WHY NOT?

THE NEXT MOVE IS UP TO WHO???

— Last week, many young people took giant steps by graduating from kindergarten through graduate studies. For our high school graduates, and especially our young people at the college and university level, the next step is up to who? *Will we lose this wealth of talent and skills or will we retain it and all profit from it?*

— The challenge is up to all of us to see what the next move will be. The challenge is up to *you in business, you in politics, you in education, you in government, you in community affairs, you in community organizations, and you in churches, too, make sure that we don't lose our young Black talent as we have in the past. Let's all think about it.*

"CHANGING FOR PROGRESS"

Black people want political clout, but there will be *no political clout until there is economic clout.* In order to obtain both economic and political clout, one must go through the hardships and sacrifices, most of the time, to survive. To get out of the mediocrity means sacrificing and *doing without.* Most Black people want success, but are not willing to make the changes one has to make. Most Black people want to have *their cake and eat it too; want to hold on to false security; and work for the man and get rich on a part time basis.* Even Mayor Dirk West has said since he has been mayor, *you can't run a major progressive city with yesterday's methods. He has proven this with a new program called: "Citizens Crime Line."* This modern method of catching today's criminals is working. In this particular program, no one knows who alerted the local authorities. At the same time, nobody knows if anything will work until is given an opportunity.

With Lubbock's Black businesses since Urban Renewal (*Nigger Removal*) removed, the Black economic base (*Lubbock's Black Businesses*) has almost been nothing. This is, by no means, saying Lubbock's Black economic structure will not work. *It just haven't worked at present time!* This writer has often said that implants from other areas will move into our area and see the potential here and come to the great Southwest to prosper while the local Blacks (men and women) sit or stand by and be left behind. Regardless of the gesture, they will say: *"It will not work, because I've been here for X number of years and haven't seen it happen.* This is a new day in Lubbock, and we need to make it happen. *Nothing happens (YES NOTHING happens until someone starts the motion.* For all doubters, look on Parkway Drive (next to Brooks Super Market) and see what two beautiful Black brothers from Chicago, Illinois is doing!! *It can happen! It is never easy. There are always hardships, even doing without and suffering to make a success in business. The payoff is eventually worth all of it!*

Young Black people, there are all kinds of possibilities, but it takes hard work, preparation, ambition, and desire. The rewards, when it comes our way, is worth it all. *In terms of accomplishments, finances, and self satisfaction, the road is tough, but if you have what it takes — you can make it. If you are strong and determined, you have a great future in the business world. The challenges are here! The opportunities are here! The field is open if you are willing to pay the price.*

Being Black has many disadvantages. We as Black people still have to run to keep up with white people, even when they are creeping along, we need to run to catch up. *If we continue to run, let's run like hell!!!*

He wrote:

BLACK EMPOWERMENT

"DEAR PRECIOUS ONE..."

Not long ago in our ruminations concerning 1979 as the "Year of the Child," we came upon an unsigned letter which we deeply wished that we might have written ourselves. It was a letter to a "little one" dealing with just a bit of the awesomely sensitive subject matter which most parents turn their backs upon... to the detriment or inconvenience of all concerned.

It seemed that this was the very kind of letter that parents might want to see and then reproduce and share — or perhaps even share exactly as it is — with their children of the very early age of the little one to whom it was addressed, or of an older age. The earlier may be the better. The letter follows:
Dear Precious One:

For some time now, you have been asking us questions concerning life and death. But most often you have asked us questions about how you were born.

In our efforts to be helpful to you, we looked in books for parents about how to raise children. We learned that we should say specific things to you, things that were simple and which would be satisfying to your interest but that we should not say much more.

more important as time goes by. The story of the stork thus, in some ways, has value to us that is missing in what we are about to tell you now. All parents have different feelings. The feelings which we share are our own.

We know that you have been reading in your books about how animals mate — or put their bodies together — so that they can have children. When you asked us what they were doing in a picture in your book describing births among animals, we told you simply that animals have children that way.

What we did not say — and what you may have already heard from some of the children with whom you play — is that mothers and fathers have children in much the same way. They must touch each other. You have seen us touch each other gently when we have told each other just how much we love each other. We have touched you, too.

In order for us to have you born, we had to be even closer than that. Like the animals which you have seen, we must make a part of daddy's body enter mommy's body in a very special way. To us, it is a very special thing to do; and the result at one time was the very special gift... of you.

Not every time that mommy and daddy come close together lovingly like that is there a child born. If that happened, we would be somewhat like the "old woman" who lived in a shoe. She had so many children, she did not know what to do.

We feel that it is always important for you to understand things to the fullest extent that it is possible. We

want you to learn as much as you can about life... with our help... first. You are, after all, a part of us, as you have been since daddy placed a seed from his life into mommy so that you could grow inside of her.

But perhaps more important, we want to be the first to tell you that in less than six to eight years — between 12 and 14 years of age — you too could become a parent, and have a child, just like mommy and daddy have done. But there would be an awfully big difference. You would probably be too young to have the most healthy child. Further, in the kind of place where we live, mommies and daddies who are very young most often are not prepared or helped as they might be to become the very best parents which they might like to be. Someday this may — or will — change for the good of all.

We want to help you as you keep getting bigger and more and more like us, to know more about birth and about the sex life of men and women — and of boys and girls — which can cause a child to be born.

While we are glad to share with you what we have said here, it would be more important to express the joy, the sacredness and what we feel to be the mystery of birth.

If we find the letters written earlier upon your conception, birth and afterwards, we shall share them with you. Would you like to see them?

To some people having a child is nothing more than a physical act, as perhaps with the animals you saw in your

book which told about birth. But to us, there is much, much more added to it. To our act as mommy and daddy, so we believe, there was an act on the part of God to make you into the exceedingly precious gift that you are and always will be. It may be that way with the animals too.

Please keep on asking us questions, and keep on trusting in us. In this way you will be helping us to be as honest and as helpful as we should and must be for one of the most wonderful young persons whom God has ever made.

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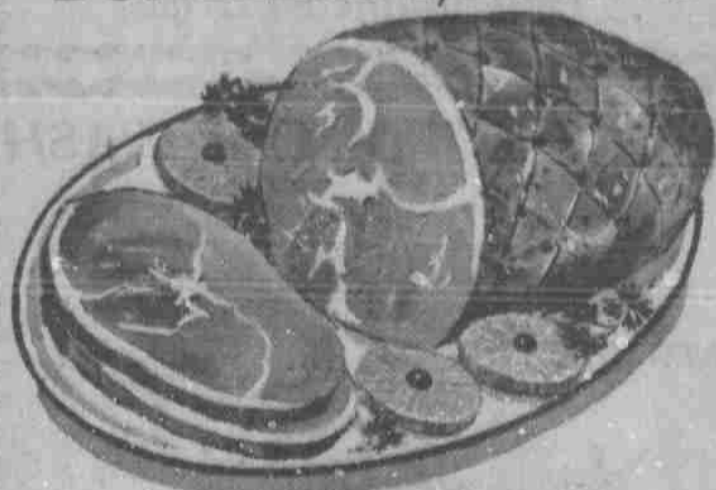
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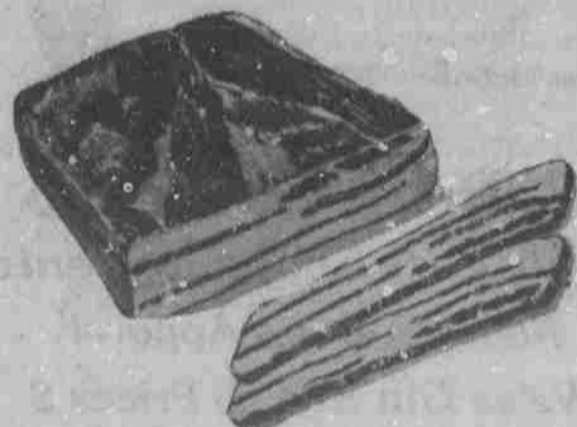


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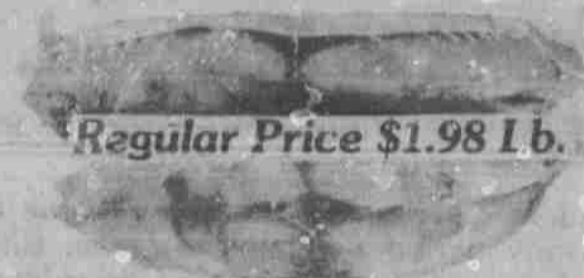
