85 Year Old In Hit-Run Mishap

An 85-year-old man was placed in the City jail on last Saturday, where he was being held in connection with a hit-run accident which injured a bicycle rider. Two other persons were hurt in the accident.

According to Police felony charges of failure to stop and render aid would be lodged against the suspect.

The victim of the accident was Leon Armstead, 29, 302 East 20th Street, who was admitted to St. Mary's Hospital for observation on the same evening. He was reported in fair condition.

There were five witnesses to the accident. The bicycle Armstead was riding was struck in the rear by a station wagon, which failed to stop after the mishap. The incident occurred at about 7 p.m. at the corner of 34th and Locust.

The witnesses gave Police a description of the vehicle and officers had the suspect in custody less than forty five minutes. He was apprehended in the 250 block of Date Avenue.

FACTS PARENTS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT JOB CORPS

The Job Corps is mostly for young men and women who are out of school and cannot find a job. In a Job Corps Center, these young people will receive basic education, job training, and the experience to develop good work habits. They will get room and board, clothing and spending money of \$30.00 a month. Also, when they leave they will get \$50.00 for each month of satisfactory service in the Job Corps.

If the Corpsman wants to send some of that money home instead of saving it he can send up to \$25.00 each month. The Job Corps will send the same amount. The Corpsman will still be saving \$25.00 and his family will be getting up to \$50.00 for each month he is in the Job Corps.

Any young man or woman between the ages of 16 and 21 can apply for the Job Corps. There are two kinds of Job Corps Centers where a young man can go. One kind is located on public land such as National Parks and Forests. At these centers, Corpsmen will do carpentry and forestry work, build roads, and make trails. They will also learn to read and write better. They will learn how to handle employment interviews and other skills that will help them get a job better.

The other kind of Job Corps Center for young men will be located in or near large cities. At these centers they will receive more specialized job training.

Young women will go to Job Corps Centers in or near large cities. They will be trained to work in business offices, hospitals, stores, beauty shops, restaurants, nursery schools, or in other jobs that are available. They will also learn how to handle home and family responsibilities.

At all of these centers, movies, athletics, games, libraries, and various kinds entertainment will be available.

A young man or woman may spend anywhere from a few months to two years in the Job Corps. The Job Corps will pay the cost of one visit home a year. Corpsmen can also visit home at their own expense. Parents may visit Corpsman at the Centers.

The Corps is entirely voluntary and any one can leave at any time. If he starts in the Job Corps and completes his training he will be better able to get a job, return to school or join the armed services.

The Job Corps uses the newest training methods. Each Corpsman will be able to learn at his own abilities and interest.

Each center will have qualified people available to every Corpsman for guidance and counseling.

The Job Corps will help every Corpsman get a job after graduation from the Corps. This program is planned to give young people a better future.

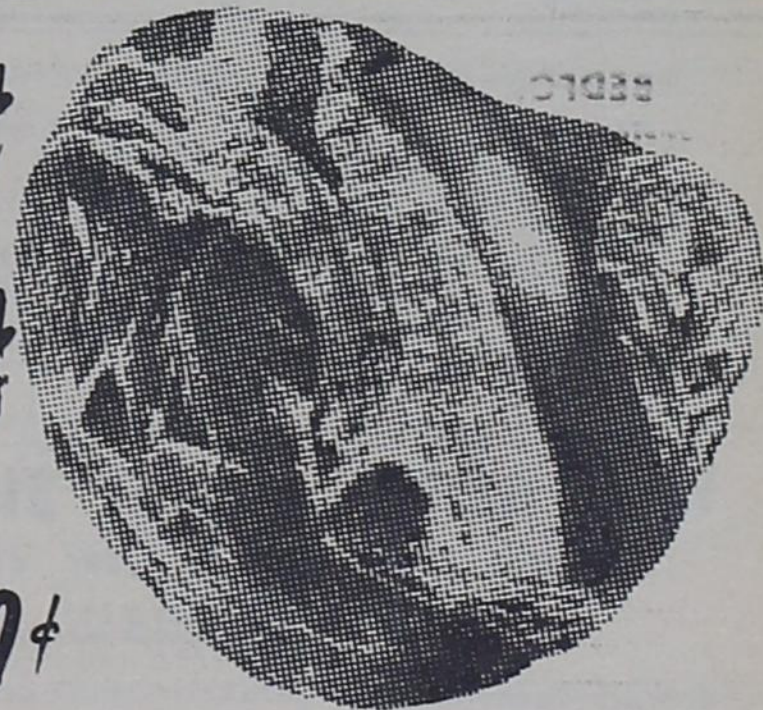

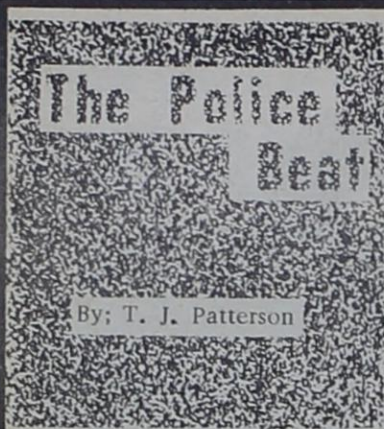

Boyer Cleared

Little Willie John Gets Three-Year Probated Sentence In Knifing

A Seattle, Washington court sentenced Little Willie John to three years probation for the stabbing death of Kendall Roundtree in October of 1964.

The court has also ruled that the singer might travel as long as he keeps the authorities posted on his whereabouts.

The Roundtree killing occurred during a party that was being given in Seattle

at which time John was drinking heavily.

According to reports the argument started when the singer asked the husky railworker to give his seat to a lady.

Witnesses on the scene say that Roundtree hit John several times about the face, and that is when he stabbed him with a knife in the heart and Roundtree died instantly.

Little Willie John, whose real name is William Edward John, was also being sought by Houston Police officials for writing several hot checks. He was indicted on two counts by the Harris County Grand Jury.

John gained fame back in 1959 when his recording "Fever" stayed in the upper charts.

They also protest an award of \$4,720 made

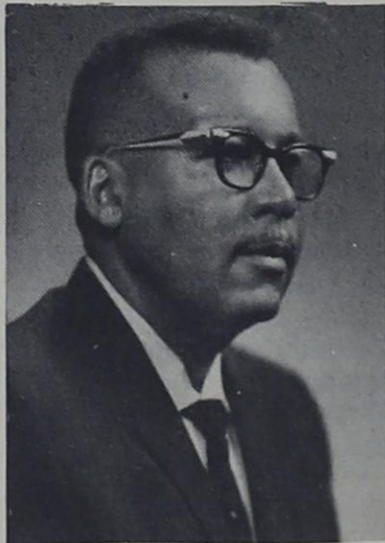

THE SERMON OF THE WEEK:

"THE WONDERFUL CHRIST"

By Rev. A. L. Davis, Pastor of Greater St. Luke Baptist Church

In showing he is wonderful, I shall refer to some aspects of his person, character, and work of mediation. I say He is wonderful.

First, He is wonderful in his person. We must not forget that he is the GOD man, because He was originally God. Had He been originally man He never could become the GOD man. Humanity never could have taken Divinity in union with itself, but Divinity from an alliance with humanity. The union of the two natures constituted the person of the Christ. It is seen therefore in his person the wildest extremes of being meet the finite and infinite. Surely He is wonderful....

And secondly, Christ is wonderful in character. A man's character is what He is. Christ was pleased while on earth to call himself the Son of man. This denotes His relation to the human race, but he escaped the sin of man by being in the world and not of the world. Such character is wonderful.

Third, Christ is wonderful in love. It is wonderful that He love his fellow man, and that He loved them in preference of a fallen angel. Whence the origin of this love? We know not. We only know that God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son. This is wonderful.

Finally, in His death, He became incarnate in order that He might die. The manner in which

HOW TO HAVE COURAGE

By Norman Vincent Peale

A friend of mine came across a very interesting relic of the Old West: the last will and testament of a rugged frontiersman. This will was obviously made without benefit of any lawyer. It consists of three sentences crudely scrawled on a rough piece of paper. Many of the words are misspelled. But the thoughts in it are as sound as the good earth on which we walk. It says:

"This here is my last will and testament. I ain't got no money to leave you, nothin' exception' our old cabin, old Buck" (undoubtedly a horse) "and my two guns. But I do leave you somethin' worth a parcel more than money: 1- a man's word that is as good as his bond, 2- faith in the Lord Jesus, 3- courage, so you won't be afraid of nothin' or nobody."

Honesty, faith, courage. What a tremendous legacy that would be! Of course, these priceless assets cannot really be handed down from father to son. To have them a person must develop them himself. However, a parent's good influence and example can make it a powerful lot easier.

Men living dangerously in primitive conditions, like the pioneers and cowboys of the days of the Frontier, would naturally be the ones to have highest regard for courage. But we cannot live successfully without courage anywhere, no matter how civilized our environment. We cannot

do without it. Yet it does not come natural to us. We aren't born with it. We don't inherit it. So how to have it is a problem life hands every one of us.

What better place could there be to look for real answers to this problem than in the experience of soldiers who have had to overcome great fear under combat conditions and who somehow found the courage they needed? General Harold K. Johnson, Chief of Staff of the United States Army, speaking recently at a prayer breakfast in Washington attended by the President and Vice President, Supreme Court Justices, members of Congress and others, shared two incidents of this kind from his own life.

Describing his feelings as a prisoner on a Japanese ship in World War II when that ship was attacked by American bomber planes.

General Johnson recalled, "I bowed my head and prayed, and in the course of my prayer said: 'Lord, I am ready if you want me.' And I knew a great peace."

He then related how several years later, during the Korean War, he found himself one night in a dreary spot southeast of Pyongyang, capital of North Korea, on a road deserted except for a handful of American defenders -- "a lonely commander," fearful for the lives of the men he was charged with leading, wondering whether he could

do the job assigned to him and still give his men a fighting chance to survive. "And out of the still of the night," he says, "as if from a great distance, came God's voice saying, 'Be strong, have no fear, I am with you.'"

The Bible has a lot to say about courage -- necessarily, since it's the book of life. "Be strong and of good courage," said the Lord of Joshua, "be not afraid, neither be thou dismayed: for the Lord thy God is with thee whithersoever thou goest." In the ABCs of courage, remembering that God is with us is certainly letter A. for it's the chief reason you or I can be unafraid under all the circumstances.

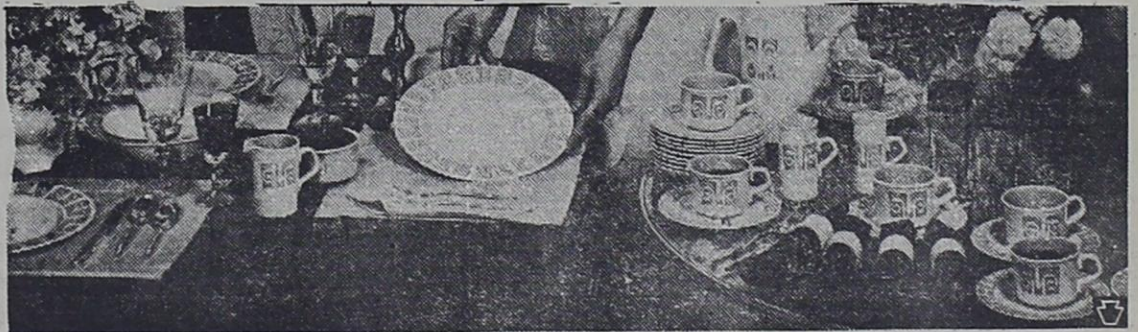
And of course the Bible also gives many stirring instances of valor on the field of battle. "Be of good courage," said King Joab to his brother when they had hastily deployed the force of Israel against the advancing armies of the Syrians and the Ammonites, "and let us behave ourselves valiantly for our people...and let the Lord do that which is good in His sight." Underscore those words: LET US BEHAVE OURSELVES VALIANTLY. That's the sure secret of having courage.

Both human experience and the Scriptures indicate that the way to have courage is to think courage, pray for courage and then act with courage. Always remember that whatever happens, God still holds you in His love and care. By thinking courage, praying for it, acting with it in little things from day to day, you can develop a courageous disposition -- and then you will be able to act with courage when you face a crisis.

A bride can find herself in a delightful dilemma selecting patterns and colors for her home. It's a big year for color in home furnishings, and dinnerware is no exception, says Designer John Gilkes. In colors and patterns, he adds, dinnerware now rivals other home furnishings.

To the bride planning a new home, this variety can cause confusion unless she takes stock of where and how she and her husband are going to live, Gilkes advises. Here is his checklist for brides to use in selecting dinnerware:

1. Consider the use of dinner-

ware. It is one home furnishing that will be used every day of the year. If you plan one set for all meals, look for a pattern that doubles for informal and formal service, and is durable.

2. Interior decor should influence the selection. A dinnerware pattern can match or contrast other colors in the home, according to your personal taste.

3. Rely on your own taste. Colorful patterns come in a wide range, from eye-catching to the subdued. Select the one that suits your requirements for your home, not someone else's.

4. Mixing serving pieces of different patterns are accepted

today and add color. But remember to find out if the pattern is readily available. If it isn't open stock, it may be difficult to add or replace pieces.

Gilkes, director of design for the Taylor, Smith & Taylor Co., is working on new colors for dinnerware. His latest design, Taylorstone earthenware, shows off colors on the rim shapes of plates.

A final point he offers about dinnerware is that, a bride shouldn't hide her personality. "Select a color and pattern you like, and use it to full advantage to make your home sparkle," he emphasizes.

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
