Dr. Emory Davis First Annual George Woods Awards Speaker

Dr. Emory G. Davis, a native of Anderson, Indiana who came to Lubbock, Texas in 1972 to accept a position as assistant professor of Sociology at Texas Tech University will be the first speaker of the annual George Woods Awards Banquet on Saturday, October 22, 1988.

The banquet will be held at the Holiday Inn Civic Center at 7:30 p. m.

Dr. Davis received his M. S. degree in Sociology from Illinois Institute of Technology, Chicago, Ill., and his PhD in Sociology from the University of Illinois, Chicago Circle.

Prior to his entrance into the academic field, he served as a minister in the African Methodist Episcopal Church pastoring in Indiana, Michigan and Illinois. While working on his advanced degrees, he served as pastor of All Saints Unitarian Church and co pastor of All Souls Unitarian Universalist Church.

Davis left Lubbock in 1977 to become chair of the Sociology Department at Bishop College in Dallas. In 1979, he was offered a position as associate professor on the faculty at Austin College in Sherman, Texas from which he retired in 1982. He was assigned as pastor of Emmanuel A. M. E. Church in October, 1982. Under his leadership, the church relocated, becoming Murph/Miller Memorial A. M. E. Church. The new church building opened July, 1985. Presently, he operates a religious book and Bible mail order

business from Dallas.

For over two years, Davis wrote and produced his own Access Cable TV show, "Black Religion and its Leadership." He served as chair of the Dallas Civil Service Board for four years and was a member to the board and was a member of the board of the Greater Dallas Community of Churches, and the Concerned Clergy and Laity of Dallas. He was frequently heard on KKDA and KNON FM talk shows. He is a member of the

NAACP and associate minister at Knight's Chapel A. M. E. Church of Dallas.

Davis' wife, Dr. Vivian Beverly Davis, a former teacher at Dunbar High School, 1955 to 1957, is on the English faculty of Eastfield Community College in Dallas.

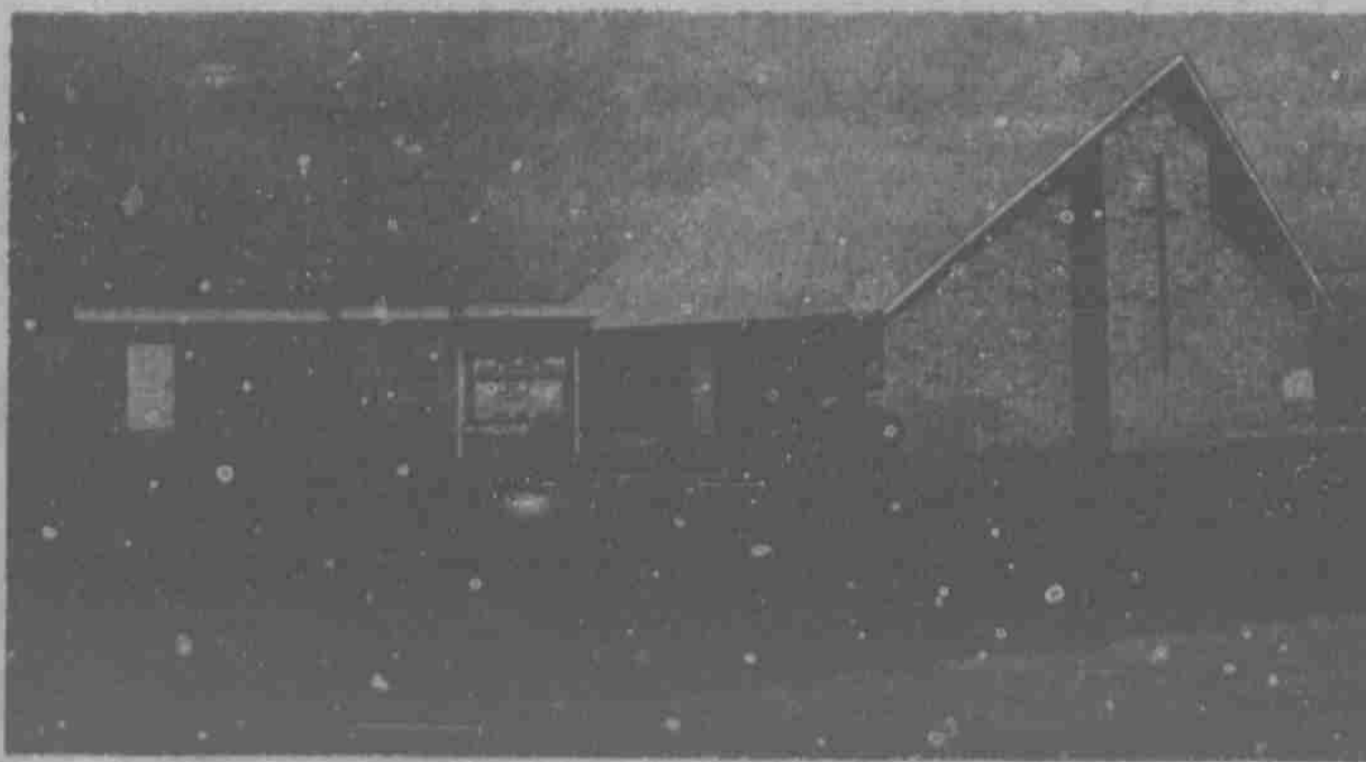

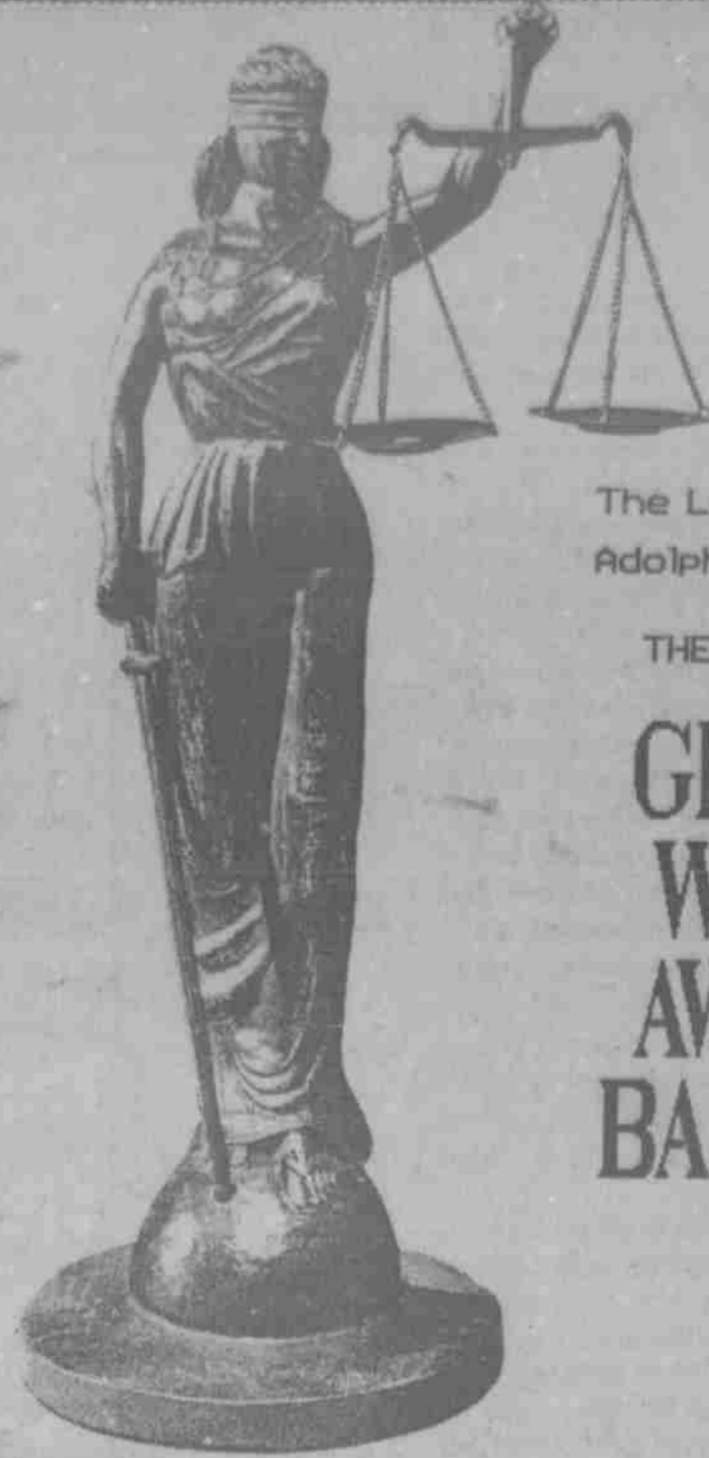

In Vietnam he was Chief of Intelligence Operations of II Field Force and earned two bronze stars and two legions of merit during his military career. He retired from the Army in 1973.

It Needs To Be Said

In a very cool, calm and collected manner, your 17 year old son or daughter informs you that he/she wants to become a "professional criminal." To the mothers and fathers, how would you handle this situation? Unreal, maybe their telling you, but it is very real that they may enter the crime world for their life's career. So real, that many parents should consider just what they could say once they find out that their John or Jane is now a professional criminal. A professional criminal is anyone that is paid for an illegal act.

In this situation, we cannot use the obvious reasons of crime being morally, spiritually and legally wrong as the kids should already know this. With crime being prevalent in all segments of our society, from the White House down to the out house, from the very rich to the very poor, using that logic would appear hopeless. From day one of being able to understand, we instill in our children that money, big money, is a basic requirement for survival and happiness and crime does pay big fast money as long as you remain free. Spending time in jail, good point, however, even our 10 year olds can defend themselves on the pros and cons of going to jail as a deterrent to crime. When you get down to it, a large majority of parents would be very hard pressed trying to talk their child out of a career in crime.

Just how this grim situation emerged in not a one fault item, nor can it be attributed totally a social, economic or ethnic reason. It happened as a result of progress, life styles, ambitions and many other positive advancements of our times. In many instances, positive advancement creates negatives for some. In the late 50's when Blacks began their "freedom movement," every group that felt oppressed sought similar headlines. There were "love ins, hippies, yuppies, drug festivals, nudity in public places, gay rights, bra burnings and even the house wife felt oppressed. T. V. began its freedom movement, allowing nude love scenes, profanity, blood and guts, and other hush hush subjects to be shown for all to see. When the house wife was no longer a proud and meaningful word to use, America geared it's self up to accommodate the new "career woman." Instant everything made it's appearance on the scene, and Sunday became another work day as many found this as their only day to shop, clean or relax. Men were being told to help around the house, they also felt threaten by the wife's income and new found independence. To balance this threat, men began to seek larger incomes even illegal means were used and with more women in the work place, "chipping" became a normal occurrence. As a result, there was little time for raising children and being a family, creating morals, providing a spiritual background and establishing a sound logic of right and wrong.

Self Evaluation

To evaluate yourself or your life you simply have to decide what you would be if you were the way you wanted to be. The notion of how something would be if it

was okay is called an Ideal Scene.

According to writer and philosopher L. Ron Hubbard, "In order to detect, handle or remedy situations one has to be able to understand and work out several things. These are defining the ideal scene itself, detect without error or guess any departure on it, find out WHY a departure occurred and work out a means of reverting back to the ideal scene."

Thus, when there is no ideal scene you can criticize something, but cannot evaluate it. To be a proper evaluation it must include:

1. A statement of the way it should be or the Ideal Scene.

2. Factual information about what is not okay.

3. What is in the way of things getting better; and

4. How to improve things.

Whether you are evaluating your work, your evaluating your work, your studies, your tennis scores, or your weight, the rules are the same.

I. Decide how things would be if they were okay (The Ideal Scene).

II. Look at the facts and note how things are different from the way they should be.

III. Find out what is preventing improvement.

IV. Figure out what is to be done to bring about an improvement.

These are the basic items that will make a self evaluation helpful. You can use them to evaluate anything.

Try it. See if it works for you. If it does, pass it on to someone else.

AN EDUCATOR'S OPINION

Bienvenido, Mr. Secretary

There are times when simple words, simply spoken, say far more than erudite lectures. One of those moments took place on the day Lauro F. Cavazos replaced William J. Bennett as U.S. Secretary of Education.

Cavazos, the first Hispanic-American ever appointed to a federal Cabinet post, was asked what he wished to say to America's Hispanic community. Answered Cavazos: "Por favor, niños, no dejen la escuela." Please, children, do not leave school.

With those seven words, the new Secretary spoke volumes. By answering in Spanish, he expressed pride in America's ethnic and linguistic diversity. By speaking to children, he made his priorities plain.

I was touched by the new Secretary's words. He did not lecture. He did not pontificate. He focused on children, not ideology.

Secretary Cavazos challenged us to remember that every student is a precious temple of untapped potential. And he asked us to find a way to unleash that potential, to make good on the promise of equal opportunity.

America's educators welcome this challenge. We understand as well as anyone both the rich diversity among America's student population and the harsh disparity among learning opportunities.

Consider for a moment the fact that our nation's education system consists of 16,000 school districts,

81,000 schools, and 40 million students. Consider, too, that education funding among districts varies wildly. Finally, consider the fact that while some of our schools are ethnically homogeneous, many are home to large numbers of recent immigrants—to students whose native lands include Lebanon and Laos, Poland and Nigeria and El Salvador.

Can a single model curriculum ever be adequate to this diversity? Former Secretary Bennett clearly thought so. Secretary Cavazos, I believe, thinks not.

I look to Cavazos to help us free America from "panty hose pedagogy"—from the one-size-fits-all approach to education. The route to improved education does not lie with the imposition of a single abstract model. We need local solutions tailored to local situations and local problems.

Finding the right fit demands experimentation—experimentation responsive to the will of local citizens, not to the whims of distant political officials. Experimentation that recognizes the vitality of variety—in instructional methods, curricular content, classroom environments, assessment instruments. Our communities must have the freedom to change their schools in profoundly imaginative ways.

Only then will we see the day when every student says "I want to be in school"—*Quiero estar en la escuela.*

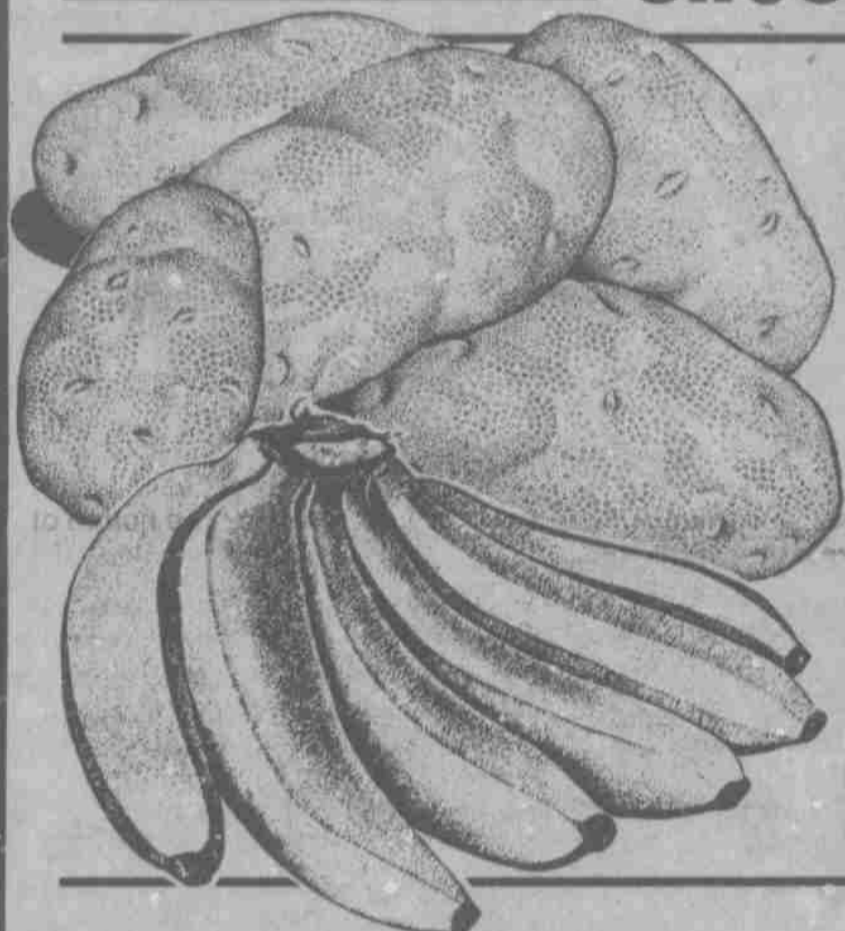

DEATH PENALTY AND CAPITAL PUNISHMENT

One of the most important issues in our society today is CRIME and how to solve the problem. SIN is the cause of all crime and therefore the answer to this problem is given in God's word and how to solve it. The reason that the problem of crime is impossible to solve is that our political and law enforcement officials are trying to solve it their own way, rather than solving it by God's way that is given in the Bible. God's Word, the Bible mentions many of the crimes and also tells us that the DEATH PENALTY is to be given as CAPITAL PUNISHMENT for that particular crime. Both Presidential candidates George Bush and Michael Dukakis have opposing beliefs on this issue. Vice President Bush supports the DEATH PENALTY while Governor Dukakis opposes CAPITAL PUNISHMENT.

SINS OF CRIME THAT GOD DEMANDS THE DEATH PENALTY:

1. Murder which is breaking the 6th. commandment. Genesis 9:5-6 says "And surely your blood of your lives will I require; at the hand of every beast will I require it, and at the hand of man; at the hand of every man's brother will I require the life of man. Whoso sheddeth man's blood, by man shall his blood be shed: for in the image of God made he man." God says in Numbers 35:16-21 that if a person is smitten by another "with an instrument of iron, so that he die, he is a murderer: the murderer shall surely be put to death. And if he smite him with throwing a stone, wherewith he may die, and he die, he is a murderer: the murderer shall surely be put to death. Or if he smite him with an hand weapon of wood, wherewith he may die, and he die, he is a murderer: the murderer shall surely be put to death. The revenger of blood himself shall slay the murderer: when he meeteth him, he shall slay him. But if he thrust him of hatred, or hurt at him by laying of wait, that he die; Or in enmity smite him with his hand, that he die: he that smote him shall surely be put to death; for he is a murderer: the revenger of blood shall slay the murderer, when he meeteth him." In this same chapter verses 29-31 says "So these things shall be for a statute of judgment unto you throughout your generations in all your dwellings. Whoso killeth any person, the murderer shall be put to death by the mouth of witnesses: but one witness shall not testify against any person to cause him to die. Moreover ye shall take no satisfaction for the life of a murderer, which is guilty of death: but he shall be surely put to death." and verse 33 says "So ye shall not pollute the land wherein ye are: for blood it defileth the land: and the land cannot be cleansed of the blood that is shed therein, but by the blood of him that shed it."
2. Rape. God says in Deuteronomy 22:25 "But if a man find a betrothed damsel in the field, and the man force her, and lie with her: then the man only that lay with her shall die."
3. Kidnapping, which would also include holding of hostages. Exodus 21:16 says "And he that stealeth a man, and selleth him, or if he be found in his hand, he shall surely be put to death." Deuteronomy 24:7 says "If a man be found stealing any of the children of Israel, and maketh merchandise of him, or selleth him; then that thief shall die; and thou shalt put evil away from among you."
4. Disobedience to parents. Federal Homeless Aid Funds Released Houston Gets \$2 Million

Washington, D. C. ... The Houston/Fort Bend and Harris Counties area will receive \$2,122,344 from the federal government for services to the homeless in fiscal year 1989, Rep. Mickey Leland, Democrat of Houston, said last week.

Funds are allocated under the Stewart B. McKinney Emergency Homeless Assistance Act. Last year 36 area agencies helping the homeless received funds under this legislation. The Houston area grant is the third largest in the nation, following Los Angeles and New York.

The grants are made on the basis of unemployment rates and the number of people in poverty, Leland explained.
