One of the principal matters given national discussion and attention today is how to raise the incomes of those in the below average brackets. A good many people, because of the vast amount of publicity given the Administration's war on poverty program, probably think this is primarily or even wholly a problem that the federal government must deal with. But others, who have analyzed the needs in all of their many ramifications, find no such simple solution. The federal government will help---but all other segments of our society, including business and local government, must make their contributions and on a big scale if the goal is to be reached.

A new and interesting discussion of the problem has come from the Committee for Economic Development under the title of "Raising Low Income Through Improved Education". Its premise is that improvement in education (by which it means: "education better adapted to the capacities, interests, and needs of individuals in the changing world in which they live" is an important thing that can and should be done to better the lot of those with lowest incomes").

The need for education is not just to improve education. It is, as well, to keep pace with the forces in the economy that are constantly changing the character of the demand for labor---something we are not doing now. One may add, it stresses that the enlarged federal role in education of the past several years does not relieve others of their responsibilities in this area. It then makes a series of recommendations, including the following:

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States that have not done so should establish adequate systems of conveniently available educational institutions beyond high school---junior colleges, community colleges, or technical institutes.

Programs to eliminate adult illiteracy should be launched by citizens at the community level.

More use should be made of the capacities of business for training workers and developing more effective methods of education and training.

The above information, like other studies of the matter, recognizes that in too many instances our educational systems and institutions are not coping adequately with the problems of technological advance. In other words, they are not doing a sufficient job of preparing young people for the kind of work for which there is a swelling need. Some skills have become obsolete-----in other instances the demand for people with

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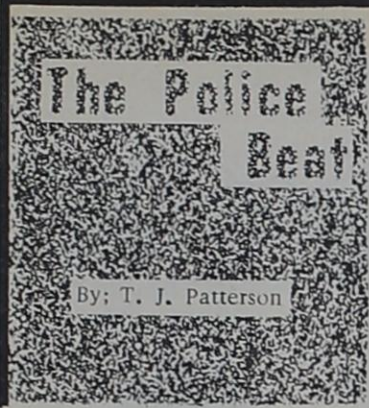
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THINK INDUSTRY... industrial development program.

During the THINK INDUSTRY campaign, 40 speaking engagements were filled before Lubbock service clubs, Chamber committees, and various professional groups over the city. These meetings were conducted by a 12-man Speakers Bureau.

Two hundred thousand of the questionnaires were distributed over the community, as well as 20,000 of the badges, and 5,000 tent cards.

The promotion featured the use of 40 billboards over the community, a series of newspaper advertisements, and radio and television commercials.
