### General Information On The 1983 Cost-Of-Living Adjustment (COLA)

The maximum benefit for a person attaining age 65 in 1983 is \$709.00. The cost-of-living increase will raise the maximum age 65 benefit effective December 1983 to \$734.00.

Currently, the average Social Security benefit for a retired worker with no dependents is \$411.00. The 3.5 percent benefit increase, effective for December 1983, would increase this average to \$425.00.

The average Social Security benefit for a retired couple, currently \$739.00, would be increased in December 1983 to \$733.00.

The average benefit for an aged widow or widower effective December 1983 is increased from \$380.00 to \$393.00.

A person age 65-69 inclusive drawing retirement benefits for the first time in 1983 can get a Social Security benefit for any month in which his or her earnings do not exceed \$550.00. (The earnings limitation for the year is \$6,600.)

A person under 65 getting retirement benefits (for the first time) can get a check for any month in 1983 earnings do not exceed \$410.00. (The annual earnings limitation is \$4,920.)

In 1984 the annual earnings limitation is estimated to be \$6,900.00 for persons 65 through 69; and a person collecting for the first time will be able to get a check for any month earnings do not exceed \$580.00.

For those under 65, the annual earnings limitation is estimated to be (in 1984) \$5,160 and the person will be able to draw a benefit for any month earnings do not exceed \$430.00.

In 1983, a person 70 years of age and over is able to have unrestricted earnings without the Retirement Test being applied. (The exemption starts with the month an individual attains age 70.)

## The Law And Legal Services

Many tenants are unable to resolve various problems with the manager of the apartment, but do not know the name and address of the owner or property management company that runs them. Concerns over repairs or rules and regulations could sometimes be resolved by writing the owner.

In 1981, the Texas Legislature passed a landlord-tenant law that requires a landlord to disclose the name and address of the owner or property management company to a tenant.

Such disclosure can be made by having the information, included in the tenant's copy of the lease, posted conspicuously in the dwelling unit or manager's office, or by giving the tenant a notice in writing. It is also the landlord's duty to disclose the new name and address if the owner or property management company changes and correct any information that is in the lease or otherwise posted.

A tenant may enforce this right by requesting the information from the landlord. If it is not given, the tenant must then give written notice to the landlord that if the information is not furnished within seven days, the tenant may exercise his or

her remedies under the law. If the landlord still does not act within those seven days, the tenant may sue the landlord and recover one or more of the following: a court

order requiring the information be disclosed, penalties of one month's rent plus \$100, costs or attorney's fees. If the tenant does not want to go to court, he or she may

unilaterally terminate the rental agreement.

In order to enforce this law, the tenant must be current on the rent. Also, if the tenant files a lawsuit in order to force the landlord, the tenant could be liable for one month's rent plus \$100 and attorney's fees.



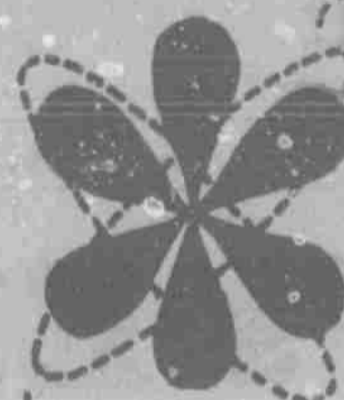

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## The KITCHEN BEAT

Cool and Casual Menus Suit Lazy Summer Days

In today's black American home, cooking is no longer the responsibility of one person. Because of busy and varied schedules, usually every member of the family at some time or another has to prepare personal meals or meals for other members of the family. *The Kitchen Beat* is designed to meet some needs of the various cooks in the modern black family.

Now that those "lazy, hazy, crazy" days are with us once again, it's time to summerize your life. Casual is in. Fussy is out. Spending the minimum time preparing meals is in. Complex recipes are definitely out.

The beauty of *In-A-Wink Three Bean Salad* is that you combine the ingredients in the morning and that's that. It's ready whenever you are to delight your wandering clan. The three beans in the title refer to convenient pork & beans in tomato sauce, green beans and wax beans. Use the pork & beans directly from the can. The other two may also be canned, yet leftovers are perfect here. Adding zest to this attractive salad are green pepper, red onion and a little French dressing which, along with the tomato sauce, unites the other components.

What makes *Chicken Luau* so appealing is the

fact that it starts with a package of frozen take-out style fried chicken. Preparation involves no more than heating it in the oven, then spreading it with a mixture of crushed pineapple and honey toward the end. Accessorize the menu with relishes, corn bread squares and eye-catching fruit parfaits. For these, use either fresh, frozen or canned fruit alternated with whipped cream or plain yogurt. French cuisine usually is left for the experienced to prepare—scaring off those with little time or desire for cooking. But there's one very French dish that even the novice cook can handle in minutes—the crepe.

A veritable craze for crepes has been sweeping the nation. People have discovered that this thin, egg-rich French pancake can be filled with almost anything, topped with a sauce and easily served for a great tasting breakfast, brunch, lunch or dinner.

Those who cook for only one or two will find the ver-

satile crepe perfectly suited to their in-between needs, since small batches can be prepared with ease and speed. And fillings for crepes are as varied as the contents of your freezer. Frozen prepared entrees, frozen vegetables in sauce and frozen fruits make especially good fillings that can be simply heated or thawed and folded into the crepes.

Even the crepe batter itself can be conveniently made with fixings from the freezer. These *Curried Peach Crepes* start off with frozen pancake batter thinned to a perfect crepe consistency with frozen non-dairy creamer, then filled with frozen sliced peaches made tangy with spices and frozen Florida orange juice concentrate. Frozen whipped topping laced with orange juice and ginger can be spooned atop these dessert crepes for a final, festive touch.

*Boeuf a la Printemps* is a quick main course that can be served either as a filling for crepes or frozen patty

### Boeuf A La Printemps

- 1 pkg. (1 lb.) frozen sliced beef & gravy, thawed
- 1/2 cup frozen sliced carrots
- 1/2 cup frozen cut green beans (half of a 10 oz. pkg.)
- 1/4 cup frozen chopped green pepper
- 1/4 cup frozen mushrooms
- 1/4 cup frozen whole pearl onions
- 12 cherry tomatoes, halved, or 1 medium tomato, chopped
- 1/4 teaspoon thyme
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder

Drain gravy from beef, reserving 1 cup. Cut beef in strips. Combine all ingredients in skillet, including reserved gravy. Cook over medium heat for approximately 10 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Serve as a filling for crepes, in frozen patty shells or over cooked rice or noodles. (Makes two generous servings.)

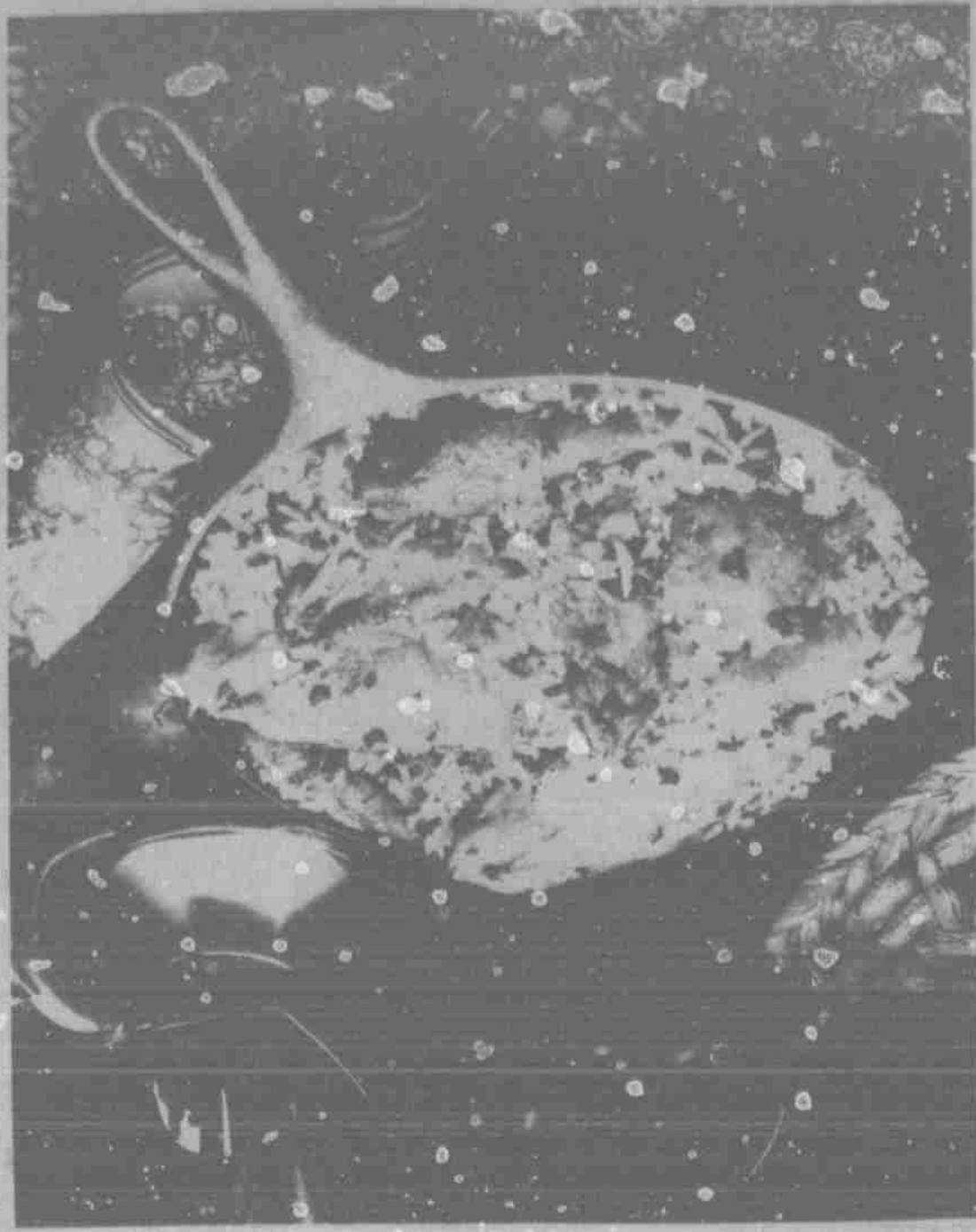

- 1 cup frozen pancake batter, thawed
- 1/4 cup frozen non-dairy creamer, thawed
- 1/4 cup frozen whole pearl onions

Combine batter and creamer, stir to blend. Lightly grease 6 or 8-inch crepe pan with enough butter to prevent batter from sticking; heat. Add about two tablespoons batter and tilt pan to spread evenly. Add more batter to pan as needed for additional crepes. Stack finished crepes, separating them with sheets of waxed paper. (Makes 8 crepes. One 16-oz. carton of frozen pancake batter makes 16 crepes.)

### JOLLOF RICE

- 1 2 1/2 to 3-pound broiler-fryer chicken, cut up
- 2 tablespoons peanut oil or cooking oil
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 16-ounce can tomatoes, cut up
- 1 1/4 cups chicken broth
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger, ground cinnamon, or dried thyme, crushed
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground red pepper
- 1 cup long grain rice
- 1 tablespoon snipped parsley

In a large skillet brown chicken pieces on both sides in hot oil about 15 minutes; remove from skillet. Set chicken aside, reserving drippings. Add the onion to drippings, cook till tender but not brown. Drain off fat. Return chicken to skillet. Combine undrained tomatoes, chicken broth, bay leaf, ginger, cinnamon, or thyme, salt, and ground red pepper. Pour over chicken. Do not stir. Bring to boiling; reduce heat. Cover, simmer for 30 minutes. Skim off fat. Add the rice, making sure all the rice is covered with liquid. Cover; simmer for 30 minutes more or till rice is tender. Remove bay leaf. Sprinkle with snipped parsley.

## Mayoral Candidates Discuss

The Southwest Digest mailed questionnaires to all of the mayoral candidates, except the write-in candidate because the questionnaires had been mailed at that time. Here are the responses from the candidates answering.

**James T. Crowder**

**1. Why are you running?**

I'm running because I feel all of the people in Lubbock are not being represented and the city government is not listening to the will of the people.

**2. Experience.**

I have no prior experience but that means I have no preconceived ideas that others would have to work against. I'm open to all ideas and to input from all areas.

**3. Why do you feel you are qualified?**

I'm a Lubbock small business man and city government should be run like a business.

**4. What are your goals for Lubbock?**

My main goal is to bring the people of Lubbock together and see that everyone is represented.

**5. What are your plans for accomplishing these goals?**

To accomplish this we need input from all the citizens of all sectors of our community. I would set up an advisory board of citizens from all neighborhoods in Lubbock.

**6. What do you feel is/are the most pressing problem/problems in Lubbock?**

The most pressing problem is to unify the city and to work for all the people.

**7. How do you propose to solve it or them?**

See No. 5 above.

**8. What do you feel is/are Lubbock's strong point or points?**

Our strongest points are our good location, friendly people, and potential for new businesses.

**9. How do you plan utilizing them?**

By making Lubbock more attractive to new businesses.

**10. What are some of your past accomplishments to the city of Lubbock?**

I'm a good taxpaying citizen, have been involved with many youth organizations, Meals on Wheels, Peace Officer's Association, Lions Club and other charitable organizations.

**11. How do you feel about single member districts?**

I'm in favor of single member districts because I believe a person elected from a district he lives in is more aware of the problems and needs of the people in his neighborhood.

**12. What are your plans for implementing the single member district?**

This will have to be done by working through the legal system set forth in the Lubbock City Charter.

**13. What are your plans for bringing new industry to Lubbock, and how do you plan to expand the industry presently in the city?**

To bring new business to Lubbock, we have to have a good water supply, adequate police protection, low fire insurance rates, and the best fire protection in the state. We also have to make it financially attractive to new industry to move here.

**14. What are your plans to get economic development for the total city of Lubbock?**

I hope to bring new business, recreation, and entertainment to Lubbock.

**15. Upon taking office, what would be your first move as Mayor?**

To reduce the size of upper management within the city, and to operate the city more effectively and efficiently.

**16. How do you feel about the 10 percent set aside for minorities from Federal funds?**

If the Federal Government should buy its goods and services from whoever can supply the best quality at the best price.



**Stan Bloom**

I am running to serve the citizens of Lubbock with a fresh approach to the problems and policies that affect all Lubbockites.

Texas Tech graduate, independent businessman. Prior experience in financial and market systems auditing.

With my past and present experience, I feel that it is time that the city has an open-minded, rational, objective person serving the needs of the citizens and not the needs of special interest groups.

To get more people involved in the needs and problems of Lubbock, in order that the city council receives more diverse input. To see that city policies and ordinances are administered on an equitable basis.

Assure the people that city hall will operate with a true open door policy for everyone. Ordinances and policies are administered based upon merit and not personalities.

One of the donor recurring posters used by United Blood Services features a quacking chicken with the caption which reads: "Chicken about donating blood? What happens if you need it?" Many people say to us over and over again, "Not me, I'm chicken." It is not hard to admit that one is afraid of needles. In fact, fear is an especially convenient excuse. After all, who can argue with a bad experience in a lab or hospital as a child, or even a generalized fear of anything that seems medical.

Overcoming fear and giving something of oneself is the real test. Intellectually, everyone knows that the actual donation does not hurt. The slight discomfort that one might feel seems a small price to pay when life hangs in the balance. What if that life is yours or someone you love? Would fear be a good excuse when your doctor says, "No one donated, so I don't have blood for you today?"

The basic issue, then, is not fear, but letting fear rule one's life. When life itself hangs in the balance, fear is a poor excuse indeed.
