No Visible Change In School Rift

There is no discernable change from last week in the controversy over the location of the new Springlake school buildings.

No materials have yet been delivered and no work commenced. However, school board members say they know of no reason why it should not commence any day, as soon as the contractor can get delivery on materials. The appellants have no comment to make except that they will file in district court an appeal to the Nov. 8 decision of the State Board of Education. That decision confirmed the school board's authority to decide where the buildings should be located. They say that the school board in signing a contract last week violated a signed statement it's lawyers submitted to the district court last summer, in which they stated that they did not intend to let any building contracts until the litigation was completed.

The appellants have until Nov. 23 to file their appeal in district court.

Farm Chemical Is Doubling Its Cage Capacity

Farm Chemical Company, operated by Sandy Sanderson and Bill Barrow, began work this week on the construction of housing and cages for nearly one thousand more laying hens at its Springlake plant. An "el" will be constructed on their present building which will enable them to nearly double the capacity of their caged egg operation.

Construction is expected to take only a few days, but it will be five months or more before the additional hens will be available for commercial production.

The operators only recently started marketing locally the production from their first thousand caged hens and say the market is two or three times as great as they are able to supply.

In addition to doubling their own capacity, they also plan to market eggs produced in the new 1000 hen cage plant now under construction by Bill Struve just outside Earth.

Sanderson says they are now getting about 70 percent daily production from their hens and expect that to increase that to over 80 percent when they cull the flock. Hens in cages should be replaced after about one year of production, they say.

Four Who Left School Have Been Expelled; One Is Back

Two Springlake High School boys admitted to Deputy Sheriff Randolph this week that they fired fifteen shots through the school's front door on the Sunday evening after the referendum on the location of the new school buildings. They denied that there was any connection between the voting and the shooting, but said they did it because they were mad at some of the teachers.

Local Man Charged In Burglary

They took full responsibility for the shooting, but said some other pupils were in on the initial planning. They said there was also a plan to put a stink bomb in the building the following week, but it never materialized. Possibly the reason it did not was that on the following Thursday school officials tore the whole thing wide open when they took a drunk student home after the noon hour, then searched student's cars, looking for liquor. They found the liquor and also a .22 caliber pistol which officers thought might have been used in the shooting incident. (It was not. A rifle was later found to have been the weapon used to perforate the school door.)

After the searching incident which was started by school officials but completed by Deputy Sheriff McClary, four students left school, they were informed, after an emergency board meeting, that when they returned they would be punished. When they had not returned by Monday all four were expelled. One returned yesterday and was reinstated.

One of the confessed participants in the shooting was among the three who have stayed away from school. The other was picked up by Randolph at the school during the noon hour Wednesday. The boys were taken to Littlefield Wednesday and interviewed by the county attorney because of their ages and the fact that they had not been in trouble here before, no charges were filed. However, authorities took note of the fact that just six days after the shooting affair, the same two boys were jailed in Mexico and paid fines before they were released in the custody of one of the boys' father. Local authorities warned that if any more vandalism occurred severe measures would probably have to be employed in dealing with it.

Dimmitt is the only undefeated team in the district and Amherst's only conference defeat came at the hands of the Springlake eleven last Friday. Springlake's only conference loss was to Dimmitt the week before.

Dimmitt has lost only one game this season, losing a non-conference game to highly touted Hale Center in an early season clash, and the Bobcats could have some trouble with the Bulldogs of Coach Lamar Kelley.

If Amherst was to beat Dimmitt and Springlake edge Sudan, the district would be thrown into a three-way tie and the representative would be chosen by the flipping of a coin or drawing out of a hat.

he says he doesn't mind—that they can't bother him. They bothered one of his hands once though. He was only trying to get a drink of water at the hydrant, but the bees thought his head was a good place to swarm. He headed back to Mexico and hasn't been seen since. But the animal they like best doesn't produce a thing useful. He is their big German Shepherd, Posie, who weighs 125 pounds already and still just a big footed pup. They think he may get as large as his 140 pound father. He is quite gentle with reporters but makes a good watch dog when Mrs. Fennell is at home alone. Riesel says the big pup is just like one of the children except that he minds a lot better. The Fennells have lived on their half section farm northwest of Earth since 1936. They came here from Pauls Valley, Oklahoma. They did all right here dry land farming until 1948, when they started irrigating. Now they don't see how they could ever make a crop without those wells. They are practically kin folks to Nossin' Polly, who was a good friend of their nephew in Holdenville back in Okla. And I guess that's how we got onto this story about the unusually good log of egg producing they do.

No More Waking At 5 a.m. To Turn On The Henhouse Lights

The R. K. Fennells have figured out ways to make their hens pay off without going to a lot of trouble with them. Riesel says they don't make much, but that they manage to trade enough at the grocery store to pay for their groceries. (That's big money to a poor old reporter with a nest full of hungry mouths to feed.) But it turns out that they also supply the

school cafeteria with a large part of their requirements. The Fennells have been in the egg business off and on since 1941 and used to work pretty hard at it. This year, though, they have only 300 hens and they have put in labor saving equipment to help take care of them. For instance, they don't even have to turn over in bed anymore to turn on the

lights in the chicken house. An automatic set up which Carrol Blackwell found for them automatically turns on the lights at any hour they wish, and turns them off at the right time too. And they have the latest feeding and watering equipment to simplify the chores. The Fennells like white leghorns thinking that they lay more eggs per pound of feed consumed. They are high volume producers too and get started earlier, Mrs. Fennell says most of this flock started laying at four months and they are getting 50 percent daily production before the first calling. Mr. Fennell says he will cull out the loafers shortly and then expects to get 70 percent production right through the winter. These folks have a lot of bees working for them too. The only work for the Fennells in that enterprise is robbing the hives twice a year. That is Riesel's job and

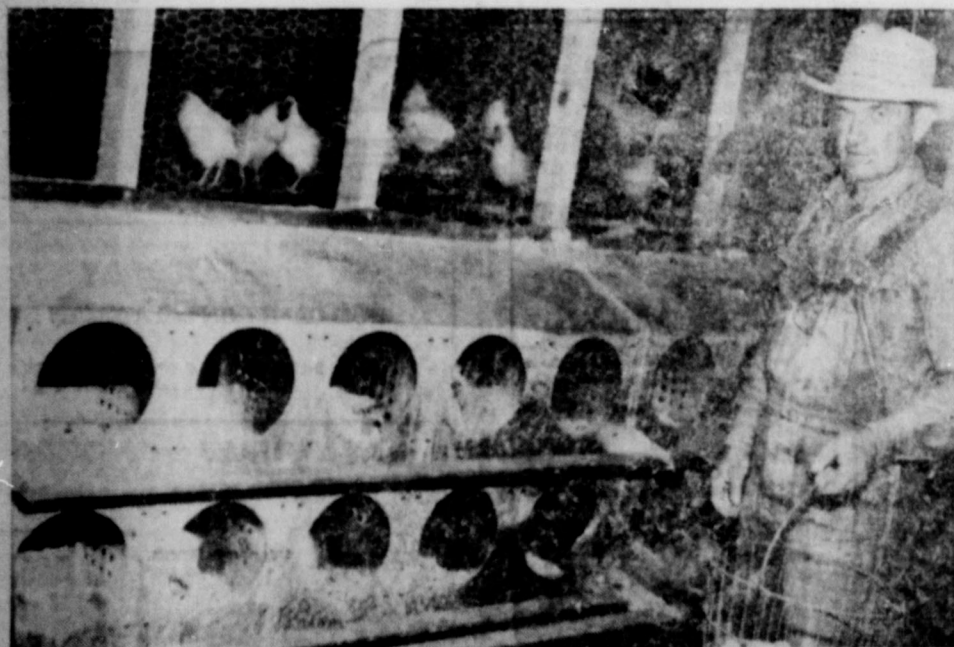

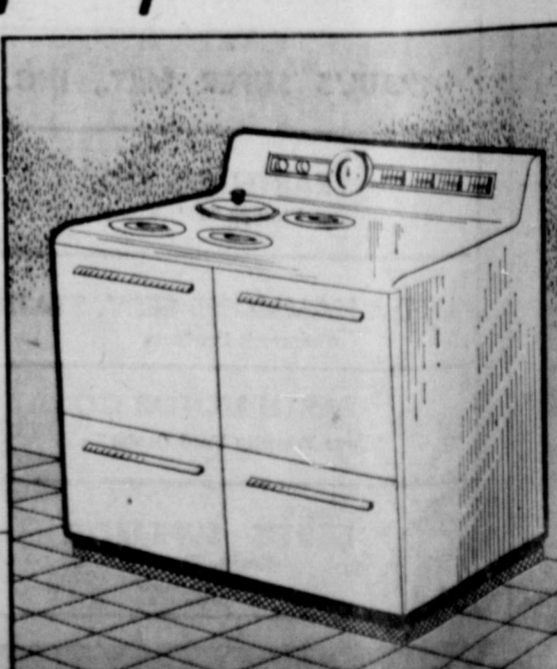

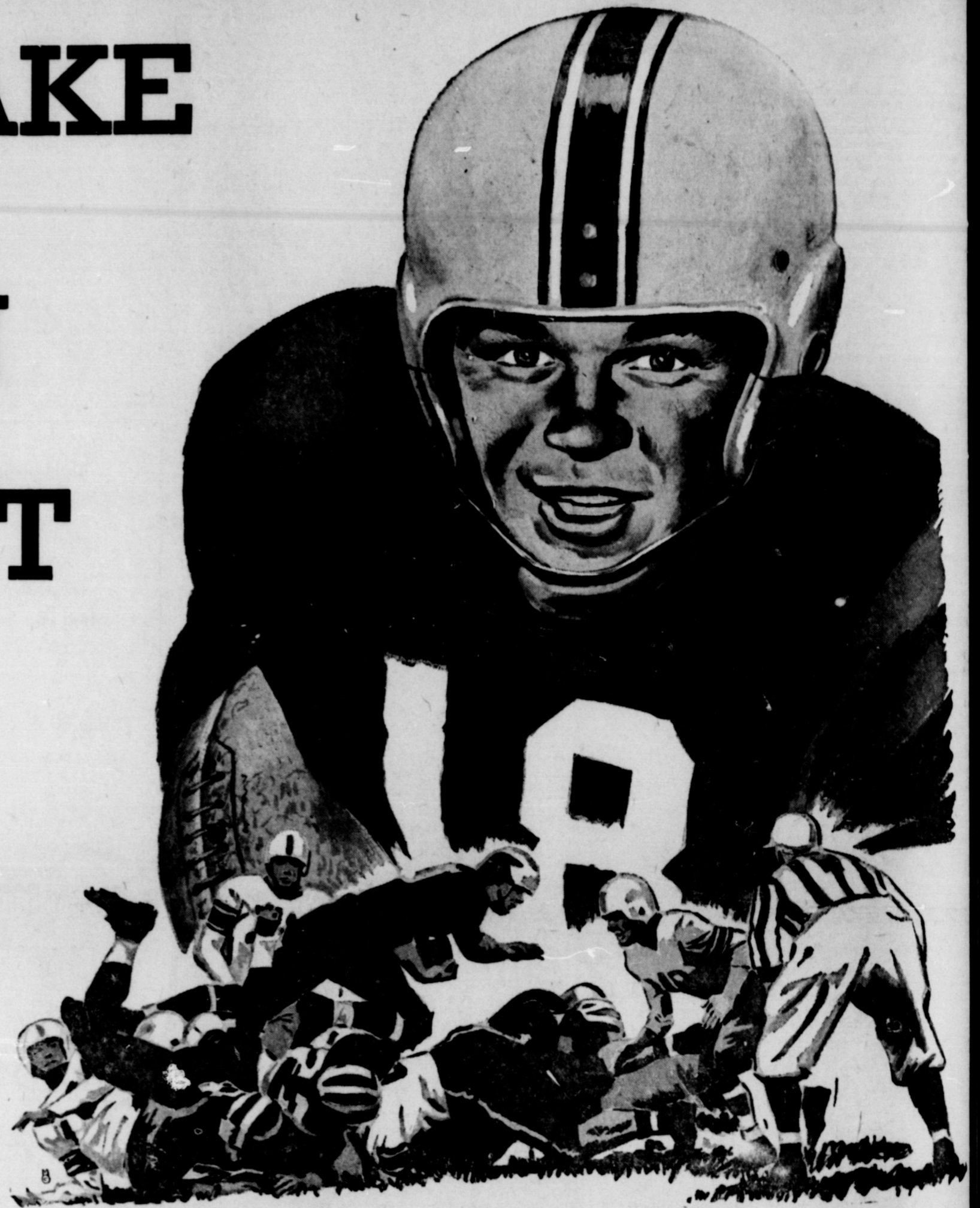

AUSTIN, Texas—Tourists are detouring Texas. James F. Melton, acting director of the governor's economic advisory commission, says that Texas' gain in manufacturing and employees, from 1947 to 1952, ranked among the nation's highest—but that the tourist trade fell off sharply. Melton says Texas is losing 800,000 visitors a year.

The state's economy expert estimates the state's loss of potential income as 77 million dollars for the past two years alone.

He blames the states constitutional proviso which prohibits Texas from advertising for tourist business.

Shivers' Hat

Parents of children in Austin's Pease school will have a chance Nov. 19 to bid on the Panama hat worn by Governor Allan Shivers during the gubernatorial campaign.

Shivers donated the hat, a tie, and some aprons, for the school's annual harvest festival.

Final Election Returns

Final reports from the Texas Election Bureau show that Governor Shivers rolled to a 521,373 to 62,907 victory over Republican opponent Tod R. Crockett.

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson received 491,228 votes to Republican Carlos Watson's 85,079.

Mystery Blasts

Central Texas residents read of another "mystery blast" last week. This time it was at Granger. But as in the previous seven cases no cause could be found.

First blast of the series came in September in Austin. Cause of the blasts has been attributed to everything from jet planes breaking the sound barrier to small boys playing with dynamite.

Inductions vs. Separations

More Texans left the service last month than entered. Separations numbered 5,365 while inductions totaled 4,691, including six Texas draftees.

Mental Care

An 11-point improvement program has been outlined by the State Hospital board, for the care of mentally retarded children and adults.

Improvements, in general, will follow recommendations made to the board by the Texas Research League.

In its report, the League listed 5,865 mentally retarded persons as presently in need of state facilities—over half of whom are not in these special schools.

Also recommended by the League was a 5,000 bed increase over the present 3,000 bed system.

Housing Act Aids Building

Passage of the 1954 Housing Act resulted in a flood of new applications for loans and has thrown the Southwest Texas FHA office four weeks behind in its work.

In speaking to Austin realtors, Director C. T. Macleod of the FHA's San Antonio headquarters, stated that he hoped the jam could be cleared by Jan. 1.

More than 1,000 applications, seeking new or additional construction, have poured in, he said. The law permits maximum loans ranging from \$20,000 to \$25,000 for home construction.

New Insurance Ruling

Policy holders of the new defunct Texas Mutual Insurance company of Beaumont will not be responsible for paying company debts, the State Supreme Court has ruled.

Upholding of an identical but earlier decision by the Court ended attempts by the state to obtain an assessment on company policyholders.

Income Tax Forms

Federal income tax forms for taxpayers in the Internal Revenue Service's southwest region office will be easier to read and decipher this year.

For instance, the well-known Form 1040A, formerly of one-sheet size is now bank-check size. Other forms will have color added as does the instruction booklet, printed in eye-pleasing tints.

More Lawyers

Texas gained 126 new lawyers on November 15 as the Supreme Court swore in those who passed the October bar examinations. Seventeen listed Austin as their hometown.

Early Discharges Approved By Army

AUSTIN, TEXAS—Army personnel whose release from active service would normally take place during the Christmas-New Year period will, with some exceptions, be separated between Dec. 13 and 17 in order that they may spend the holidays at home, the Department of the Army has advised Fourth Army headquarters.

Officers and enlisted men who return from overseas and are scheduled for separation during the holiday season period will be separated as soon after arrival as possible. To preclude overseas returnees from reporting for reassignment during the Christmas holiday period, leave for this period has been authorized.

The release policy applies only to personnel scheduled for separation during the Dec. 13 to 17 period who are in the continental United States or its territories. Early departure from overseas stations to meet provisions of the policy is not authorized.

Exceptions to the policy are of officers being released from active duty for purpose of reenlistment and retirement, who will continue to be processed in accordance with instructions issued in each case; non-regular Medical corps, Dental corps, and Veterinary corps officers who have not completed 21 months' active duty

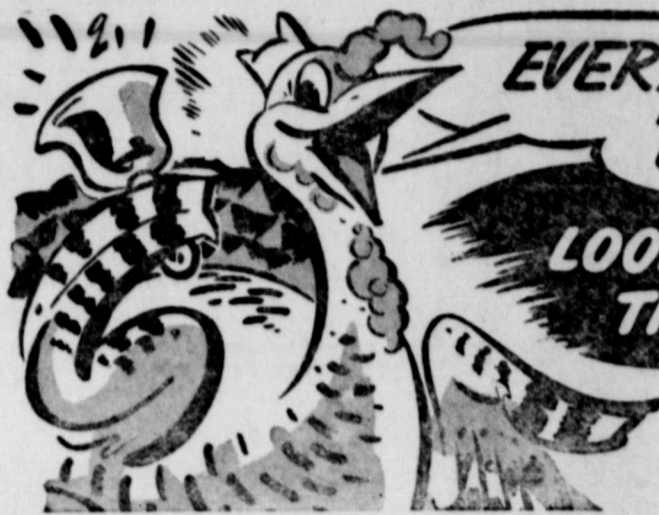

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Roast Turkey With Stuffing

1/2 cup finely cut onion
1/4 cup hot fat
10 cups inch bread cubes (2 days old)
2 1/2 cups finely cut celery
1 Tablespoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper

1/4 teaspoon ground sage
2 cups fat
Evaporated Milk
10 to 12 lb. roasting turkey
1 teaspoon salt
2 1/2 Tablespoons soft fat

Cook onion slowly 5 minutes in hot fat. Put bread cubes, celery, 1 Tablespoon salt, the pepper and sage into a very large bowl. Add milk, onion and fat. Mix just until bread cubes lose their shape. Sprinkle inside of turkey with 1 teaspoon salt. Spoon stuffing loosely into turkey. Do not pack. Sew opening together or secure with toothpicks laced with string. Tie legs to tail. Rub soft fat over outside of turkey. Place turkey on its side in a shallow roasting pan. Do not cover. Bake on bottom rack in 325 oven (low moderate) about 4 1/2 to 5 hours. At end of half of baking period, turn turkey on other side and finish baking. Remove to warm platter.

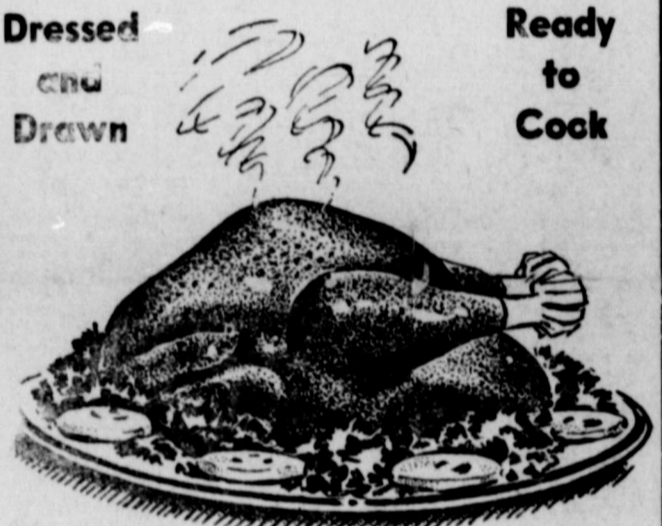

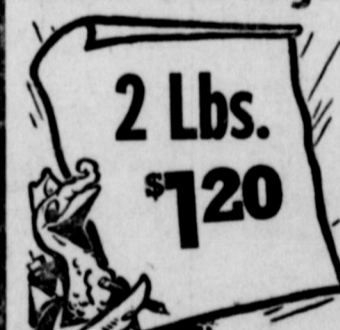
