# Black Power Has Arrived...With Some New Challenges!



National NAACP head Benjamin Todd Jealous speaking at a news conference at the state Capitol in Hartford, Conn. Nine months after seizing unprecedented power in government, black lawmakers are in control of some of the most powerful positions in Congress, and facing new challenges to using their long-sought influence.

WASHINGTON (AP) -WASHINGTON (AP) --Ten months after Democrats took over the Capitol and the first African-American president moved into the White House, black lawmakers are in control of some of the most powerful positions in Congress - and face

positions in Congress - and face new challenges to using their long-sought influence. There have been some victo-ries - guaranteeing that stimulus oney reaches some of the orest parts of the country, expanding hate crimes legislation and moving to close health care disparities.

But "in some ways, our strate-

gies haven't caught up with our own power," said Benjamin Todd Jealous, chief executive of the NAACP.

The civil rights community is used to passing big omnibus leg-islative acts," he said. "We're not so accustomed to having the power to slice and dice that into 20 pieces and attach that to var-

ous other appropriations bills."

For generations, civil rights were inseparable from black politicians. That era ended with President Barack Obama, who

President Barack Obama, who has declined to engage in traditional black advocacy.

So any new efforts to help blacks who remain disproportionately unemployed, incarcreated, unhealthy and undereducated will most likely come from the 42 members of the Congressional Black Caucius

"The goal is closing all of these gaps," said Rep. Barbara Lee, chairwoman of the caucus and a member of the House Approprimember of the House Appropriations Committee, which over-sees budgetary spending. "When you look at all these huge sys-temic gaps, there's still not equality and justice for all." But due to recent advances among blacks - Obama's elec-

among blacks - Obama's elec-tion chief among them - there is a new resistance toward efforts aimed at helping black people specifically, said University of Pennsylvania history professor

Mary Frances Berry.
"We're used to being supplicants at the table," Berry said.
"Now they have to be smart. If they want to do something about they want to do something about unemployment, they can target those who have the highest rates. If you target education, target the lowest achievement rates. Don't say, 'We're doing this for black folks'; you say, 'We want to target where the problems are."

That strategy has been takin shape for some time, said Rep. James Clyburn, D-S.C., who as majority whip is the third-rank-ing member of the House. in the economic recovery package that he worked on with Rep. Charles Rangel, D-N.Y., chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, to ensure that 10 percent of federal stimulus dolpers are spent in ages, where at

lars are spent in areas where at least 20 percent of residents have lived in poverty for the last 30 years.
"If I were designing a quote unquote affirmative action program today, that's what I would be using, the 10-20-30 formula," Clyburn said. "We are finding more and more sophisticated ways of doing this on a nonracial basis."

But some still say the fractious black caucus - which famously split over endorsing Obama or Hillary Rodham Clinton in the 2008 presidential primaries -should be doing much more to bring together leaders from the private sector, education and local government to tackle prob-

local government to tackle prob-lem's facing black America.
"The black power establish-ment altogether should be given a B-minus or a C-plus," Berry said. "They need to pull to-gether, join together and be smart about how they articulate what the goals and opportunities are."

protection and changes he is pushing to mandatory minimum sentencing laws are evidence of

a whole new power syndrome on the national scene."

He also said he planned to bring a bill through his committhe calling for the government to study the issue of reparations to descendants of slaves. "This is not just a feel-good measure," Conyers said. "This is very seri-

Obama opposes reparations and has said "the best reparations we can provide are good schools in the inner city and jobs for people who are unemployed."

The caucus also played a major role in pushing the House to formally rebuke Rep. Jim Wilson, the South Carolina Republican who shouted "You lie!" during Obama's health care address to Congress.

"We weren't just going to let that go and not say something about it," said Rep. Yvette Clarke, D-N.Y. She said Clyburn's position as

said Clyourn's position as majority whip was crucial to this and other caucus priorities: "We're able to sort of project and amplify our voices because he's in the leadership."

Clarke said that in bills such

as the stimulus package, health care reform and auto industry care reform and auto industry bailouts, caucus members affect "the chemistry of the legislation" by ensuring that provisions to help minorities are included. For example, the House health care bill provides billions of dollars to address the substandard health care many minorities re-

health care many minorities re-ceive. It's unclear whether the provisions will remain after ne otiations to reconcile the Sen-te health care bills. Berry, the Penn professor, said

the caucus' effectiveness should ultimately be judged by results on problems in poverty, educa-tion, unemployment and other

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

lating to the non-action of Jus-tice Thomas) I was totally surprise at a news story caption. "Clarence Thomas To Other Supreme Court Justices: Be

Jay Reeve wrote: Clarence Thomas, the justice long known as the silent member of the colleagues Friday (October 23, 2009) for badgering attorneys rather than letting them speak during oral arguments. Thomas who hasn't asked a lawyer a question during arguments in nearly four years—said he and the other eight justices virtually always know where they stand on a case by reading legal briefs before oral arguments.

before oral arguments.

"So why do you beat up on people if you already know? I don't know, because I don't beat up on 'em. I refuse to participate. I don't like it, so I don't do it," Thomas said during an appearance before law students at the University of Alabama.

Thomas didn't name names, but fellow conservative. Instice.

but fellow conservative Justice Antonin Scalia is generally con-sidered the court's most aggres-sive questioner during oral arguments. President Barack Obama's lone nominee so far, Justice Sonia Sotomayor, isn't afraid to ask questions either. Thomas scoffed at the idea that

the justices try to use questions to influence the opinions of fellow member of the court. "All nine of us are in the same building," he said. "If we want to sway each other we know where we are. We don't need oral arguments to do that. It doesn't make

any sense to me."

Reeves noted that Thomas compared Senate confirmation

to selecting the referees for a college football game in hopes of getting favorable calls for one team or the other. "That's all based on a particular outcome you want. That is the antithesis of judging. You're corrupting your process. I think the conformation process is both unnecess. sary, it's uniformed with respect

to what the court actually does and it's very dangerous."

Thomas also noted "the court is too dominated by Ivy League lawyers and lacks regional di-versity. People constantly worry about racial, gender and ethnic diversity and home states matter,

too."

I am happy to know that parts of Justice Thomas are liken to brass. When he apply his thoughts to action (and quit acting like he is afraid of white males) black women may respect him and he just might become another Thurgood Marchall.



fish, lobster, clams, swan, berries, dried fruit, pumpkin, squash, and many more vegeta-bles.



# Obama Meets With Half-Brother While in China

BEIJING (AP) — President Barack Obama said Wednesday that he met briefly with a half brother who lives in China and who recently wrote a semi-auto-biographical novel about the abusive Kenyan father they

share.

Obama, who spent three days in China during his first official tour of Asia, acknowledged the meeting in an interview with CNN. He offered no details. An aide said later that the meeting took place Monday night after Obama arrived in Beijing, the Chinese canital Chinese capital.
The White House had declined

to say whether the president and Mark Ndesandjo would meet. And no White House official

And no white House official mentioned the visit until Obama did when asked about it.

"I don't know him well. I met him for the first time a couple of years ago," Obama told CNN.
"He stopped by with his wife for about five minutes during the

Describing the meeting as "overwhelming" and "intense," Ndesandjo told The Associated Press in an interview Wednesday that he had long anticipated the chance to welcome his famous brother to China.

"It think he came directly off

"I think he came directly off the plane, changed some clothes and then came down and saw us," Ndesandjo said. "And he just gave me a big hug. And it was so intense. I'm still over the moon on it. I am over the moon. And my wife. She is his biggest fan and I think she is still recov-

ering."

In the CNN interview, Obama said he hadn't read his brother's book, "Nairobi to Shenzhen," which features a protagonist who is the son of a Jewish mother and an abusive father from Kenya.

Ndesandio has revealed in

previous interviews that his fa-ther, Barack Obama Sr., beat him and his mother. The presi-dent also wrote about his father,

who abandoned him as a child.

who abandoned him as a child, in his best-selling memoir.

"It's no secret that my father was a troubled person," Obama said. "Anybody who has read my first book, 'Dreams from My Father,' knows that, you know, he had an alcoholism problem, that he didn't treat his families very well. Obviously it's a sadnatt of my history and my backpart of my history and my back-ground, but it's not something I spend a lot of time brooding

over."

Ndesandjo said he bought tick-Ndesandjo said he bought tick-ets months ago to fly from the southern boomtown of Shen-zhen, where he has lived since 2002, to Beijing, in hopes of re-connecting with his brother. The two last met in January when Ndesandjo attended Obama's in-auguration as a family guest. The three chatted on Monday, with Ohama being introduced to

The three chatted on Monday, with Obama being introduced to Ndesandjo's wife, a native of Henan, China, whom he married a year ago, he said. He gave few details of what they discussed.

"All I can say is, we talked about family, and it was very powerful because when he came in through that door, and I saw him and I hugged him, and he hugged me and hugged my wife. It was like we were continuing a conversation that had started


many years ago," he said.

The two men did not grow up together. Ndesandjo's mother, Ruth Nidesand, was Barack Obama Sr.'s third wife. Before arriving in Beijing on Monday, Obama had been in a townhall-style meeting with students in Shanghai, and joked that a family eathering at his house "looks". ily gathering at his house "looks like the United Nations."

President Obama's father had been a Kenyan exchange student who met his mother, Kansas native Stanley Ann Dunham, when they were in school in Hawaii. The two separated two years after he was born.


The senior Obama married Ndesandjo's mother after divorcing the president's mother. They returned to Kenya to live, where Mark and his brother, David, were born and raised.

Obama Sr. died in an automo-bile accident in 1982 at age 46. Ndesandjo lives near Hong Kong and earns a living as a marketing consultant. For most of that time, he has maintained a low profile, with few people knowing of his connection to the












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
