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



For 1963, only 200 acres of sugar beets are set up for planting, by five farmers in the Olton community who presumably will have a market at a new sugar factory being built at Hereford.

The 1963 domestic beet sugar marketing quota is approxi-mately 2.7 million tons, Stocks of beet sugar on hand amounted to 1,368,000 tons of sugar and it is anticipated that 616,000 tons will be produced from 62 crop beets, to be harvested in

This provides a supply of 1,984,000 tons of beet sugar to meet requirements until new crop sugar reaches the market next fall. Marketings of beet sugar in the last quarter

of the year will be heavy. Production of sugar from the 1962 crop of beets has been estimated at 2,580,000 tons by the beet sugar industry. Even a large increase in 1963 production would not result in excessive reserve supplies.



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


