

First-Round PISD Superintendent finalists announced

The PISD Board of Trustees took the first step in selecting finalists for the position of School Superintendent at their meeting the night of February 24. From a list of 88 candidates for the position, the Board selected eleven finalists for a round of personal interviews which will start here March 3 and continue to March 8.

In telephone interviews with Board President Brad Palmer and Board member Dwayne Canada, both men said they were well pleased with the backgrounds and qualities of all the candidates. Palmer said "I think the Board did an excellent job of selecting the eleven finalists from such a large group of worthy candidates". and Canada echoed those sentiments."It was a really tough chore to narrow the list down to these men from such a good group", he said.

The finalist selection procedure allowed each Trustee to list their preferred ten finalists in their order of preference. Those names were assigned weighted numbers, and the numbers were totalled. From that order of ranking, the top six weighted numbers were selected. Then each Board member was allowed to cast a vote for one other finalist, resulting in 13 names chosen. Since that meeting, two of the finalists have accepted employment elsewhere and were removed from the list.
