



-On The Two Hundred Years Of The United States Constitution: 1787 to

1987 - Part -5

by Eddie P. Richardson

On this two hundreth year anniversary of the signing of the U. S. Constitution, some interesting things are happening. For example, Justice Thurgood Marshall's speech at the San Francisco Patent And Trademark Law Association in Maui, Hawaii, on May 6, 1987, stirred some controversy from some right flag wavers and praise from the more liberal elements.

We will run excerpts of this speech and a series of articles on the Constitution and Bill of Rights and other information of Justice Marshall, the Black justice on the U.S. Supreme Court bench, since this is his 20th anniversary and the 200th anniversary of the U.S. Constitution.

With the resignation of Justice Lewis F. Powell, Jr., and the nomination of Judge Robert Bork, who is being opposed by many minority groups, this anniverary year should be very interesting to watch and see how the highest court will shape up. Follow our series for interesting information.

Justice Thurgood Marshall

During this time of celebration of the bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States, it is appropriate to take note of the life and work of Associate Justice Thurgood Marshall of the Supreme Court of the United States. A few months ago, Justice Marshall made a speech in which he was critical of the framers of our Constitution, and even critical of the document itself. He pointed out that the Constitution did not even contain the Bill of Rights when it was first adopted. Those important provisions had to be added later as amendments.

In addition, he pointed out that the Constitution recognized the existence of slavery, and provided that for census purposes each slave counted only as 3/5 of a "full" person. The Constitution prohibited Congress from enacting any law to end the slave trade before the year 1803, and provided that when slaves escaped to nonslave states, they had to be returned to their masters. As Justice Marshall explained in his speech, the Constitution was far from being the perfect document that some of today's publicity on the bicentennial would try to make it. It had some fine things in it, but it was written by men, many of who were captives to their own time and place, and it contained some very bac things too, like those mentioned above.

Many people have been particularly harsh in commenting on Justice Marshall's speech. We think our readers should have the opportunity to make up their own minds, and so we will be printing his entire speech in our next issue.

For this issue, we want to explain something of lustice Marshall's background, and his important place in the history of American law and the history of the 世 四 日 中 中 田 田 田 田 田

Justice Marshall was born on July 2, 1908, in Baltimore, Maryland, where he was raised. He graduated from Lincoln University in 1930, and went on to Huward University Law School in Washington, D. C., where he graduated first in his class. He practiced law in Baltimore until 1935, when he was named assistant special legal counsel to the NAACP. Two years later, he was promoted to the post of Special Counsel, and when the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund was separately established in 1940 he was appointed its Director-Counsel.

As head of the NAACP's legal program, Thurgood Marshall became America's foremost civil rights attorney, coordinating attacks on racial discrimination in

many fields. He has won more cases at the Supreme Court of the United States than any other lawyer who has ever practiced there.

His Supreme Court victories included a 1944 decision prohibiting the esclusion of Blacks from Democratic primary elections because of race, and a 1946 case outlawing segregation in interstate transportation.

Marshall traveled thousands of miles throughout the South each year to represent Black litigants in court, and to encourage local NAACP chapters in their efforts to secure equal rights for Blacks.

In what was to be his most significant court battle, he supervised the greparation of four cases challenging racial segregation in the public schools. He

How Others Try To Control

It's a push-botton society, or so it has often been said. But this may be more true

than we previously might have suspected.

Much like a computer, you have push-botton impulses, key word phrases that can compel you to do things against your better judgement, or which can repress you from doing what you want. Even without understanding the mental mechanisms involved, people frequently try to control you by discovering and using these phrases to manipulate your reactions.

According to the current best-selling book Diametics: The Modern Science of Mental Health by L. Ron Hubbard, "The 'handling of human beings' and what people have been calling, roughly, 'psychology' have been actually push-butten handling of a person's aberrational phrases and sounds.

"Children discover them in their parents and use them with a vengenance," says Hubbard. "Wives may find that certain words make the husband wince or make humangry or make him refrain from doing something and so they use these 'push buttons." And husbands find their wives' push bottons and keep them from Luying clothes or using the car."

In fact, everywhere, we are manipulated by button words. Advertising frequently tries to discover general public button words and to use these to make people auy. In the advertising field, they even talk about copulse buying

But just that are these button words and why do they have such power over us-Hubbard discovered that these buttors are in fact words connected to past experience, of pain and emotion. But until the effects of these phrases are released through Diametics technology, a person penerally is not aware of the connection.

But simply recognizing the phenomenon could be a stop toward crearer thinking. It, for instances, you find yourself getting particularly upont for no reason about something someone says, realize that view have probably just pushed a button of yours. If you find yourself reacting in a way you don't understand, this could be button words at work.

our backs (that we heard), and call the black janitor that we all love Fat Albert. This is hard to believe, but we wouldn't lie to you. How could they be so mean? Why did they always expect the black girls to move the heavy flats and clean the tables, and put gas in the LISD vehicle? While the white boys sat down and talked with them or produced shows? He swore up and down that he would look into it He said that he would have one of the counselors to ask each student who had dropped out or was kicked out of TV Productions why? And what they felt about Alice French, the director. He lied to us; he deserted us; he let us poor teenagers who looked up to him down. because none of us were even catled to the offic. He told our parents he'd help us fight only to successfully succeed in shutting our powerless black mouths against the smart white man.

I guess we shouldn't be afraid anymore, because we aren't in TV anymore. If LISO TV is for the white students of Lubbock to learn, then take it to Monterey, and bring another TV st. Jon to Dunhar, one that will let us blacks learn. We aren't as stupid as some white people may believe but want to learn about the TV world.

Some of us come to Dunbar just to take TV Productions only to be forced to get out, because we're Nack. Maybe we should settle or beign maids or namiles. Is there hope for us black teens? At Channel 12 when one of us got up the nerves to ask if he could be in front of the camera, he was told he was self-centered and to go clean a table. How degrading He only asked, because they were letting some white girls from Monterey High School host shows weekly. But still, he persisted and kept (roking over the white boys shoulffors Lying to loarn Turn on Channel 12, who are the summer mapleyues? 5 whites, 1 black from Eubbock High Selvot and I Sparish from Jur beloved Dunbar, the school of aut Black ancestors. Oh yes, black students from Dunbar filled out applications. One of us is the first TV Production's student to enroll in the class, but she got burned

It Needs To Be Said

The Black community has voiced an opinion only to have teh "establishment" place an obstacle in our path. It is a "low down, dirty shame that we can not rid ourselves of an elected official that does not represent us. However, if we are serious, then we must show all concerned that we Blacks are together, that we no longer will tolerate abuse and illtreatment, regardless of the source.

We must continue the recall proceeding, gather all the signatures possible and present a formal statement to the School Board with an information copy to the AJ, Mrs. Caviel and Judge Woodard. We must show that this is not just a small group with vendetta against Mrs. Caviel. We must show that the community does not support her vote in support of the unitary system. How many times must the "establishment" stab we Blacks in the back before we realize our interest is something they do not consider nor can we trust the establishment. How many more behind closed door meetings and other under-handed tactics must they display before Blacks realize the "establishment" only wants us in servant roles and to be seen but not heard.

Now, more than ever, the Blacks of Lubbock must come together, we must show a majority of togetherness, not only in this issue, but many other issues. The "establishment" feels secure in their belief that there is only a small group of Blacks that are concerned. The "establishment" feels that by placing obstacles in our path we will stop our persuit. We must show them that since our trustee has clearly shown she will not represent our community as we desire, then we will go on record with a majority, that we do not recognize her. Friendship is not an issue, our constitutional rights for representation of our choice is the primary issue All the trouble andured to obigin single-member districting will be for naught if we allow our elected officials to continuously vote along with the "establishment". What is good for west Lubbock may not be good for east Lubock and we need elected officials who know the difference. We realize that one vote may not change the outcome, but our one vote should reflect the majority

One lesson should be learned from this, we must do more screening, researching and know more about the individual before casting our vote on election day. Having our skin color does not mean the person is for us.





Through God's Faith

Please read Ephesians 2:1-9. The key verses in our text are found in verses 4 & 5 and 8 & 9. "But God, who is rich in mercy, for his great love therewith he loved us, even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ, (by grace ye are saved;)" and verses 8 & 9 "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God; not of works, lest any man should

On Sunday evening, May 9, 1982, while traveling on my way to preach at the Littlefield Missionary Baptist Church in Littlefield, Texas, I saw a sign on the front of a large building with only one word on It, all by Itself, the word "GRACE" only caught my attention and it was the basis for this message that I preached that Sunuay evening service.

Grace shows the full expression of the wonderful love of God. Grace is the only cause and source of salvation. The Apostle Paul said "By the grace of God I am what I am." (1 Corinthians 15:10). What else could have saved the chiefest of sinners, Saul of Tarsus? There is no evidence of faith in his lite prior to his experience of salvation on the road to Damascus. If any man was ever void of any faith and understanding and understanding and allenated from God, derserving the wrath and condemnation of Almighty God, that man was Saul of Tarsus. But grace, In the person of Jesus Christ, conquered this great enemy of the cross, without any ald from works, faith, church, preacher, or Saul himself. This is a striking example of the unrestrained grace of God.

Some people may ask, "How could Christ save him if he were not submissive or willing to be saved?" Do you not know that there is no willingness or submission in Saul or anyone else, until the quickening power of Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit makes them willing? "Thy people shall be willing in the day of thy power..." (Psains 110:3). What is this strange power? Jesus said "Verliy, verily, I say into you, the hour is coming, and now is, when the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God: and they that hear shall live." (John 5:25). The voice in this passage is the same voice that arrested Saul on the Demascus road. It is not a begging, pleading value that tries to influence a lost sinner, but it is the Almighty Uni Power of God that transforms a dead lost sinner from spiritual death to spiritual life. Man cannot, will not, and Indeed, I repeat, cannot resist the quickening power of the voice of the Son of God. Lazarus, who was dead, could not and did not clse from the dead until Jesus spoke with a loud voice, "Lazarus come forth." (John 11:43). Some people say that "Jesus will quicken only those who will let him." but Jesus said "The Son quickeneth whom he will." (John 5:21).

Some people may twist the scriptures or ignore them in their value attempts to overthrow the throne of grace; but the truth of God's word shall stand the test and grace shall continue to receive the praise. A pure running stream may be momentarily muddled by the crossing of cattle, but it will always purify itself again. Simply, because the majority does not believe in God's sovereign grace is no reason to think that It is not true. The majority did not believe Christ while he was here on earth. They would not have him or his doctrine today even if he were here in person. They cannot resist the power of grace, but they can and do resist the truth of the preached word.

It is puzzling to me that so many refuse to give the praise to grace. There can be only one reason for this--pride! One of the greatest sins among religious people is self-righteousness, the cardinal sin of the Jews at Christ's first coming. People do not like to think of themselves as a worm or as a being that is unable to do anything right. They want to imagine that they have always had some good about them and that they help, at least, to save themselves for Heaven. They are not willing to forsake their own righteousness and submit themselves wholly to God's righteousness, for in so doing, they would deny themselves of any praise or cradit.

People praise faith or works or both as their means of salvation. Some of these will admit that salvation is by grace but will then turn around and deny it by adding some other requirement even boast-Ing about their faith. Verses 8 & 9 of our text says that "by grace are ye saved" (God's grace) "through faith" (God's faith) for it says in Galations 3:32 that "faith is the fruit of the Spirit" "and that not of yourselves: It is the glift of God" (It is God's faith, not yours) "Not of works, lest any man should boast." verse 9. Our faith is works but the faith that comes from God is not works but is a gift of God! So you see, even the faith that we are saved by is not ours to boast or brag about, but is God's faith. People Just have to have a little credit, they think. Well, what does God say about It? Please read Ephesians 1:1-13 before going further. Notice in verses 3 through 6, "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ: According as he hath crosen us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be hely and with out blame before him in love: having predestinated us unto the adoption of children by Jesus Christ to himself, according to the good pleasure of his will," (not our will but His will). "To the praise of the glory of his grace, wherein he hath made us accepted in the beloved."


Please glvs special attention to that last verse of scripture just quoted. "To the praise of the glory of his grace." The knowledge of salvation inspires people to praise the Saviour. In the full sense, our praise should be cirected to Christ; but then Christ is grace, and grace is Christ. God says that our praise is to be directed toward the grace that saves us. Nothing is said of praising faith (our faith) or our works. These are important in their proper places and should receive caraful attention, but they are not to be honored for something they are incapable of doing. But if we say that faith or works save us from our sir, we dethrone grace and elevate something else to the seat of praise. The nature of grace is so strict, that it will not sit on the same throne with any other thing. James clearly establishes the fact that works and grace will not wix. Faith (our faith, not God's) and works go hand in hand; In fact, "felth without works is dead," (James 2:20). Grace, however, reigns alone and will not tolerate eny help from others or anything else. Salvation is completely by grace only; or else, grace has nothing at all to do with selvation. It cannot be by the grace of God and also by something alse. The Bible teaches that It is by grace only! Romans 11:5-6 says "Even so then at this present time also there is a remnant according to the election of grace. And if by grace, then is it no more of works: otherwise grace is no more grace. But i it be of works, then is it no more grace: otherwise work is no more work! So grace, emaring grace, is to receive the praise!

Our works and our faith may fail. We no good one day and then we fail into error and sin. Surely, if salvation were conditioned upon works, or our faith instead of God's faith, then no one could possibly be saved. Our forth may fall, causing us to have doubts and trans about our selvetion. Jesus says in Luke 22:37 "I have prayed for thee, that thy fait! fall not," If salvotion is conditioned on our faith, which may fall, then saliation is most uncertain. But it is not so with grace. Grace sity rightfully upon the throne of God. It is the ture expression of God's unfailing love and his faithfulness to corry out His furposes to the full extint. Grace Is to be praised. If is the sule cause for salvetion and it comes only from God. Praise God and His Grace. Amen and Amen I







personally represented the Black plaintiffs from Clarendon County, South Carolina, in one of those cases. During oral argument at the Supreme Court, Marshall insisted to the Court that state-enforced segregation violated the 14th Amendment. On May 17, 1954, the Supreme Court ruled unanimously in Brown v. Board of Education that racial segregation in public education is unconstitutional.

(It was Marshall's victory in the Brown case that would later make it possible for the federal court to end racial segregation in the Lubbock Independent School District, and in thousands of other segregated school districts in the nation.)


Thurgood Marshall was also the lawyer who represented Autherine Lucy, the first Black ever admitted to the University of Alabama. Marshall was the Ms. Lucy when she was attacked by a white mob on the University's campus, and after the University's trustees suspened her the next day, Marshall got a federal court order for her reinstatement so that she could return to classes.

Marshall was counsel for the Black students who desegregated Central High School in Little Rock, Arkansas in the Fall of 1957. He has been involved in many, many other lawsuits and similar proceedings to obtain equal rights for Blacks. Among other things, Marshall defended hundreds of students arrested during the sit-ins, the Freedom Rides in the South, and similar non-violent protests against segregation. In all, Thurgood Marshall has particiated in 32 cases before the Supreme Court and has won 27 of those cases, which is a remarkable record, and one that never has been surpassed by any other lawyer in the entire history of the
