BLACK CAUCUS APPLAUDS SUPREME COURT'S WEBER CASE

The Congressional Black Caucus last week applauded the Supreme Court's decision in the Weber case involving a voluntary affirmative action for employment plan undertaken by Kaiser Aluminum and the United Steelworkers of America. Speaking for the Caucus, Chairwoman Cardiss Collins (D-Ill.) said, "We believe that the Court has correctly interpreted the congressional intent of Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act broadly." Congresswoman Collins pointed out, "This is the first so-called 'reverse discrimination' in employment case to reach the Supreme Court. The Court fully recognized that Congress intended to encourage, rather than discourage, private employers to move voluntarily to 'eliminate traditional patterns of racial segregation' in employment."

The Court found that only 1.83 percent of the skilled craft workers at Kaiser's Gramercy, Louisiana plant were Black prior to 1974, while 39 percent of the local work force was Black. To remedy this situation, a collective bargaining agreement between the union and the employer

provided that 50 percent of openings in an in-plant skill training program would go to Black employees until the percentage of Black craft employees was commensurate with the percentage of Black in the local labor force. The Court held that Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act does not prohibit such voluntary race-conscious plans.

The Congressional Black Caucus has long urged full enforcement of the equal employment opportunity laws and recognized that in some circumstances this can only be accomplished by affirmative relief. Caucus members had joined in an Amicus Curiae brief in the Weber case. The Supreme Court's opinion in the Weber case is considered particularly important in a society in which the vestiges of prior servitude and past discrimination are still with us.

Congresswoman Collins concluded by saying, "Now that the issue of permitting voluntary plans has been decided by

the Court, it is time for our public agencies and the private sector to get on with the business of eliminating entirely inequality in employment for all persons."

AFFECTED CLASS MINORITIES??

Affected Class Minorities, by government standards, are those who "by virtue of past discrimination, continue to suffer the effects of that discrimination", and have never been permitted to identify with white America and its institutions. According to E.O. 11246, "An affected class problem must be remedied" in order to be in compliance. Over the last week, we have heard much about reversed discrimination the Brian Weber Case. But one thing, Paul Harvey and all the other ultra conservatives yelling about reverse discrimination is as bad as discrimination. What they do not say is any Black, no matter who he or she is, has to be more qualified, more prepared, and more anything else. You have to compete with the lowest white on the pole. So when it comes to qualifications, which this writer often questions, I can qualify anybody or anything I want to as long as I am doing the qualifying.

The thing niggers have go through is something else. Blacks have to get qualified by white standards, by white qualifiers which are self explanatory. But the "reverse discrimination" lawsuit responsible for Weber's notoriety has roused the wrath of many fellow union members. Their anger is no where more visible than in the Chicago, Northern Indiana District 31, home of George Wallace supporters, and nearly one-tenth of the Steelworkers Union's 1.4 million members. "We are diametrically opposed to Brian Weber," says William Andrews, a Black leader in the district Black caucus and president of 18,000 member Steelworkers local, the largest in the union at Inland Steel's East Chicago Mill. "There is no such thing as reverse discrimination."

Even with all the affirmative action, it's going to be a helluva time before we catch up. The suit by Weber, a white worker at the Kaiser plant as a lab worker, charged that he was a victim of racial discrimination when his application for a skilled trades training program was rejected while two Black workers with less seniority were accepted. This is what was mentioned in this article earlier about seniority. What about getting in the door in the first place. The program was established as an anti-discrimination measure by the Steelworkers Union 1974 nationwide contract with Kaiser. Under that agreement, minority workers were to have half the trainee slots. Why the hell not? Until tiner numbers in the higher paid skilled trades work force match the local minority population. Before the program began, Blacks held only two percent of the trade jobs and population of the surrounding community was 39 percent.

Two lower courts ruled that the program violates Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act. The Lubbock Digest, especially after the local single member district case, wants all Blacks to know that we have the right to negotiate these kinds of plans where there is an imbalance. Blacks who have long been silent will be coming to the forefront in the 80's, because we (Blacks) are being rapidly pushed into the background. After looking around America, with information received by this writer from



Part II—Arms Aid and the Soviet Threat
The Congressional Black Caucus communicated by letter with the President last year regarding the crucial need for sounder and more positive approaches by the Administration to black Africa. In the excerpt below, arms aid and the Soviet threat are discussed:

First, in pursuing your goal of encouraging the evolution of events, we ask that requests from African nations for military assistance be handled with due caution. You may be assured that relevant Congressional Committees, particularly the House Subcommittee on Africa, will review such requests very carefully, since what constitutes "legitimate defense needs" is subject to many definitions. For a country which has invested its resources principally in economic development, the case for addressing its legitimate security needs and modernizing its defense establishment seems justified. Nevertheless, given the limited extent of our assistance to African nations and the current negativism of Congressional attitudes, we think it criminal to mispend the scarce funds available to that continent on perceived rather than real threats to security.

Second, most African nations and principal Africanists both on the Hill and in other respected circles believe the United States has not been creative and positive enough in dealing with the impact of Soviet activities in Africa. The United States should not be indifferent to such competition nor rely on

precedents and anticipate that the Soviets will ultimately "fall on their faces" in Africa. However, we do believe that by identifying and helping to resolve the causes of unrest, in addition to sharing with African Nations our technological advancements and other resources, American policy will be enhanced.

BLACK EMPOWERMENT

By Dr. Nathaniel Wright, Jr.
Human Rights Activist

Several years ago, when Andrew Jackson Young Jr. became the first Black American to be appointed Ambassador to the United Nations, there was a tremendous furor in the press concerned primarily with Ambassador Young's "off the cuff" manner. That Mr. Young was not in the traditional diplomatic mold was clear to the public as a whole. Further, the State Department was served notice of this fact by Andrew Young's summary removal of all State Department career officers from his U.N. headquarters staff as soon as he took office.

From the perspective afforded by the passage of several years from all of the initial controversy regarding Mr. Young's new approach to diplomatic affairs, it might be helpful to see what clearer image of Mr. Young might emerge.

Andrew Young came to the work at the United Nations out of the basic background of religious idealism. Indeed, shortly after his arrival at the United Nations, he stated: "If we ever believe things are impossible, then we've got nothing to live for at all... The seemingly impossible dreams make life worthwhile and I would not trade them for any amount of realism, caution or protocol in the world... Everything I have ever done has been controversial and apparently naive, and people have advised against it."

It is precisely in the expression of these idealistic, religiously rooted, sentiments

crude antics and jingoism of Mr. Moynihan, one may see perhaps much more clearly why it has been absolutely vital for the United States to have at the United Nations a new image-making ambassador whose charismatic gifts and global insights could command the respect and also the loyalties of the majority of those represented at the United Nations.

In this regard, primarily Mr. Young brought to his work at the United Nations a vastly altered perception of world realities or relationships. For example, he did not see the major tensions as being between East and

West, with Russia and the United States squared off as major contenders against each other and with the other U.N. nations being merely pawns. Nor did Mr. Young see the major global dynamic as involving a tension between the "have-not" nations and those affluent nations which are the "haves."

Rather, Mr. Young came to the United Nations with a wholly non-traditional view of the realities of international life, as they were emerging in the several latter decades of the twentieth Century. Specifically he saw what he called "five worlds," in which the United States Government was no longer the leading power. This was enough to confound, confuse and to bring about at least the initial tremors of a diplomatic earthquake.

These worlds, or spheres of international activity and focus, include: (1) the indus-

trial nations; (2) the oil-rich and mineral rich emerging nations; (3) developing countries, such as the People's Republic of China, Kenya, and India; (4) the "poorest of the poor" nations; and (5) the multinational corporations.

Such a world view should be seen as a welcome and refreshing aspect of the needed or salutary gifts which Andrew Young brings to his most important work at the United Nations. But there is more.

Mr. Young has sought, for the benefit of the entire American public, to bring our country's foreign policy

debate out into the open. Those who have wanted a continuation of the old cloistered ways would naturally disagree with such a vastly different and open approach to international relations.

The American public, however, has only to reflect briefly upon the secretive diplomacy of Lyndon Johnson and the diplomacy and personality exercised by Henry Kissinger to recognize what a salutary service Mr. Young has rendered for us all.

The flaming fires of controversy regarding Ambassador Young have now largely subsided. Hence, there should be value in seeing our Nation's United Nations Ambassador in a clearer light, enabling us to contend or to cooperate with him in the most rational and realistic way.

IMPORTANT TAX NOTICE

The Lubbock Independent School District hereby announces that all persons under a disability for purposes of payment of disability benefits under Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance (under Title II of the Social Security Act) are entitled to an exemption of \$10,000 from the market value (\$6,000 from the assessed value) of their residence homesteads for the purpose of school taxes.

In order to qualify for this exemption for the 1979 tax year, the rendition period has been re-opened. You must claim this exemption by filling out and filing the required exemption forms at the School Tax Office, 1001 Texas Avenue, before July 20, 1979. The law provides that unless this exemption is claimed prior to July 20, 1979, the exemption cannot be granted for 1979.

If you are disabled, and eligible under the law for this exemption, and are also eligible for the age 65 exemption, you may choose either exemption, but not both!

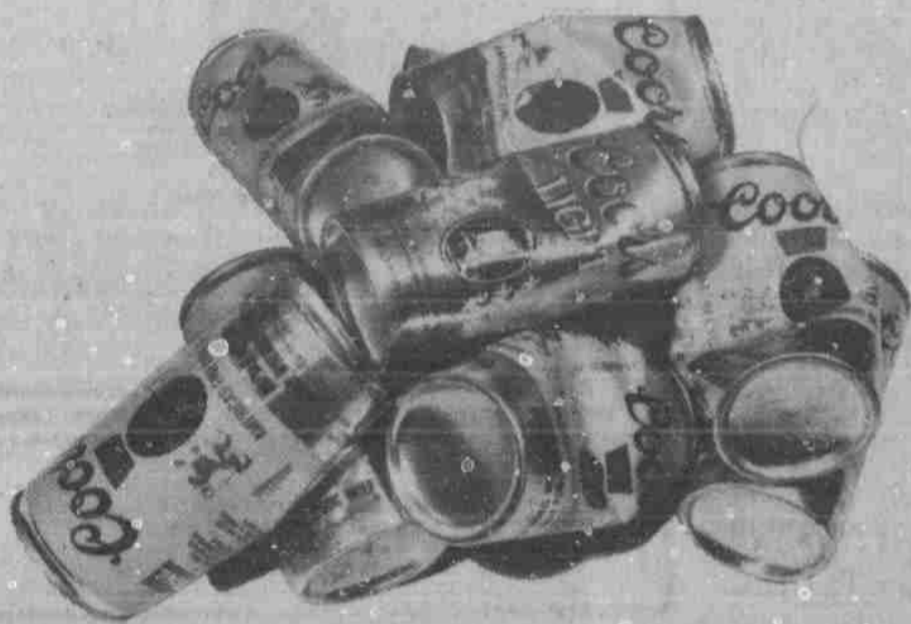

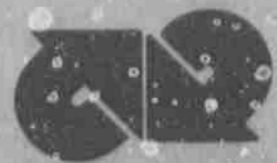

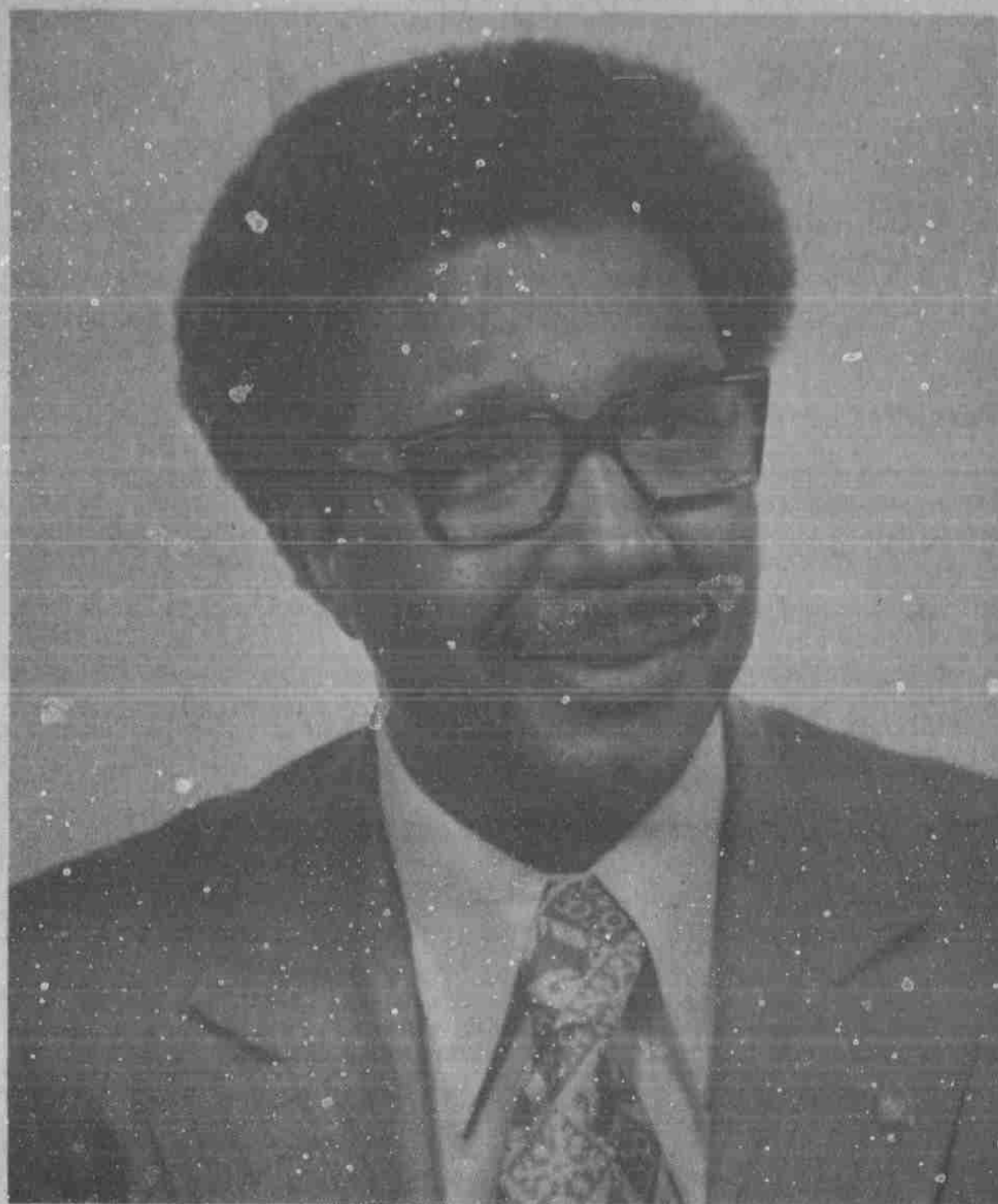
