People go into business for many reasons, but for James Ross, it was still a different one. "I went into my own business (J. J.'s Sanitizing Service), because I was fired for asking for an opportunity to become a salesman," he says.

"You know, I saw an opportunity as well as a need in the janitorial business, so here I am. In this business, I want to be able to create jobs and build a good Black image for our young Black boys and girls as well as other minorities," says Ross. A resident of Lubbock for thirty five years, he has only been in business for nine months. "Since this short time, I'm able to sell my service to many businesses and some residential. Even the Better Business Bureau knows about this business," he smiles.

Starting Lubbock, now J. J.'s Sanitizing Service is known across the New Mexico state line. "My business shows young Blacks there is something else in the world other than pimping and hustling. I believe any person who wants to go into business can put his mind into it and become successful. This is what my wife, Mary, and I are

busy doing each day and week.

"There's no doubt about it, there needs to be more Black businesses in Lubbock on the South Plains of Texas. Perhaps, I don't have a college education, but I know what one can do in the business world. You must be good with what you do."

"For instance, the other company I worked for several years didn't give me an opportunity to become a salesman, but today, I've got some of their customers. You see, you must be good in what you do," says Ross.

"My goals in business are to make it on my own and not to depend on anyone for a loan or other handouts."

This janitorial service Ross and wife are building involves a complete sanitation and cleaning of businesses and other establishments

as well as homes. "All I want is for people to give us an opportunity, and they'll be glad they did," he said.

The Rosses are proud parents of two children, Catalina and Christopher.

Reading a recent article in the Denver Weekly Newspaper, owned by a friend of mine, F. Cosmo Harris, this writer felt it was worthwhile for our readers. Here it is:  
**James Farmer: "Only Hate Groups Can Benefit"**

James Farmer, the founder and former national director of the Congress for Racial Equality (CORE), warned this week that the "scuttling of the alliance" between Blacks and Jews would not be in the interests of Blacks or Jews but would benefit "only those who, like the KU KLUX KLAN, wish pain upon Jews and Blacks alike." Farmer, who is now executive director of the Coalition of American Public Employees, told a conferece of the National Association of Human Rights Workers in Portland, Me. that "the purported rift between the Black and Jewish communities" tied to the resignation of Andrew Young as U. S. Ambassador to the United Nations threatens to "fragment" the "historical alliance between Blacks and Jews."

### Cites Contributions of American Jews

"In allmy years in the civil rights movements, no single white community contributed more in human and economic terms than the Jewish, and economic terms than the Jewish American Community."

## BLACK EMPOWERMENT

### THIS WEEK WE EXAMINE

#### WINTER SAVINGS

Periodically in this column, we point out the connection between good economics and the continuing empowerment needs of Black Americans. A poor race in any society will almost always be disproportionately powerless in every other aspect of its people's life.

Hence, wintertime savings—and the discipline involved in achieving them—are of tremendous importance to us as a people seeking improved status and full liberation.

One of the most important areas in accruing wintertime savings is the matter of providing both ample and pleasant heat for the cold winter months.

Fuel costs within just a few years have increased three times over; and, most immediately devastating, there has been a doubling of our winter fuel costs in less than three years.

Whether we live in the North (where heating costs are 65 percent higher than in the South) or in the South (where a doubled or a tripled fuel bill can still be shattering to a family's budget) fuel savings are important.

While we have made fuel-saving suggestions in the past, we add several significant ones to this year's list, because fuel promises to be an increasingly difficult burden for every American in the years which are ahead.

1. Wherever possible, try to "zone" your heat. The zoning of heat simply means putting heat only where it is being used at the immediate

time. If you live in an "old-fashioned" house, built before the 1940's where you have doors to every room and hot air registers, this can be a relatively simple matter. You can adjust the duct valves permanently in the basement; and you can shut the hot air registers, as well as the doors, in immediately unused rooms.

Should you have a more modern home, built after 1940, zoning may be a bit more difficult because of the open arches which have no doors. But, for a relatively minor investment and at little or no loss of beauty, attractive plastic accordion or folding doors may be used to close off an area in the house not being used at the time.

Where one has steam or hot water radiators, even these can be adjusted. The happy "end result" of these simple actions can be tremendous savings. Last winter, one person reported a 60-percent savings on the family fuel bill, only by "zoning" the household heat. . . and she was also warmer.

You can do it, and be more comfortable, too! Where legally permitted, the addition—at perhaps between a \$50 to \$200 investment—of electric or gas-fired area heating units may result in tremendous savings. But . . . keep the fireplace chimney closed. It is the greatest heat loser of all!

2. Enjoy family evenings and weekends together. When family members are scattered, occupying every

room—as they certainly must at some times—heat bills are highest. When families are gathered together in a "family room," heat savings may be achieved elsewhere throughout the house.

If you need to be convinced at how costly fuel can be—and most often is—wasted, just go to where your furnace is, listen to the fuel injector go "click, click, click," and then just imagine how your own hard-earned money is going "clickety, clickety, click" right up the chimney!

3. Get into the vest, sweater or "smoking jacket" habit. Both male and female vests are now in style. Sweaters for indoor wear are more manageable, inexpensive, warm, comfortable and attractive than ever before. One heat specialist has said: "A sweater each day saves a dollar a day." Put this into your pocket computer; it may show you how to keep out of debtor's jail.

For males who like to "sport it up," you can "play rich" and have your wife get you an attractive, bright smoking jacket and do just what the rich men do. Perhaps the wearing of smoking jackets indoors by the rich helps them to stay that way.

4. Check the caulking on your windows; check the seals on your storm doors; make certain that all windows are closed in any area where the heat is on; and make certain that you have ample insulation and a good running furnace. These are

"the old standbys," along with adding sufficient humidity to your air.

Most of all, remember that you are improving your family's security and the disciplined economics of our race when the now exorbitant winter fuel bills in our households are reduced—as they easily can be—to any substantial degree.

### HEALTH

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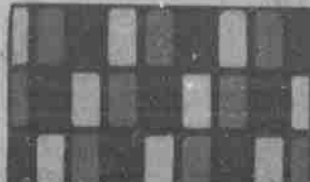
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
