Driver's Education To Be Offered As Summer Course By School

The Springlake School Board met in a regular session Monday at the school for a general business meeting.

It was decided that Driver's Education would be offered as a summer course and will not be taught during the regular school term in the future. This change was made in order that students may take more solid subjects.

Tuition fee is \$25 which will

be used to pay the instructor and for car expenses.

Fire Damages 200 Acres Saturday On Halsell Ranch

A huge brush fire, believed to have been caused by lightning was reported about 4:30 p.m. Saturday on the Halsell Ranch, south of the Phillips 66 booster plant. Fire departments from Earth, Olton, Springlake and Littlefield joined in extinguishing the blaze.

A second blaze started after the fire companies left and ranch employees and others succeeded in putting out the second blaze about 9:30 p.m.

Turbulent weather moved into the Earth area Wednesday about 4 p.m. accompanied by heavy hail, rain and high winds.

Many streets and intersections were under water. Traffic was forced to a slow speed during an interval of a hard wind driven rain and hail. Motorists turned on their headlights due to the semi-darkness during the peak of the storm.

The rain gauge at the Pete Parish home showed about 1.2 inches of rain.

Due to the high wind, some of the residents of the Phillips Camp prepared to leave the area by loading cars with household articles. It was reported.

Johnny Murrell, ranch foreman reports that approximately 200 acres and 130 posts were burned.

The Earth Volunteer Fire Department answered a call Monday at 8:30 p.m. to extinguish a grass fire believed to have started from a trash fire. Scene of this fire was across the highway, south of Brown-White Equipment yard.

Postmaster Harold Miller wishes to remind rural patrons of the Earth Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Survey cards will be placed in a sample of boxes belonging to farmers and ranchmen.

Miller explains, "USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey. It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the letter drop. This way, USDA gets a true sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings. This information will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions."

The west end of the slab will contain tables with umbrellas.

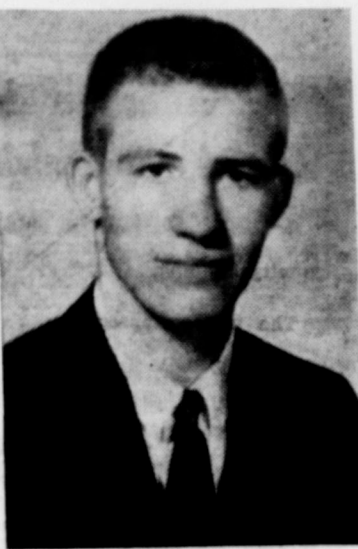
A two inch pipe fence will be built on the street side of the concession stand with a grass lawn between the fence and concession stand.

Resolution no. 4, agreed to support a conservative candidate for president and vice president in 1964.

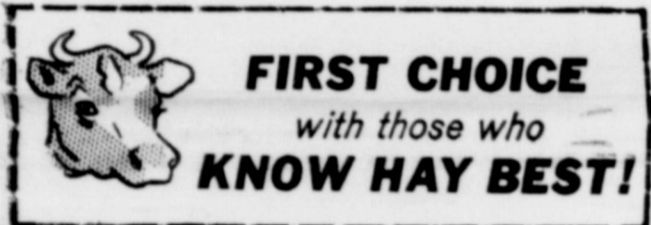

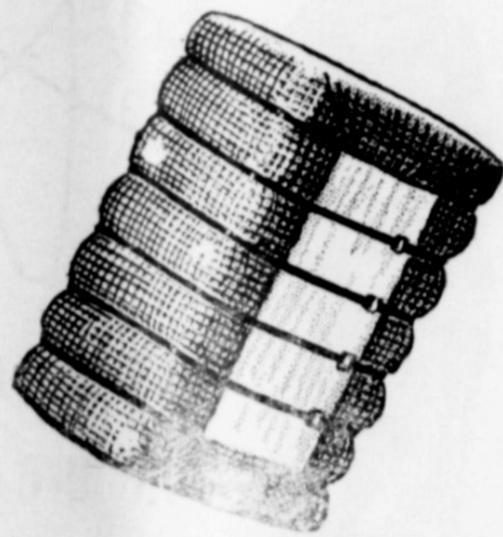

Cortez Participating In Exercise 'Iron Dragoon' in Louisiana

FORT POLK, LA. (AHTNC) — Army Reserve Pfc Pablo F. Cortez, 27, son of Julio L. Cortez, Earth, is participating with other personnel from the 49th Armored Division in Exercise Iron Dragoon in Louisiana. The exercise is scheduled to end May 14.

During Exercise Iron Dragoon, the largest field maneuver to be held in the U. S. this year, nearly 1300 square miles of Southwestern Louisiana maneuver ground, with blank ammunition for rifles and tanks, artillery simulators and gas grenades, friendly forces will be engaged in battle against an "Aggressor" force under simulated

combat conditions. This exercise is part of the Army's continuing operational readiness training.

Cortez is an assistant gunner in Battery B in the division's 132nd Artillery, an Army National Guard unit, which was recalled to active duty and is assigned at Fort Polk, La.

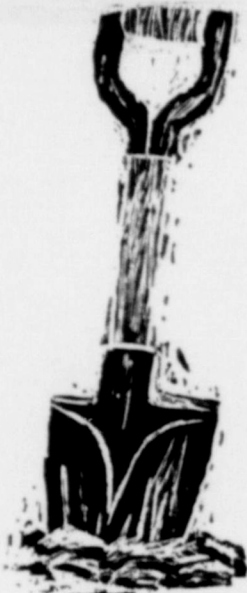

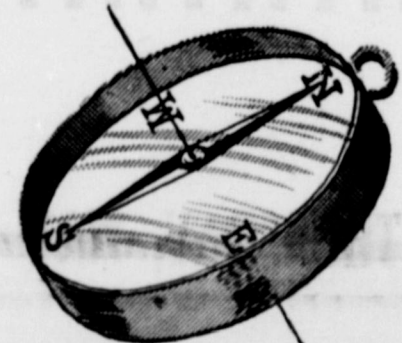

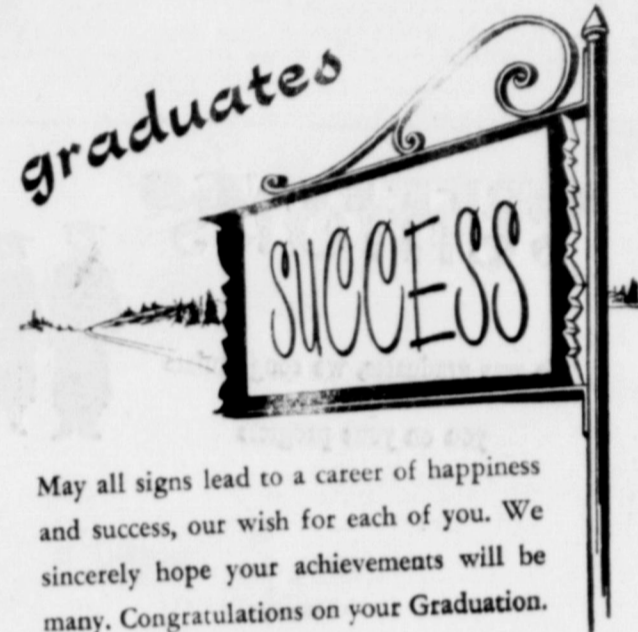
"That's quite a switch, isn't it?" I said, rising to leave. "It's been so nice talking with you again, Claburn. Do come back to

Patti is in at St. Louis?" I asked.

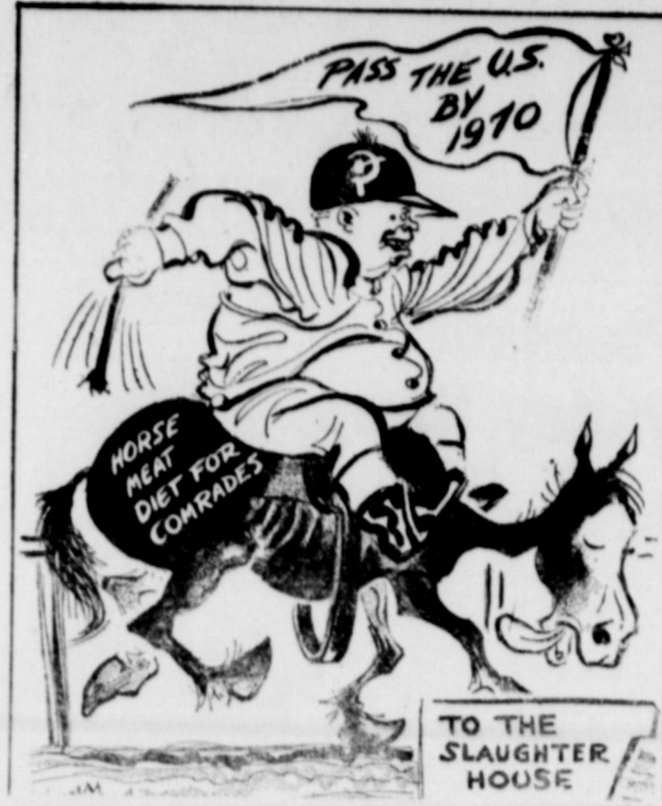
"Why, yes. She's training chimpanzees at the zoo," he answered. "They say that she can put herself in her students' places and just work wonders with the most difficult monkey."

Lamb County's Share of GNP, \$41,994,000 in 1961

Because consumer buying was The GNP, which is the sum

at a high level in Lamb County in the past fiscal year, the county was able to contribute its full quota toward the overall business results that were achieved nationally.

Local residents, through their spending, had a proportionate part in the attainment of a gross national product of \$516 billion, a new high. The previous year's GNP was \$504 billion.

total of all goods and services produced in a year, is used by economists as a principal gauge of business activity.

The bulk of this output, Government reports show, is due to consumer spending. It constitutes two-thirds of the total.

The remainder consists, for the most part, of expenditures by Federal, state and local governments and of capital outlays for industrial expansion.

Of the year's \$516 billion, some \$336 billion was in consumer outlays, \$196 billion of it for goods and 140 billions for services.

Lamb County's output of goods and services in fiscal 1961 was a sturdy \$41,924,000, an increase over the previous year's \$41,005,000.

The figures are based on reports released by the Standard Rate and Data service and other sources.

As usual, local tastes and attitudes determined the way the people spent their money. Their expenditures ran the gamut, from automobiles to apparel.

While there was little change in the amount they spent for durable and non-durable goods, there was a considerable rise in outlays for services. The increase in the year was \$5 billion, nationally, part of this increase, it is noted, was due to the rising cost of many services.

Of the \$41,994,000 spent in Lamb County by consumers, \$31,773,000 was for goods bought in local retail stores and \$10,221,000 was for services of all kinds.

The Commerce Department is highly optimistic about business in the months ahead. It feels that the advance that has been in progress will continue, subject to occasional fluctuations, and that the GNP will hit \$565 billion or better in 1962.

Lamb County Due New Farm to Market Road Near Amherst

More than 1200 miles of new Farm to Market roads will be constructed in a one-year program at a cost of \$231.1 Million, announces the Texas Highway Commission.

Herbert C. Peary, Jr., chairman of the Commission says, "This type of road is the Land Service Road that has done so much to develop our state. These roads have meant a great deal to the development of our economy, pro-

1960 Lamb County Housing Census Report

The 1960 Lamb County housing census shows general improvement in housing conditions and ownership of home appliances are on the increase.

At the time of the census there were 8419 housing units in Lamb County. Of these 54% were in sound condition with all plumbing. 6474 were occupied. Among these 3685 were occupied by owners.

Medium value of own-occupied home was \$6900. Renters occupied 2789 places and paid a medium gross rent of \$54. Hot and cold running water was found in 6087 dwellings. 6215 had flush toilets and 6163 had bathtub or shower. There were 422 basements and 67 trailer homes. 628 households reported air-conditioning.

There were 5683 television owners, 5902 radio owners and 3700 had telephones.

Washing machine owners totaled 3867 and there were 1332 owners of clothes dryers. 2960 owned one or more home freezers.

3385 owners had one automobile, while 1807 had two. The category of three autos owned was 375.

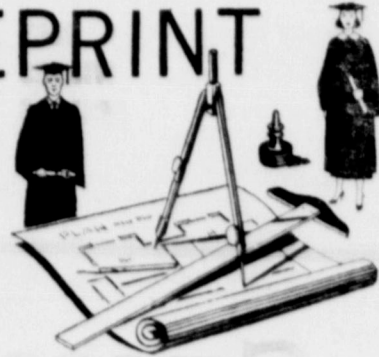

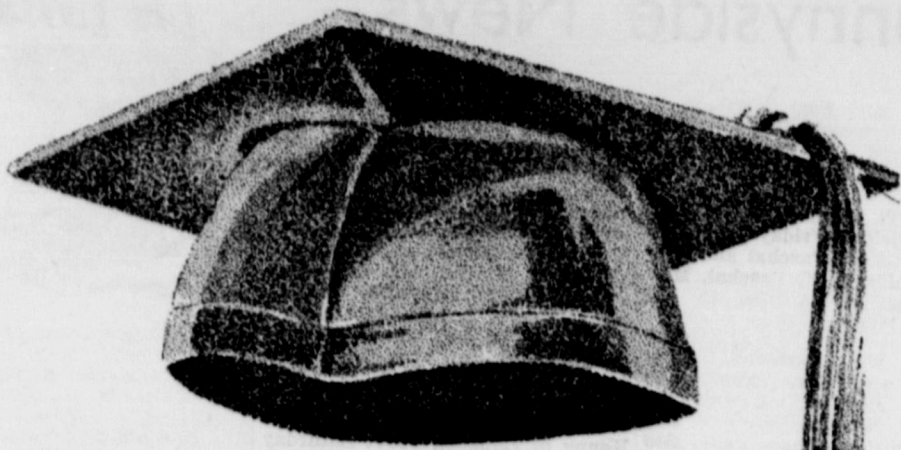
