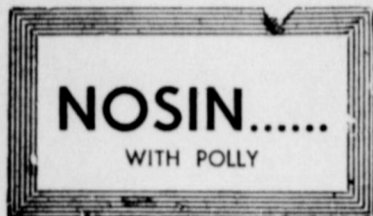

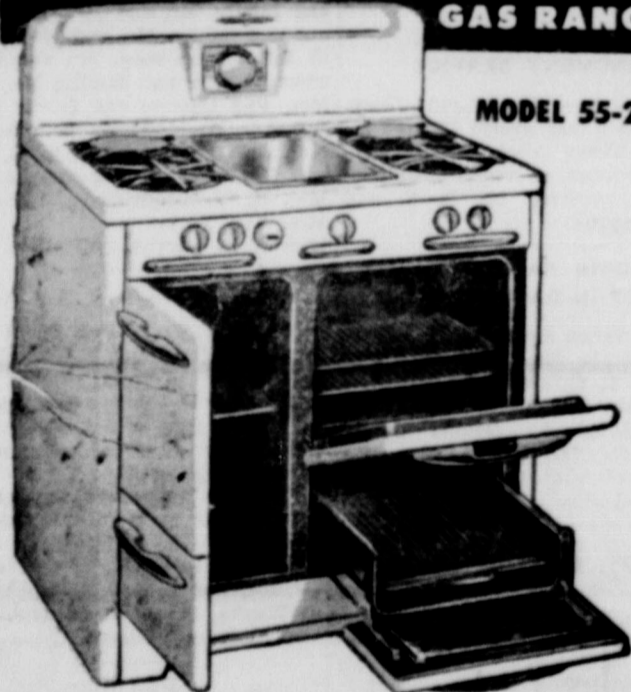

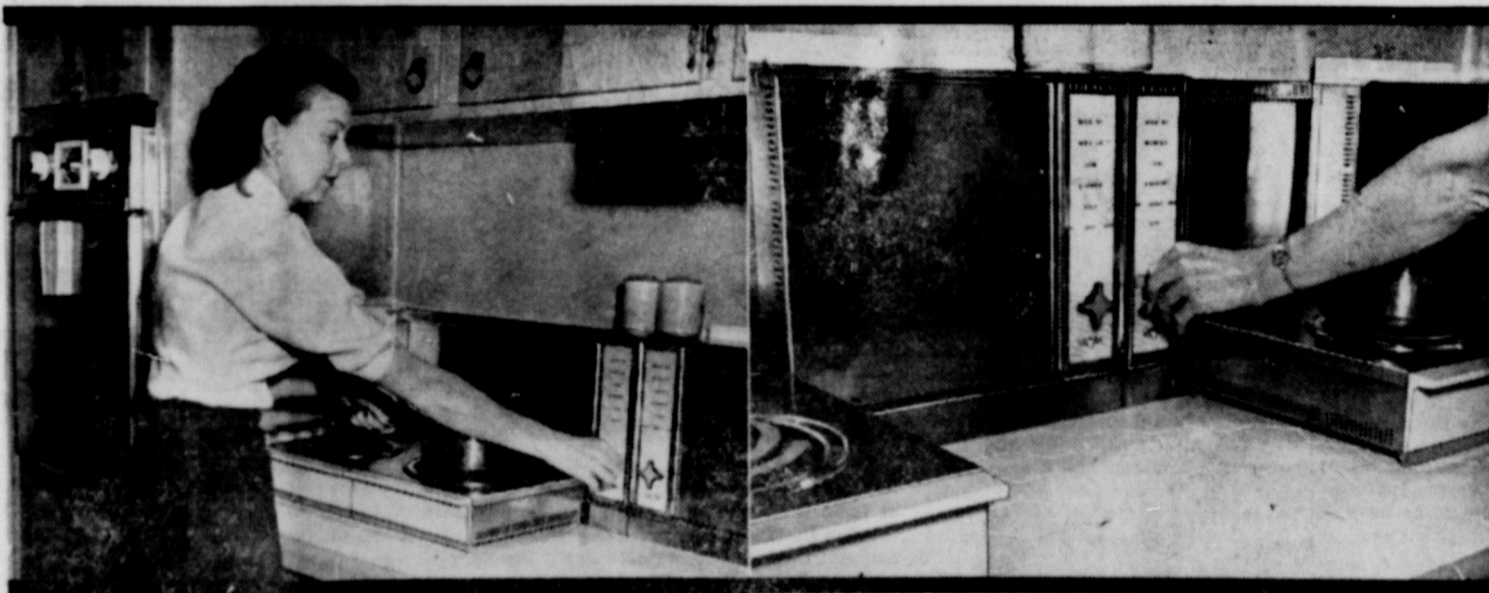

Elimination of risk with greater assurance of profit from flat storage of grain or seed, on the farm, is possible where the farmer has made provision for aeration of the stored grain.

Aeration prevents excessive moisture from forming on top of the grain and, in addition, cools the grain, thereby preventing insect and small rodent growth. Since grain is usually cut with a moisture content of about 13%, it is practical to maintain that percentage with aeration equipment.

The easiest way to accomplish aeration is to have a well advised installation consisting of a wire mesh tunnel running the length of the storage building, at one end of which is an electrically driven fan capable of pulling or pushing large volumes of air through the grain. Since aeration is simply a matter of cooling and maintaining quality after the grain has been dried to desirable moisture content, good aeration equipment can be used successfully for fumigation.

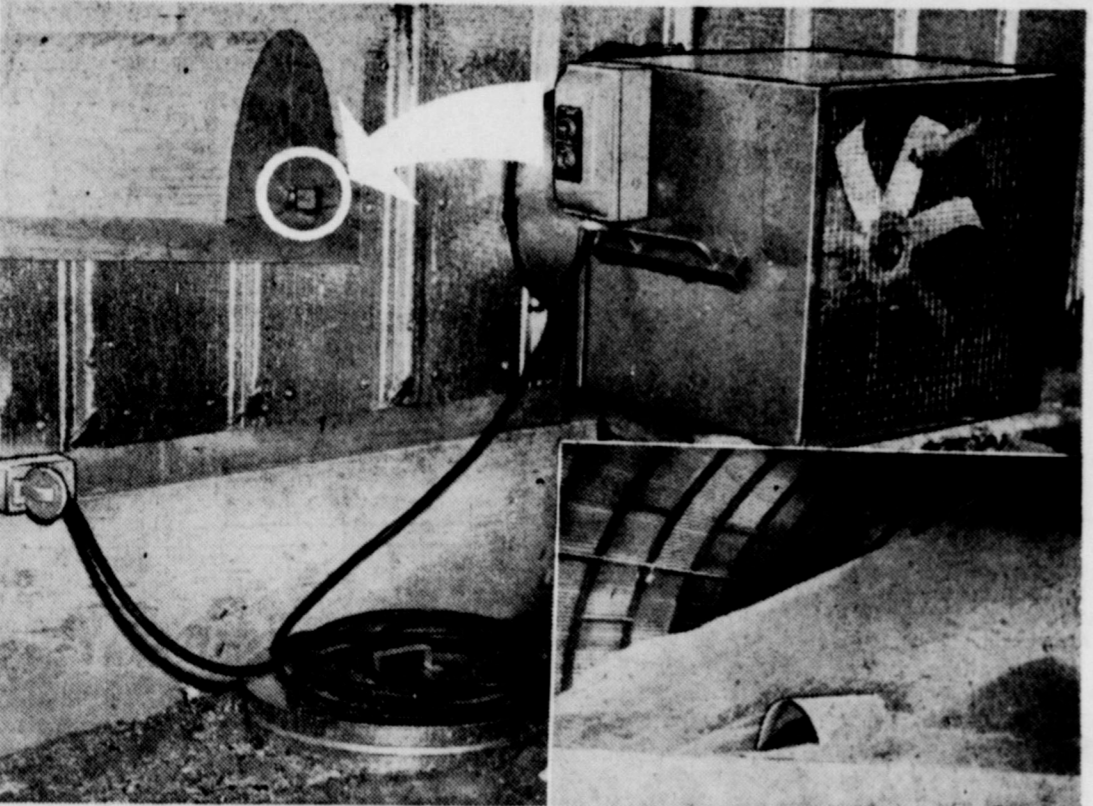
Some grain growers have at-

tempted to dry high-moisture-content grain with aeration equipment, however, this practice is not recommended because upwards of ten to twenty-five times greater air moving capacity must be employed. In drying, air is "pushed" through the grain rather than "pulled" through as in aeration.

Farmers have found that by storing grain on the farm, with proper anti-spoilage equipment, they have good returns for labor performed, good return on investment through saving the usual storage fees and grain handling costs. In addition, the grower maintains control of his crop, and he can sell whenever the market looks best.

Information on grain storage equipment is available through college agricultural departments and equipment suppliers.

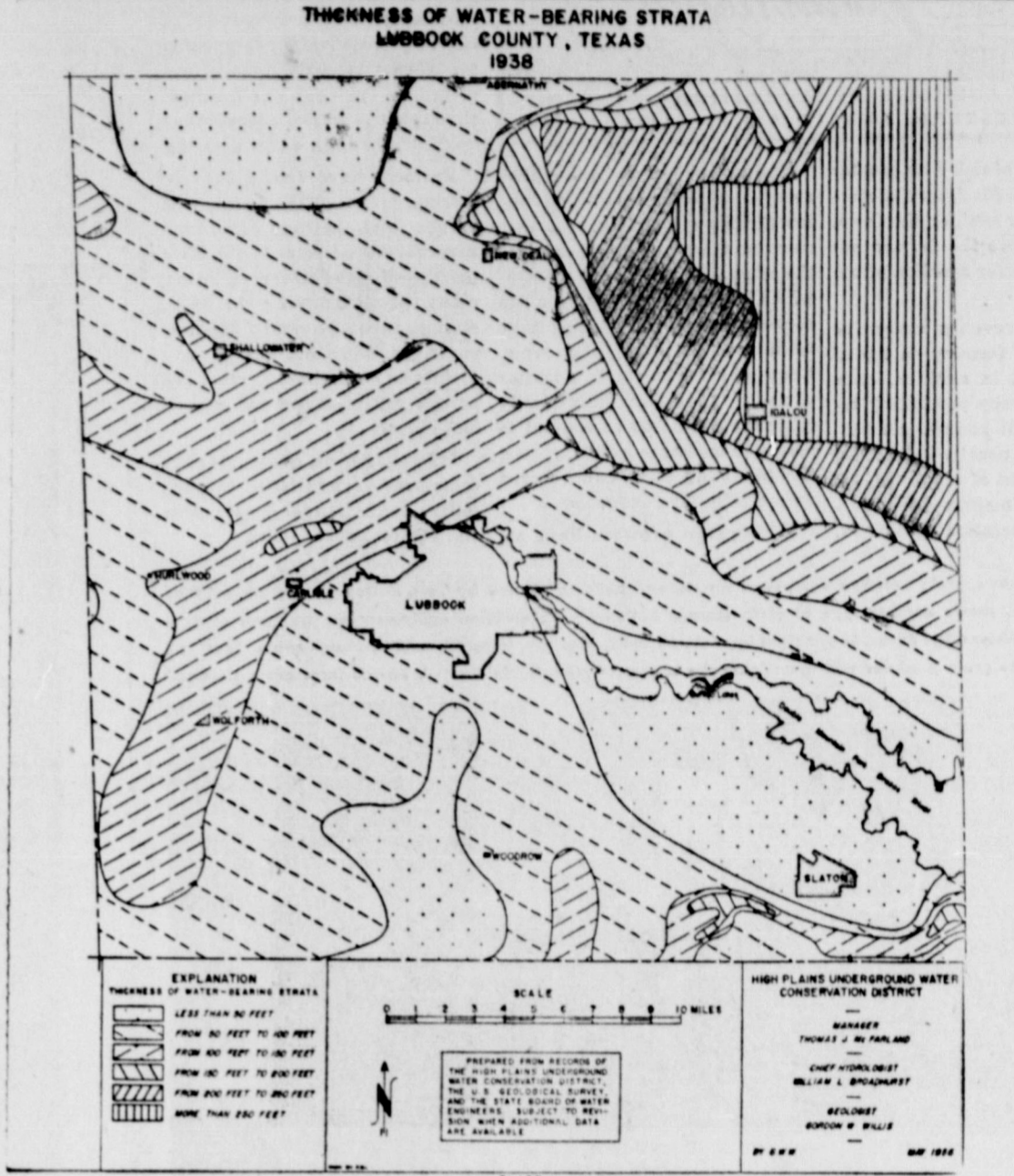
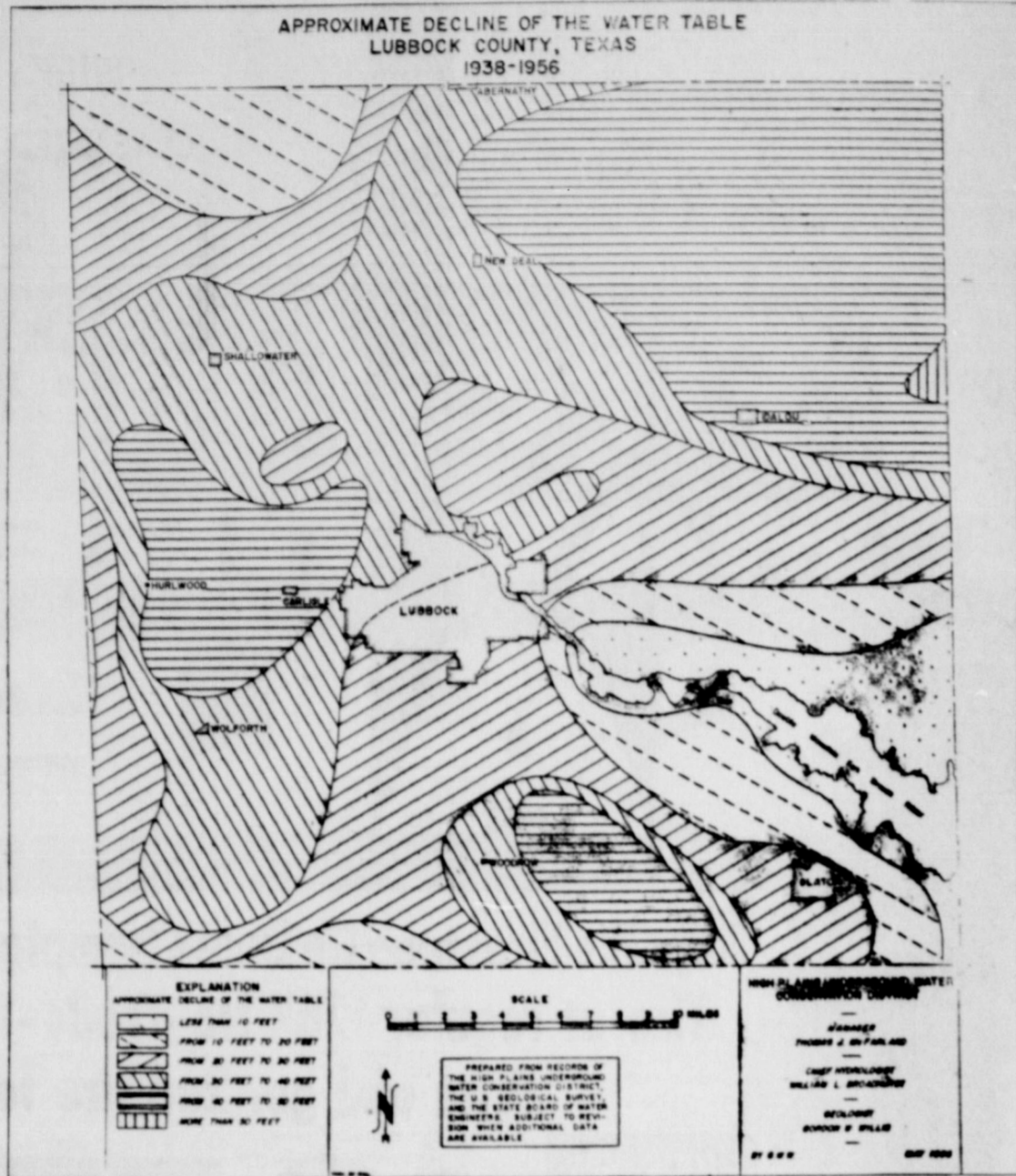

Lubbock County in January 1956 contained about 4,630,000 acre-ft. of ground water available for pumping in 1938. Lubbock County contained about 7,350,000 acre-ft. of ground water available for pumping and about 2,720,000 acre-feet or 37 percent of the water was pumped from 1938 to 1956.

The map in plate 1 shows the thickness of the water-bearing strata in the Ogallala formation in 1938 before an appreciable amount of water had been pumped from the reservoir. The map in plate 2 shows the decline of the water table from the spring of 1938 to January 1956.

The volume of water remaining in the underground reservoir was determined by subtracting the volume of material unwatered since 1938 from the volume of saturated material in 1938 and multiplying the remainder by the coefficient of storage of 1. percent.

Some of the irrigation wells in the north central part of Lubbock County draw water from crevices and solution channels in limestone strata in the Cretaceous rocks which underlie the Ogallala formation in that area. Pumping from the so-called "crevice wells" causes a decline of the water table in the Ogallala formation. The thickness of the water-bearing material in the Ogallala formation underlying any particular farm, therefore, is a practical measure for the determination of the quantity of water in storage available for pumping.

Some areas in the eastern part of Lubbock County have a hundred or more feet of water-bearing material, however, some of the irrigation wells have rather meager yields in gallons per minute. Logs of many of the wells in the eastern part of the county show

mainly of very fine grained sandy clay and clay. These fine grained materials reduce the permeability of the water bearing strata, and are responsible for the meager yields of the wells.
