Son Of Lubbock Resident, L. G. Long Time Resident McCutcheon Passes At Dallas Laid To Rest Jan. 3

Final rites for L. G. McCutcheon, 55, were held Monday, Jan. 1, at Greater New Zion Baptist Church, 2210 Pine Street, Dallas.

He was stricken with a heart attack Thursday evening and passed away later Thursday night almost suddenly.

L. G. was the first born of Burton and the late Mahalia McCutcheon, born March 29, 1906, at Taylor, Texas.

His childhood was spent in Waco where his parents moved after his birth. He attended public school at Waco where a teacher discovered he had unusual scholastic abilities.

After he grew up, he moved to Dallas where he met and married Miss Evelyn Calhoun November 19, 1941.

For 14 years, he was employed by Sears Roebuck and Company.

Later he became owner and operator of the Unique Cleaners, 2323 Rolet Street, Dallas. He enjoyed a thriving business.

He was converted early in youth and in Dallas he united with the St. John Baptist Church in 1944, under the pastorate of Rev. E. C. Estell Sr. There he served as president of the Junior Ushers Board and was also active in other phases of church work.

Later he became a member of Greater New Zion Baptist Church with Rev. A. V. Voice pastor. In Greater Zion he served as head of the Green Room committee until his health began to fail, but he continued active services in the church until his death.

He was a Master Mason with membership with the Metropolitan Lodge No. 146 F. and A. M.

He was also a sports writer for the Dallas Express newspaper. He was also active in other civic and religious groups: the Y. M. C. A., the N. A. A. C. P., was a constant contributor to the Red Cross, the United Fund and other charitable organizations.

Services were held at 1 p. m. with Rev. A. V. Voice officiating, as-

Survivors include his widow, father, Burton McCutcheon Sr., 6 brothers, Guy, Fort Worth, Burton Jr. and Thomas, Lubbock, Jimmie and Clarence of San Francisco, Calif., and Edward of Houston; four sisters, Mrs. Vollie B. Blanton and Mrs. Annie Mae Washington, San Francisco, Calif., Bernice

Lawson, Lubbock, and Odessa Scott; an uncle, five aunts and many other family relatives and friends.

Active pallbearers were Morris C. McGoo, A. B. Bell, W. T. Beckett, Robert L. Smith, Raymond Hollie and Marion Butts. Honorary pallbearers, the Metropolitan Lodge No. 146, F. and A. M.

Interment was at Lincoln Memorial Cemetery, Dallas, services by Black and Clark, Funeral Directors, 1802 N. Washington.

Sylvester Mooney Services Held Friday

Final rites for Sylvester Mooney were held Friday, January 5, at 2:30 p. m. at the Church of God in Christ No. 2, with Elder W. D. Haynes in charge and the eulogy by Rev. A. W. Wilson, pastor of Bethel A. M. E. Church.

Sylvester, 24, was the son of Mrs. Lillie Mae Mooney Parks and Will Mooney. He was dead on arrival at Methodist Hospital late Sunday evening, victim of a stab wound.

He was born March 18, 1937, at Lubbock.

He was converted at an early age and reared in the fear and admonition of the Lord. He was a member of the Church of

God in Christ No. 1, where he served until his death.

Survivors include his parents, a step-father, his widow, three children, four brothers, seven sisters, four aunts and other relatives and friends.

September 13, 1954, he was married to Gloria Dean Caro.

Assisting also with the services were Rev. H. J. Alexander. Remarks by Rev. S. S. Scott. Special music by Mrs. Hester English.

Active pallbearers were Joe K. Johnson, William Gibson, Albert Walker, and Walter Hibler.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, Jan. 3, at the Church of God in Christ No. 2 for Mrs. Ada Thomas, known to most of her friends and acquaintances as "Mother Ada."

She was a resident of Lubbock 32 years.

Not much is known about her early life. She was born in Georgia, Dec. 25, 1869.

She was married to Mr. Jim Thomas who preceded her in death. She was the mother of ten children, all of whom preceded her in death

except two, Mrs. Irene Gipson, 2108 Elm, with whom she made her home; and Mrs. Namina Stillwell. She also leaves 12 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

She was widely known as a mid-wife, as long as her health permitted.

She was a faithful member of the Church of God in Christ.

Elder W. D. Haynes officiated at the service and interment in Lubbock Cemetery with South Plains Funeral directors in charge.

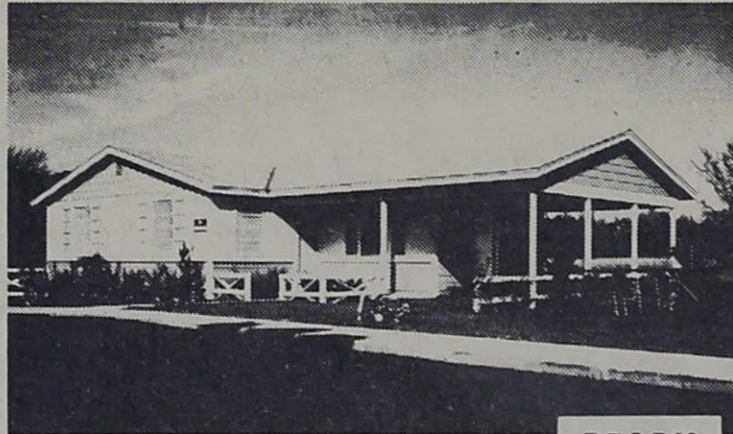

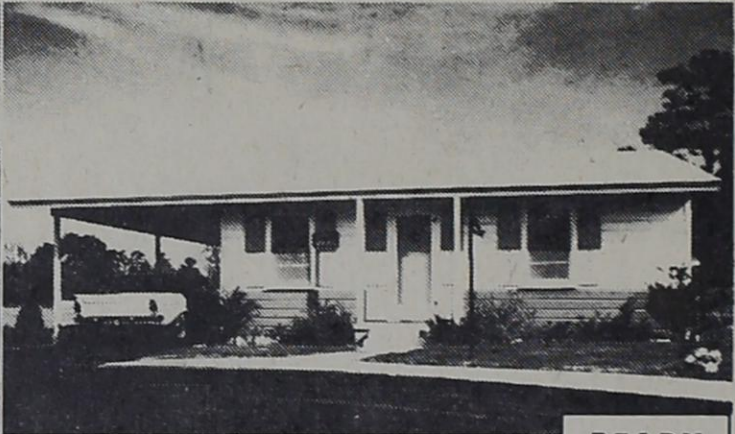

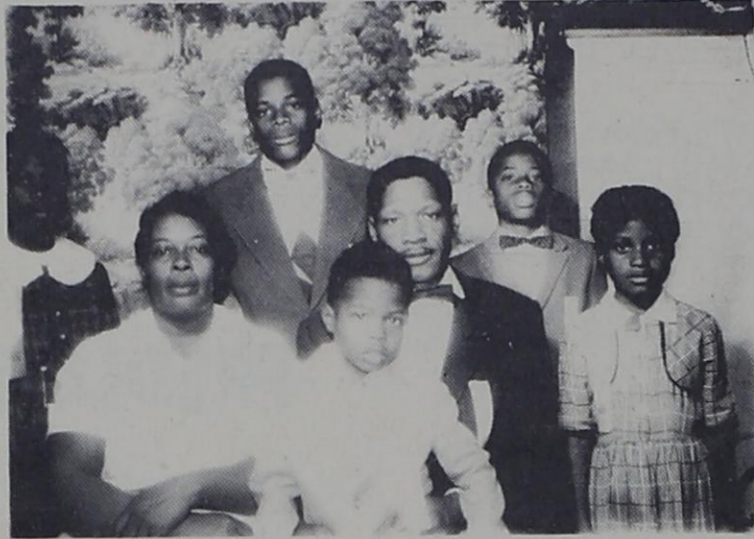
