The West German Track and Field Federation has invited the state of Texas to assemble a track and field team to compete with the ASV Club of Cologne, Germany June 17 through 26, 1984. ASV is one of the largest clubs in Germany with more than 1500 members.

Residents who reside in District Two will have an opportunity to participate in their first Mass Meeting which is set for Wednesday evening, May 23, 1984, at Max Simmons Community Center, beginning at 7:00 p. m.

Waterworld Opens For Second Season With Big Splash



ENCHANTED KINGDOM, a special new magical land for children, featuring Discovery Mountain, opens this summer at AstroWorld.

Special to young people ages 5-11 in the May 24th issue you will have a chance to win tickets for you and your parents to Astro World and WaterWorld was sponsored by the Digest. AstroWorld would and WaterWorld watch each issue for more information.

HOUSTON—Spring is here and thoughts of the young at heart turn to AstroWorld. March 10 marks the beginning of the six-month season for Houston's fabulous family entertainment park. They'll be open weekends only from then until Memorial Day. After that it will be every day throughout the summer.

This year marks the 100th anniversary of the invention of roller coasters. AstroWorld will celebrate the event by introducing a unique and exciting new coaster called XLR-8. Go ahead, say it fast out loud and you have "accelerate," right? And accelerate it does. Two seven-car trains flash around a 3,000-foot track at 50 feet per second. From a maximum height of 81 feet, passengers have the best

view over from a coaster. The cars are suspended from a track above, leaving them free to float with the forces and giving riders the sensations of being in an airplane doing very tight turns. Passengers soar through space, bank exciting turns, glide over land and water far below, then quietly touch down, as the most unique ride of the century concludes.

This new evolution of roller coasters was manufactured near Salt Lake City and is being assembled by skilled craftsmen at AstroWorld, over the River of No Return. Unlike most coasters, which offer tracks and support structure as visual reference points so riders can tell exactly where they are going next, XLR-8 eliminates the vehicle reference point, and people still tend to look down, but this time they're not seeing anything except river and jungle.

The futuristic flight of XLR-8 can be experienced by park visitors beginning in late spring, 1984.

Another major innovation at AstroWorld this year is the Enchanted Kingdom. Although the area is designed principally for children under 54", it can be enjoyed by adults, too. However, adults must be accompanied by a child to enter.

Enchanted Kingdom stresses education, but don't tell the kids. They will learn through the fun of discovery. Featured in the area will be a computer room offering hands-on experience with computers for children and their parents.

After crossing a suspended bridge, visitors enter Discovery Mountain, which contains the Shadow Room, where phosphorescent material and strobe lights offer the opportunity to make "shadows" on the wall that last for several seconds. There will also be a Musical Hall where guests sit on lighted areas, each of which sounds a different musical note. By figuring out which light emits which note, children and adults can make their own music. And for the mountain's small visitors, there will also be a Children's Maze. To find his way out, a child must use color schemes.

Other attractions and exhibits will include a net crawls and soft tunnels. Sorry Mom and Dad, these are for the little ones only! You will come and go by more conventional means.

According to Morris Wilkes, chairman of the Fourth of July Committee of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, plans are being made to make this one of the biggest and best parades ever held in Lubbock.

Several other events are in the formative stage at this time for the patriotic celebration.

Discovery Mountain will be net crawls and soft tunnels. Sorry Mom and Dad, these are for the little ones only! You will come and go by more conventional means.

Enchanted Kingdom will also host a new theatre where the "Shirley Tales," stars of NBC's Saturday morning cartoon show, perform live shows daily. This area will also feature other attractions, such as Digger's Mole Maze, a Ball Crawl, Cloud Fence, Boppy Bags, a King of the Mountain soft structure, scaled-down airplanes, cars, boats and Ferris Wheel, plus racing on a Big Wheel Tricycle Track with beachcars for cheering parents. There will also be a snack area and a special hospitality room for champion or nursing baby.

Few places are available today that offer interaction between children and adults. At Enchanted Kingdom both can have fun and learn together while they are at it. This exciting new section will be open to early summer.
