The fund for the coming school year is to go to Elias Acevado, a Springlake student who graduated in May, and plans to take nurses training.


City Equalization Board Holds Meet

Damage To Crops By Hail Slight In Lamb County

Lamb County's cotton situation is a little better than was thought at first after the hail storm on Sunday, June 18 and more hail Saturday, June 21.

Lamar Aten, A.S.U. representative said that some farmers are planting their cotton over, but most of them are waiting, hoping that their crops were not too badly damaged to produce.

Aten stated that most of the farmers are staying in the feed grain program and that those who think it too late to replant cotton are finding some crop such as soybeans, pinto beans or barley to plant so that they can stay in the program.

Aten said that farmers who were hailed out and wish to plant feed grain may do so by repaying the allotment received on the feed grain program.

Aten estimated the cotton acreage lost from hail damage at approximately 20,000 some partially and some completely destroyed around Littlefield.

He stated that the last few days of hot sunny weather have helped the crops to recover from the moisture and hail damages.

"As a whole" Aten concluded, "the county is in better shape now than at this time last year." He estimated at least 200,000 more acres of cotton was planted this year over last year.

Three Springlake residents, Jimmy Banks, Ernest Goforth, and Wayne Davis, received minor injuries in a two car, tractor collision Monday night, about two miles west of Halfway.

The collision occurred on Highway 79 shortly before 9 p.m.

An Olton youth, Gary D. Copeland, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Darwood Copeland was killed. He was to have entered his senior year in Olton High School this fall.

Kenneth Hooper, about 17, also of Olton, who was a passenger in the Copeland car, was critically injured. He was taken to Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, with a head injury.

Jimmy Banks, 33, was taken to Medical Arts Hospital-Clinic in Littlefield, where he was treated for cuts and bruises. Approximately 100 stitches were required to close the wounds over his body. He was dismissed from the hospital Tuesday afternoon.

Ernest Goforth, 25, and Wayne Davis, 25, both passengers in the Banks car, received emergency treatment at Community Hospital, Olton, and were released.

The Springlake men were invited to Plainview to attend a meeting of a baseball league.

Davis could not be sure of what happened except that the Banks car was meeting a compact car in which the Olton youths were riding.

He said he believed the compact car and a tractor collided and then the Banks car was involved in the collision. The three Springlake men were not thrown from their car, but it was demolished.

H. D. Ogde of Halfway driving the tractor involved in the crash, was also injured. He was taken to Plainview Medical Center Hospital suffering from a weak concussion and fractures. His condition was not considered serious.

Wreckage of the vehicles was described as "strewn up and down the road like a tornado had hit."

The compact car was said to have been sliced into at least two pieces and both Olton youths were thrown from the car.

One witness said the tractor, "looked like a dump truck had dropped a load of garbage on it."



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

power to abolish the office outright (without an election) in any and all counties. Secondly, they also have the power to change the laws to allow the people of any county to vote to abolish the office, if the people see fit to do so.

I wrote and submitted two bills to the 57th Legislature.

Bill number one, S. B. 192 by Schwartz, permits the people of any county to abolish the office by local option election which must be called on petition of 5

percent of the voters that participated in the preceding governor's race. (Only 20 per cent required in counties of over one hundred thousand population).

Bill number two, V. B. 488 by Gibbens abolishes the office outright in Young County (my county) without an election.

Both bills passed both Houses, and will go into effect as law by September 20, 1961.

Any such office abolished by whatever means will cease to ex-

ist at the end of the present of the holder's term. Besides these two bills, I gave my support to other outright abolition bills for various counties that were introduced by several members of the legislature.


It is to be hoped that passage of these two bills will help to combat the growing cynicism among both voters and legislators about our democratic processes.

On the one hand, it will prove to the voters that useless offices can be abolished; on the other hand,
