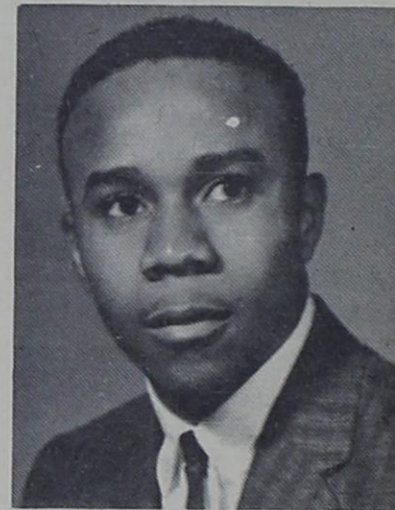

stitutions of other races in America and abroad. Today the celebration enjoys widespread participation.

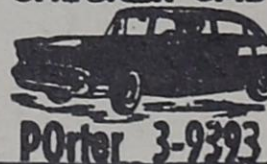
The observance comes each year about the second Sunday in February, the objective being to select the week which will include both Feb. 12 and 14. Negro History Week is meant to embrace the birthdates of both Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass in the latter case, the date that Douglass calculated must have been his natal day. Sometimes the celebration can include only one date. At such times the selected date must include the Negro, Frederick Douglass.

If a race has no history, if it has no worthwhile tradition it becomes a negligible factor in the thought of the world, and it stands in danger of being exterminated.

Let the light of history enable us to see that "enough of good there is in the lowest estate to sweeten life; enough of evil in the highest to check presumption; enough there is of both in all estates to bind us in compassionate brotherhood, to teach us impressively that we are one dying and one immortal family." Let truth destroy the dividing prejudices of nationality and teach love without distinction of race, merit or rank.
