Tips on Touring

For Outdoor Living

To help you and your family enjoy the great outdoors this summer, the makers of gadgets have come up with some dandy new ones.

Here are some you might want to consider:

For inflating air mattresses, life rafts, etc., there's a pump unit that



runs on your car's engine. Remove a spark plug, screw on the unit, idle your engine, and— presto!—air is pumped in while you sit back and rest. Be sure the plugs on your engine are easy to reach and the pump you get fits the plug opening.

To save trunk space when you're carrying an outboard motor, there's an accessory that enables you to clamp the outboard to the lid of the trunk. It's secured by vacuum cups, screw clamps and web safety straps. When you want to open the trunk, the motor can be swung away to rest on the ground.

For campers, there's a combination tool that can be used as a hatchet, hammer, chisel, nail puller, bottle cap remover, saw, screwdriver and spade. It comes with a drawing string carrying case.

A stove that burns canned propane does double duty as a broiler when turned on its side. It cooks with a flameless, red-hot grid. It broils meat as fat drips off. Tilted back, it can be used with cooking utensils.

Another cooking device is an electric toaster and broiler with a griddle in the middle. It works off the car battery through the cigarette lighter socket. Toaster pops up, griddle and broiler temperatures can be regulated.

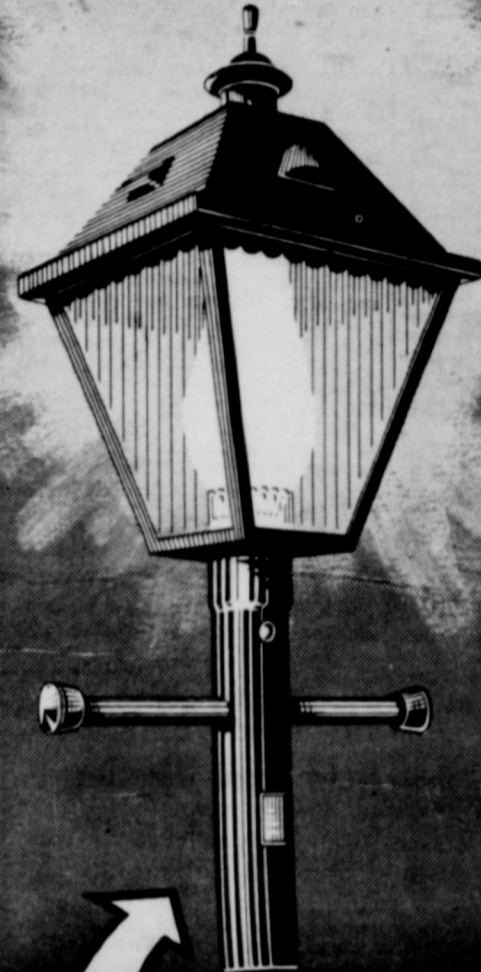

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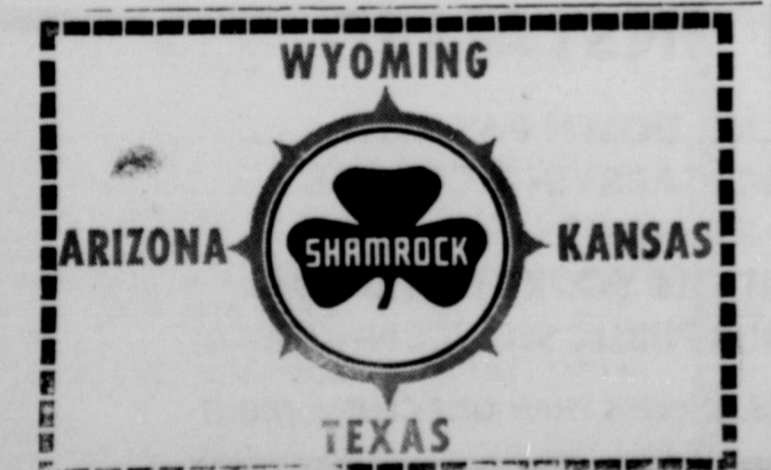
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Grey Ladies Capped By American Red Cross Friday Night

Senator Johnson Asks For Review Of Relationships

Senate Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson called Sunday for a review of this nation's relationships with other countries "in the light of today's conditions."

Johnson, in a weekly report recorded for broadcast in Texas, commended government action which sped aid to earthquake-stricken Chile.

But he noted that, "Unfortunately, our diplomatic relations with some countries of Latin America have been on the decline."

The Senator referred to deteriorating relations with Cuba and said this was "symbolic of a situation that benefits no one."

"It contains a threat to the future of all of us. It is a trend that must be stopped. It is a trend that must be reversed," he said.

Johnson called for a review of attitudes and policies.

"Our relationship with these countries of Latin America — our hemispheric neighbors — needs to be studied in the light of today's conditions," the Senator continued.

He noted that retaining the friendship of other nations "takes patience . . . it takes understanding. Above all it takes work." He said these qualities were displayed in sending aid to Chile.

"We offered this help the way all help should be offered — because it was the right thing, because it was the neighborly thing to do," he said.

Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

An in-furrow fungicide test to determine the efficiency of 12 different chemicals used in the prevention of seedling diseases on cotton is underway at the High Plains Research Foundation. Each of the 12 chemicals has been applied in four row plots, 300 feet long. A 13th plot has been planted with as a check plot for comparison. This test is being conducted by Dr. Harry Lane of the Lubbock Experiment Station and Delbert R. Langford of the Foundation staff.

A comparative date of planting test on cotton is in process at Halfway to secure further information desired by area farmers so they can achieve higher quality yields.

Cotton was planted on April 20 and May 20, and will be planted on June 20 and 30.

A climatology test on cotton is included with the date of planting research program. This test consists of cotton planted on (1) dryland, (2) irrigated land with no fertilizer, and (3) irrigated land with various rates and combinations of fertilizer. Air temperature, relative humidity, and solar energy are to be recorded throughout the growing season to determine the

effect of these factors on the cotton yields. These tests are being conducted by Dr. J. D. Bilbro, A.R.S., Lubbock, and Delbert Langford of the Foundation.

These projects are being conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation in cooperation with the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station, Lubbock, and the Agricultural Research Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.
