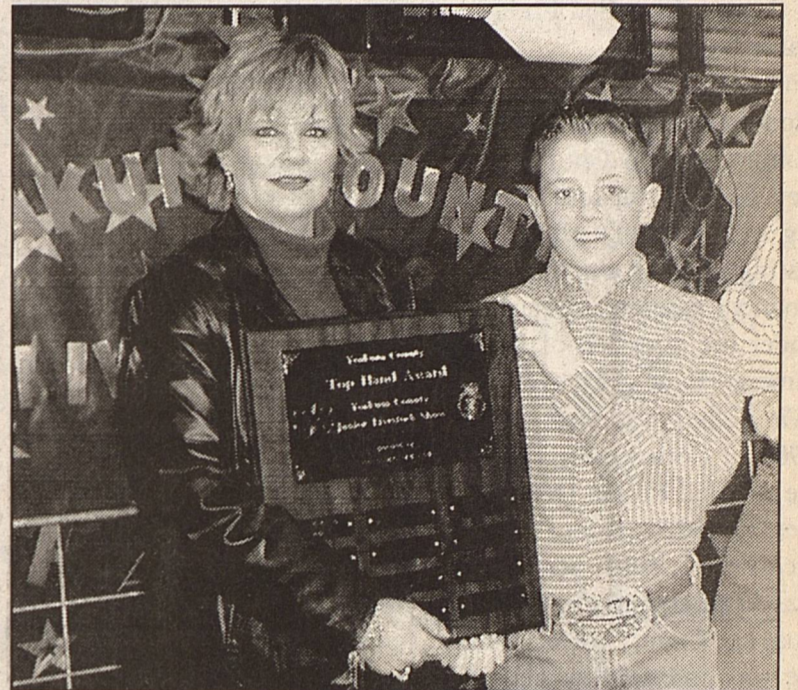

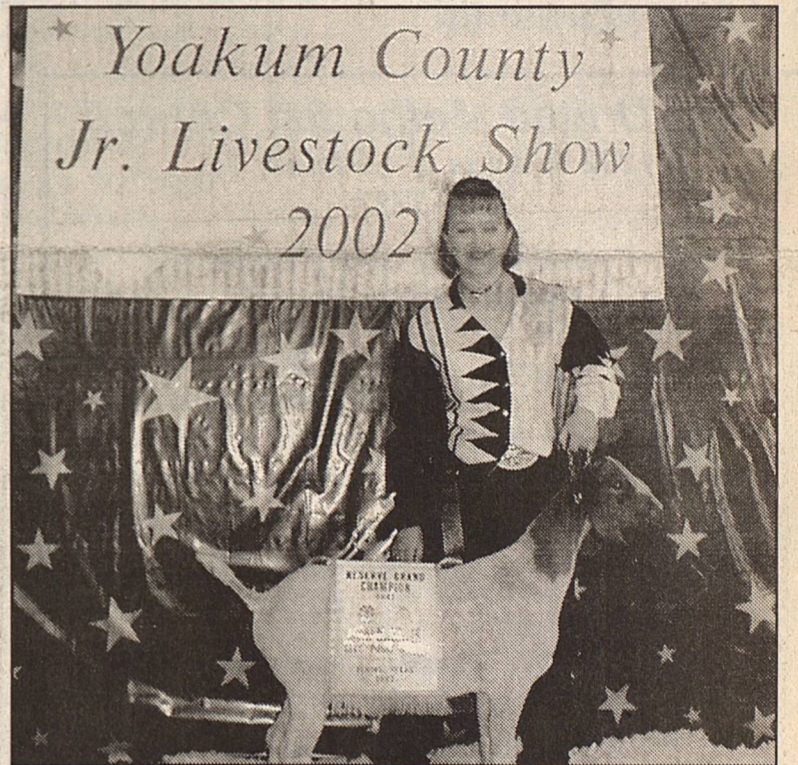

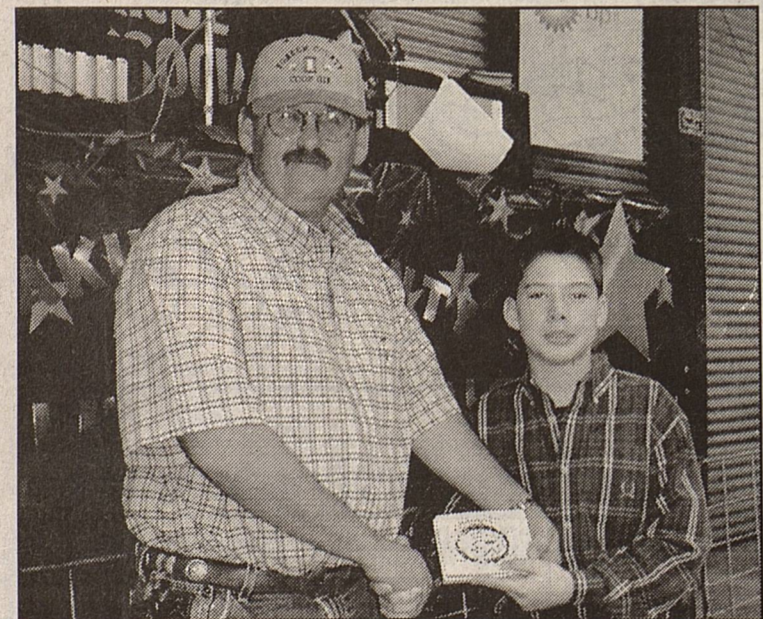

Plains ISD drops to Class I - A

The long awaited alignment and re-alignment of many UIL school districts around the state was announced the morning of February 4, and as expected, PISD will return to Class I A ranks for sporting and academic activities during 2002 - 2003.

In football, the Cowboys will compete in the 6-A district, comprised of Morton, O'Donnell, Plains, Smyer, Sundown and Whiteface.

Basketball action will take place in the 4-A district, comprised of Anton, Morton, Plains, Smyer, Sundown and Whiteface. At press time, volleyball, baseball and track alignments had not been announced. Plains ISD's return to 1A ranks results from a drop in the high school enrollment census this October, when 156 students were enrolled.

Criminal Cases In County, District Court

Eight criminal cases were heard in County Court anuary 23, with Judge Dallas Brewer presiding and Criminal District Attorney Richard Clark representing the state.

Jesus Andres Garcia pled guilty to consumption of alcohol by a minor, enhanced. A 30 day jail sentence was suspended and probated six months. A \$250 fine and \$211 court costs will be met with time payments. He must serve 24 hours community service, spend 23 hours in jail with credit for 23 hours served, attend weekly AA meetings, and surrender his license 180 days. Investigating officer was DPS Trooper Brad Taylor.

Kelley Robert Graham pled guilty to purchase or furnish alcohol to a minor. He spent 36 hours in jail with credit for 16 hours served. He was fined \$200 and must pay \$255 court fees. Investigating officer was DPS Trooper Robert Shugart.

Ivie Lee Carter pled guilty to possession of two ounces or less marijuana. He was fined \$100, must pay \$210 court costs, and \$70 restitution to DPS. He must complete the drug offender program and surrender his license 180 days.

John Joseph Shirley pled guilty to driving while license suspended. He was fined \$200 and must pay \$210 court costs. Investigating officer was Robert Shugart, DPS.

Lazaro G. Perez pled guilty to a first DWI, breath test refused. A 90 day jail sentence was suspended on a \$500 fine and

\$225 court costs. He will spend 72 hours in jail with credit for 31 hours served, perform 24 hours community service, attend AA meetings and complete the DWI first offender program. Brad Taylor, DPS, was investigating officer, and Anna J. Ricker was his attorney.

In District Court January 22, Judge Kelly G. Moore presiding, Vidal Samaripas III pled guilty to a third or more DWI. A five year prison term was suspended and probated five years. He was fined \$1500, and assessed \$238 court costs. He will serve 160 hours community service, attend weekly AA meetings, have his license suspended 180 days, complete the Texas Alternative Incarceration Program, serve nine days in jail, and complete the DWI repeat offender program. Brad Taylor, DPS, was investigating officer, and the defendant served as his own attorney.

Vicente Lasoa Perez pled guilty to burglary of a habitation. A five year prison sentence was suspended and the defendant was placed on community supervision five years. \$242 court costs will be met with time payments. He must pay a \$1000 fine and \$250 attorney fees, serve 240 hours community service, and complete the Texas Boot Camp program. Paul Manusr was his attorney, and Chris Ballard, Denver City Police was investigating officer.

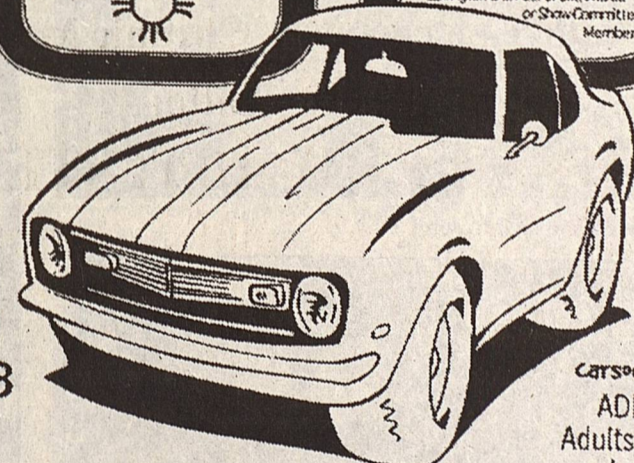

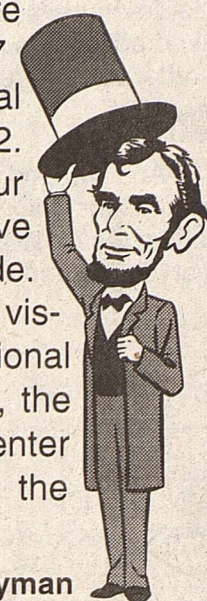

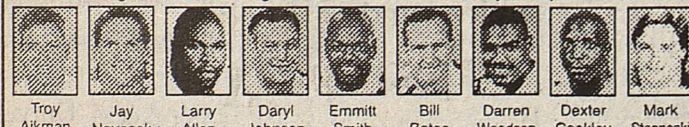
