



We Must Do For Ourselves

With all the talk of the Reagan cut offs and backs ... it is time we focus and refocus our minds in the direction of self help and

move away from social action.

One of the major objectives of any group of responsible people is to take their rightful place, by reaching out in mutual interdependence roles and etc. However, a necessary precedent of acceptance of the responsibility and/or priviledge of interdependence is independece. Nonetheless, we are faced with the costly and devasting fact that 33 years after the historic 1954 U. S. Supreme Court decision on school desegregation now over 47% of our nation's Black youth are "functionally illerates."

These Black youth, as such adn along with many others ... especially minorities ... are forced to be in a depending role or society as a whole. There must be a re-assessment of our immediate goals and priorities. Something must be done immediately to change our past and present pooling of encouraging partenalism, etc. which fostures dependency. We must call for and encourage excellence in education equitable opportunities for achievement and community pride that builds self-reliance or independence.

Our community and nation's urgent priorities during the rest of the 1980's and 1990's calls for a shift away from certain kinds of "integration" or reaching out and immediate emphasis on the things necessary within our communities to save our presently denied youth and millions of others

in our community.

The Southwest Digest as well as other Black Media Newspapers over America ... more than 65% of all printed media in Black America cooperatively ... is dedicated to eliminate these burdersome needs from within Black America. We have chosen as our overall theme for the 1980's and 1990's: "Casting Down Our Buckets Where We Are." The new emphasis or priority ... will have to involve getting all our Black Community organizations and institutions together to encourage our youth and others to take pride in preparing themselves early to be our community's economic builders."

This means new forms of massive training to take over our Black Community's needs for Black bricklayers, Black carpenters, Black electricians, Black street sweepers, as well as Black policemen, Black teachers in Black schools, Black lawyers, Black merchants, and Black businessmen and women of all kinds. If also calls for new forms of partneships whereby we, simultaneously, can encourage the Black Community to selectively support those white owned-businesses and institutions which have policies that tend to build our long denied communities in an equitiable manner.

Those who don't need to be boycotted and frozen out of our communities are those who have done what is mentioned above.

This new priority of rebuilding our community from within calls for new roles for all in the Black community. It means that the Black Press Southwest Digest and others will have to examine every possible way we can to "pull up our communities by whatever bootstraps." We have as we seek the long overdue and deserved support required of the white community.

However, the leadership and initiative to make our communities the responsible and self-sustaining market place msut come from within our communities!! We have a tremendous task before us. We must all take as our personal creed: "It it is to be; it is up to me." And pray for God's guidiance and direction. It's way past time to sit around and wait on someone else and critize. We must all become involved in our communities, and do our share for the good of all of us!!

You Got to Get a Better System UNEMPLOYMENT PAR FOR THE COURSE

You take the high road An I'll take the low road But I'll be in Scotland before you. Old Course, St. Andrews, Scotland

Lee Elder, Charles Sifford, Jim Thorpe and thousands of Black American golfers, as well as every Scotsman, dream of breaking par and winning a tournament on the first golf course in the world - The Old Course, located in St. Andrews, Scotland home also of the oldest university in Scotland, the 572 year old St. Andrews University.

It is not that the Old Course is so difficult, but set in such ancient tradition and turf, that it takes more than skill and intellecutal talent to tackle the trying bunker barrier course and come out a winner. It means for those who are not part of "the old schoolboy network," a breaking of the system, not just a breaking into the system. Indeed, at the moment it is a public golf course gone strolling park on Sundays. A situation about to be ended with the conversion of the Course into a private country club as a sign of these conservative bent Thatcher (a la

Paying the modest green playing fees of 17 1/2 pounds (\$26.25) to play does not encourage local interest nor does it make you a member of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club which prohibits people from merely entering the stateusque building which dominates the course. And being a member of the club is really what counts. That way you can always work and play. Over the years, being able to WORK and PLAY is still the name of the game.

Unemployment on a national basis in the United Kingdom is as much a disgrace as it is in the Black American community, hovering around 15% for adult males. In pockets of Scotland, it has soared to 20 plus percent, placing people on the dole who are desperate for moving on to make a honest living out of the country. Thus the Scots have a score to settle as stepchild to their Southern English rulers and a saying worth heeding to one and all. "When the able-bodied are out of work, it is often for reasons beyond their control."

Churchism, not Religionism, a fate of Scots, as well as Black Americans, comes under scrutiny in stressful times of high unemployment for its involvement with maintaining traditional values which prevent the people from prying away from a property protectionist system. Striking against the system is the only solution for suffering men and women under Reaganism or Thatcherism.

Those who don't know a "divot" made by an iron in the grass from a hole in the ground still got excited by the prospects of employment. Work being their aim, play their pay. Oh, Yes my golf score. Revolution would be par for the course.

When "Child Welfare" (Children's Protective Services) Steps In!

Continued from last week!

5. It is important that the parent(s) pay CPS some amount of child support regularly during the period that CPS has custody whether they are ordered or asked to do so or not. One of the routine grounds used to terminate is failure to support the children financially. The amount of course, depends on the parent(s)' circumstances. Nevertheless, some definite amount should be paid to CPS monthly at least for the support of the children and any and all arguments against paying such support are counterproductive and undermine the realization of the goal of having the children returned as soon as possible.

6. Again, the parent(s) is the key. They must demonstrate their cooperation, responsibil lity, and stability. All visitation times are met. All meetings with counselors and CPS staff are kept. The parent(s) are on the spot. It is not easy. It is hard work. But it can be done.

7. Even when the parent(s) himself or herself did not perpetuate the abuse, they must demonstrate a willingness and ability to protect the children from abuse. It is not enough simply not personally abuse the child. Here the ugly head of sexual abuse of childre appears Again, the data indicates the sexual abuse of children is very prevalent in our society. The parent(s) must be sensitive and watchful and protective in this area which more often than not involves relatives and friends. CPS is not lenient with parent(s) who fail to protect their children from such abuse.

8. If the rehabilitation effort of the first instance fails, CPS through its Personal Planning Team Committee may seek termination of parental rights with the children. This is a much more serious threat to the natual family unit than the custody phase. Yet, the same efforts toward stability and rehabilitation apply in opposing termination.

In summary, when CPS steps in, don't panic and control your hostility. Take a good look at the situation and at yourself. With the help of the CPS worker, devise and execute a plan for the return of the children.

A Roof Over Our Heads

What happens to a family when its most basic need - a roof overhead -- is taken away?

The experience is "extremely traumatic," according to Dianne Betsey, whose family, along with dozens of other (mostly black) families received eviction notices from their Maryland apartments in 1980 when their building went "all adult". The Betsey and nine other families 'sught back, eventually winning a \$125,000 settle in court last July. But they have had to deal with the difficulty and inconvenience of finding

Too many black families today cannot count on their homes being there tomorrow. And most families at the lower end of the income scale can often do little or nothing to fight back. increasingly, black families are caught in a housing crunch caused by many factors they cannot control:

Fewer affordable homes are available. Our nation is simply not building enough affordable homes to keep up with the demand. Construction starts for multi-family housing -the units low-income famileis are likely to be able to afford-fell from 456,000 in 1978 to 283,600 in 1983. The decline is

Rising costs and tighter family budgets. For the very poor, the problem of coming up with the rent money or the mortgage payment has gotten far worse in recent years. Lingering unemployment, falling incomes among the poor and

I. WHY WE BELIEVE IN MISSIONS!

- 1. Because the Great Commission commands it. Matt. 28: 18-20; Mark 16:15; Luke 24:46,47; Acts 1:8
- 2. Because all men are lost without Jesus Christ. Acts 4:12
- 3. Because Christ is the only way of salvation. John 5:24,25; Rom. 10:13-15
- 4. Because of the destiny of the unsaved. John 3:18,36; Rev. 20:15; Luke 16:19-23
- 5. Because missions bring glory to God. a. It displays His saving power.
- b. It displays His mercy and grace.
- c. Saved people praise and worship Him.

II. WHAT IS COMMANDED IN THE GREAT COMMISSION?

1. That the gospel be taught and preached to all nations.

Matt. 28:19; Mark 16:15 2. Those who believe the gospel are to be scripturally

baptized, Matt. 28:19; Acts 2:41 3. Churches must be organized so that they can carry out the great commission. NOTE: Churches on the mission field should be indigenous. To be truly "indigenous" there must be three things: (1) They must be self supporting. (Not dependent on mission dollars for building, paster or expenses). (2) They must be selfgoverning. (Not run or controlled by missionaries or any other authority, except that of God). (3) They must be self propogating. (That is that they are reproducing themselves and carrying out the

great commission). 4. The converts are to be taught the "all things" of God.

Matt. 28:20

You cannot omit any one of the above and be obedient to the great commission. The social gospel as practiced by institutional missions, is not really missions. Those who merely educate, practice medicine, raise the living standard, etc., are not doing Scriptural mission work.

> III. WHO IS COMMANDED TO CARRY OUT THE GREAT COMMISSION?

1. It was not given to the spostles. They had no successors, therefore if it was given to them, when they died, it died.

2. It was not given to a convention, association or mission board, for none of them existed at that time. 3. It was not given to individuals It should be evident to any-

one that while all may carry the gospel, they would not be qualified to baptize and teach all things. 4. It was given to the local Church (the only kind there is).

The apostles of Matt. 28:16 were first in the Church. a. Jesus promised the Church perpetuity, so she will be

on earth as long as there is a need. Matt. 16:10 b. The local Church has the authority to baptize. c. The local Church has the means of "teaching all

things." d. We have the example of Acts 13:1-4 to guide us.

IV. HOW ARE MISSIONARIES CALLED AND SENT?

- 1. They are chosen by the Holy Spirit out of a Scriptural Bible teaching Church. Acts 13:1-4
- 2. They are sent forth by the Holy Spirit and the Church.
- Acts 13:3,4 3. They are supported by the home Church and other
- churches who desire to take part in this ministry. Phil.
- 4. The missionary reports back to the local Church. Acts

V. WHERE DOES THE INDIVIDUAL CHRISTIAN FIT IN TO MISSIONS?

- 1. By being a faithful member of a Scriptural missionary minded Church. Every Christian should be a part of one.
- 2. By witnessing daily for Christ. Remember the field is the world.
- 3. By going in person as a missionary, if God calls.
- 4. By going in prayer for missionaries and their needs. 5. By going in purse, and thus give regularly, systematically,
- and sacrificially to missional The command to give the gospel to the world is clear

and unmistakable and this Commisssion was given to the Matt. 28:18-20. "And Jesus came and spake unto them,

saying, All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth. near-poor, and continued cutbacks in a range of governmen income support programs have put the squeeze on the family

But rents and mortgage payments continue to rise, with the result that they are taking a bigger and bigger bit out of the family budget. Between 1975 and 1983, the number of lowerincome households paying more than half of their incomes for rent and utilities rose from 3.7 million to 6.3 million.

Less government support than the rich. Housing costs are a large proportion of most (amilies' budgets. However, the government has stepped in to help primarily the wealthy. Billions of dollars each year in federal tax relief through the homeowner's tax deduction help the rich far more than the poor, for the simple reason that the poor are less likely to be able to afford to purchase homes in the first place. Only three percent of the federal tax breaks for owner-occupied housing goes to households with incomes of \$15,000 or less.

Direct federal housing help for low-income Americans, always short of the need, has been cut deeply in recent years.

Persistent discrimination. Regrettably, laws against race discrimination have not put a stop to it everywhere. As occurred in a Maryland case, too many landlords are now using a range of tactics -- including a bar against families -- to keep out minorities. Given the growing adults - only trend, black families now face double discrimination in looking for

The Reagan Administration is not helping but hurting by drastically cutting back on housing and other help for poor families and opposing efforts to strengthen fair housing enforcement. Our job is to fight back on their behalf and to hold our federal government accountable to its decades-old promise of "a decent home for every American family."

The Black History Class of Lubbock High School left Lubbock Friday morning, May 22, 1987, on the first ever Black History Tour of Texas.

The class, under the direction of Ms. Gloria Carter, visited Loraine, Texas, site of the Legendary Wallace Ranch, homestead of the late "80 John" Wallace - famous Black rancher during the 1800's. Then it was on to San Angelo's Fort Concho, frontier home of the 'Buffalo Soldiers'. The next stop was financially troubled Bishop College, founded in 1881 by former Black slaves, where they learned of the plight of historically Black colleges.

In Dallas, Texas, they also visited the African American Museum of Life and Culture.

The tour's next stop was Fort Worth, Texas where the class witnessed the unveiling of the Bill Pickett Bronze, first life sized sculpture of a Black Cowboy in America.

The class' final stop was in Weatherford, Texas where students visited gravesites and met with the family of great Black Cowboy Bose Ikard of the legendary Goodnight Loving Trail.

Ms. Carter explained, "The kids were so excited to see all the national media in Fort Worth and to see the descentants of all the famous people."


