Cynthia Busby Receives Certificate Of Merit

Cynthia Busby, Senior, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Busby of near Springlake was presented with a certificate of merit by principal D. H. Koeninger this week, shortly following arrival of a citation from John M. Stalnaker, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

The certificate of merit signified that Miss Busby had advanced to finalist standing in the 1966-67 merit program. An honor that about one-half of one percent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the nation receive.

Miss Busby at present is one of 14,200 finalists in the merit scholarship competition. The selection process is currently underway, and the approximately 2,300 winners of merit scholarships will be notified confidentially in late March. The winners will be publicly announced on May 3.

The letter accompanying the certificate of merit urged Miss Busby to continue her studies. It explained the merit program was a means of recognizing talented young people of this country who would undoubtedly be amongst its future leaders in many fields.

The letter also pointed out that students capable of distinguished achievement must strive to develop all their abilities to the fullest extent possible, declaring that one's potential will be realized only through perseverance and the most extensive training obtainable.

Local School Board Election Set For April 1

At a regular school board meeting Monday night, the local board voted to call an election on Saturday, April 1, in the study hall of the high school building for the purpose of electing three new school trustees.

The terms of James Busby, Roger Haberer, and Bob Armstrong will terminate.

Mrs. Gaye Clinch, tax assessor-collector, was appointed as absentee clerk for the school trustee election. Absentee voting will begin on March 13 and continue through March 28. Voters wishing to vote absentee may do so in the Springlake-Earth school tax office.

Election judge appointed was Leroy Williams, with Phil Rought, M. E. Kelley, F. A. Washington, Howard McClure and E. C. Hudson assisting.

Deadline for candidates to file for one of the three vacancies is set for Wednesday, March 1. All board members will be elected for a three year term. Other business transacted by the board was the approval of John Varnell as Junior High coach and assistant varsity coach, replacing Earl McKinley.

The school enrollment figures were reviewed. Total enrollment currently stands at 906, of this enrollment figure there are 497 students presently enrolled in the elementary school; 161 in Junior High; 215 in high school; and 35 in special education classes.

Principals D. H. Koeninger, Cecil Slover, and J. I. Davis were given two year extended contracts through the '68 and '69 school year.

The minimum wage law was discussed, and it was reported that in most cases, the local school already meets the new wage law.

Superintendent Mann explained, "The law does not affect the local school greatly this year, but it will most definitely effect the school next year because each year the wage increases 15 cents, until it reaches \$1.60 per hour wage."

Attending the meeting were James Busby, Guy Kelley, Bob Armstrong, Roger Haberer, Ronald Cleavinger, and superintendent Mann.

Construction On New Baptist Church Building To Begin Monday

Groundbreaking services, to kick-off the \$125,000 building program for the First Baptist Church in Earth, will begin at 10 o'clock Monday morning. The church membership, the longest term membership in the local church will be asked to turn the first shovel of dirt. The new educational building will have 9,761 square feet of floor space, and remodeling of the present building will include 3,744 square feet.

The new structure will be constructed of brick matching the existing church auditorium. It will be located on the east and built in a reversed "L" shape joining the present structure to give the over-all appearance of a "U" shaped church building.

The new structure will house

21 individual class rooms, 8 department assembly rooms, four rest rooms, and a long hallway running the entire length of the new building.

The walls of the new building will be constructed of vinyl material. The floors in the adult department will feature wall to wall carpeting, while the intermediate department and fellowship hall will be covered with tile.

Acoustical tile block ceilings will be featured throughout the building.

The building will feature central air conditioning and heating, with refrigerated air and gas circulating heat. Seven new mechanical units will be installed to take care of localized heating and cooling in the desired rooms to be used,

without making it necessary to heat or cool unused rooms. The two existing heating and cooling units in the present building will make a total of 46½ tons of air conditioning for the church.

On the east side of the new structure will be a full length driveway leading to the new paved parking area in the rear of the building. A sheltered unloading space 25 X 36 feet covering the driveway, will add convenience to churchgoers during bad weather. The lighting system for this unloading carport will be attached with a time clock which will automatically light the loading and unloading zone as the sun goes down.

A covered walkway connecting the front of the new build-

ing with that of the present auditorium will also be erected. The present auditorium will receive only minor changes. The outside trim will be painted and a window in the front

will be removed and enclosed with brick. In the rear of the auditorium, the existing fellowship hall will be made into office space, library, and choir room. These rooms will be paneled.

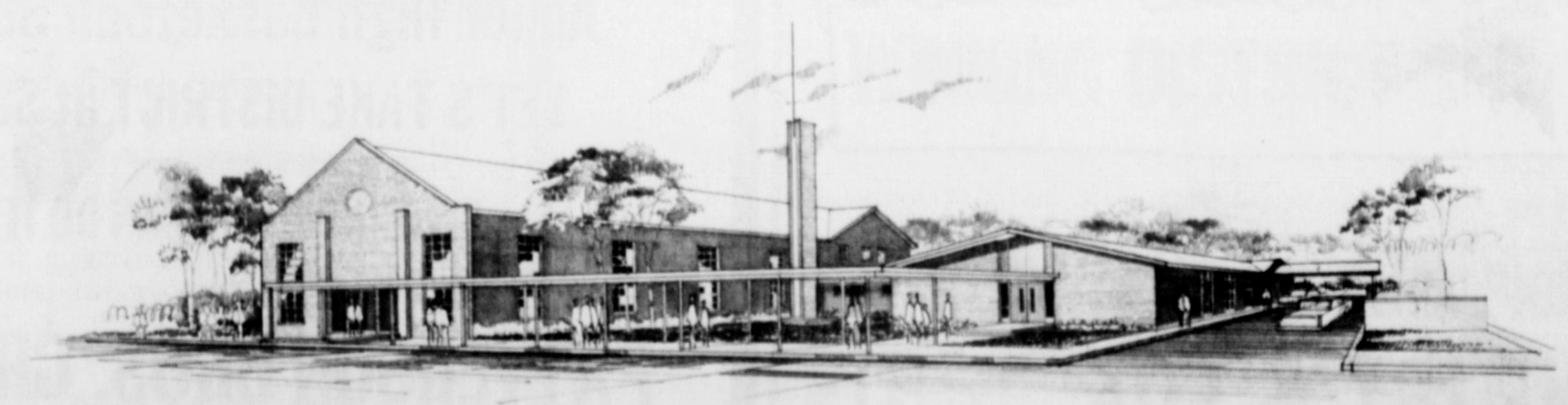
The upstairs portion of the present church building will be completely remodeled and used by the junior I and junior II departments. It will consist of 9 individual class rooms and 2 department assembly rooms and will include a pastors study. Plans call for a unique fire alarm system that will localize

the portion of the church where a fire has broken out, thus eliminating any effort to locate a blaze.

A communication system will be installed to enable each department to report to others in the building. The old educational building on the west will be torn down and the space will be landscaped to make the church grounds more beautiful.

For additional beauty, plans call for the church to have a lighted spire extending 20 feet above the roof of the church. This will be wired with a time clock, and will light up daily as the sun goes down.

The paved parking area in the rear of the parsonage will be available for recreational purposes. It will be marked

son are Floydada, Friona, Silledell, Sidney, Archer City, Spearman, Tulla, Kress, Hale Center, Frenship, Canyon, Farwell, Slaton, Dinmitt, Bovina and Sudan. Many of the above teams were played more than one time. There is no one member on the Wolverette team that can take credit for the team's winning reputation, as coach Dean Foshee has built his team on a combined effort rather than around one player. The forwards are all good and can hit from any direction or position on the court. The guards are tremendous, they don't take the word "guard" loosely, but rather take their position on the team as an important spot and are apt to wear down any top performing forward. They are talented in attaching themselves to rebounds and exert every possible effort to contribute to the all-around team effort to win. Of the 378 attempted goals from the floor, Anita O'Hair has made 195 tallying up a 50% average. She has also racked up 1.7 of the 217 free shots attempted giving her a 79% average for free shots. O'Hair is credited with 567 points and 124 rebounds. Susan Britton has attempted 391 field goals and made 281 setting a 70% average. Of the 196 free shots Susan has racked up 126 for a 79% average on free shots. She has scored 688 points this season and retrieved 77 rebounds. Marsha Dawson has made 241 of the attempted 362 floor shots. Her average is 79%. She has a 63% average in free shots having made 85 of the 136 attempted. For the season she has totaled 567 points and retrieved 114 rebounds. Linda Gregory has made 47 of the 182 attempted shots from the floor and 15 of the 35 attempted free shots, giving her a 53% average. She has made 109 points and caught 22 rebounds. Beverly Prather has made 50 of the 83 goals attempted and 41 of the 62 free throws, gaining for herself a 52% average.

She has made 144 points and picked up 29 rebounds to her credit. Dalpha Banks, has made 15 of the 35 attempted goals and in the free shot scoring she has made 6 of the 17 attempted, giving her a 35% average. She has 36 points and 20 rebounds credited to her playing. Rebounds accredited to the seven local guards are as follows: Judy Gover 123, Pansy Been 60, Carolyn Hucks 50, Vicki Sanders 49, Linda Jordan 31, Judy Hitt 25, and 24 for Ginger Dent.

The sales committee, headed by Eddie Hayden, is presently contacting each business house in Earth, Springlake, and surrounding areas.

Local Junior High Teams To Play In District Tournament

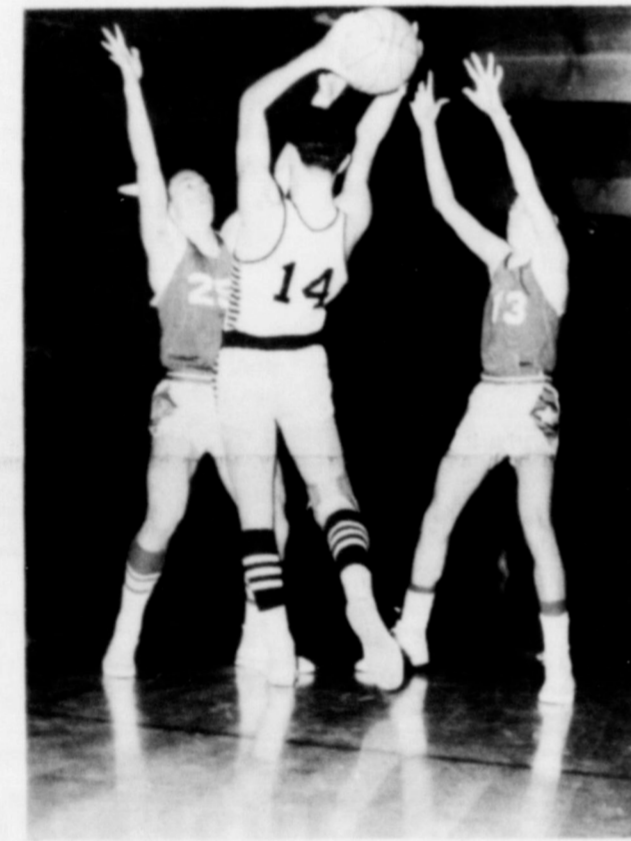

LEGAL NOTICES

An ordinance requiring all motor vehicle to stop for school buses. When stopped to load or unload.

The driver of a vehicle within the city limits, upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus stopped on the traveled portion of any street for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children, shall come to a complete stop. After such stop, he may proceed at a prudent rate of speed not to exceed ten (10) miles per hour, and with due care and caution for the safety of such children.

The driver of a vehicle upon a city street or highway having a separate roadway must stop when a school bus is stopped on a different roadway, or when the school bus is stopped in a loading zone which is a part of or adjacent to a street, and where pedestrians are crossing at street crossing.

It shall be the duty of the operator of every school bus to take the license number of any vehicle violating the provisions of this section and report such violation and the date, time and place to the proper Officer and to appear in court and testify to such violation. Passed and approved, this 9th day of February.

Ordinance No. 63

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING DRIVERS OF MOTOR VEHICLES UPON MEETING OR OVERTAKING A SCHOOL BUS STOPPED ON A STREET FOR THE PURPOSE OF RECEIVING OR DISCHARGING CHILDREN; DECLARING A VIOLATION TO BE A MISDEMEANOR AND PROVIDING A FINE OF NOT LESS THAN \$1.00 NOR MORE THAN \$200.00 FOR A VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EARTH:

Section 1. Definition-School Bus. Every motor vehicle owned by any private, public, or governmental agency and operated for the transportation of children to or from school, provided, however, that the term "school bus" shall not include motor vehicles which do not conform to the rules, regulations and standards established by the Texas State Department of Education in regard to color and marking.

Sec. 2. The driver of a vehicle upon any and all public streets and thoroughfares within the corporate limits of this city, upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the street for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop his vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children.

Sec. 3. The driver of any vehicle who shall violate any provision of Sec. 2 of this ordinance shall be guilty of a

misdeemeanor, and upon conviction for a violation thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).
