## MAN HELD IN SHOOTING OF WIFE

A murder with malice complaint was filed against Otis Lee Reed, 28, early Monday morning in the shooting of his wife, Bessie Mae Carrington Reed, 26, on last Sunday afternoon at their apartment, 2219 Quirt Avenue.

A cording to Police the suspect surrendered a .38 caliber pistol, with five spent shells, when they arrived at the scene of the crime. They also stated that a .22 caliber pistol was found near the body of the victim which was lying on the porch of an apartment next to the Reed apartment.

Two spent shells were found in the gun. Mrs. Reed had been shot three times, forehead, shoulder, and right side.

The suspect was treated at Methodist Hospital for a bullet wound in the leg.

Several hours before the shooting, Police were summoned to the same resident. It was

It seems as though the entire country is concerned about the repeal of Section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act. Here are some facts in regard to the act on the national level.

As the majority of us know the spotlight is on the labor legislation proposed in this Congress is based almost entirely on the bill to repeal Section 14 (b) of the Taft-Hartley Act-the section which permits the states to pass Right-To Work laws forbidding compulsory union membership as a condition of employment. The repeal bill, which is NUMBER ONE on organized labor's list of priorities, passed the House and for a time it was believed it was certain to go through the Senate. The heaviest kind of political pressure is being used to that end. However, there is very powerful opposition to repeal, on the grounds that there can be no justification for forcing a man to join and pay dues to a private organization in order to be able to hold a job. There is a strong possibility that the bill will be passed over until next year.

We will soon learn whether that is the case or not. Meanwhile, there is other labor legislation up for consideration which has been given little or no public attention. It is important legislation, too. One measure would amend another section of the Taft-Hartley Act to permit the building trade unions to direct strikes against secondary employers at construction sites. It would amend the existing provisions which curb secondary boycotts at those sites.

This is not so technical a matter as it may seem. Construction projects differ from most other businesses in that a number of different employers-contractors and subcontractors-----may be engaged in work on the same project. The unions want to be able to do what is forbidden now--strike against a secondary employer, such as a subcontractor, even though their dispute is only with the primary employer.

The difference of opinion about this run to extremes. A publication of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States has succinctly summed up the pros and cons. They run about like this:

The unions say the bill would give construction workers a right comparable to that exercised by other unions; openents say that to the contrary, it would give the building trades unions very special privileges and coercive powers. Proponents say it would not permit "product boycotts" --the refusal of unions to handle the products of certain employers; opponents say it would open the door not only to this abuse but to others. Proponents say it would increase industrial peace and the opponents say it would increase industrial disruptions.

No matter how the two sides will differ this issue will still remain a controversial issue as long as you have the Proponents and their opposition.

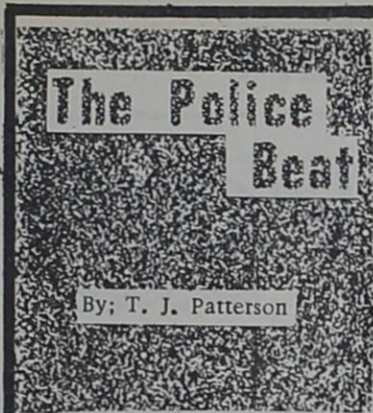

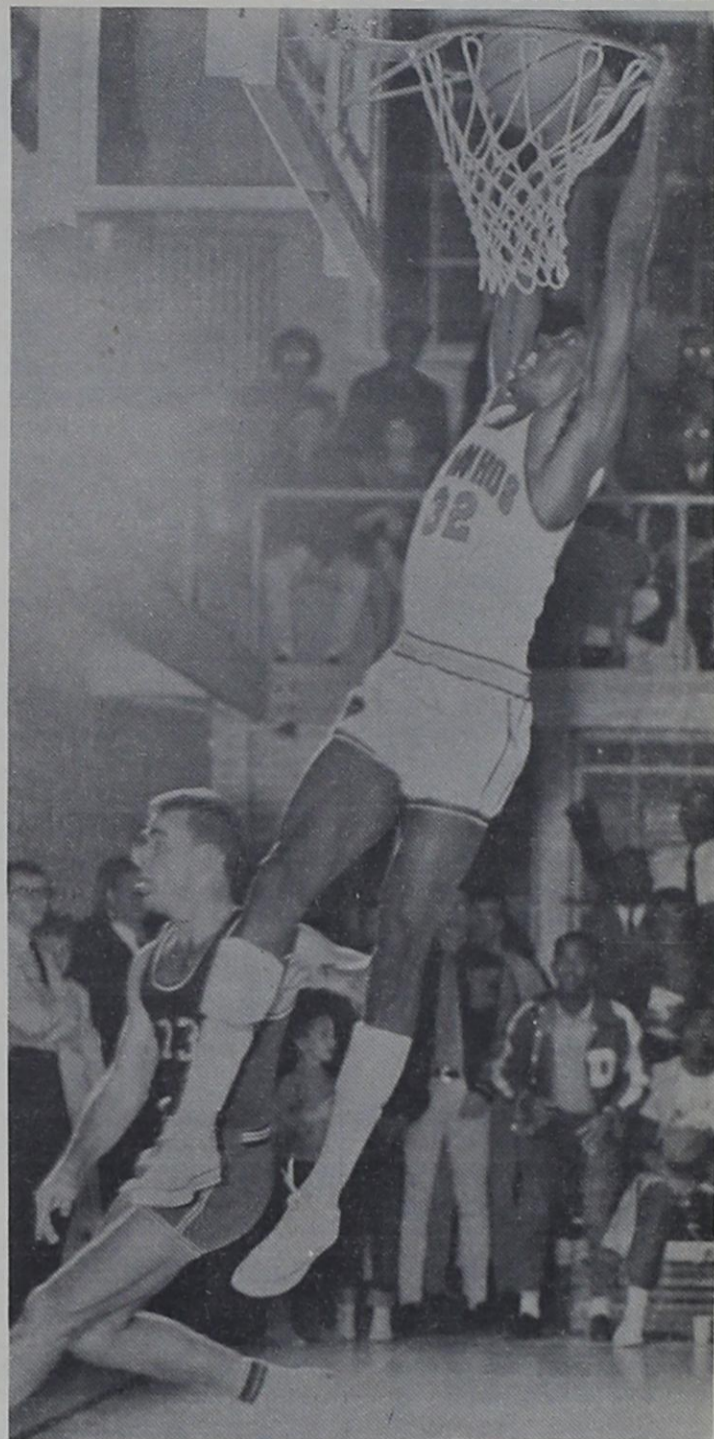

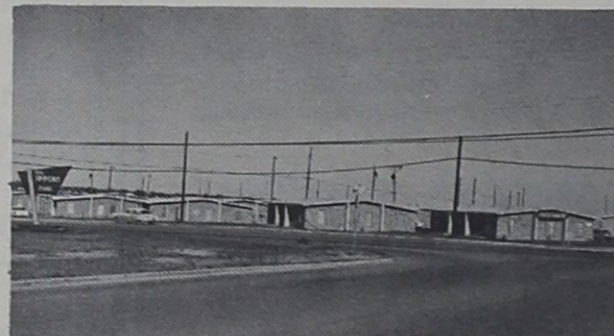

It seems as though the entire country is concerned about the repeal of Section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act. Here are some facts in regard to the act on the national level.

As the majority of us know the spotlight is on the labor legislation proposed in this Congress is based almost entirely on the bill to repeal Section 14 (b) of the Taft-Hartley Act—the section which permits the states to pass Right-To Work laws forbidding compulsory union membership as a condition of employment. The repeal bill, which is NUMBER ONE on organized labor's list of priorities, passed the House and for a time it was believed it was certain to go through the Senate. The heaviest kind of political pressure is being used to that end. However, there is very powerful opposition to repeal, on the grounds that there can be no justification for forcing a man to join and pay dues to a private organization in order to be able to hold a job. There is a strong possibility that the bill will be passed over until next year.

We will soon learn whether that is the case or not. Meanwhile, there is other labor legislation up for consideration which has been given little or no public attention. It is important legislation, too. One measure would amend another section of the Taft-Hartley Act to permit the building trade unions to direct strikes against secondary employers at construction sites. It would amend the existing provisions which curb secondary boycotts at those sites.

This is not so technical a matter as it may seem. Construction projects differ from most other businesses in that a number of different employers—contractors and subcontractors—may be engaged in work on the same project. The unions want to be able to do what is forbidden now—strike against a secondary employer, such as a subcontractor, even though their dispute is only with the primary employer.

The difference of opinion about this run to extremes. A publication of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States has succinctly summed up the pros and cons. They run about like this:

The unions say the bill would give construction workers a right comparable to that exercised by other unions; opponents say that to the contrary, it would give the building trades unions very special privileges and coercive powers. Proponents say it would not permit "product boycotts"—the refusal of unions to handle the products of certain employers; opponents say it would open the door not only to this abuse but to others. Proponents say it would increase industrial peace and the opponents say it would increase industrial disruptions.

No matter how the two sides will differ this issue will still remain a controversial issue as long as you have the Proponents and their opposition.

## Two Youngsters Die in Fire Mishap

Two youngsters, ages 14 months and 3 months, burned to death and their parents were seriously injured late Friday evening when fire swept through a portion of their apartment at 1015-D East 29th Street.

Killed were Roland Fitzgerald Pogue and Ronnie McGraw who were sons of A/2C and Mrs. George W. McGraw who had recently moved into the apartments.

At press time McGraw, 24, was listed in serious condition and his 19 year-old wife, Dorothy, was reported

According to the Lubbock Fire Department a pilot light on a gas stove apparently ignited fumes from gasoline the airman was using as a cleaning fluid.

Flames quickly engulfed the kitchen of the first floor unit of Coronado Apartments, trapping the two youngsters in corners away from two interior doorways.

McGraw's clothing was afire when he ran from the apartment, neighbors told firemen.

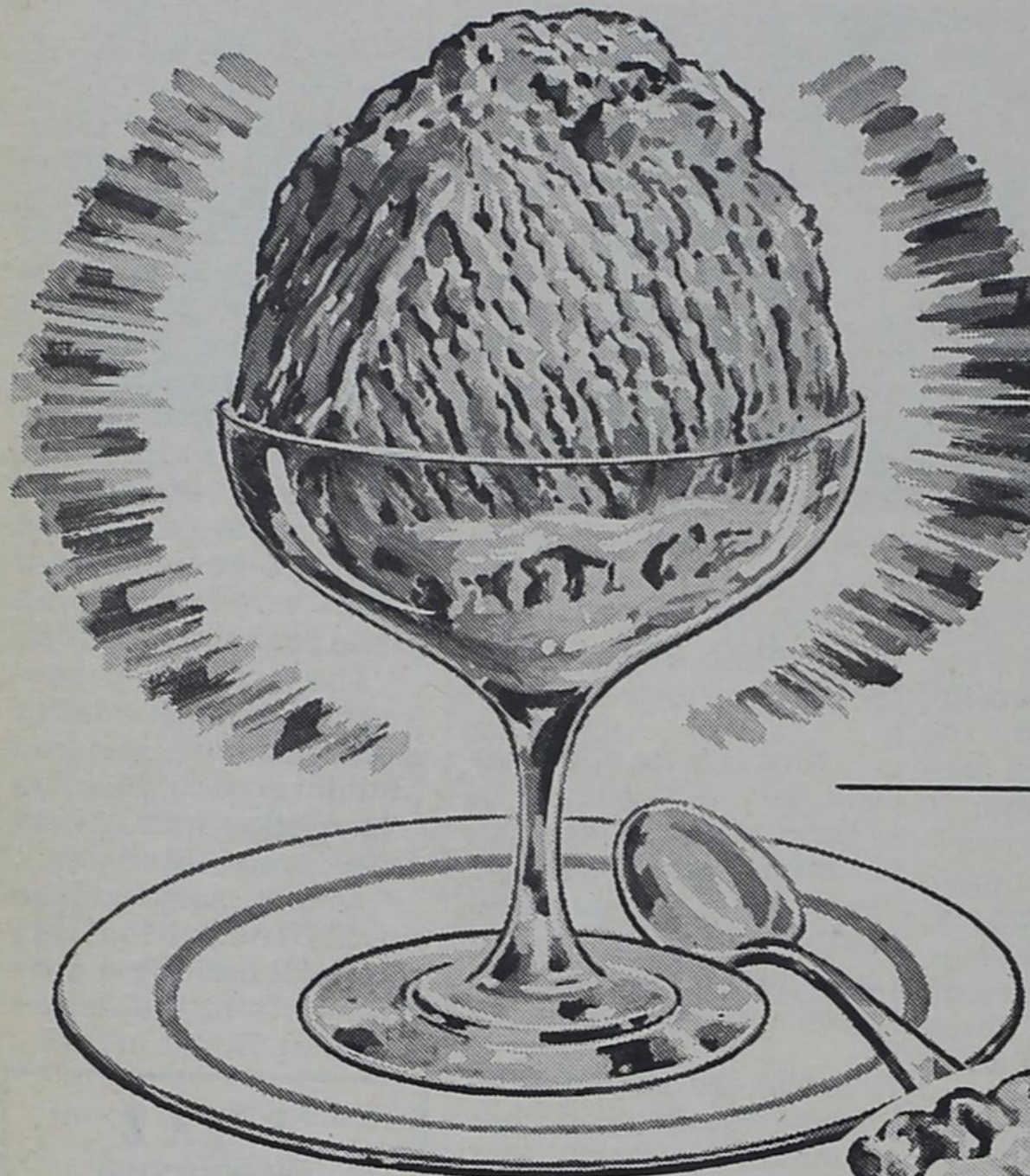

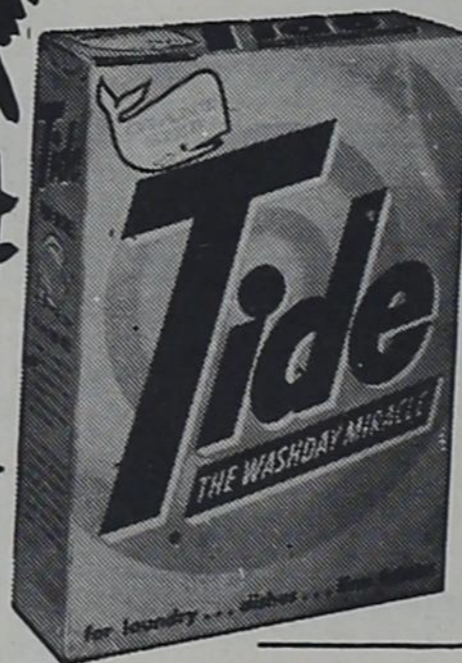

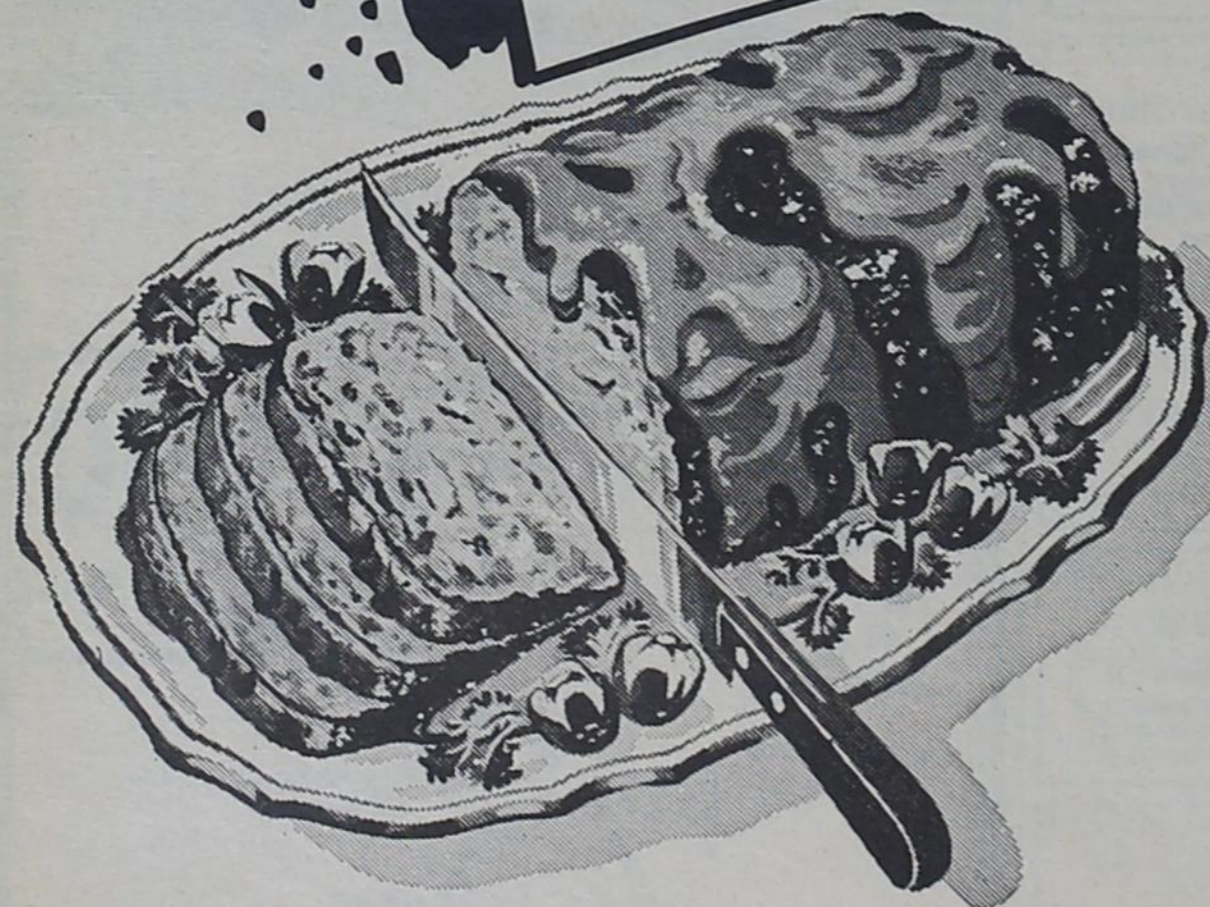
