

City Laws To Be Enforced, Strays To Be Eliminated

The Earth city officials met Monday night in a regular stated meeting.

Among the items of business discussed was the issuance of a warning to citizens of the area, to the effect that all traffic ordinances would be strictly enforced.

It was brought to the attention of the commission that several people still persisted in double parking. The commission instructed the city marshal to issue tickets to all offenders, effective immediately.

It was also brought to the commissioner's attention that the city is currently being overrun with stray cats and dogs. The group therefore agreed that to remedy the situation the strays must be eliminated.

The mayor and commission requested that citizens who have pets, must keep them penned up or tied up for the next two weeks. Elimination of these strays will be carried out within this period of time.

Other business conducted by the group was the authorization to purchase parts to repair the city maintainer, and to purchase a supply of trash barrels

to be made available to replace the ones that are unserviceable within the city.

They also passed an ordinance authorizing the issue of warrants paying for the expense of the city water and sewer bond election which was held last year.

Leroy Wilkinson, local Southwestern Public Service Company office manager was present to present a request from his company for a 7.62% rate increase for electrical service for residential and general service users. The city commission tabled the request until a later date so that they could study the request before giving their answer.

Also discussed and passed on was the erection of no solicitor signs within the city limits.

Migrant Health Grant Approved

A grant of \$50,984 has been approved by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to the City of Littlefield to finance Littlefield-Lamb County Migrant Health Project, according to telegrams from Bob Price and Ralph Yarbrough.

Mayor J. E. Chisholm explained the program is for all Lamb County and is sponsored by Littlefield.

Funds will provide medical care, as well as medication, for migrant laborers unable to pay. Mayor Chisholm said procedures are set up for persons residing in the county six months, but the migrant group had no agency to care for its medical needs.

Chisholm said two registered nurses will make house calls and also take care of "a certain amount" of office calls and then refer cases to physicians when needed.

No place yet has been rented as an office for the project, Chisholm said, but "this will be done within the next few days."

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Tops Club Inc. To Observe 20th Anniversary

On January 21, 1968 the first Tops Club Inc. will observe its twentieth anniversary. Ester Manz and three of her friends in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, met and decided to do something about being overweight. This one small group of friends who decided to Take Off Pounds Sensible (TOPS) has grown to 5,922 International Tops Chapters with a total enrollment of 147,433 members in 1966 with a loss of 1,402,195,74 pounds. Doctors send patients to TOPS Clubs and accept invitations to talk at Chapter meetings. The American Medical Association blesses TOPS and all its work. TOPS Clubs have become the ranking practitioners of group therapy for obesity in the country, and group therapy has become accepted as powerful artillery in the rickety arsenal of weapons against overweight.

Dr. Fredrick State of Harvard and other nutrition experts have applauded the idea as sound. Psychiatrists like Dr. Albert J. Stunkard of the University of Pennsylvania have pointed out that such groups conserve the time of busy therapist and save the overweight a lot of money. After surveying the range of available appetite-depressant drugs, Dr. Walter Modell wrote in his authoritative book, "Drugs of Choice," that "Group therapy through an organization similar to Alcoholics Anonymous might provide the best hope for most obese persons."

The main thing in TOPS is somebody cares.

TOPS cannot attempt to stay undercover as Alcoholics Anonymous because after all, how can a fat person be anonymous? Indeed the self confession that a person actually has an overweight problem is the first step toward the TOPS therapy. Most members have taken it only reluctantly and after substantial persuasion by doctors, husbands or overweight friends. Sometimes either a serious illness or a last pathetic indignity has been required for a woman to overcome her inhibitions and walk into her first TOPS meeting.

Current weights of members are never announced at meetings, only gains and losses. Weighins precede each meeting. This procedure is supervised by the chapters key official, the weight recorder.

Violations of club thinking have frequently been reported, but it is not the purpose to police the girls. That is not up to TOPS. They just try to make

them realize what they have to do. Many join with misguided notions. Many come in with an attitude of "What are you going to do for me? But it is a do-it-yourself program." Not entirely. If the club is to be completely successful each member must be dedicated to the cause. Each must be willing to fight with all her will-power for her battle against the craving for food.

Overweight men are frequently too embarrassed about their size to do anything about it in semi-public, so consequently there are less male chapters. The nearest of which is Sir Plop Tops in Plainview. Its leader, Eugene Davis, has expressed desire to help some of the Earth-Springlake men with their problem. Eugene was International King last year having lost from 338 1/2 to 197 3/4, a total of 140 1/2 pounds in one year.

Each member's dues are \$6.00 a year, which includes a subscription to the club magazine, plus local chapter assessments of \$1 per month plus 10¢ for each pound gained.

Visitors are welcome to meet with the local chapter at the General Office Building between the Citizens State Bank and Earth Postoffice every Thursday at 7:30 p.m.

The local chapter has six members who have reached their desired weight since joining TOPS and all had never successfully lost before.

Several others have lost 30, some forty, 2 have lost 50 lbs., and one member 60 pounds.

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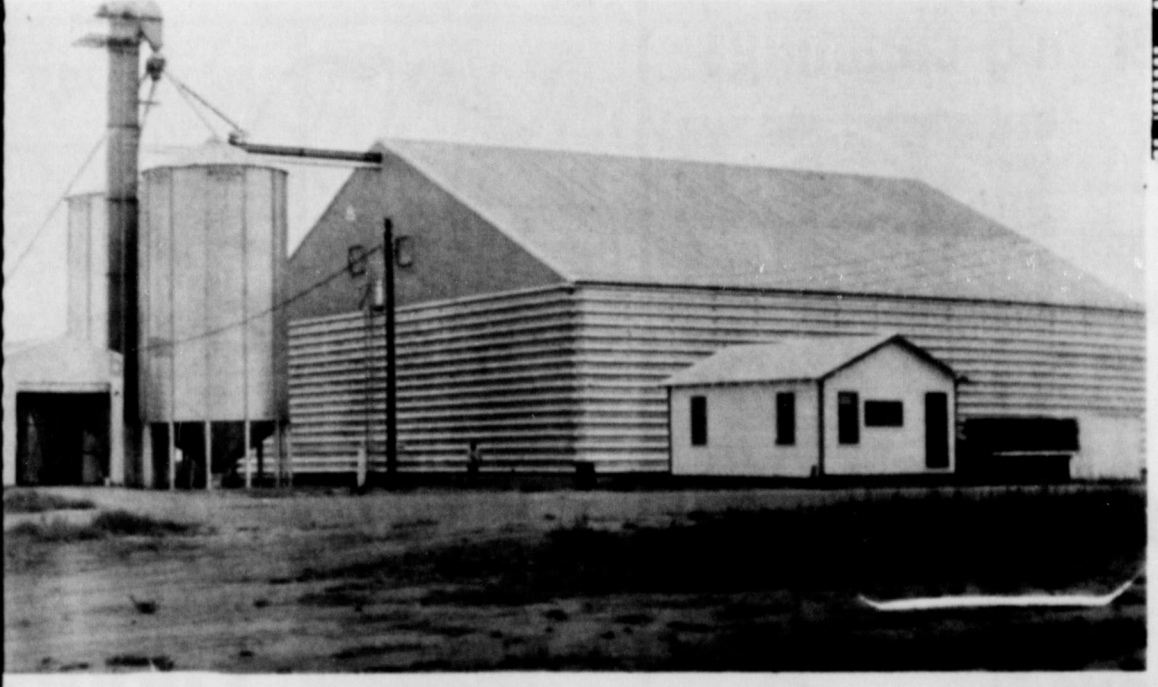
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Wolverines Lose To Owls 32-6 Friday Night

Hale Center's visiting Owls literally outran the host Wolverines Friday night to the tune of 32 to six, as the Springlake-Earth aggregation dropped their second game of the season.
