"RATS ALL OVER THE CITY OF LUBBOCK," SAYS HEALTH OFFICER

T. J. Patterson, Sr.

Dr. Marjorie K. Orr. M. D., city health officer and director of the Lubbock City Health Unit, told the Lubbock Digest this week there is a rat problem in Lubbock. "Rats are all over Lubbock, not just in easi Lubbock," said the health official.

She reported that there were forty five (45) cases of rat related illness in 1979. "In a city of the affluency of Lubbock. that is absoultely too high. Perhaps there would be more if people would report their sickness. In some cases, people are just immune to the disease."

"People need to be educated about this problem in Lubbock," she said. She went on to add that the city health unit and the City of Lubbock dosen't have enough health inspectors to work in the entire area. "We need to have more

In looking at a map, which used pins to show the high concentration fo the high concentration of cat infestations here, one area (Arnett-Benson) shows a larger number of pins, according to Dr. Orr, because of more than one family living in a dwelling with a sickness. "Even in East Lubbock, many cases may not be reported to local health officials, because persons may be immune after living under these conditions for years."

In one case, Dr. Orr reported a Lubbock businessman several years ago became the victim of Salmonella, which is a direase carried by rais and spread to humans through contaminated water and food supplies. This man,

according to Dr. Orr, loss approximately \$35,000 from his business in a few weeks; his hospital bill was \$6,000 and his doctor bill was \$300. "You see, it cost more when you become ill from this disease. It is cheaper for all if there were adequate preventive health pro-

grams here." "A person dosen't have to get the disease from only eating from a local restaurant that is rat infested. One can become sick from buying food supplies from a local grocery store and taking them home for cooking," she said.

in Lubbock." According to a rat survey and rodent problems in Lubbock. Texas by James B. Montgomery, Jr., Ph.D. it states that rodent and sanitation surveys have been conducted in only East Lubbock and mentions none of the affluent areas where statistics show there is a rat problem.

Hooks: Blacks Have Long Way To Go'

Las Cruces, N. M. Benjamin Lawson Hooks, executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, told delegates to the 32nd Annual Region VI Leadership Conference here last Friday night Blacks in the United States have "come a long way but still have a long way to go."

Delegates were from Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, and New Mexico. The confernece theme was "We Just Want to be Free."

Hooks expressed concern about the increasingly conservative outlook of the American people and said President Carter's recent proposals to cut back government spending would probably adversely affect Blacks.

"We live in an age of conservatism that is sweeping across this countery like wildfire in

prairie land," he said. He said Blacks still must work to secure equal rights, and quoted from Dr. Martin Luther King's last speech in Memphis in 1968 when King said there would be "dar" and difficult days ahead."

In 1968, Hooks said, "Blacks had made much progress and had been singing 'We Shall Overcome' so long, they believed they had overcome. However, he said, this was not the

He told the more than 300 people in the

audience that it has been difficult for Blacks to secure their rights and they "must celebrate what other people take for granted. "This," he made know, "is a sad comment on the nation."

The concept of reverse discrimination is one Hooks blamed the mass media for propagating and said it is "one of the most damuable lies." He also said he was "sick of this word 'qualification.' "because it may be used to discriminate against dlacks.

"We are asking only for a chance, and if you give us a chance, we will excel at anything," he

Hooks said Blacks should make sure their children receive good educations and they should "get sense in their (children's) heads and dollars in thier pockets."

"We've got to prepare ourselves," he said. He said he was not bitter towards whites because "there are good Black folk and good white folk," and he has discovered he "can't

alford to hate." "I'm not hung up on the color question. Hooks said.

In his main address, he took time to use harsh words for Blacks who are not supporting the NAACP.

"There is not a single Black person in the country the NAACP has not helped," he said. noting that the organization has difficulty in attracting members in spite of this.

"There's something wrong," his philosophy is. "We may not get all we pay for, but we will pay for all we get."

Ms. Newsome, if you could wave a magic wand in Lubbock, what would you wish for? "I would like to see those less forunate than others have their lives improved, through self-help programs. There are many people in Lubbock who need these kinds of opportunities."

Are you a do gooder? "Perhaps I am, basically. I try to be fair with all people. I try real hard to help people. In working with his particular program, one must treat everybody fair. A Black shouldn't be given a job because he or she happens to be Black. You should always hire the person who is most qualified, regardless of the

The report also stated that rodent complaints were investigated throughout the city and a sanitation survey was conducted in part of the Arentt-Benson neighborhood from October through December.

In the report, confirmed rat infestations were found on 23 of 1355 premises (1.8%) in Cherry Point, 11 of 896 premises (1.2%) in the area between Parkway Drive and Idalou Road. and 3 of 398 premises (0.3%) in the area between Idalou Road and Loop 289. Rat infestations were also found in other residential areas in the commercial district along Avenue A. In summary, the report indicated, the rat population in Lubbock presently consists of small scattered colonies in residential area (up to 2% of the premises in

selected neighborhoods) and local concentrations around food sources in commercial areas. Rats. according to the report. are currently not a significant problem.

Believing there is a rat problem in Lubbock, Dr. Orr states: "Putting poison out to kill the rats or mice is not the solution to the problem. This is only fighting the symptom, not the cause. We need more education programs in preventive medicie to overcome this problem before it becomes an epidemic here."

"We can start now by cleaning up around our own areas of living. Again, we need good preventative programs, and they are cheaper," concluded Dr. Orr.

It could help show the way to establishing a national federal

from a wide range of disciplines, including Administration officials responsible for matters of crime and/or unemployment; law enforcement officials; economists, sociologists, criminologists and others who have studied crime and unemployment; elected officials at the national, state and local levels: business and labor leaders; and ex-offenders and persons involved in employment, counselling, and related programs. Those who will testify at the first two sessions next week will be announced on Monday.

"There is some polarization of thought at suggestions of a connection between crime and unemployment. A large body of knowledgeable people believe beyond a doubt that it exists. They point to a host of learned strictes to support their theory, buttressing it with a common sense argument. In the middle ground are many private and public organizations whose activities and responsibilities are concentrated in the areas of employment, or crime, or both, who readily admit to us that their knowledge of the connection between the two is fragmentary or non-existent. Critics of the notion say that the amount of crime related to unemployment is not significant enough to warrant government intervention and see the correlation more as the product of discredited social theories than of statistical reality," Convers said.

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
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
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Know Your City Government

Along with the adoption of the City Charter, the voters instituted the Council-Manager form of government. This system of local government combines the strong political leadership of elected officials with the strong managerial experience of an appointed City Manager. And it places the power where it belongs - in the hands of the voters. What is the council-manager plan?

"The council-manager plan is r. form of government developed in the United States to help communities overcome weakness in local government structure, and to cope with increasingly difficult and complicated urban problems, by providing for an executive appointed by and continuously responsible to a popularly elected council. In little more than a half a century it has become the most popular form of local government in the United States, and is regarded as the greatest American contribution to the improvement of government.

For what term does a city manager serve? "A city manager usually has no definite term, such as an elected official has, or a contract, such as a school superintendent has. He serves as long as the city council is satisfied with his service." Dose a city manager have sole power to appoint

department heads? "Yes, in most cases. Otherwise he cannot be held responsible for results,"






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


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EDITORIAL "WHY NOT?"

Further, we must emphasize our efforts to focus to not only work on our own efforts for Black community development. But alos with those Black organizations, churches and other instutitions that are committed to serving the needs of the Black communities. We as Black people must re-assess our situation and evaluate where we are going and pull ourselves up by whatever bootstraps we nave.

A functional illiteacy rate of better than 40 percent among Black youth which burdens everyone in America must be corrected. If we as Black people do not accept who we are and what we have to contribute to society, then decay in the forms of crime, welfare syndronie, etc. will not only destroy the Black community, but the very framework of society as well. Therefore, we must prepare ourselves to be the best. Now is the time when we all must look at ourselves in relation to Him. Our Lord and Saviour, and to all mankind. Please ask yourself: "Am I searching...for if it is to be, it is up to me?"

Almost all of our communities are torn apart, and some extremely damaged by the often helpful, but also sometimes deeply distressing circumstances of bussing our young people (white and Black) long distances from their homes. In many areas, studies show that merely sitting next to a white youngster does not insure increased learning skills. Teacher caring and a security of environment often are admittedly the most productive considerations.

The overall results of operating under extreme solitary intentions of the "school integration" umbrella that has 40% or better functional illiteracy level, surely indicates that ... at this point ... other avenues need exploring for the good of both Black and white Americans. We all know that we need "desegregation". Getting bogged down in integregation as a helpful assist to education often effectively has sidetracked us. We need to get back on

One of the secondary and quite important intents of school "integregation" always has been to assist white America by inculcating a better and more realistic image among white Americans of Black Americans and of Black America as a whole. While there is evidence that for greater understanding has been achieved in this regard during this trial much bitterness and resentment also has engendered in this process. Many (including us) believe this aspect now can be achieved in a far better way and that some alternatives should be explained. Next week an alternative

Remember to have a strong united Black community, we must go back to the basics of a strong United Black Family.

Safeguards are Needed for Hatch Act Reform

If Congressman Bill Clay and others are successful, the 40 year old Hatch Act which was denied federal c'/ilian and postal workers the right to participate in partisan politics will be amended to right this injustice.

Hopefully, this sought after political freedom will not result in supevisors and managers intimidating and harassing subordinates of different political pesuasion. But, it is a very real possibility and it will be

difficult — although not impossible to police supervisors and managers to ensure they are not interjecting partisan politics in the workplace.

As a union official heding up the National Alliance

As a union official heding up the National Alliance of Postal and Federal Employees, I can vouch for what this union's response would be to a political discriminatin complaint. The National Alliance as any other union representing government empoyees would pursue it vigorously with all the resources available to us.

But seemingly, there should be adequate safeguards included in the amendment to the Act to protect federal workers from the type of mistreatment I have described.

While I am aware the Civil Service Reform Act of 1978 includes a provision for the Merit Systems Protection Board's Special Counsel to investigate charges of political discrimination, it is a well known fact that the Office of Special Counsel lacks adequate funding and resources to conduct this and other types of investigations.

As some watchdogs of the federal personnel scepe have already pointed out there is a need for the Special Counsel to have an effective investigative arm which is fully capable of pursuing charges of discrimination against employees on the basis of partisan politics.

I hope those reading this column — especially blacks — will not think I am opposing amending the Hatch Act. Clearly, I am not. Political freedom is a right that should be enjoyed by everyone. More than likely, blacks in the federal and postal service will be able to develop some real political clout if they are able to engage in off-duty partisan politics. My only fear is that too often we cannot see the forest for the trees. There is an inherent danger that workers may have to bear the subtle and sometimes undetectable wrath of their bosses because of active is volvement in the political process.

It is my deep consistion that the only way to afford the 2.d million federal civilian and postel was ers the right to engage in the political process, without impairing the quality of government service is to make sure that any enacted amendments to the Hatch Act contain strong, enforceable provisions that would guarantee protection to federal workers from abuse or harassment by their bosses.

Minorities and the Political Experience: In Southern New Mexico and most of the Texas Plains. Chicanos, blacks and maverick whites from independently minded urban neighborhoods—are all struggling to make themselves heard in areas so long ruled by conservative business establishments.

In Hobbs, New Mexico and Clovis which have the largest black populations in the state, no black has ever been elected to a city or county office, with a notable exception of Hobbs, where a black has been elected to a school board position. A black was elected to a council position in Carlsbad, New Mexico some years ago. Every now and then a Chicano has been elected to the city council in Clovis and once in Hobbs but was defeated when he ran for re-election.

In Odessa, Texas a black was elected in recent years to the city council by a combination of black and brown votes and since, the black has been elected by the same combination, to a position on the county commission. In Midland, no black has ever been elected to erve on the city council, altho a black has served on the school board in the Midland area.

In Lubbock. Texas which has one of largest black populations on the Plains, no black has ever served on the city council, however a black woman was elected to the school in recent years but was not re-elected. When this correspondent asked why Lubbock had not given blacks representation to the city council, a prominent black woman replied: "Bob, it just seems tobe that the rank and file of us are not ready for political responsibility. And too, we are suffering from a lack of black leadership in Lubbock."

In the mean ime Houston, Dallas and San Antonio, may well turn out to be more cosmopolitan and politically competitive, more attuned to energy conservation, neighborhood and poverty issues than it has in the past. And as Neal Pierce, noted columnist points out "none of tis means Texas will be transformed overnight into a high-tax, high-spending mirror of Northern metropolises."

But the signs of change of a breakup of teh monolithic rule of big business circles are particularly evident in the big cities, Pierce points out.

One of the greatest drawbacks against minority representation in many areas has been the at-large voting prevalent in Southern New Mexico and West Texas, one black leader pointed out. In 1975 the U.S. Department of Justice reviewed electoral districts and annexations with the goal of preventing discrimination against minorities.

Results were amazing. Houston's council, previously elected all at-large, suddenly has geographical districts for nine of its 14 seats and includes for the first time in history, three blacks, its first Mexican-American and first two women council persons.

San Antonio which has also dropped its business-controlled at-large system in favor of districting, now has a council closely balanced between affluent conservatives and more liberal Chicanos and blacks. It is reported that there will be launced soon more efforts by black and brown leaders in such areas as Midland, Odessa, Lubbock, Amarillo, Hobbs, Clovis and Roswell, all in New Mexico, to ask U.S. Department of Justice to force division of cities into separate rather than at-large legislative districts, a parallel effort to city council districting.

A rising lide of Texas Republicanism seems evident as witness the 1978 election of the GOP's William Clements as governor and black leaders are saying that Republicans have an opportunity to win thousands of black voters if they will lend their efforts to grant more black and brown r. presentation in many Texas. 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



Eliminate Emotional Fatigue and Tension

Dear Dr. Faulkner:

I am interested in finding ways to relieve myself of emotional fatigue and tension. Can you recommend ways todo this? M. Cairn, Philadelphia, Pa.

Dear M. Cairn:

There are many successful techniques that you can use to eliminate emotional fatigue and tension. At my Stress Prevention and Control Clinics, many people have significantly improved their lives with methods that are proven, safe, and beneficial.

Tension is the opposite of relaxation. Worry usually causes the mind to send signals of distress to the muscles which become easily tensed and tightened.

People who have routine, unchallenging jobs tend to become bored, frustrated, and antagonized. They have plenty of time to worry and to create things to worry about. This is stress and stress causes tension.

If one concentrates on thoughts of relaxing scenery; a vacation; the beach; being with good friends; and doing the things that he enjoys doing, he is likely to send positive signals to his body that relax him. On the other hand, if he concentrates on probleuis; unplesant experiences; fears; and unhappiness, he is likely to find his body in a stressful and tense condition.

The mind profoundly influences the body. This is exemplified by the persons who suffers an upset stomach because he was told, and believed that he had mistakenly eaten chocolate covered cockroaches when he thought that he was crunching on candy. The point is this: when you think about pleasant thiags, you tend to become relaxed; when you think about unpleasant things, your body becomes tense.

Your imagination is a powerful force. Here are some facts:

(1) Your imagination affects your emotions. It is for this reason that when you simply, imagine yourself in a fearful situation, you begin to tremble. (2) The imagination is

a two-sided sword. It can

hurt and it can heal, When it is not managed by you, your imagination is likely to be destructive and out of contro! causing doubt, Iris of confidence, shyness, fear, and depression. It can breed jealousy, envy. hate, and can keep you from getting along with

others. (3) The imagination has unlimited potential to help. When used positively, your imagination can bring about happiness, confidence, constructive ideas, and knowledge.

(4) The imagination can treat ideas that solve your problems and help you to cope with those that cannot be solved; it can anticipate; forecast and plan ahead. Remember, you can be your greatest asset or your greatest enemy - if you expect to fail, you are likely to fail; if your expect to succeed, you

are likely to succeed. Your imagination controls your destiny. Your mind is like computer in that it has recorded all of your experiences - good and bad. Fcars, phobias, hates, and loves are all there - waiting to be recalled by you. You

should always imagine yourcelf being successful, secure, and happy. These thoughts determine how you will act in relation to your family, friends, job, and problems. By thinking positively,

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

Black Caucus In Opposition

The Congressional Black Caucus last week issued a statement opposing the latest round of budget cuts in domestic social programs as a cure for inflation. Instead the Caucus is calling upon the Administration to impose stringent mandatory controls on prices, wages,

and dividends. The Caucus asserts that spending reductions for health, housing. education, economic development, and employment and training programs will have a tremendous negative effect on economic prosperity. The employment rate will increase far beyond the Administration's earlier estimate of 7.5% by the end of this year. Additinally, the Congressional Budget Office estimates that a SLAPSTIX

\$20 billion dollar decrease in the federal budget will only reduce inflation by 0.1% after two years time.

Congresswoman Car-

diss Collins. Chairwoman of the Congressional Black Caucus stated. "The source of the problem of the nation's economic woes is the gross imbalance between the real 5% decrease in wages, the 20% to 35% increase in corporate profits, and the decline in public outlays for domestic purposes. By controlling inflation for the basic necessities of energy, food, housing and health care, (which rose by 10.8% in 1976 and 17.6% in 1979), the Caucus believes that inflation will decrease, taking the pressure off of wage earners, taxpayers and consumers."





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As I See It

As this writer looks back over hillife, it is easy to see that there are somethings in which younger Blacks today don't realize. As one talks to these young Black boys and girls, one can easily detect they are not truly proud of who they are or who; their roots are embedded in history. It appears as though many of them (not all) take for granted that riding in the front of the bus, drinking water out of a fountain in some county facility, or working with members of the majority has always been a reality.

As often as possible, this writer quizzes these young people on who they are and what are their goals in life. Many times, it's very interesting as to the answers one will receive.

Looking back over the years, this writer who taught school at Mary & Mac Private School (located then at 1324 East 24th and later moving to its new location at 902 East 28th Street), can runember when school teachers (public or private) were more visible in the community. Not only did these Black teachers (who in my opinion were number one in instruction), work hard in the classroom, but were most active in the Black community. They were energetic participants in the church, social functions (holding annual balls and cultural events), and visinging with many Black boys and girls.

Today, since the signing of the twenty-six year old law which made segregation a "no no", these Black teachers are not as involved, in this writer's opinion. Of course, they are just as hard working in the classroom and are good, but they apparently don't see the need or getting involved in the community setting. At one time, the football coach, in particular, made it mandatory that the football team (Panther's squad then) be seen frequently in some church in the Black community. This, too, has become a "no no" today.

Anyway, these qualified and dedicated educators are needed in the Black community of Lubbock today. It would make good sense if many of us would let them know they are among our leaders and their input in vitally needed from the classroom to the church house. Perhaps with more community involvement in the Black community, some of the problems they are having in the public school system would be shared to the community and or a broad base support will be

Not only this, but, who knows, maybe (just maybe) this Lubbock Independent School District would have an assistant superintendent. Yes, there are those in he Black community with experience to become an assistant superintendent. With proper administrative development in this school district, this person or persons could become a superintendent one day. ********

Looking back over the years, this writer can recall how much fun it was to go to school. Although there were not many modern cafeteria facilities in my school district (Wichita Falls), it was fun to carry a syrup bucket with my dinnur (not dinner) wich included an egg samwich (not sandwich), occassionaly some fat back, and maybe, (just maybe) a nickle to buy some milk. Those tennis shoes, worn in spring and winter, were in style, along with those frided blue jeans. Even the white bucks were something to be desired by every young Black brother with this very close (nearly baid) haircut. If you were fournate and had thie hair, then the pompodre was what was happening.

Bussing was not a neccesity in my community, but a few were used to bring in young Blacks from surrounding communities who didn't have a high echool and couldn't attend a white school in those days.

No matter how many problems this writer encountered as a young Black in high school, there were still ifmer to have fun and enjoy being who you were. For example, the majority of the kids in my high school had a nick name. This was something in which we called each other, rather than the given name. My nickname (one in which I really didn't like) was chinchilla (a small rodent). Day, this made me mad' when someone especially a girls would say: "Hey, Chinchilla!" There were other such as: Skinny, Fatso, Muscles (who was given to the skinnest person in class), Trash Can, Dump Ground, Snuff, Cowboy, Bubber, Junior, Feet, Kool Breeze, Smudge, Soot, and many, many others.

Many ccame rather angry when called these nick names. But to look back today, one can't help but laugh on the various ones. It was fun, in most cases, Young Blacks today apparently don't enjoy this fun and laughter. Maybe I'm wrong, but there is no indication of this gesture. Are we becoming too modern or too white?

For the heck of it young Elacks, ask your mom and dad or even grandma and grandpa about their nickname. They, perhaps, will tell it to you. As they do, they may just laugh about it. Now, don't get carried away and laugh the second time with them. They might not like it. Anyway, ask them their

Oh, by the way, od you have a nickname? If so, let this writer hear from you. As I See it, these were fun days with many obstacles to be hurdled over each day of my young life.

ARE BLACK COLLEGES "INFERIOR?"

Dr. Kenneth B. Clark, a graduate school admissions Through its "atmosphere of disturbance with some deeply negative remarks he made concerning the nation's black colleges. Writing in The Nation, Dr. Clark states: "Actually, black colleges who come from black-orientperpetuate inferior academic standards for black students and award Jim Crow degrees that do not meet the standards of the average traditionally white colleges.

"It is significant that nowhere in the 'evidence' presented by those who seek to justify the special mission of the traditionally black colleges is there any description of systemetic educational remediation, and concentrated enrichment programs designed to raise the academic level of these students, so that they can in fact meet the same stanuards of academic, professional and occupational performance that whites do."

There is no clear, crisp and direct answer to what Dr. Clark says here. But its message is inescapable...and it. serves as a reeded and direct challenge to those longdenied, and now extremely salutary, institutions for many otherwise marginal people. For this, Dr. Clark must be commended.

There are, however, at least several things which I would think should be said by way of response, and which may paint a vastly different type of picture of infinitely greater validity in support of the tremendous worthwhileness of black colleges among us.

1. Graduate School Admissions. The record of recent aptitude for college work.

There could hardly be a clearer test of adequacy, competency or even of excellence than the record of graduate school achievement. On this score, our nation's black colleges repeatedly

> 2. Undergraduate Readiness. A number of our black colleges-as with our older independent or church-related white colleges-began as high schools. Then they added collegiate departments. These schools have retained much of their original spirit of "college readiness training." Several examples tell much of the broader story. Bethune-Cookman College in Daytona Beach, Florida has a high record of undergraduate scholastic achievement based on nationwide test scores. Yet this institution has always had a remedial outlook. For years its students excelled when they moved on to the prestigicus graduate schools, and

come out on top.

England - Of far greater racial importance here than the dramatic events in Zimbabwe is the growing place occupied by Third World minorities throughout the British Isles.

Since World War II, and most precipitously so since the early 1960's, Africans and Asians from British Commonwealth nations have been "heading home" to tradition ly white Great Britain. The present government of Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, reflecting the "pro-white" mood of the nation's majority, has sought some fresh means to halt the influx and to stabilize relations between the new racial minorities and the long-established white majority.

Britain has only 1.9 million Asians and Africans among its populations of 56 million-thus reflecting only a 3.4 percent minority population proportion. But Britain has traditionally been a population-exporting nation and not a population-

receiving nation. While as a Prime Minister in office, Mrs. Thatcher has modified her racial stance, she had earlier encouraged a conservative mood when she said: "The moment a minority threatens to become a big one, people get frightened. The British character has done so much for democracy, for law, that if there is any fear that it might be ramped, people are going to react and be rather hostile to those coming to." England - Of major significance to black Americans is the current campaign of "Amnesty International," which is headquartered here, to encourage the United States to move decisively toward the abolition of the death penalty.

Late last year, Amnesty International, a world-wide association devoted to the extension of global human rights, called on President Carter to establish a prodential commission on the uses of the death penalty in the United States.


Both black and white Americans have tended to overlook the world-wide hapact of gun-carrying and the cheap sense of value toward human life which the American use of the death penalty have in foreign eyes. For this reason largely, Andrew Young's remarks regarding American political repression simply could not be rightly understood.

Amnesty International noted that "the death penalty in the United States. . . (may) constitute a serious violation of the most basic internationally recognized human rights-the right to life and the right not to be subjected to cruel, inhuman and degrading punishment," The international organization noted that it believes that the creation of a presidential commission "will demonstrate ... the U.S. Government commitment to human rights at home as well as abroad."

siderations in college recruitment. The implications should soon be felt in employment and upgrading procedurer within the federal government and at all levels of state, local and private institutional life.

The Department of Health and Social Services (HSS) has issued guidelines on how the nation's 3,000 colleges and universities can use affirmative action principles in admission policies without violating the ban on strict racial or ethnic quotas in the U.S. Supreme Court Bakke decision.

It is important for all black Americans to note the scope of the federal guidelines. They specifically encourage: consideration of race, color or national origin as a positive factor, like geographic origin or economic circumstances; increased recruiting in minority communities; modifying admission criteria for minority applicants; offering tutoring and other special services; or pursuing numerical "goals" to achieve the racial and other ethnic composition desired.

Washington, D.C. -Blacks and American Indians still lag in the purcuit and winning of doctoral degrees.

While white women represent 5 times the number of blacks, "blacks" (as a category including black women) have received only one-eighth the number of doctoral degrees as white women, in the latest surveys of doctoral degree recipients. It has been held by major civil rights advocates that Asian Americans and white women should not be dealt with as being in nearly the same category of disability due to discrimination as are black Americans.

Between 1976 and 1978, the number of blacks and American Indians receiving doctoral degrees actually decreased, while the number of Asian-Americans, Hispanics and white women increased.

Black Americans thus have been urged to be alert to the dangers inherent in a gapwidening process-and assuredly not progress-currently underway.

Rochester, N.Y. - Eastman Kodak Company late last year announced "proudly" that it was providing \$118,350 to predominantly black colleges. At the same time, it was granting \$150,000 to colleges in South Africa!

Furthermore-over a period of 25 years, Kodak has contributed more than \$60 million to white colleges and universities-and only \$4 million to black colleges.


