Lubbock Citizen Killed!

In less than fifteen years, tragedy has struck the Scott family three times. This time it was Mrs. Luella Mildred Sparks Scott, age 57, of 1801 East 26th Street. In 1969, her nine-year-old daughter, Renee, was killed from a home accident when fallen glass struck her. Later, her son, George, Jr., was killed in an automobile accident in Houston in 1978, a few days before his 26th birthday.

The former wife of George Scott, II, Mrs. Scott's body was found in a bedroom of her residence about 10:30 p. m. Thursday (August 18th) by two friends and a co-worker. This trio, according to the police report, met Lubbock police at the Scott residence. Police learned, after talking to the witnesses, that Mrs. Scott didn't turn up at her work on Wednesday at the Lubbock State School.

One of the witnesses told police that she didn't learn that Mrs. Scott didn't show up for work Wednesday until last Thursday and became worried about her. At that time, the witness said she called her house all during the day, but didn't

get an answer. She told police this is when she notified the other two witnesses and had them to meet her at the east Lubbock residence.

The witness went on to say when they arrived at the Scott residence, it appeared that all the lights were on in the house. They knocked on the door in an attempt to locate Mrs. Scott, but to no avail, they could not locate Mrs. Scott. They went to the back door in which is located in a fenced-in area, and knocked on the back door. The witness said: "There still was no answer."

At this time, all three opened the glass door which was unlocked. Both said they entered the house and found Mrs. Scott lying in the southeast bedroom nude.

They summoned the other witness, and she came in. All knew Mrs. Scott was dead. This is when they phoned the Lubbock police.

Justice of the Peace L. J. Blalock ruled the death a homicide, the city's 23rd of the year and the third in less than a week.

Although two witnesses told police they had seen Mrs. Scott on Wednesday morning at about 10:00 a. m., police

believe it is possible for her to have been killed as early as Tuesday evening upon her arrival from the Lubbock State School.

As of this time, police have no motive for the brutal slaying of the Lubbock woman. Her billfold and some keys still remain missing, however.

Hundreds of Lubbockites and out-of-town friends and associates attended funeral services Tuesday afternoon at the Greater Saint Luke Baptist Church with the pastor, Rev. J. I. Ford, officiating. Interment was held in Peaceful Gardens Memorial Cemetery under the directions of Jamison & Son Funeral Home.

An autopsy revealed that Mrs. Scott had five stab wounds on her body, and was beaten.

A native of Corsicana, Texas, she taught school in Frederick, Oklahoma in the public schools. In 1953, she moved to Lubbock where she taught school for several years.

Mrs. Scott was a member of the Greater Saint Luke Baptist Church, the Lubbock Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., the Lubbock Association for Retarded Children, the

Lubbock Branch of the NAACP, the International Women's Club, and the Dorcas Missionary Society.

At one time, she served as board member of the Lubbock Opportunities Industrialization Center (LOIC) and other local efforts.

She is survived by her former husband, George Scott, Jr. of Lubbock; a son, Donald Scott of

Lubbock; mother, Mrs. Geneva Jackson, of Los Angeles, California; step-mother, Mrs. Adelle Sparks, of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; sister, Mrs. Inez Alex, of Los Angeles, California; step-son, Donald J. Scott, Monterey, California; two granddaughters, Tara of Lubbock and Jeanele of Monterey, California; one grandson, Jerry, of Monterey, California; one uncle, Willie Houston, of

The help of every citizen of Lubbock, in particular the Black Community, is needed to find the person or persons responsible for the slaying of a well-known Lubbock woman, Mrs. Luella Mildred Sparks Scott, 57. Any help you may offer will be most appreciative and it will help in finding out who is responsible.

Last Friday morning, the **Southwest Digest** and Brooks Super Market agreed to put up a \$50.00 reward each, a total of \$100.00, for information leading to the capture and conviction of person or persons responsible. But since that time, the Pastors' Fellowship has started an effort to involve the Black Community in securing monies for a reward. A reward of \$1,500.00 has been set up with monies deposited at the Security National Bank. All over \$1,500.00 collected will be turned over to Crime Line, Inc.

It is good to see many members of the Black Community involved in this effort. For this, we say, continue in working together for efforts which will bring the Black Community closer together.

The death of Mrs. Scott let us know as Black people in 1983, living in Lubbock, Texas, that as neighbors we are insensitive with what is going on around us. It points out that we are not as close of a neighbor as we should be.

Let's hope that this unfortunate incident will suggest that coordination is needed within each block, i. e., some neighborhood organizations to help each other keep out many of the evils which exist in this city. With all the dope in the city of Lubbock, any kind of criminal minded person or persons are walking our streets. Maybe, just maybe, some kind of preventive medicine will be used to prevent future acts of violence.

It is the practice of this newspaper, working with one of our friends -- Brooks Super Market -- to continue to help in this area. What is really important is that we see that justice prevails!

Every child must have a birth certificate to attend public schools, reminds Linda Thomas, Vital Statistics Registrar at the Lubbock Health Department.

Birth certificates for those born in Lubbock may be obtained from Vital Statistics at the Lubbock Health Department, 1202 Jarvis, between 8:30 a. m. and 4:30 p. m., Monday through Friday.

Mrs. Thomas encourages parents of 1st graders to come early to get the birth certificates. After a brief waiting period, birth certificates may be picked up at the City Health Department. An application form must be completed and \$5.00 cash or money order per certificate is the fee. Come as soon as possible to get birth certificates.

Mrs. Wanda Vaughn, R. N., Immunization Clinic, Lubbock Health Department.

In order to protect your child, Texas law requires that all children be immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, poliomyelitis, measles, mumps and rubella.

Check your health record to be sure your children are protected, reminds Mrs. Vaughn. Immunizations are available from the Lubbock Health Department or check with your private physician.

Vocational Counselors On Duty

The five vocational counselors of Lubbock Public Schools are now on duty in their respective high schools. Anyone interested in a vocational program should visit a vocational counselor as soon as possible.

Black Community Set Up Reward Fund For Luella Scott Murder

In an effort to receive information which may lead to the capture of person or persons in the brutal slaying of one of Lubbock's well-known Black women, Mrs. Luella Scott, a special fund has been set up to pay for such information.

According to Rev. Stephen Pierson, pastor of the Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church, the Pastors' Fellowship has set up a special fund for this purpose. "We want to be a part of getting information which will lead to the capture of such person or

persons," said Rev. Pierson. The fund, according to Rev. Pierson, has been set up at Security National Bank. "It is our goal to raise \$1,500.00 for this effort, and will present funds excess of this amount to Crime Line," he continued.

Donations were taken up Sunday morning in various Black churches in East Lubbock for this effort. According to Rev. Pierson more than \$1,100 has been collected as of Monday morning. "More is expected," said Rev. Pierson.

One source revealed

that the Booker T. Washington American Legion Hall, Post 808, has made a contribution to Crime Line toward this effort. One patron, who played bingo last Friday evening at the hall in Yellowhouse Canyon, gave \$100.00. Also Brooks Super Market and the **Southwest Digest** will make their contribution to this effort.

Black Population Profiled In Report

A new 1980 census report showing general characteristics of the Black population has been published by the Commerce Department's Census Bureau.

The report shows that on April 1, 1980, the number of Blacks in the United States was 26,495,025, an increase of 17 percent over 1970 compared to an 11.5 percent increase for the total population. The Black population in 1980 represented about 12 percent of the nation's total population of 226,545,805.

In 1980, 58 percent of the Black population resided inside central cities of metropolitan areas (urban portion) and 19 percent lived in suburbs. SMSAs with the largest Black population are New York, N. Y. - N.

J. (1,940,628), Chicago, Ill. (1,427,826), Los Angeles - Long Beach, Calif. (943,968), Detroit, Mich. (890,532), Philadelphia, Pa. - N. J. (884,405), and Washington, D. C. - Md. - Va. (853,719).

The Black population was older in 1980 than in 1970; the median age moved up to 24.9 years from 22.2 years, while the median age in 1980 for all persons was 30.0 years. About 35 percent of Black persons were under 18 years old and only 8 percent were 65 years old or over.

In 1980, the census showed 35 percent of the Black population, 15 years and over, in the United States was married; another 15 percent was either separated or divorced and 37 percent was single.

Black families totaled 6,043,822 in 1980. The percent of Black married-couple families declined from 67 percent in 1970 to 56 percent in 1980. About 38 percent or 2,283,777 Black families were maintained by a female householder with no husband present in 1980, up 10 percentage points from 1970. Also, there were 3.72 persons per Black family in the United States; the average size for all families was 3.27 persons. Approximately 53 percent of Black "own children" -- sons and

daughters (including adopted and step-children) who were single (never married) and under 18 -- lived with both parents.

Why Teachers Cannot Teach or THE AFFECTS AND WEIGHTS OF EDUCATION

It has been of great interest to note the controversial issue over the present public education crisis in regards to President Reagan's administration and the national teachers organizations in recognition that both have joined the rank and file to become their own competitor and victim in the market place in attempts to survive the last mile of the way. Many articles have written and speeches given concerning the low standards of education and lack of discipline and some to include religion in relation to prayer in the schools.

Twenty years does make a difference when the shoe is on the other foot. During the early 1960s when Blacks voiced their concern over the poor quality education their children were receiving, in unawareness that the traditional and theoretical concepts applied in instruc-

tion and study of the mass of teachers left them without adequate knowledge and understanding in the subjects and the inability to manage the erroneous knowledge; a second civil war in the nation was sparked by the busing issue.

Recent completed research and investigation into the plaguing non-existent "small business" problems established the fact that the disinvestment over low standards, discipline, and religion are the not true issues of the education problems, but rather, "How do the public educational institutions attain or accomplish its goals to teach the children the basic reading, writing, and arithmetic or mathematical skills to support the desired demand and supply of the essential occupations of the established businesses and institu-

tions and guarantee employment in a society that have been disintegrated by the permitted affects and weights of human influences encouraged in an ambiguous constitution established on civil disorder and an impure secondary native language; an always present progressive and modern society; and traditional and theoretical institutional instructions respectively?"

The education (public and private) system which is an element of the social custom along with the political and religious customs succumbed in 1929 with the Stock Market Crash and the start of the Great Depression under the affects and weights of tradition and the attributes of the market place through successions of compromised decisions in intellect and ignorancies of men in leaderships; domestic and foreign wars; continual devesment in the impure secondary native language and the unpublished and unenforced laws of the constitution; and the wise and unwise concepts and inventions by men in the market place to be revived in 1933 with the "New Deal" in efforts to save the depressed nation to disintegrate in the 1960 Civil Rights Movement when the then oppressed businesses, institutions, and people disadvantaged both the governments incentives and the unknowledgable society in their own interest to cause an uncontrollable inflation and recession in the economy, the demands for higher traditional and theoretical education, and the independent separation and specialization into the functions of the established word teacher and the established occupa-

Black On Black Crime !!!!!

In the 1930's and 1940's, Blacks fled the South and headed to the North and East for freedom. When they fled then it was from Jim Crow and White Supremacy. Go to any major city today now in the North or East and the same Blacks are fleeing those areas going back down home, heading from the Black street muggers and gangs.

Funny thing they are running away from the opposite of what they went there for. They were fleeing the whites; but returning fleeing from Blacks. Funny thing down home is not so good now. The dope and low morals and criminal elements have reached the South. Even the small southern towns and communities are affected by a lot of crime.

The solution to the Black on Black Crime problem is for us to generate more community pride, unity, and a sense of concern and care for self and kind. A sense of being a good neighbor and as our good friend State Representative Al Edwards always says: "You are your brother's keeper."

Black folks have become so sophisticated, so refined, so important, so selfish, so affluent; they do not care about their neighbor, neighborhood or anything that does not affect us personally. It's time for us to get involved in our selves and communities. If there are strange vehicles, persons in our community behaving in a suspicious manner, we must call the police. When we see crimes being committed, we must report them and stop saying "I don't want to get involved." We must do for and to our neighbors what we would want them to do for or to us.

Black men must stand up. We must deal with those who rape our women; mug our senior citizens; burglarize our neighbor's homes. We must do the same as we would if they were burglarizing ours. If necessary, hold them at gun point until the police come. It is a must that every neighborhood from a crime watch, neighborhood watch, or a crime stoppers organization. We must learn to take license plate numbers, vehicle descriptions and questionable people and what they are wearing and report same to police.

Most of all, we must become involved and start coming forward. When we see crimes committed, we must start speaking out when questioned by law enforcement authorities. We must do for others when we witness crimes being committed against them as we would want them to do for us. We must be concerned about all the dope and joints in our communities. We must start signing petitions, calling the police and again, please report strange and suspicious characters in our neighborhood, and communities by taking action before they mug or take the life of someone in our community. You may save the your life or the life of someone else.

Remember, one thing, the police is there to protect and help. The key and crucial thing to remember is the only one who can save us from us, is us; and if it is to be, it is up to me. We cannot set around and wait on someone else to solve our community's problems. The leadership and initiative must come from us in solving our community problems -- economic, social and crime working -- with others who care and are concerned. But if it is to work, we have to set the tone and take the lead. No one else knows our needs and concerns like us. Until we start turning in relatives, friends, neighbors, acquaintances, and friends of friends who commit crimes on and against us -- and say we can't get involved -- things will only get worse. If we fail to act, we will leave no future for the generations to come.

Maybe, just maybe, if we form us a vigilante group like the Black Men Against Crime and Rape in our Community, we may get the same kind of results D. C. did. When they caught a rapist, they whipped him on his raper and the rape dropped fast. When

In short, do for others what you would want them to do for you. Get involved!!

Closing thought: from the words of Rev. Jesse Jackson: "We must begin, like never before, joining and participating in our local organizations such as: **Operation PUSH, NAACP, Urban League, United For A Better Communities, and Concerned Citizens for Community Awareness**, and others. **If we join them**, laying political affiliations and petty jealousies and personality differences aside, I am confident ... that we will find our economic **Freedom**. For we are desperately in need of **"Parity, Not Charity, and trade, not aid"**.

Through self help, we can; we must, we will!!!!

Small-business Angle

MORE HELP PROPOSED FOR SMALL-BUSINESS EXPORTERS

Small-business owners can be pleased about the progress made by the Reagan Administration to help them get more export business. U.S. embassies the world over have been instructed to take a keen interest in all American small businesses interested in exporting, and, the U.S. Commerce Department is fully committed to doing everything possible to encourage and foster exporting among small businesses.

Even with such a positive approach, more needs to be done to get American small business into foreign markets, according to Sen. Rudy Boschwitz (R-Minn.).

Sen. Boschwitz has introduced an amendment to the Export-Import Bank reauthorization bill (S. 869) to set aside percentages of Eximbank loans for small businesses. The Boschwitz measure would guarantee for small business six percent of all Eximbank loans in 1984. That percentage would increase in steps to 10 percent by 1990.

Sen. Boschwitz also wants a program to provide line of credit to any combination of small and medium-sized banks, export trading companies, state finance companies, export financing cooperatives or other export financing institutions. His amendment would require the Eximbank to promote small-business exports in cooperation with any and all entities of the federal government and private sector organizations. Additionally he would require an annual report to Congress on the effectiveness of the set aside percentages, the small-business financing programs and the Eximbank's efforts to promote small-business exports.

Sen. Boschwitz is being supported in his bipartisan effort by Senators Mack Mattingly (R-Ga.), Jim Sasser (D-Tenn.), Alfonse D'Amato (R-NY), Alan Dixon (D-Ill.) and John Glenn (D-Ohio).

The Commerce Department estimates that there are 20,000 small manufacturers with capability to export that do not do so. Secretary Malcolm Baldrige has pointed out that in most foreign countries, small and medium-sized businesses are the main thrust of export endeavors. It is time for the U.S. to move into the same competitive arena. It is imperative that small firms export more on their own to create jobs and improve the balance of trade figures in favor of the U.S.

Blacks Sent to Kill "Quotas"

President's Pimp With Wrong Priority

"I am on board, pull up the ladder." Black Americans who have benefited from the civil rights movement are making news knocking affirmative action advocates. A July 13 article in the Wall Street Journal, written by a Black American assistant professor at Rutgers University advises the abolition of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. His argument is that if you wash your dirty linen in public you don't need clothes.

The present chairman, U. S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC), a graduate of Yale Law School, says he "did not think that affirmative action should take priority over length of service" in maintaining hard won women, Black American and other minorities jobs. These two I've League dudes are the type of clowns getting most of the white media attention to help strike down the civil rights gains of the 60's.

Clarence Thomas, Chairman, EEOC, uses the high podium of the Sheraton Palace Hotel in San Francisco where the regular Friday luncheon meetings are held for the prestigious Commonwealth Club of California to show his tail. Perhaps Mr. Thomas was unaware that "summer time is Black time" for selection of speakers. He should have refused to address his miniscule audience at this time of the year on such a crucial thesis as "In the Pursuit of Equality." If Black Americans, other minorities and women. When he recognizes where he was "segregated," to then he will be qualified to objectively address the most serious issues in this country, Racism and Sexism.

Instead, he chose to prevent a fragmented historical picture of the civil rights struggle. Silly. Besides the few senior white club members only one Black American, the Honorable Judge Clinton White, was recognizable in the audience. Black American republicans are few and far between and need not be reminded that they were not a part of the civil rights struggle in the past. Presumably, as of today, no positive programs had been put forward in the San Francisco Bay area to generate any interest in this now sedated tiger of civil rights agency.

As if this lack of real action on the part of his agency was not enough to anger women, Thomas had the audacity to want to exclude more firms from ever coming under the Civil Rights Act. "Too many" complaints are filed, according to Thomas, because of the status including all firms with 15 or more employees. In the White House words, he would like to wipe out a lot of this bureaucratic book burden by not giving the protection of the law to those individuals in small firms. From the perspective one can only assume Thomas wants to have tea with the fortune 500 companies and ask them to comply with the law at their earliest convenience.

Soothing white male conscience by saying what they say does not develop an accurate picture for progressive economic growth of white women, Black American males or females, as well as the country as a whole.

When Black Americans and other minorities continue to increase in the unemployment roles while white males are sharply decreasing, there is no one "In Pursuit of Equality." Those who echo economic policies that continue the same degenerate program and cry out for the demise of an active civil rights

The Law and Common Sense

About At-Large Elections

Last week the **Avlanche-Journal** asked in an editorial why the lawyers representing minority plaintiffs in the at-large election case "are so fearful of a November at-large vote." The **A-J** then suggested that the lawyers are afraid that a minority candidate will be elected to the city council, and that would "blow holes in the plaintiffs' claims" against the at-large system. To suggest such a thing is nonsense, and we think our friends at the **A-J** know it. In any event, the **A-J** editorial betrays and incorrect understanding of the applicable law.

In the first place, our lawyers would be as pleased as anyone in the minority community if a Black or Brown candidate could actually get elected in November, whether in an at-large or in a single member district election. **Our lawyers are on our side**, after all, not against us.

In the second place, the U. S. Supreme Court cases and Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals cases make it crystal clear that the election of a few minority candidates does not necessarily mean that an at-large system can pass constitutional muster. As recently as last April, the at-large election system of the City of Terrell, Texas, was struck down as unconstitutional by Federal Judge Barefoot Sanders, even though two Blacks have been elected to office in Terrell.

Judge Sanders noted that in seven out of nine races in which Black candidates opposed white candidates, the Blacks were defeated. The Judge said, "Racial polarization need not be perfect to be persuasive," and he held that the at-large system in Terrell violates the Fourteenth and Fifteenth Amendments to the Constitution.

Other election cases have reached similar results. The message is that even if there are a few isolated victories for minority candidates, an at-large election scheme still may be unconstitutional under what the courts term the "totality of the circumstances." So that even if a minority candidate should be elected in a November at-large election here, the chances are excellent that we would still win our case at the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals, and later at the Supreme Court if the city council continues its mindless appealing. We wonder whether the **A-J's** legal analyst has read the same cases we have?

So it isn't losing the case on appeal that our lawyers are worried about with regard to the possibility of a minority candidate being elected in a November at-large election. What they are worried about is the common sense aspect of the equation: given the brutal fact of Lubbock's polarized racial voting, it is unlikely that any minority candidate can ever be elected in an at-large contest. What our lawyers tried to make Judge Woodward understand is that no matter how much money, time and effort a minority candidate puts into a race, he or she will always be defeated by the at-large system and the polarized white voting that has existed under that systems ever since it was first adopted.

Of course, things can change. We hope, as much as anyone, that the day will come when Lubbock's white majority stops its racially polarized voting. Maybe that day will come eventually. But in the meantime, we have to live in the here and now.

As most Federal courts realize, the best indicator of future conduct in elections is **actual past conduct**. Instead of listening to sarcastic speculations by **A-J** editors, let's look at the actual conduct of Lubbock's white voters across the years, as proved by evidence in Federal court in both trials of the Lubbock case. Measured by that test, it is clear that the at-large system is unconstitutional and that no minority candidate has a realistic chance of being elected in present day Lubbock.

Our lawyers were, and still are, trying their best to get us out from under this ugly system from Lubbock's past **before the November election is held**, so that for the first time we can participate without the built-in barriers to election that now exist to keep us out. They will continue the fight, regardless of **A-J** editorial attacks on them, and we think that finally we will win this fight. We will move beyond this cruel phase in the history of Lubbock's city government, and into a new day under the single member district system when the color of a candidate's skin will not be the determining factor in whether he or she can be elected to the city council.

Sheridan's Ride

You know it's strange but, did you know that many great composers, stars of stage, screen and the rest (I'm referring to the lasting, immortal big ones -- not the seasonal, shallow stars that are created by the assembly line techniques of television) started out with no clear aim to become what they became?

I am reminded of this fact by preparing the Program Notes for the upcoming (Sept. 19) 20 pair of opening season concerts to be given by the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra at the Civic Center Theatre.

Two of the biographies of the famed composers represented on the program did not develop interest or become involved, other than in a minor way, perhaps, in music as a career until they had reached their studied midway at the university.

The composer of the orchestra's opening selection this year, Charbrier, studied for law. Not only that but he went on to achieve an official status with his country's Ministry of the Interior. Only then did his interest solidify to music. He went off on a vacation to Spain and there became so entranced by the Spanish rhythms that he returned home eventually to compose his delightful and melodic "Espagna" musical poem which was an instant success and set him up as a major composer. From then on it was music.

Another candidate for the law world, Robert Schumann, was attending Heidelberg University in Germany when he abruptly switch all of his interest to music. We hear what came out of that momentous decision as we listen to the concert's guest artist, Leslie Parnas, performing Schumann's Concerto in A Minor for Cello and Orchestra.

Their numbers on the ambitious program prepared by Director-Conductor William A. Harrod for September 19-20 include Bach's Brandenburg Concerto No. 3 for string orchestra; "A Night on the Bald Mountain" by Mussorgsky; and, fittingly in light of the death of lyricist-composer Ira Gershwin the past week, his late brother's great and romantic, tuneful "An American in Paris" by George Gershwin.

By the way, did you know that the relatively new Uris Theatre in New York City's Broadway (devoted to live theatre) was renamed at the time of this year's Tony Awards to the Gershwin Theatre, honoring both brothers for their contribution to American music, stage, screen and symphonic (even operatic, if you are one of those like me who consider "Porgy and Bess" in that genre).

If the summer screens around Lubbock get off the rock 'n roll kick, the fantasies and star wars and now, computers, and release some genuine adult (not teenage or twenties fodder) features, we'll probably give you a movie opinion or two along the way shortly.

Black Dollar Day Momentum Builds

NEW YORK -- Moving resolutely to complete his gruelling tour of 22 cities before Labor Day weekend, Fred Rasheed, director of the NAACP Fair Share program, reported that the movement among NAACP branches to participate in the BLACK DOLLAR DAY demonstration is growing at a strong rate.

In Beaumont, Texas, 600 people turned out for a mass rally at the Greater Good Hope Baptist Church that was sponsored by the local NAACP branch. There the crowd rousingly expressed support for the program; following addresses by Mr. Rasheed and his assistant L. R. Bryd, national Fair Share consultant. The meeting was capped by the crowd's waving \$2 bills, which will be used along with Susan B. Anthony dollar coins over the Labor Day weekend to demonstrate awareness by blacks of their spending power.

Mr. Rasheed's next whistle stop for a Fort Worth Minority Leadership luncheon was equally successful. Participating were the Fort Worth Black Bar Association, the Opportunities Industrialization Cooperation, an organization for training blacks in various skills and other major groups. At this luncheon, \$500 was converted into \$2 bills.

The Dallas Black

Chamber of Commerce, the nation's oldest black organization of its kind, also pledged its strong support for the BLACK DOLLAR DAY demonstration. So did local organizations in Houston.

"In every city we have been to," reported Mr. Rasheed, the NAACP branches have lined up various local banks to participate in the program. Earlier stops were made in Atlanta, Memphis, Boston, and Philadelphia.

Bank participation is important to the program's success, since many do not normally keep on hand \$2 bills and Susan B. Anthony coins. Consequently, NAACP Executive Director Benjamin L. Hooks, has advised branches to ask various banks to participate in the program by having a sufficient quantity of these denominations available for the expected demand. Local branches have also been asked to publicize the names and locations of these banks.

(A new image in the light of a rapidly changing Africa)

A review of *Transformation and Resiliency in Africa* edited by Pearl T. Robinson and Elliott P. Skinner (Washington, D.C.: Howard University Press, 1983), 277 pages—Hardcover—\$14.95.

This book is a compilation of monographs which

challenge the thesis that Africa has not been able to adjust to the social, political and cultural changes that have been brought about by independence—and that Black Africa is losing its most valued institutions and traditions.

Here the reader will find an analysis of the Harris Church movement on the Ivory Coast and an account of the transformation of the University of Dakar.

All of the articles are the result of primary research and each reflects the variety and scope of change in Africa.

The case studies include: "Rural-Urban Labor Migration and Family Arrangements Among the Kamba," "Ethiopia: The Revolutionary Transformation of a Twentieth-Century Bureaucratic Empire," "Traditional Change and

Political Change in a Hausa Community," "Societal Implications of Changes in the University of Dakar (Senegal)," "African Initiative and Indigenous Christianity in the Ivory Coast" and "Toward a Theory of Transformation in African Music."

This book will explain the rapid changes that are taking place in Africa and how Africans are responding to it.
