The Lottie Circle of the general Missionary Society of Mt. Gilead Baptist presented Harvey Bunton in a voice recital of Church music at the auditorium, Wednesday evening.

Harvey is the son of Mrs. Ester Breedlove Bunton and the late Lawrence Bunton. He was born in Milam County near Cameron, Texas, August 26, 1934. His parents moved to Lubbock when he was a small boy and have lived here ever since. He did all his public school work here and was a member of the Dunbar High School graduating class of 1952. In 1954 he enlisted in the U. S. Navy and was sent to San Diego, Calif. While in the service he was at the following places: Japan, Formosa, Okinawa, Australia and Indonesia. After 6 years he was honorably discharged and made his home in San Diego until about a year ago when he returned to Lubbock. In 1959 he was married to Miss Virginia Joseph at Las Vegas.

During the recital, Mrs. Edwina Furry was narrator. Harvey said doing the recital he has been wonderfully inspired. He became a member of Mr. Gilead Baptist Church at an early age under the pastorate of Rev. E. S. Cooks.

His father, Lawrence Bunton Sr., passed away of an apparent heart attack September, 1957.

Harvey has two older brothers, Lawrence Jr. and Ernest Bunton, Indianapolis, Indiana; two sisters, Mrs. Gloria

W. E. Medlock, 36-year-old Lubbock businessman and longtime civic worker, has announced his candidacy for the City Commission, Place 1, in the April 3 municipal election.

Medlock, in making his announcement, said, "I have not been asked by any group but have had friends ask me to offer my services to the people of Lubbock, which I am doing."

Medlock has been active in traffic safety work. He currently is a member of the Governor's Highway Safety Committee and the President's Committee of Traffic Safety.

He has worked with the Citizens Traffic Council for nine years and now is president of the council's board of directors.

Medlock said "I feel that each citizen has a most important responsibility to contribute his best in the interest of continued progress for his community, for better government, and to keep his community the best possible place in which to live and raise his children."

Nellie Fox and Luis Aparicio have made enough double plays to easily rate up among the leaders in that department. Fox's time is drawing near the end of his playing days.

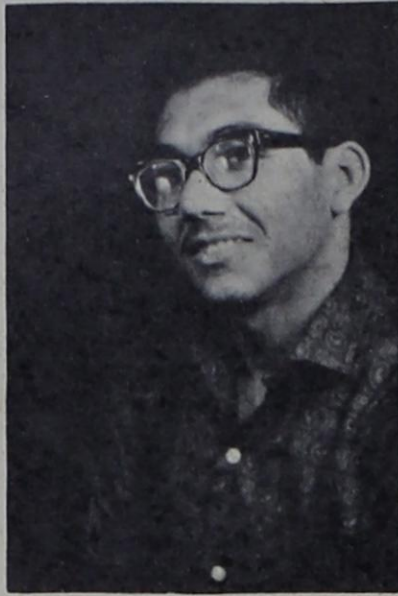
