It was necessary to call in a large crane from Sulliva Crane, Hobbs, to raise this new 15 ton air conditioning unit atop the PISD Resource Center. It was one of 34 new units purchased recently to replace 20 and 25 year old units on buildings of all three schools. Hicks Heating and Air Conditioning, Denver City, submitted the low bid for the new Trane units, much more efficient and less costly to operate than the old units, and should produce much smaller utility bills in the future. It was originally planned to replace about tenold units each school year, but the Board of Trustees felt the bid for all the units at one time would result in a much lower bid, a substantial savings of school funds.



Commissioner's Court for Yoakum County met Monday, August 19. The first agenda item considered was to act on bids for the purchase of a new light duty truck for Precinct 3. Eyes on the Skies

The eyes of Texas can scan the heavens through a number of large scientific telescopes. Soon, Texas will be home to the largest telescope in the continental U.S. and the third largest in the world: the University of Texas' Hobby-Eberly telescope. Under construction at McDonald Observatory near Fort Davis, the Hobby-Eberly is scheduled for "first light" in August 1996 and should be fully operational by mid-1997.

Texas' new eye on the sky will feature a mirror 9.2 meters (about 30 feet) in diameter. Only the twin 9.8 meter telescopes at Keck Observatory in Hawaii are larger. A segmented mirror design that renders 70 percent of the sky visible will enable the Hobby-Ebrely to be build for \$13.5 million-about one-fifteenth the cost of a typical telescope its size.

The Hobby-Eberly telescope is a joint project of the University of Texas and Penn State University, with Stanford University and two German universities also contributing some funding.



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



TURFGRASS STRESSED BY DROUGHT

The recent drought has placed a great deal of stress announce it's Open House on turfgrasses in Texas. Because of the environmental during the Yoakum County benefits of turfgrasses, many people are concerned about Watermelon Round-Up on caring for them during this dry period.

Turfgrasses provide benefits such as cooler giving away four phone temperatures in the summer, cleaner air and water, and sets during the day, just habitat for wildlife. Therefore, there is a desire to keep these grasses alive.

A big concern right now is water use. People want to to be present for the keep their lawns green, but many do not wish to use excessive amounts of water.

This time of year, if you're trying to keep a lawn green Barnes, Supervisor Robert it will probably need about one and one-half inches of water a week. To just keep it alive, not green, about onehalf inch every two to three weeks for St. Augustine and one-half inch every month for bermudagrass will work.

Herbicide use to kill weeds is not a wise practice right Drought-stressed grass will be damaged by herbicide application which could slow the fall recovery of the grass.

Fall recovery of turfgrasses may be slower this year. However, if the grass is adapted to the local area, replanting won't be necessary. Unfortunately, St. Augustine grass is not native to this area.

The most important consideration with turfgrasses during dry periods is water application. Individuals must decide whether they want a green lawn or whether they just want to keep their lawn alive and water accordingly.







Water supply: Half-full or half-empty?

As the population of the state increases—it has doubled since the 1950s-demands on water resources will rise and could exceed supply by 2030 in some regions of Texas without planning for conservation, waste prevention and drought management. Irrigation accounts for about two-thirds of the annual water use in the state, with the High Plains region drawing 4 million acre-feet a year from the Ogallala aquifer.



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
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
