## Rose Marion Gamble Wins "Miss American Legion Post"

### Dunbar High School Wins State AA Track Crown at Prairie View

Prairie View (special) Dunbar, paced by James Jackson's 20 points, raced away with the class AA Negro track championship here May 5 by totaling 68 points.

The Panthers outdistanced Victoria and Jasper, deadlocked in second place, by 40 team points.

James Jackson raced to a record shattering 9.7 to win the 100-yard dash, and he also anchored both winning Dunbar relay teams.

Dunbar's sprint relay team of Julius Guy, L.D. Birdow, Howard Jackson and James clocked in with a time of 42.7, breaking the old record of 43.0.

In the mile relay, the Panthers also set a new meet record with a time of 3:22.6. James Jackson anchored the crew in a time of 48.9 in the final 440. James Jones, who was on his knees when the gun sounded, raced to a 49.6 time on the initial lap. Others on the team were Birdow and Howard Jackson.

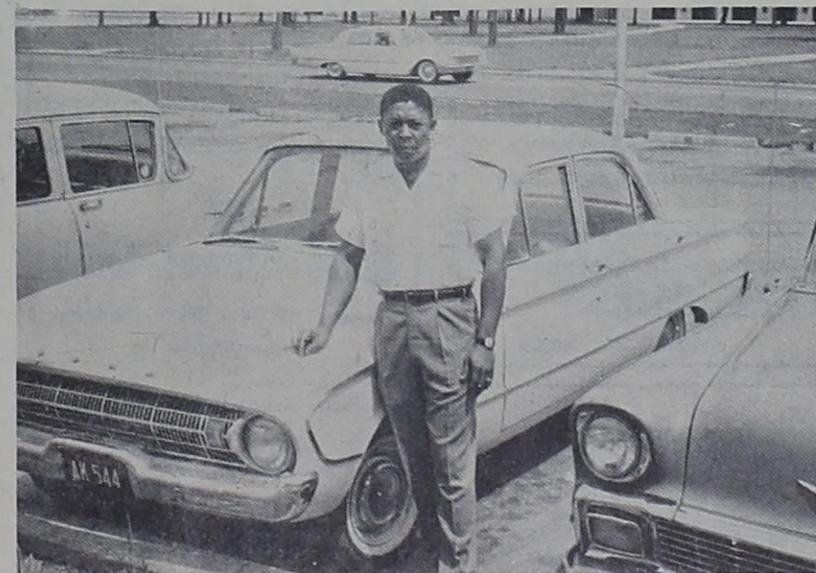

All seats will be air-conditioned winter and summer.
