 1939. She and her husband, Casey, reared three children who all attended Plains ISD. She worked as deputy clerk at the courthouse for four years and as the tax collector in the sheriff's office for six years. Her interests throughout her life have been her family, her church, history, and federated women's club.

In 1939, Mrs. Jones became a member of GFWC Tsa Mo Ga Club and has been an active member ever since. She has held all offices in her club including serving as president in 1945-47 and again as president in 1994-96 at the age of 91. She has served on the yearbook committee for most of the past 30 years. As member of a museum committee, she helped to obtain a Texas Historic Marker for a "Bonus Shack" that houses a museum owned by the Tsa Mo Ga Club. Both her daughter and granddaughter are members of a federated club. She was their example!

In Caprock District she was second vice-president (1956-58), and first vice-president (1958-1960), and became a Caprock District Life Member in 1989. She also held the following Caprock District positions:

In 1957, Mrs. Jones was chairman of a committee which met with the Yoakum County Commissioners to ask for a library in Plains. The library was built. She met again with the commissioners in 1982 as chairman of a Tsa Mo Ga committee to encourage the enlargement of the library. When this project was completed, she was the main speaker at the Open House of the renovated library.

With her love of history and a mind attuned to remembering facts, Mrs. Jones wrote the Yoakum County history in 1957, for the 50th anniversary of the county. One of her favorite historical topics is "Quanah Parker" who was born near Cedar Lake in Gaines County.

She has been a member of the Plains Cemetery Association since its inception in 1957, and has seen the cemetery change from nothing more than a fenced-in area with headstones to a truly beautiful, peaceful cemetery.

Mrs. Jones was the memorial chairman for the American Cancer Society for 20 years, and a charter member of the American Legion Auxiliary. For 40 years she made the arrangements to send a local girl to Girls State.

Every Sunday Mrs. Jones enjoys attending the Methodist

Church in Plains. She still takes an active part in all church activities, especially Sunday school where she still teaches when the need arises. This past Fourth of July she amazed some of the membership by reciting from memory "America for Me," a poem she learned as a girl of 16. She continues to be an inspiration to her church, her family, and her community because of her good attitude, her good memory, and her sincere interest in others and their accomplishments and activities.

responsible for discovering over a million dollars in heroin the first year of his service, found in a car in Yoakum County on Highway 214.

The dogs have an amazingly effective and sensitive sense of smell. Dickson told of one dog finding a stash of marijuana, packed into a large PVC sealed pipe, which was immersed in a vehicles gas tank. They can locate the merest residue of narcotics, which is how they locate illegal cash which the drug dealers have handled.

Dickson and his wife sat up a large cabinet type wooden case, with some sixty doored and numbered compartments, and in number 12, placed a Baggie containing 2 grams of cocaine. He then brought his dog Audin in on a leash. It was apparent the dog was eager to work. He quickly sniffed the case over, then frantically and persistently began to scratch the number 12 door.

Dickson said the officers with dogs in their care become deeply attached to the animals. "They truly become your working partner. In most of our patrol work we are alone. It is really comforting to have that big smart animal covering you when you stop some of these characters. They are trained to come to our rescue if we are attacked, or if we command them to", Dickson said.

An interesting characteristic of all the dogs is their training to refuse to eat or drink anything when working, unless the water or food is from their own bowls. Audin, prowling about the building during the program, didn't even sniff at the table containing food from the noon meal.

When asked if the Task Force is finding more, less,

or about the same amount of illegal narcotics now, compared to previous years, he said "Probably more, and that could be because the business is getting bigger, but I really think it's because we are working harder and more effectively. There is no question these dogs have helped us become more effective in the fight against drugs."

**OIL
RECYCLING
ENCOURAGED**

Motor oil has changed our world. With it, millions of people can take to the roads or the skies for easy, quick travel. Industry and agriculture depend on it.

Pouring oil into engines is vital to their operation, but pouring it into the environment can be very harmful, according to Joan Chandler, Yoakum County Extension Agent.

"Mismanagement of used motor oil is a serious environmental problem," she said. "Every year, do-it-yourself mechanics dump an estimated 25 million gallons of oil on Texas lands or in storm drains, contaminating ground water and waterways. Yet, only a small portion of the 200 million gallons changed nationwide is ever collected to be reused or recycled."

Used oil has been and sometimes still is spread on dirt roads to suppress dust. It's also been used to kill insects and weeds, and improperly disposed of in sewers and dumped in household and industrial trash.

Used oil can be blended with virgin oil and then reprocessed into industrial grade fuel oil. Additionally, the by-products and remaining oil from the re-refining process can be used as asphalt extender and fuel oil.

However, new state laws to protect the environment now make it illegal to dispose of oil in these old ways. It's also against the law to place dirty oil filters in the trash. As a result, more than 1,300 public and private used oil collection centers have opened in Texas

communities. These must be registered with the Texas Nature Resource Conservation Commission, which also established a used oil educational program to encourage collection and recycling.

Collection centers in this county are located at City of Plains Maintenance Barn on Avenue H & 7th Street, behind the City Service Center in Denver City on corner of 4th and Main, and the Yoakum County Landfill.

"Texans have a rich history of managing their natural resources wisely. Oil collection and recycling will continue this legacy," she said.

**WHEAT
BOARD
ELECTION**

The Texas Wheat Board, engaged in research, market development and services adding value to the crop, will hold its 12th biennial mail election between March 6 and March 20, according to Ben Scholz, Chairman of the organization.

Changes in government programs, particularly the CRP, Conservation Reserve and Conservation Use has combined with changing crop practices to drop Texas harvested acres to 2.9 million this year. This acreage produced a 75.4 million bushel crop valued in excess of \$300 million. Any farmer producing wheat may vote for a board member for the district in which he resides. Yoakum County is District 4.

A qualified may place his name in nomination for a six year membership on the Board by application to the organization, signed by himself and at least ten other qualified voters, 30 days (Feb 18) prior to the final election day (Mar 20).

The election will be by mail ballots. Anyone not having a ballot 15 days before the election date may get one at the Ag-Extension Office, as provided by the Texas Commodity Referendum Law.



ENDANGERED SPECIES ENDANGERING US?

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) propose to list the Arkansas River Basin population of the Arkansas River Shiner (a small minnow) as an endangered species.

The basin includes rivers and streams feeding Lake Meredith, which supplies water to Amarillo, Lubbock and other area towns. The USFWS proposal could affect the amount of water available for irrigation purposes.

A. Wayne Wyatt, manager of High Plains Underground Water Conservation Dist. 1 in Lubbock, says "Listing the shiner as an endangered species could have a tremendous impact upon the use of surface and ground water in the region. He pointed out, "approximately 25% of the total US cotton crop and 56% of all Texas cotton is grown in the High Plains area, a crop with a \$3 Billion economic impact. Reducing ground water pumpage to improve the habitat for a 2 inch minnow would devastate the area's

agricultural economy." Ironically, the minnow remains abundant in the South Canadian River in Texas and the Pecos River in New Mexico.

The proposed listing of another endangered species brings to mind other instances of this type of bureaucratic action. The construction of O. H. Ivie Reservoir near Ballenger was delayed for years after USFWS declared a small water snake in the watershed area on endangered species. In the Edwards Aquifer area the Sierra Club has recently filed a motion asking the Federal Court to order all agricultural subsidies stopped, to force reduce pumping of ground water in the area.

Makes one wonder how valuable a 2 inch minnow really is, doesn't it?
