## SHORT PUTS TEETH IN ANTI-DISCRIMINATION

The Senate State Affairs Committee Monday unanimously approved a bill by Lubbock area State Senator E.L. Short that would allow the State Alcoholic Beverage Commission to take administrative action against a nightclub of

against a nightclub or tavern operator convicted of an anti-discrimination offense. Short told the Committee the bill was prompted by problems that cropped up in Lubbock when some nightclub operators were regularly discriminating against minorities, the elderly and military personnel. Short stated, "This anti-discrimination bill will put teeth in the recently passed Lubbock City Ordinance making it unlawful for taverns or nightclubs to practice

racial discrimination." Short praised the efforts of the Coalition for Equal Justice for its persistence in urging action by the City Council. The Coalition for Equal Justice is a loosely knit organization of representatives from Lubbock's minority organizations and individuals concerned with responsive governmental action and human rights.

Short's bill will allow the Alcoholic Beverage Commission or Administrator to suspend or cancel a liquor permit for conviction of a business related discrimination. While prompted by discriminatory practices in Lubbock, Short's bill will have statewide impact. "Lots of our minority people are being discriminated against in bars throughout the State. It's not fair and we must put a stop to it,"

Short said. Short's measure is scheduled for a vote before the full Senate next Wednesday, where approval is expected. Representative Froy Salinas, Lubbock's Representative from District 75-B, is sponsoring a similar measure in the House of Representatives.

He is concerned about the future of the Black man in America. "I feel as though the Democrats as a whole and nation wide are moving in the direction to desert the Black, and this can even be seen in the acts of President Carter," he says.

He feels that although the Republicans have not in the past been very receptive to Black, the mood of the Republican Party towards Blacks is changing, and they are trying to reach the Black minority.

Clark says: "I feel that the Democrats will discard the Blacks and that we need to align ourselves with the Republican Party. I'm not saying that all Blacks should become Republicans, because this is just as ineffective as having all Blacks as Democrats. I still believe in the two party system. This is the best way."

Mr. Clark has talked with former governor John Connally who is vying for the presidential nomination. Clark admits he has not committed himself to any presidential nominee, he admits that he wants the chance to talk to all of them if

possible. He says he would like to attend the Republican National Convention. Clark plans to work very closely with the county and state Republicans. He was recently elected to the Community Service Board.

## WHY NOT??

According to syndicated radio and newspaper columnist Carl T. Rowan, more Black people phoned the White House to protest the absence of Black faces at the State dinner held for the Chinese Vice-Premier than called to protest the Presidents' 1980 budget cuts.

I assume our Black leaders are still more interested in setting next to white folks at the dinner table and in the classroom than they are about developing new ideas, new strategies and new tactics for Black Americans.

The budget for 1980 is not as far off as it sounds. It will take effect October 1, 1979, and will hit Black folks in the cities pretty hard. The chilling effect will hit around the summer of 1980 - just in time to give all you Black Democrats the opportunity to come out and again vote in another Democrat President who will then again put you on the bottom of his agenda. Makes me kind of glad I changed my party affiliation in 1975.

But, the killing thing about the whole sordid dinner affair is the fact that Louis Marlini, the Presidents' Special Assistant for minorities submitted a list of Black folks who should be in attendance. Guess what happened?

Answer: The Presidents' Special Assistant for Women, Ann Wexler, axed them out. How is it that for 'Minority' solidarity. And anyway, how come a special assistant for women is higher than a special assistant for 'Minorities'.

Let's Look Beyond The Systems To The Causes!!!

Minorities should study the issues before forming an opinion. Most legislations passed in one way or another, omits or put minorities at a disadvantage. Black people study the candidates, issues, pros, and cons of everything and make sound decisions based on logic and not emotions - or who or what, or what we like or do not like.

Black people must become a two party people to hold the balance in American Life. We are the difference or the balance for keeping both sides responsive to us.

A politician is a politician, no matter what the party is. I hear a lot of Blacks say "I have been a democrat all my life. My grandfather was a democrat,"... and that person, over 60 or 65, no way Blacks were Democrats. Elected officials in the 1800's and early 1900's were Republicans. Blacks turned Democrat in the 30's when Franklin D. Roosevelt defeated Herbert Clark Hoover after the great depression. From that time on, Republicans ignored or overlooked Blacks and at the same time, that is when Democrats started taking Blacks for granted and assuming they had Blacks in their hip pockets.

Now is the time for us to hold both parties feet to the fire and think for ourselves, and make all parties responsive to our needs. Why Not?!!!

## DID YOU KNOW THAT VIOLENCE SURFACES IN KLAN ACTIVITIES

As Black people, we had better be aware that violence has been pronounced by one major Ku Klux Klan group, according to recent copyrighted article appearing in the N.Y. Times News Service. This article referred that this group has "turned toward armed defiance, publicly brandishing sawed-off shotguns and submachine guns, harassing and beating activist blacks and intimidating public officials."

This is why Black people in Lubbock and the South Plains of Texas, as well as America, had better start getting their thing together. All of this above mentioned information is apparently happening in Mississippi and Alabama and appears to be generating significant membership increases, particularly in northern Alabama.

That's why it's so important that we get our act together. This is why we have no time to continue to play games. Things are happening and we must be aware on what is going on.



The Congressional Black Caucus continues to urge a Martin Luther King, Jr. national holiday (January 15th) and a Presidential commitment to black and inner-city needs. The Caucus position follows below:

Members of the Congressional Black Caucus believe that the President should set forth a comprehensive economic policy linking full employment, urban revitalization and equal opportunity through affirmative action. He must:

- Establish clear policies for achieving full employment;
  - State a commitment to vigorous and effective enforcement of the civil rights laws through affirmative action and support of the set-aside concept;

## BLACK EMPOWERMENT

### "THE WEBER CASE" ON AFFIRMATIVE ACTION

We all remember the historic Bakke Case regarding affirmative action. Well, now there is a similar case before the U.S. Supreme Court which may be even more historic and far-reaching in its implications. It is known as the Weber Case. Technically it is the Weber vs. Steelworkers case involving a complaint of one Brian F. Weber of Granberry, Louisiana against the United Steelworkers' union in the local plant of the Kaiser Aluminum Company.

Brian Weber and a number of his white associates are contending that a training program, designed to upgrade hitherto excluded blacks, discriminates unfairly against them and other whites in their efforts and aspirations at the Kaiser plant.

What the Weber Case is doing is pulling to the test the legality of all of the training programs designed to help blacks get around the oily slick union rules which have kept blacks unfairly out of many areas of blue collar employment for decades.

The importance of the case rests in the fact that if the affirmative action training programs are seen to be unconstitutional, the heart of affirmative action would be destroyed. The validity of the affirmative action effort should be seen as evident on the surface. When white Americans claim that they

have not maintained an actively discriminatory edge against black people throughout all of our nation's life, they grossly deceive themselves. That is the central point. On the day that the U.S. Supreme Court announced that it would hear the Weber Case this spring, a white veteran social worker in and around Harlem since the Great Depression had this deeply revealing testimony to offer. He began: "I cannot understand for the life of me any white persons who say that they have not been advantaged disproportionately in either some or many ways at the expense of black people."

"When I did social work in Harlem during the Great Depression, blacks were not even allowed to serve the needs of their fellow blacks except at the lower rungs of the social work scale. I went to work as the supervisor of blacks who might me what to do."

His story continued, "Even before I began doing social work, I got a job at Brook's Brothers exhibiting clothes. Two black fellows who worked in the stock room told me about the job and told me how to present myself and what to do on the job. I landed that job, thanks to my black buddies who joyously helped me get a job

for which they could not even apply. That story, directly and indirectly, could be multiplied many times in my own experience. In symbolic and in overt or more tangible ways, this same general picture could be painted for white Americans as a whole. The plain, elementary fact was—and still is—that we white folks get opportunities to the extent that we do in some part because black folks have been denied their just opportunities. "I cringe inside whenever I hear a blindly self-serving white person talk about blacks 'getting the breaks.' It is only peanuts in terms of the opportunities that practically all of us who are white blithely assume and which, in actuality, represent robbery of opportunity from blacks, both past and present."

The Weber Case presents the U.S. Supreme Court with the best opportunity yet to speak to this kind of discrimination against black Americans, which has been built into the very fabric of our nation's life. Black Americans should muster every resource at their disposal to get testimony before the highest court which will encourage the court, at long last, to affirm that restitution for past wrongs is called for by means of aggressive court-supported affirmative action in all areas of our nation's life.

### ADDITION TO HISTORY

A review of True Black Man's History, by Douglas Taylor and R.P. Powell, Philosophical Library, New York, N.Y., 83 pages, Hardcover, \$6.00.

The Philosophical Library is to be commended by black readers and writers as a willing and open resource for the publication of often difficult-to-publish but still highly important writings by or concerning black Americans.

This publishing house, located at 12 East 40th St., New York, N.Y. 10016, has given many younger black writers a start and has also provided a long-awaited recognition for older writers who may otherwise have never found an outlet for their creative work.

Into this latter category, generally, True Black Man's History may be seen to fit. Douglas Taylor is a black Pullman porter with 33 years of service and is still "working on the road." R.P. Powell, a contemporary, is a graduate of Columbia University and is also author of The Human Side of a People.

The present book may perhaps best be described as a brief historical dictionary of black Americans whom the authors see as having inspired themselves and countless others. It is clearly a labor of love and should be of interest to many, especially to young people who need to review the lives and names of our heroes who are not often recorded elsewhere.

Congratulations once more to the Philosophical Library for giving still more black writers a place in the world of literature.
