## Lamb County Pioneers

Lamb County Pioneers will gather at the Lamb County Ag and Community Center in Littlefield, Tuesday, August 23, for their annual reunion.

Members of the Lamb County Pioneer Reunion Board meet Monday night in the Reddy Room to discuss plans for the annual event, and to name committees.

Registration for the reunion is to get underway at 2 p.m., with Herbert Dunn and his committee in charge. The registration fee is \$2, and with a registration badge, persons will be eligible to go through the barbecue line.

The board decided to begin serving barbecue at 4:30 p.m. this year, and to have four serving lines to accommodate the crowd faster. The menu is to include barbecued beef brisket, beans, potato salad, pickles, onions, cobbler and tea.

No invitations are being mailed to persons in the county this year, but those outside the county will be notified.

The board named Mrs. Emily Peterman to be in charge of securing the engraved gift cups again this year. The cups will be awarded to the oldest man and woman present, the person who comes the farthest, the person who has attended the most reunions, and to the president and his wife.

Deb Bawcom, president of this year's reunion stated, "I definitely want the gifts to go to the oldest man and woman present," regardless of whether or not they have received the recognition at prior reunions.

Bawcom presided for the Monday night meeting

and Gladys Yohner, secretary, read the minutes of the last called meeting.

## Hail Suppression

Littlefield forces opposed to the controversial hail suppression issue have collected an estimated 1200 names on petitions seeking to have weather modification brought to a vote in Lamb County. The petitions have been turned in to the County Clerk.

The documents ask the Lamb County Commissioners Court to call an election to determine whether modification planes will be allowed to fly above the county after October 31.

On that date, permits for two licensed weather modification companies operating over most of the South Plains expire and elections can be ordered before new permits are issued.

The petitions must be certified as containing at least 900 names, 10 per cent of the qualified county voters, before Commissioners can call an election. It's the first of several efforts to force elections in other area counties.

Swisher County citizens for natural weather recently met in Tulia, voting to take immediate action to call an election and to join Briscoe County residents in a boycott of Plainview merchants, except for doctors and other professionals.

Also in Swisher County a petition bearing the needed 25 names to call for election petitions has been filed with the County Clerk in Tulia and petitions asking for the elections are available for signing in Tulia, Happy and Kress, anti-modification forces report.

Those petitions must be signed within 30 days, by 10 percent of that county's voters. Mid-August elections are being sought in all of the counties, including Castro.

Approximately 600 persons have signed petitions in Briscoe County, saying they will not patronize some 5 dozen Plainview merchants who are supporting weather modification activities.

Ross Lumsden of Littlefield turned in the Lamb County petitions in behalf of the citizens for natural weather in the county.

Hail Suppression in the area has been a boiling controversy for at least 7 years, with opponents of the cloud-seeding, claiming the program has caused drastic changes in the weather for 200 miles.

One of the biggest controversies surrounding cloud-seeding is whether it decreases or increases rainfall amounts and how effective it is at suppressing hail.

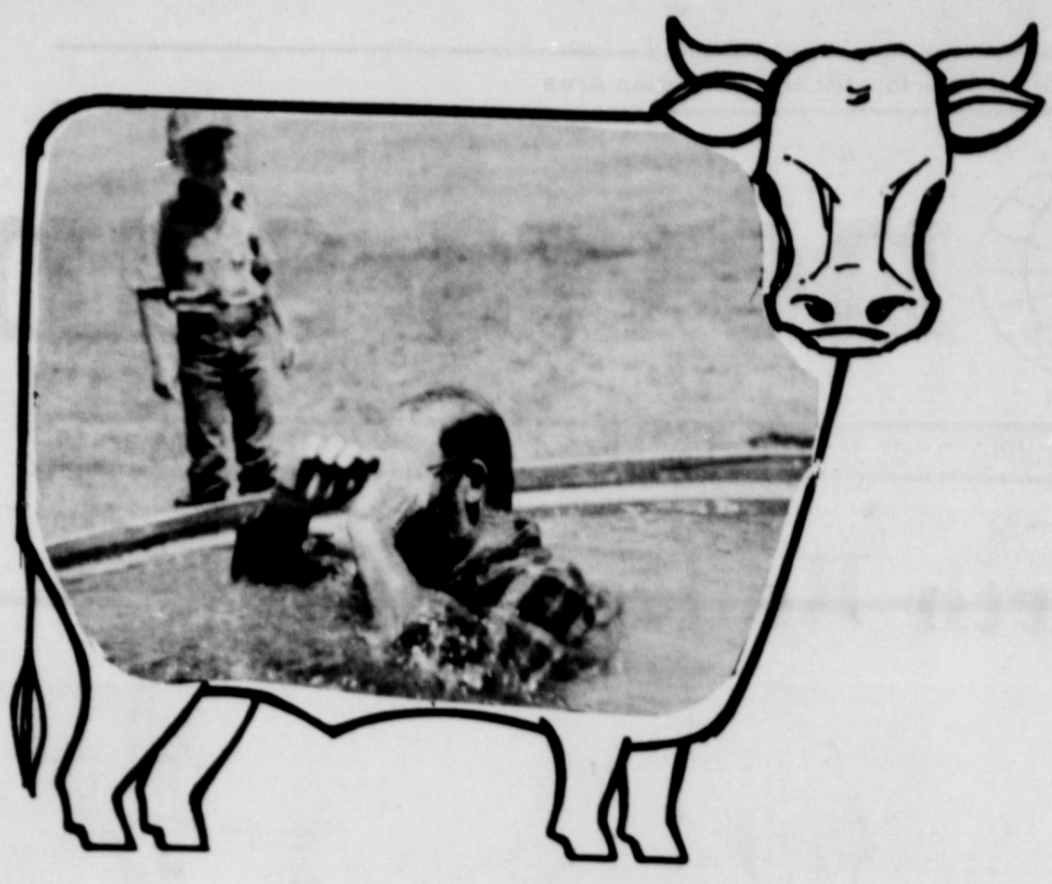
Opponents contend that cloud-seeding causes clouds stratification which tends to produce a mist like rain that often evaporates before reaching the ground.

Because of its evaporation, they say, rainfall is decreased and natural weather patterns are disrupted.

Some area farmers and rangers have indicated that they have seen the seeding disrupt clouds that in their opinion, would have produced rain.

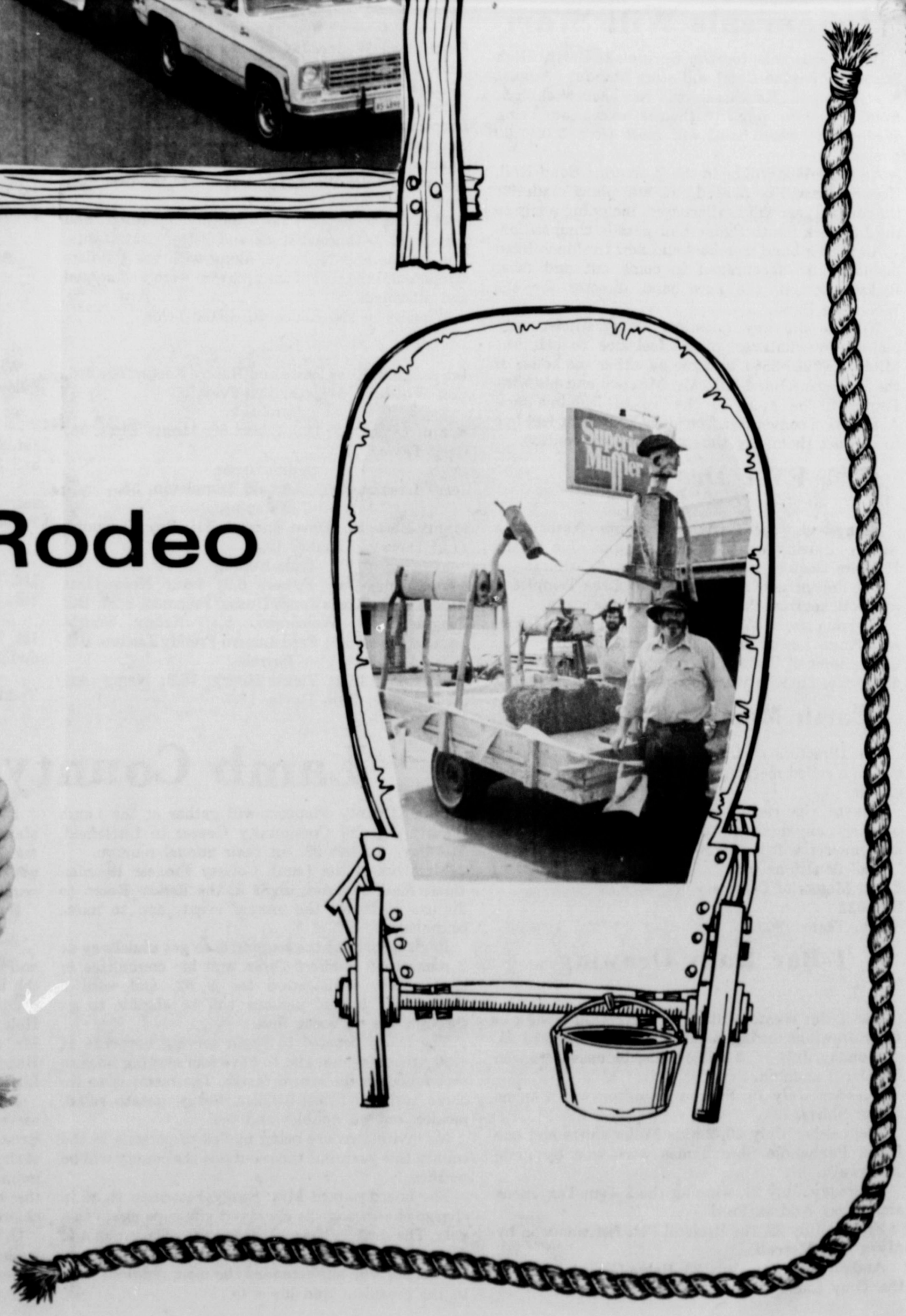
Other foes cite theories that the anti-hail seeding does not reduce total rainfall, but produces more widespread, less intense rain. That, they indicate, means that a given area is going to get less rain.

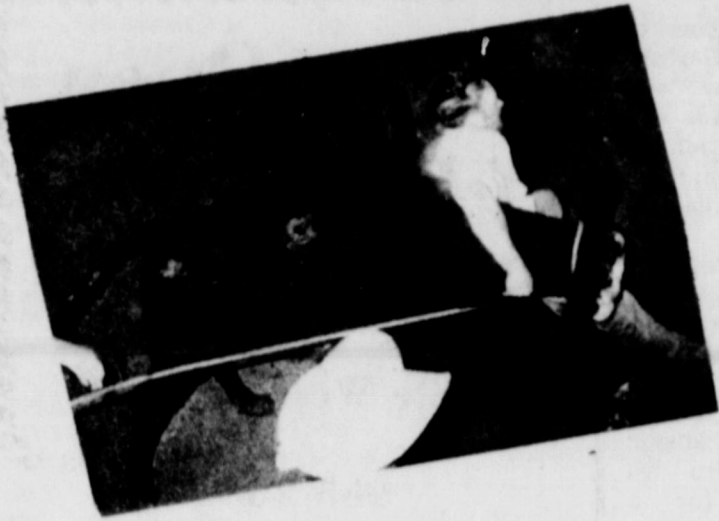

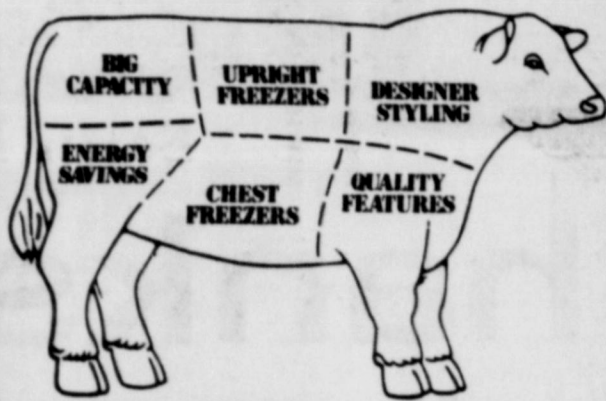

## Harrington Plant Open House Sunday

Southwestern Public Service Company will hold open house at its newest generating facility, Harrington Station, Saturday and Sunday, July 30 and 31. The plant, located northeast of Amarillo, one mile north of Nichols Station on Lakeside Drive, will be open to the public on Saturday from 12 noon to 6 p.m. and on Sunday from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m.

Harrington Station is the first generating plant on Southwestern's system to use coal as its primary fuel. The first unit, rated at 356,700 kilowatts, was put into service in mid-1976 and is using about 3500 tons of coal per day. During some of the summer months this consumption will be in excess of 4000 tons per day.

The second generating unit at Harrington is under construction and is about fifty percent complete. It is scheduled to go on the line next summer and will also have a capability of 356,700 kilowatts. Construction of the third unit of the same size will begin in the next few weeks and is scheduled for completion in 1980. All three of the Harrington generating

units will use coal-fired boilers. The coal used at Harrington Station is low-sulphur western coal, mined and brought in by unit train from Gillette, Wyoming. The trains have about 110 cars and are designed and built specifically to haul coal. Each train brings about 11,000 tons of coal to the plant on a twice-a-week schedule.

The boilers at Harrington Station are equipped with the most advanced equipment, available at this time, for preventing objectionable products of combustion from reaching the environment. Both electrostatic precipitators and stack gas scrubbers were installed on the first unit at a cost of approximately \$20-million. The number 2 unit will utilize a fabric filter stack emission control system known as a "baghouse". This environmental control equipment is necessary for compliance with the Texas and Federal air control regulations.

The use of sewage effluent for boiler and cooling water -- a practice pioneered by Southwestern Public Service Company at Jones Station in Lubbock, Nichols Station and Harrington Station in Amarillo -- will

continue to save millions of gallons of fresh water per day. The three plants use an average of 9-million gallons of sewage effluent a day, saving enough fresh water to serve the residential, commercial and industrial needs of a city of 100,000 people. It takes about 450 gallons of water per month to generate the power for a residential customer using 600 KWH per month. The investment for water quality control equipment was about \$6-million.

The principal plant capability of Southwestern Public Service Company is presently 2,746,800 kilowatts. This includes 2,613,200 in steam plant capability and 133,600 kilowatts in gas turbine and expander turbine capability. With the completion of the number 2 unit, Harrington Station will become the largest plant of Southwestern's system. In 1980, when the third unit goes on the line, Harrington will have a capability of over 1-million kilowatts and at that time, approximately 30 percent of the system generating capability will be coal-fired.

The design, engineering and construction supervision

was done by Southwestern's own generating plant design department, under the direction of Jim Matthews, manager, generation and design construction. Missouri Valley Constructors, Inc. of Amarillo, was the mechanical and structural contractor and Budwine Electric Service Company, Carlsbad, New Mexico, was the electrical contractor.

J.B. Bottoms was the resident engineer for Southwestern Public Service Company during the Construction of the first unit, and Jerry Hermesmeier is the plant manager. Bottoms will also serve as resident engineer for construction of the second unit.

Harrington Station was named in honor of the late Don Harrington, Amarillo oilman, investor and philanthropist. He served continuously on the SPS board of directors from the time the company was organized in its present form in 1942 until his death on April 27, 1974.
