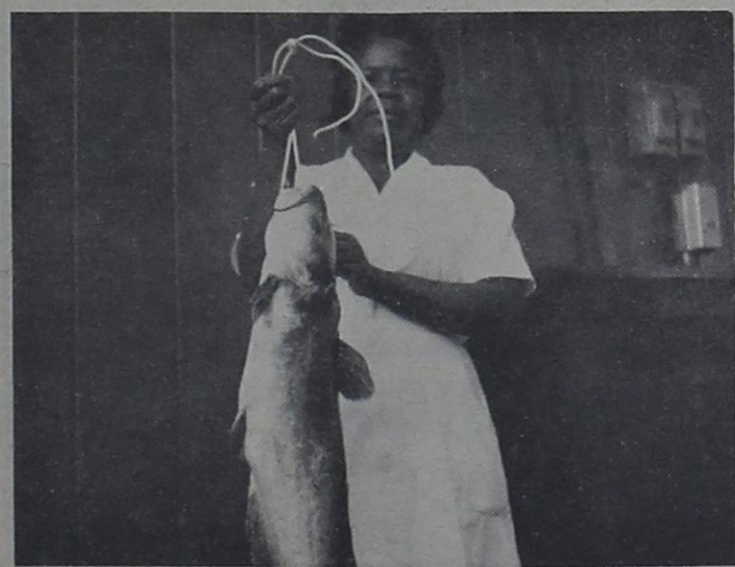

NEW PROGRAM FOR OPEN HOURS OF SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE

All of you Lubbockites and citizens of area towns who have failed to look into the new Social Security program will now have an opportunity beginning tonight.

The social security district office in Lubbock will remain open from 4:45 to 8:45 p.m. each Thursday for the next several months, for the convenience of residents of the area, according to a spokesman of the office. These evening hours are in addition to the regular 8:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. schedule of office hours, Monday through Friday.

It was also pointed out that it is important for many people to get in touch with the district office to take advantage of the health insurance and other provisions of the 1965 amendments to the social security program. Although most people are able to visit the office during the day, many find it impossible to do so because of employment or home responsibilities.

The three major groups of people who should get in touch with the social security office are the following:

1. People who are now 65 or older but who are not entitled to social security benefits. Some of these people are eligible for benefits but have not applied for them because they are still working full time. It is desirable for these people to apply now to establish their social security benefit rights and to qualify for the hospital insurance that begins July 1966. No one can lose by applying for benefits as soon as he reaches 65. Those who retire between 62 and 65 may receive cash benefits but in a permanently reduced amount. They are not eligible for hospital insurance until they reach 65. Many persons 72 or older are not now getting benefits because they had not worked enough under social security to qualify.
2. Widows 60 or 61 years of age who under the old law would have been eligible for widows benefits at 62. They may now apply for social security benefits as early as age 60 if they wish to accept a permanently reduced amount.
3. Unmarried students 18 to 22 years of age whose social security benefits have stopped and students who receive social security benefits and are nearing age 18, and who plan to continue in school.

The youth sponsor, Mrs. Dual Roberts, gave the closing remarks.

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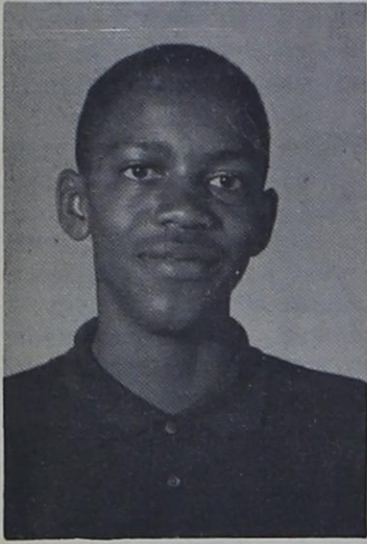

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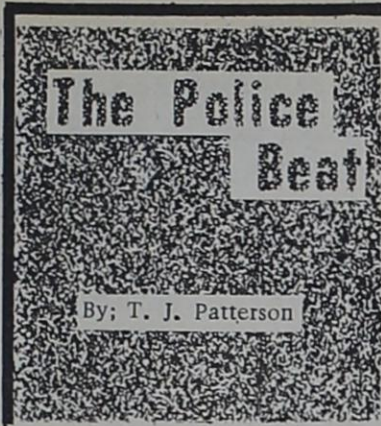
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FIGHT
