Springlake cindermen captured team titles Saturday at Wolverine Stadium for District 3-A. The Wolverines qualified the mile relay team and six individuals for the Region I meet at Lubbock April 19-20. The meet, held jointly with District 2-B, resulted in victory for Springlake with a 146 1/2 margin over second place Farwell. A bad hand-off in the 440 relay cost the sprint relay team a trip to the regional meet. The incident, between Jerry Been and Floyd Bennett, occurred when Springlake had taken an early lead in the event. Farwell won the event with a 45.9 and Kress was second with a 46.7. The Springlake Mile Relay team galloped in first with 3:38 flat, Kress followed with 3:38.7. Placings in the meet other than Springlake and Farwell were Kress, 84; Sudan, 74; and Hale Center, 72 points. Wolverines going to regional are Troy Layman, John Patterson, Thomas Gregory, Jerry Don Sanders, Dale Dent, Ken Dawson, Don Sanders and Jerry Been. Bovina in District 2-B breezed through for a 188 1/2 point total, resulting in ten individuals and both relay teams qualifying for the Region I meet.

## Local Ginners Attend Meet In Dallas Recently

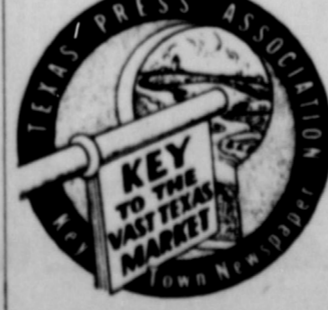

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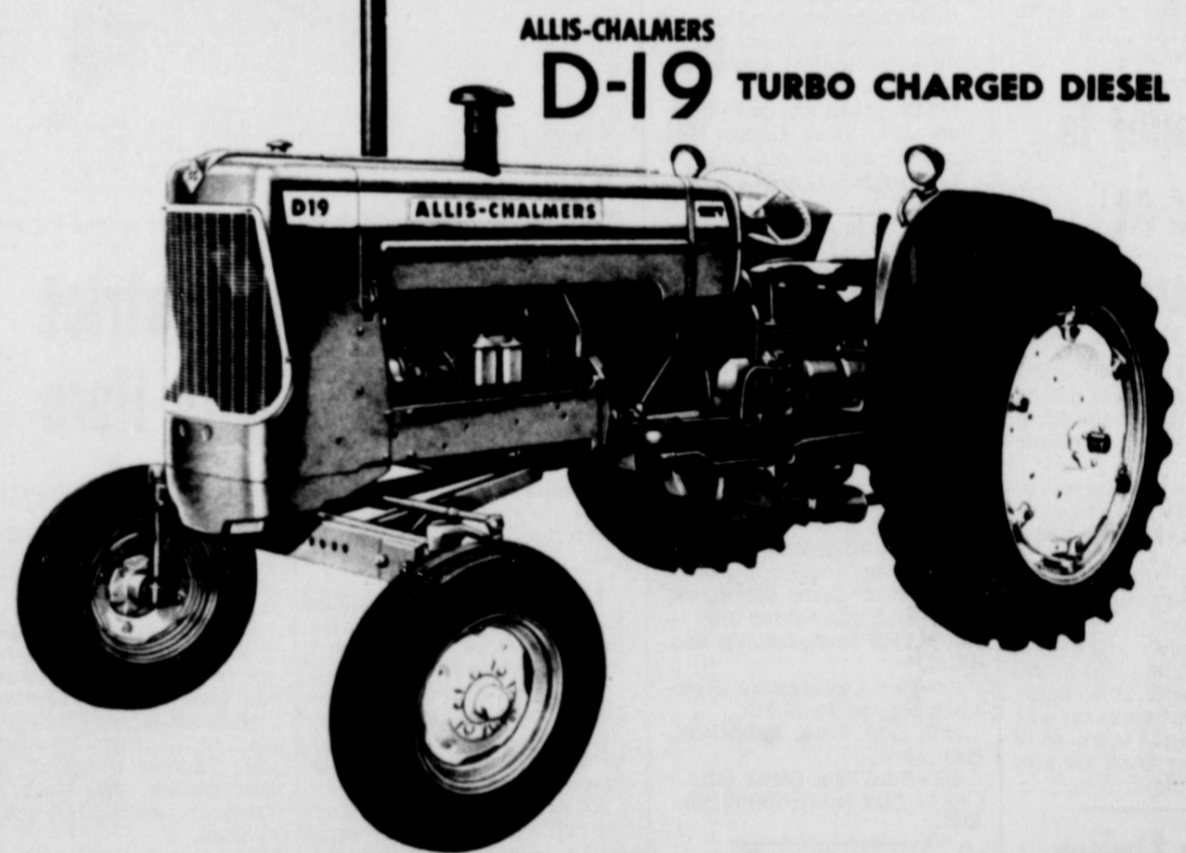

## Sugar Beet Acreage Restrictions To Be Lifted In 1964 For Farmers

Lamb County farmers who want to get into sugar beet production will be able to in 1964, restricted only by the outlook for a market.

There will be no acreage restrictions (proportionate share) on the 1964 crop of sugar beets, reports Lamar Aten, office manager for the Lamb County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office.

For 1963, only 200 acres of sugarbeets are set up for planting, by five farmers in the Olton community who presumably will have a market at a new sugar factory being built at Hereford.

The 1963 domestic beet sugar marketing quota is approximately 2.7 million tons. Stocks of beet sugar on hand amounted to 1,368,000 tons of sugar and it is anticipated that 616,000 tons will be produced from '62 crop beets, to be harvested in 1963.

This provides a supply of 1,984,000 tons of beet sugar to meet requirements until new crop sugar reaches the market next fall. Marketings of beets in the last quarter of the year will be heavy.

Production of sugar from the 1962 crop of beets has been estimated at 2,580,000 tons by the beet sugar industry. Even a large increase in 1963 production would not result in excessive reserve supplies.

The Department of Agriculture has indicated that it is too early to determine whether restrictions will be necessary on the 1965 crop. However, production would have to exceed marketings sufficiently to create safe and reasonable stocks before acreage restrictions could be reimposed.

It is assumed that the industry will try in 1963 to produce at the maximum capacity of its plants, and the announcement about no restrictions on the 1964 sugar beet crop is expected to encourage plant expansion. First, it should encourage existing plants to modernize and expand their facilities since they can be assured of at least two years of unrestricted operations.

Second, new plants under construction for operation in 1963 and 1964 could be expanded immediately to their ultimate capacity so as to take advantage of this opportunity for full production and the marketing history in excess of the tonnage provided from the national acreage reserve.

The Department has suggested that, when acreage restrictions are reimposed, major consideration should be given to production history in the period immediately preceding the resumption of controls. That should provide fair treatment for those who increase production sufficiently to meet prospective marketing quotas and stock requirements.

## Auto Inspection Deadline Nears

Approximately 75% of the registered vehicles in this county have obtained their inspection sticker, according to Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Captain Johnson said he was pleased to see that the large per cent of vehicle owners have had their vehicles safety inspected. However, Johnson stated that with less than two weeks before the April 15 deadline and 25 per cent still to be inspected there will be long lines of vehicles waiting at the inspection stations.

He pointed out that inspections may not be made when the streets are wet. "No extension of time will be made if there are some wet days," stated Johnson, because inspection started September 15 to allow owners plenty of time to have their vehicles inspected.

Failure to have a 1963 inspection sticker displayed on

the windshield of your vehicle after April 15 is a violation of the law and is punishable by a fine not to exceed two hundred dollars.

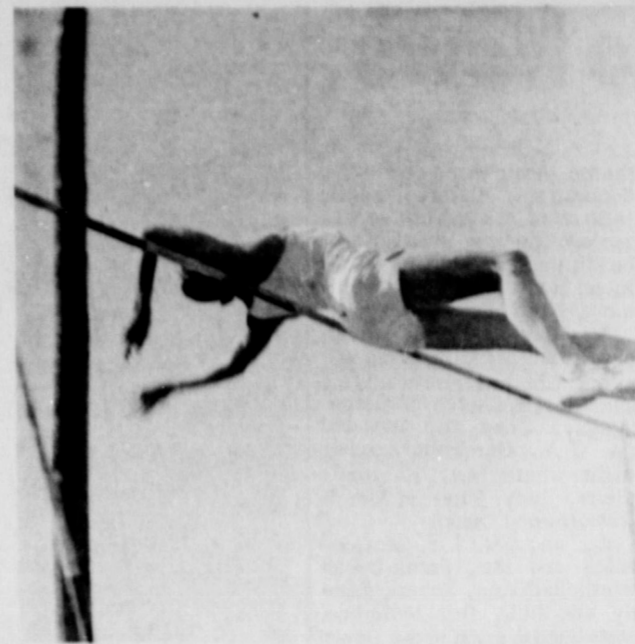

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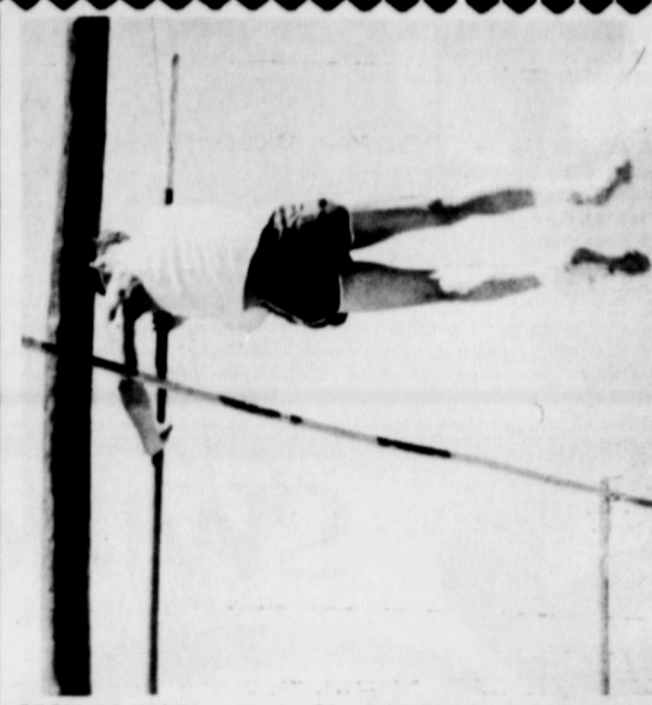

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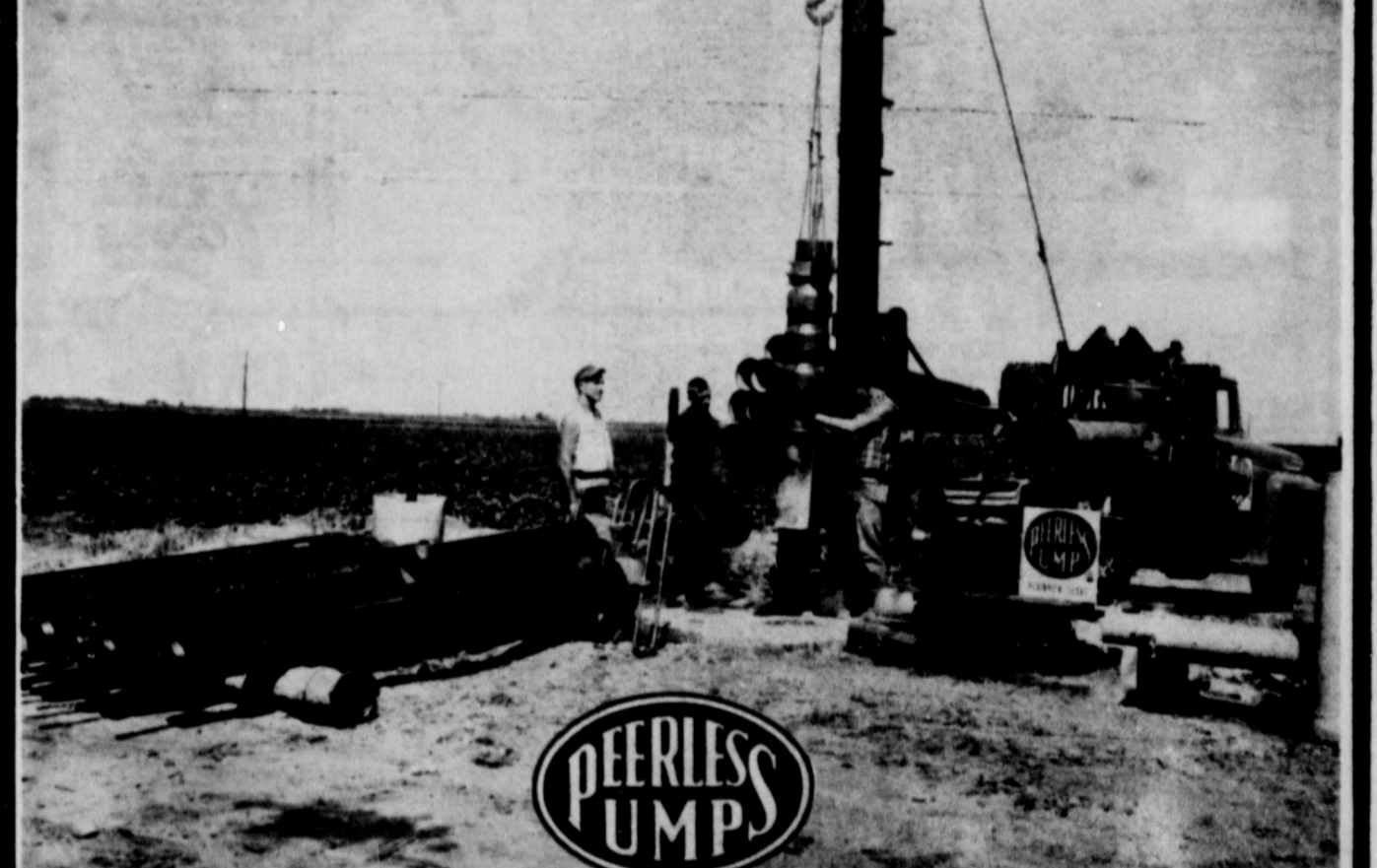
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## Senator Tower Places Resolution 26 In Congressional Record

Senator John Tower Thursday placed in the Congressional Record a Concurrent Resolution passed by the Texas Legislature and forwarded to Members of the Texas delegation. The resolution deals with the government's two-price support program for cotton, and urges Congress to review the program and make it more equitable for American buyers and producers. Senator Tower's remarks in inserting the resolution in the Record are as follows: "Mr. President, Today, I received a copy of Senate Concurrent Resolution Number 26, passed by the Senate and the House of Representatives in Texas. It was authored by State Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe, a distinguished and veteran member of the Texas Senate. "In a word the resolution deplores the inequitable and impractical situation that now exists in the domestic cotton industry, wherein American buyers of American cotton are placed in a disadvantageous position in relation to foreign purchasers. The resolution urges the Congress to review the present two-price support program, with a view toward doing what we can to alleviate the problem. "I would like to associate myself with the resolution passed by the Texas Legislature, and insert the resolution in the Congressional Record for the benefit of the Members of the Congress."
