THE HOUSING BILL

The Housing Bill authorizes a total of \$350 million for rent supplements over the next four years. It is estimated that these funds will enable private enterprise to build 375,000 units in the next four years of which nearly 100,000 are expected to house senior citizens.

This program offers many advantages to our senior citizens. It will increase substantially the supply of good housing available to low income older people at rates they can afford; it will enlarge the area of choice that an older person or couple can make in selecting the kind of housing they wish. It will reduce the need to segregate people by income level and will assist greatly in equating the need for housing with effective demand.

Many of the church groups, labor unions, and other civic groups which have been active in the field will be able to participate even more actively and with rent supplements, many additional sponsors will be able to develop their plans for housing for the elderly with assurance that there will be an effective demand.

The Housing Bill provides for a futher expansion and new approaches in the low-rent public housing program. These new provisions will give added momentum to this program which has been serving low-income senior citizens so well. The new bill will provide for an additional 60,000 public housing units a year for the next four years or a total of 240,000. It is expected that 35,000 new units a year will be constructed with another 15,000 each year to be purchased and rehabilitated from existing housing and an additional 10,000 units each year to be leased from private owners for occupancy by low-income families.

About half of all the low rent units for which contracts have been signed during the past two years are planned for occupancy by older people. Thus, the expansion and liberalization of the program, with recent trends continuing, is certain to play an important role in providing decent housing for low-income senior citizens.

With this for new emphasis on the use of existing housing, older people in particular, may obtain particular benefits through quicker availability for occupancy, and by locations in established, familiar neighborhoods as compared to new construction.

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'Norm's Notebook'

FROM THE PUBLISHER'S DESK...

Last week I talked at great length about civil rights and my desire to see the idea changed to civil responsibility. During the discussion, I mentioned talking last year with a friend of mine and his statement about the masses falling into the hands of people who were preaching race hate at the time.

Now it seems that his attitudes have come true, especially when the observer looks at the many times each week the charges of police brutality crop up throughout the United States. Also, it becomes quite evident that the citizens who last year were demonstrating peacefully are now being represented by citizens, if we stretch the meaning of the word, whose only desire is to lend themselves to violence, looting and the complete rape of the moral and judicial codes that this great country of ours was built upon.

When these events began to take shape this year, I went back in memory and recalled asking my friend how he could possibly predict what might occur a year hence. His answer was brutal in the light of civil rights workers, but alas, in the shadows of present events, quite true. "It's simple." he said, "With close investigation of the poeple involved in the leadership of some of the civil rights organizations, a person only has to read past history and understand the methods and manners being employed." "The first step," he added, "in the sequence of events as taught by communism, is to establish some theme by which two races can be led to distrust each other, in other words, the attempt this summer to create ill feelings between the Negro and white races all over the nation. Then next year, with all manner of legislation already passed in favor of the Negro, small incidents will be used by these same communist to incite the Negroes to riots and complete civil disobedience. Along with this civil disobedience will be the establishment of good channels of communication to publicly denounce all manners of law enforcement officials." "In this manner," he went on to say, "civil rights will lead to civil disobedience, leading in turn to disrespect for law enforcement officials and eventually to complete disregard to law in its entirety, which is the only thing at the present time standing between EVERY AMERICAN'S personal freedom and complete domination by some other form of government other than our own." "This other form of government," he concluded, "has for the past 30 years envarably been communism."

With just a little study, a person will find that my friend is quite right about these things. Especially is this true when you study the history of communist revolutions the world over. Look close to home, at Cuba, where the prevailing rule was discredited through the efforts of Fidel Castro, causing complete disorder, and disrespect for the law and order, such as it was. The next step after this was the complete take over and control yb the communists. Please don't be misled by cries of "communism in civil rights", to the point that you think you will ever be fortunate enough to have an avowed communist walk up to you out of a civil rights demonstration and admit he is such, rather, look at the results of such demonstrations, consider the possibilities of teaching our younger people disrespect rather than respect for law and order, and then look closely at the people in charge of just such demonstrations.

Not everyone in favor of civil rights is a communist, nor is a majority of the people, but, only a few can spoil the whole idea, like the apple and the barrel. Remember, that in a nation of different peoples as large as all the communist dominated countries today, LESS than 10% of the total peoples are actually avowed communists, while the rest are merely required to 'go along' with their present form of government.

Again I say, and intend to continue to say, civil rights must be replaced immediately with CIVIL RESPONSIBILITY. Now, before the Negro cause is set back another 100 years with continuations of such acts as heve been taking place in Los Angeles, Chicago, and even Dallas. Now, before our society becomes composed of segments of Negroes, whites, latins, etc., we must reach a point where everyone's common sense takes hold of them again, and we all have time to remember first and foremost we are Americans. Without this the time is very short when the freedom of protest will just be a thing of the past, not just for the Negro, but for all citizens of this great country of ours.

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

Also, it becomes quite evident that the citizens who last year were demonstrating peacefully are now being represented by citizens, if we stretch the meaning of the word, whose only desire is to lend themselves to violence, looting and the complete rape of the moral and judicial codes that this great country of ours was built upon.

When these events began to take shape this year, I went back in memory and recalled asking my friend how he could possibly predict what might occur a year hence. His answer was brutal in the light of civil rights workers, but alas, in the shadows of present events, quite true, "It's simple." he said, "With close investigation of the poeple involved in the leadership of some of the civil rights organizations, a person only has to read past history and understand the methods and manners being employed." "The first step," he added, "in the sequence of events as taught by communism, is to establish some theme by which two races can be led to distrust each other, in other words, the attempt this summer to create ill feelings between the Negro and white races all over the nation. Then next year, with all manner of legislation already passed in favor of the Negro, small incidents will be used by these same communist to incite the Negroes to riots and complete civil disobedience. Along with this civil disobedience will be the establishment of good channels of communication to publicly denounce all manners of law enforcement officials." "In this manner," he went on to say, "civil rights will lead to civil disobedience, leading in turn to disrespect for law enforcement officials and eventually to complete disregard to law in its entirety, which is the only thing at the present time standing between EVERY AMERICAN'S personal freedom and complete domination by some other form of government other than our own." "This other form of government," he concluded, "has for the past 30 years envarably been communism."

With just a little study, a person will find that my friend is quite right about these things. Especially is this true when you study the history of communist revolutions the world over. Look close to home, at Cuba, where the prevailing rule was discredited through the efforts of Fidel Castro, causing complete disorder, and disrespect for the law and order, such as it was. The next step after this was the complete take over and control yb the communists. Please don't be misled by cries of "communism in civil rights", to the point that you think you will ever be fortunate enough to have an avowed communist walk up to you out of a civil rights demonstration and admit he is such, rather, look at the results of such demonstrations, consider the possibilities of teaching our younger people disrespect rather than respect for law and order, and then look closely at the people in charge of just such demonstrations.

Not everyone in favor of civil rights is a communist, nor is a majority of the people, but, only a few can spoil the whole idea, like the apple and the barrel. Remember, that in a nation of different peoples as large as all the communist dominated countries today, LESS than 10% of the total peoples are actually avowed communists, while the rest are merely required to 'go along' with their present form of government.

Again I say, and intend to continue to say, civil rights must be replaced immediately with CIVIL RESPONSIBILITY. Now, before the Negro cause is set back another 100 years with continuations of such acts as heve been taking place in Los Angeles, Chicago, and even Dallas. Now, before our society becomes composed of segments of Negroes, whites, latins, etc., we must reach a point where everyone's common sense takes hold of them again, and we all have time to remember first and foremost we are Americans. Without this the time is very short when the freedom of protest will just be a thing of the past, not just for the Negro, but for all citizens of this great country of ours.

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
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MAN CUT

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
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
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

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Veterans News

Now that the Cold War GI Bill has lassed the United States Senate we have had many request from people of our City asking for more details about this bill and how it will affect the lives of the five million forgotten veterans of the Cold War---250,000 of them in Texas.

First, who is eligible for the bill. Any veteran with an honorable discharge who has served more than 180 days on active duty between January 31, 1955 and July 1, 1967 (the end of the present draft), will be eligible for these benefits.

Second, what are the benefits under this bill? For each day of service a veteran will receive 1 1/2 days of educational assistance, with a maximum of 36 months of assistance to any. veteran. This is long enough for four years of

college, with nine months of schooling each year.

This assistance will be in the form of a monthly cash allowance paid to the veteran, but he must pay all of his tuition, books, living expenses, and other costs from this money. A single veteran with no dependents will receive \$110 a month; a veteran with one depe n d e n t will receive \$135 a month; and a veteran in school with two or more dependents will receive \$160 a month.

These Cold War veterans will also be eligible for loans, similiar to those under the World War II and Korean GI Bills, for the purchasing of homes or farms, including farm lands, livestock, and equipm e n t needed to start farming operations.

A veteran can use his educational allowance to finish high school,



He is a member of the Mt. Gilead Baptist Church and is employed at the Benson a n d McCormick Barber Shop located at 1324 East 24th Street.

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
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
