however, using the coalition figure of 12%, the start-up sum would be increased to \$100 million a year. Moreover, the Coors proposal included the gimmick that Blacks must be the salesmen to push Coors products.

With this important difference, the Black negotiators found the Coors proposal unacceptable. The attempt at goodwill was destroyed in the negotiating process when Coors rejected the Black coalition's advice and assumed a take-it-or-leave-it stance, indicating that Coors would go it alone, without the coalition's agreement.

The Black coalition had no other choice than to walk out. However, the Coors sensed that the negotiations were about to fall down about their head, they attempted to persuade the co-chairmen of the coalition, Fred Fisher, Chief Negotiator for the NAACP, and Rev. George Reddick, operation PUSII, to continue the negotiations; however, Coors let it be known, after five caucuses, that they were not interested in changing their position. They failed in their attempt to divide and conquer.

The coup de grace was placed on the negotiations when Coors announced it would carry out its

Drink Any Beer, But Coors!

The recently aborted negotiations between Black community leaders and Coors was the first time that the National Newspaper Publishers Association—the Black Press of America—was accorded the privilege of participating with the national Black leadership in a conference to end racism against Black consumers in the marketplace.

The Black coalition contained the big four: NAACP, Operation Push, the Black Church (represented by AME ministers) and the Black Press, as well as the People Against Racism at Coors, and Calpac. They met three times with Coors officials and discussed specific proposals to eradicate economic racism, centered around the following subjects: investments in Black bars and Black insurance, increased use of Black vendors, Black organization and agencies, additional hiring of Blacks, appointment of a Black vice president, increased Blacks in

management, Black distributorships, increased use of Black advertising in the marketing services, corporate contributions, and additional support for Black-owned businesses.

Coors took the position that only 6 percent of Coors' consumers were Black, and the company proposed to increase its contributions only a result of increased patronage by Blacks as Coors moved into areas of large Black concentration, such as New York, Chicago, and Washington, D.C. However, the Black negotiators felt that at present Coors received closer to 10 to 13% Black patronage, and found it impossible to accept the Coors statement that the commitments could only come about as Coors increased its share of business in the Black market.

These different positions were reflected in efforts of each group to quantify the participation of each. With Coors looking at the lower figure, 6%, it proposed spending only \$24 million a year.

count them and where Travis County was the last big county in the state to report its figures. In that Travis box, Doggett unofficial beat Hance 45,870 to 17,086 in Austin and Travis County. Hance also noted Sunday that results looked especially questionable in five or six counties. Those mentioned included Wichita County where despite several endorsements, Doggett won with 61 percent of the votes, and Henderson County, which Hance won in the May 5th Primary but Doggett took with 60 percent last Saturday.

Returns from the district's 15 counties showed Don Richards defeating Thomas Richards by 718 votes. Thomas Richards was only able to capture 28,426 votes while Don Richards brought in 29,144 votes. On the other side of town, Combest defeated Ron Fleming by a score of 4,213 to 3,107 votes. Don Richards, who recently

became a licensed Lubbock attorney and worked for Congressman Kent Hance as an aide, took control of 12 counties and ran close to his challenger Thomas Richards in Lubbock County to win the race. Richards, age 36, was able to mobilize the efforts of endorsements from weekly newspapers in West Texas who endorsed him.

On the other hand, Thomas Richards -- a 43 year-old Lubbock oil and gas attorney, carried Ector County 4,376 to 1,751; Yoakum County 497 to 416; and Lubbock County by 12,728 to 10,744. Don Richards carried Dawson County 1,872 to 1,051; Hale

Marriage, Divorce May Stop Most Benefits

Most Social Security benefits to dependents or survivors of retired, disabled, or deceased workers end if the person divorces or marries. But benefits to disabled widows and widowers 50-59, and to widows and widowers 60 or older can continue upon remarriage.

This same rule applies to disabled surviving divorced spouses 50-59 and to surviving divorced spouses 60 or older.

Benefits to a child getting checks because he or she is under 18, or 19 if a student, or disabled will generally end if the child marries. Checks to a spouse getting benefits on the record of a retired or disabled worker will end if the marriage ends in divorce unless the spouse is 62 or older and the marriage lasted 10 years or more.

Checks for a widowed mother or father getting benefits because she or he is caring for an entitled child will end if the parent remarries. There is an exception to these general rules. If an otherwise eligible person receiving benefits as a widow, widower, or adult disabled in childhood marries a person also getting one of these benefits she or he can continue to get benefits.

Benefits will also continue if a person receiving benefits as a widowed mother or father or adult disabled in childhood marries a person getting benefits as a retired or disabled worker. A retired or disabled worker's benefits are never affected if he or she marries or divorces.

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The Truth About Foster Care

Could you share your home, time, knowledge, and LOVE with a child-in need? Last year 144 children were placed in foster homes in Lubbock County.

Children of all ages and races are placed in foster care every year. Their placement in foster care is due to an ongoing family problem, abuse or neglect. The decision to temporarily remove a child from their family is made by the courts. A child will be removed from their family if remaining in the home presents immediate danger to the child.

Foster care provides a substitute family for a child for a temporary or extended period of time while efforts are made to reunite the family. The primary goal of foster care is to reunite the family. If this is not possible, permanent plans for the child will be made. Foster parenting is not a lifetime commitment to a child, but a commitment to be meaningful during a child's lifetime.

Foster parents are professional parents who enjoy parenting and sharing their time with children. They are people who are capable of understanding how children feel and think. These are special people who have the capacity to give to a child without expecting much in return from that child. They are also flexible in their expectations in

relation to the child's needs and problems. Basically, they are loving and caring people who believe all children have the right to physical and emotional nurturance.

Foster parents are faced with a tremendous challenge. It is the foster family's responsibility to provide twenty-four hour care to the child. In addition to providing for the physical needs of the child, they are concerned with the child's emotional and social well-being. It is also the foster parent's responsibility to work with children's protective services toward the main goal of reuniting the child with their family whenever possible. Foster parents play a major role in the foster care program, and are an asset to both the Agency and foster children.

To take a child into your home temporarily is a lot to ask of somebody. But there are rewards. The rewards are what the foster parents feel when caring for a child in need. They have helped the child in a time of crisis by providing the love, guidance, and structure every child needs. Hopefully, the short but valuable time they spent caring for that child may have some effect on that child's future.

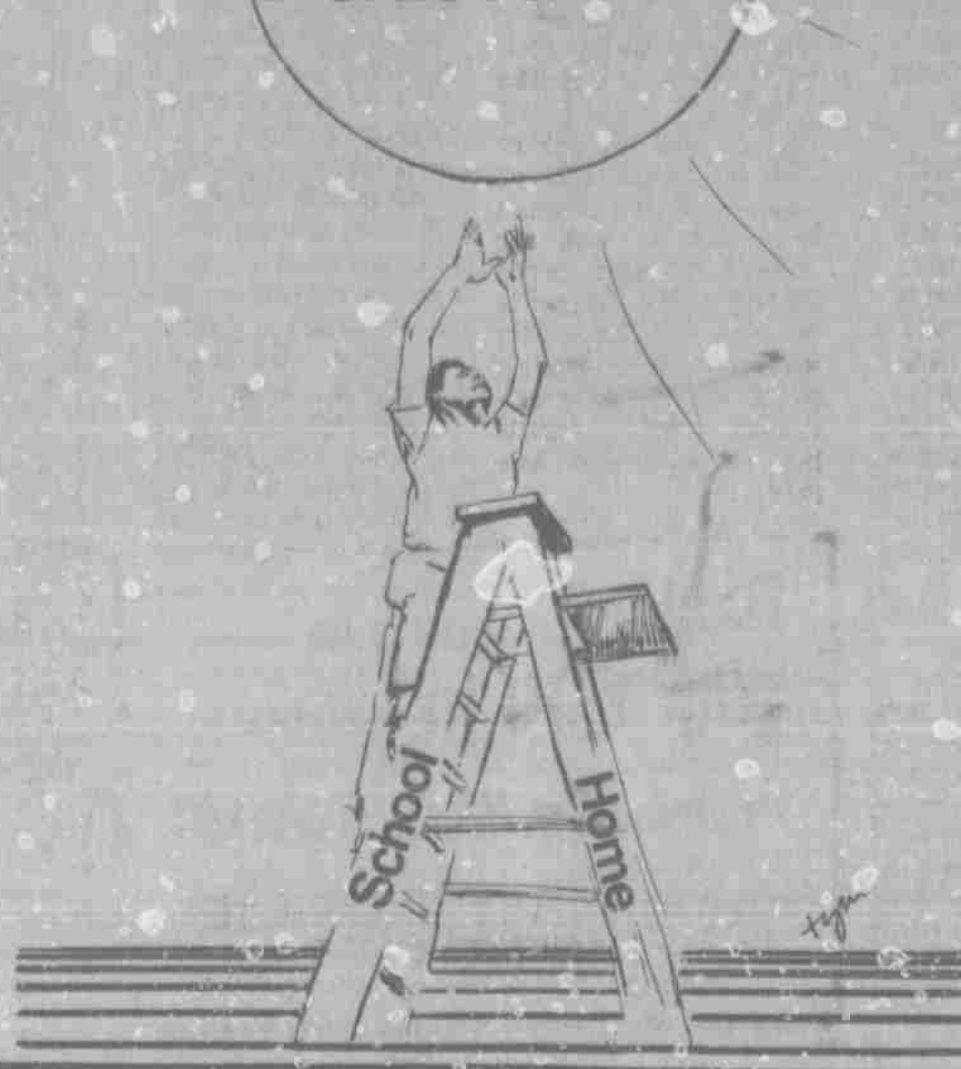

College Athletes and Corporate Executives Need Community Commitment: Clause On the Road to Making The Most of \$40 Million

Now we know that one out of every five adults cannot afford food. This finding by a Gallup survey seems in sharp contrast to the confessions on the front page of Business Week Magazine the first week of May with its picture of the ten top paid public executives in the United States taking home a total of \$57,812,000. Scandalous for a single year's work. Ever when you compare it to the unobtainable \$40 million over 40 years for a well publicized football player's pay. It shows the most appalling aspect of this comparison is that the condition of the quarterback's contract contains a clause giving some money back to his community, while the wages of those who made the most day in day out in corporate America ask not what they can do for their country.

Lois Steinberg, sport attorney, agent for Professional Athletes including the guy who got the \$40 million for throwing a football, finds a need to commit collectors of grand theft dough to giving back some part of his penny profits to the people in the community. Corporate American executives have not yet caught on to this idea of assisting the community out of untold personal riches. No such community commitment clause is known to be in existence in any executive's golden parachute plans.

Attorney Steinberg started on the right track taking care of caring athletes after he left the University of California where he was once student body president in the early 70s. Since 1971, he had not spoken at the Commonwealth Club of California. But shortly after May Day, Mr. Steinberg spoke openly again to those who could selfishly profit from the people they serve on the subject "The Sporting Dilemma: Economics and Professional Sports."

"Money does not change the principal," states Steinberg. Stars in sports must be free to negotiate their salary anywhere for as much money as possible, as well as, be prepared to put some of that salary back into the community.

While the earnings of married couples with both spouses working in professional or managerial occupations was less than \$40,000 in 1981, it may not be much of an issue to most people that a \$40 million contract holder drops \$138,000 to his favorite university upon signing. Since most of the money for the super stars that Steinberg works for comes from the community, he personally cannot condone a client who refuses to commit some funds back to the community.

Steinberg has represented three media made contracts, one for dancing New York Jets linebacker Mark Gastineau, another for "this league or that" Wally Moon, who eventually, for the right high price, signed with the NFL. Houston Oilers over the USFL and the \$40 million college kid on his way to L.A. Steinberg who started his agent's career with University of California then star Steve Barkowski, still believes in a community commitment from people and as such only takes clients who will fulfill that commitment in word and in deeds. Shareholders of corporate America could get a few good ideas for bonus contracts for their super stars then a lot more people could eat in America.

Computers do not Necessarily Guarantee Excellence in Education

One of the myths underlying the current debate about American schooling is that we must gear our children for jobs in a "high-tech" society. According to this myth, the American economy will demand higher level, more sophisticated skills from its workers than it has in the past - skills the schools must provide.

The primary skill touted by believers in this "new" economic age is how to use a computer. Like some magical gatepost to success, the computer now stands as the guardian of career advancement. Television commercials sponsored by computer companies tell parents that without a home computer, Johnny will fall behind in class, lose his acceptance to a "good" college, and never get the answers correct on his math test. Computers serve as an all-too-ready substitute for good

teachers, good parents and good textbooks.

In relative terms, the fastest growing occupations for the 1980s and 1990s are high-tech related. Between 1978 and 1990, the need for data processing machine mechanics, computer systems analysts, and computer operators are projected to double, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. This is four times the growth rate of all other occupations.

In absolute terms, however, not one of the 20 occupations expected to generate the most jobs by the end of the decade is high-tech oriented. Only four require more than a high school degree. Only two, teaching and nursing, require a college degree. By 1990, for each new analyst, there will be three new janitors. For each new computer programmer, there will be five new fast food workers. Although there will be 350,999 new jobs in these two high-tech professions, there will be 1.4 million new jobs in the two low skilled ones. Government analyses estimate that high-tech occupations will account for only seven percent of the new jobs between 1990 and 1990.

In fact, the advent of computers in the work place may require even fewer skills of employees than in the past. Although the earliest computers required their lives users to have fairly complex skills and extensive training, these requirements have declined considerably. The new generation of office computers require no special computer skills to operate. The same change occurred in the automobile industry - although cars are more sophisticated than they were 50 years ago, they are much easier to run.

This does not mean that we should slash training our children to be janitors, or that this is the highest expectation we should have for them. It does not mean that we should not be sold too inflated a definition of what computers can do, or too narrow a definition that cuts the use of computers off from any greater educational goal.

A child who cannot write a simple English composition, with pen and paper or on a typewriter will not be able to do so on a computer. Computers should be used to improve students' communication, reasoning, and problem-solving skills - not as a substitute for those skills. Micro-computers are mechanics to be mastered because of their increasing pervasiveness in our society and tools to expand thinking and creativity. They do not offer a panacea to educational problems. Nor are they a fad to be avoided. To the degree that computers fit within a set of broader instructional goals, and are used as a tool or a resource to reach those goals, they will improve education. They will maximize children's talents to the extent that they are available to everyone. Relying on parents to purchase home computers for their children, or on wealthy school districts to purchase individual computers for their students, only promise to widen the current educational gaps between rich and poor, minorities and non-minorities.

Before a school district or a state invests in computers it should look at the other improvements its school could buy with that money. We must not be fooled into substituting hardware for knowledge.

Capital Comment

WASHINGTON - Congressman Augustus Hawkins, the veteran representative who has been in the forefront of the Capitol Hill fight for adequate employment legislation has introduced a new initiative designed to provide \$2 billion in jobs for unemployed youth.

Hawkins, the chairman of the House Subcommittee on Employment Opportunities, introduced the bill in response to the dangerously high rate of unemployment among young people. Over half of black youths are now jobless.

The Los Angeles representative believes that the Youth Employment Act is just one aspect of a much-needed comprehensive approach to address high unemployment. The proposal is targeted to youth with educational difficulties and offers part and full-time jobs as an inducement to maintain satisfactory attendance in high school.

Former Congresswoman Barbara Jordan told a cheering audience at the National Policy Institute that "1984 could be the leap year" for Black Americans but that it would be "absolutely necessary" for the black political leadership to "submerge their egos." Jordan, now a university professor in Texas, told the elite gathering of black elected and appointed officials that every black elected official had the responsibility to represent black people everywhere and to make "race work for us and not against us."

Jordan's dinner speech was one of the highlights of the Institute, which was sponsored by seven national organizations, representing black mayors, black members of the U.S. Congress, and black local and state representatives. Earlier meetings or black elected officials were held in 1987, and 1975 to discuss policy issues and "outlet" concerns for the political, social and economic progress of Black Americans.

Black officials believe that 1984 is a pivotal year for the black community. Eddie K. Williams, the president of the Joint Center for Political Studies, the convener of the conference, believes that several factors have "come together to place the black vote in the spotlight this year." It includes the campaign of the Reverend Jesse Jackson, the surge in the number of registered black voters and black officials over the past year, the mounting of several major voter registration



Sexual Dysfunction

One of the increasing problems that people want to resolve is the problem of sexual dysfunction on the part of themselves or a spouse. Sexual dysfunction, also known as impotence, increases with the increase of stress in society and leads inevitably to marriage failure.

What is sexual dysfunction? S.D. refers to the inability to reach orgasm or even experience the responses normally associated with foreplay. S.D. may have physical or psychological origins. At first awareness of a problem the victim should consult a competent physician to determine if any organs are injured, diseased or inadequately developed. If such a discovery is made, the doctor will use his expertise to help resolve the problem.

But suppose the problem is not due to a physical deficiency. In such a case, it is probably psychological and most psychologically initiated dysfunctions can be traced to personal feelings of inadequacy that induce stress. Stress, in turn, causes the malfunction. This is the usual scenario: two people marry (even though one need not be married in order to have a sexual dysfunction) and things seem to work fine initially. Then, one of the mates becomes angered, argumentative or critical of the other. The troubled mate good enough to fulfill the needs of my spouse? These questions become nagging reminders of one's inadequacy. The questioner usually has a predetermined answer which is "no."

Because of intense desire to provide satisfactory sexual companionship, the victim becomes self-conscious and begins to try hard to do something that should be natural and occur without abnormal effort. After repeated failures, the victimized mate starts to anticipate failure: "I know that things will be the same tonight as they always are."

Unfortunately, in many instances, the spouse begins to indicate displeasure at a lack of fulfillment through argument or some other subtle action. Thus, sexual involvement becomes a stressful contest for both mates. The victimized mate feels the stress of inadequacy, the other mate feels the stress of being unfulfilled. They both find the sexual encounter unfulfilling and engage in it less and less. The resolution of this unpleasant situation is expressed in both individuals seeking satisfaction outside of the marriage. Then, separation and divorce.

Space does not allow me to provide detailed methods of resolving the problem but here are some helpful aids.

- 1) Remain calm and attractive regardless of the extent of the problem.
- 2) Encourage the spouse with confidence-building statements. Try to avoid having the mate become self-conscious. Let the mate know that sexual fulfillment involves more than the sexual organs. You find a loving satisfaction in the closeness that comes with sexual involvement.
- 3) Find out if there are problems on the job, in social activities or other aspects of their life that are causing undue stress. Help the mate to resolve them.
- 4) Determine if your own behavior, subtle or apparent, is creating inadequacy, stress and self-criticism within your mate.
- 5) Experiment with different approaches to sexual engagement and extended foreplay. Ask if there is anything that you can do to make the interaction more suitable.
- 6) If all else fails, consider seeking professional consultation with a counselor or a trained, competent, licensed, sex therapist.

Looking for a Job

Winston-Salem, N.C.—Looking for a job is like marketing a product, says a recruitment manager for a major corporation.

"You have to package and sell yourself to be successful," says Marylou Southern, manager of college recruitment for R.J. Reynolds Industries, Inc.

Southern says hundreds of job seekers each year.

"At RJI, we believe that the way a person pursues a job is a good indication of how he or she will perform at it," Southern says. "That means those applicants who seem to be very much in control have an edge over those who do not."

Developing a personal marketing plan means defining your goals, setting target dates, and establishing specific strategies, Southern says. "And remember that many jobs are not filled through newspaper ads or head hunters," she says. "A good number of jobs are filled through campus recruiting and write-ins."

"There are numerous examples in any company of qualified people who were in the right place at the right time," she says. "So keep in touch with friends, neighbors and relatives who may be in a position to learn about openings you'll be interested in."

Southern offers the following tips for successfully selling yourself in the job market:

1) Make a list of your personal achievements to gain some

insight into your best abilities and therefore the best type of work for you.

2) Develop a list of references who can support those achievements, and get permission to use their names.

3) Prepare a neatly typed and concise resume, that tells your work history (name and location of company, job title, dates employed) and a brief summary of major duties and responsibilities, educational background (schools, dates attended, date of graduation and degree), and languages you speak or read. A one-page, well-written resume will get more attention from a recruiter than a two- or three-page, wordy resume. Avoid attention-getting gimmicks, and don't go to the expense of a photo. It will be removed by the secretary before the recruiter sees it.

4) Use your resume as a calling card which must speak in your absence. Remember that a resume can only get you an interview—only you can get the job.

5) When you are offered an interview, show up on time and dressed appropriately. Be prepared in advance to describe your work history and accomplishments in a concise statement.

6) Once in the interview, be positive about yourself. Concentrate on the interviewer's questions and be sure you

understand them. If a question is not clear, ask about it before answering. Be creative, but truthful, in answering questions. Be honest about problems you may have encountered in previous jobs, but avoid negative comments about previous employers or jobs and concentrate on your abilities.

7) Follow up the interview with a thank-you letter that recaps your strong points and expresses your interest in the job.

"If you are seriously interested in getting a certain job in a given field, don't give up," Southern says. "A carefully thought-out plan will help you avoid making mistakes that cost you a job lead, interview or offer," she says.

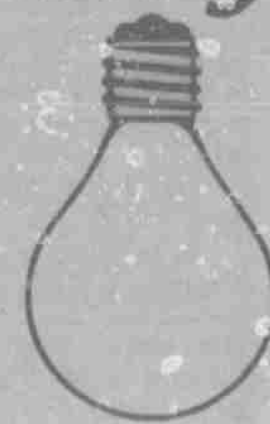

"The Superiority of Love"

For many the 13th Chapter of I Corinthians is "the hymn of love", it expresses the very nature of Christian love. Love is the greatest of all virtues, the characteristic virtue of the Christian faith. There are many types of love, however, in English we have only one word to express the various kinds of love. It is in the Greek language we discover the many shades of its meaning.

There are four words in Greek that are commonly used to express the different kinds of love: Eros, Storge, Philia, Agape. Eros is the word that express erotic love, love between two sexes. Storge is the word used to denote family affection. This is suggestive, because it implies that the Christian community is not a society, but a family. Philia is the commonest word for love in Greek that expresses a warm, affectionate kind of love. It is the love that exemplified when close friends meet. They embrace each other and demonstrate warmth and affection; they delight in each other's presence. This is also the kind of love wives are to show to their husband and children (Titus 2:4).

This kind of love is also known as brotherly love, from which the first part of "Philadelphia" comes. The most common word for love in the Greek New Testament is Agape, which is divine love.

Agape is that kind of love which is judicious and active. It is more than a display of emotions; it is a love that is expressed by doing that which results in the highest good for a person. Christ's love reaches far past our children, and other nearest and dearest, and those that love us; it reaches out to the ones that hate and despitely use us.

Now, all the ordinary words for love are words which express an emotion. They are words which have to do with the heart, mind, soul, and spirit. This love knows no limits, it extends far beyond the finish line. Sincerely, A.B.

The first round was in the Mayor's office where Mrs. Martha Lou was presented a proclamation declaring May 11th "Joe Louis Day." Watch that ceremony was on the 10th. The second round, May 11th, a large contingent from several sections of the country, led by Mrs. Louis, Joe's kids and kin and Freddie Guinard, his long time personal aid, made it to the White House. There President Ronald Reagan present the champs widow with the gold medal coin which had been struck in his honor.
