Annual CROP Drive Nets \$158

The Junior High Youth Department of the Earth Methodist Church conducted their annual drive for CROP, the Christian Rural Overseas, Program, Monday night, November 1.

The group met at the church at 6:30 p. m., before beginning the house-to-house canvass in their attempt to raise money for the "Freedom from Hunger" Campaign for the destitute People overseas.

The local group collected \$158.00 for CROP. Last year they collected \$100 and applied it to the youth collections throughout the state of Texas, making a grand total of \$53,000 for the CROP program.

These amounts gathered help to provide 66,904,000 pounds of government-donated food, and other CROP shipments, not otherwise available, for the overseas programs of the churches.

The local group extends their thanks to all who gave, who made it possible to help people in more than 30 countries receive aid from CROP.

Area Voting Light On Proposed Amendments

City Dads Study Possibility Of New Well

Clarence Hazlett, resigned his position as City Marshal, to become effective Monday, November 15, when he met with the City Council at a regular monthly meeting Monday night in the City Hall.

A lengthy discussion on the possibilities of drilling a new water well on a plot of land adjoining Hite Park Addition, purchased by the city dads last summer, resulted in a decision to discuss the matter with city engineer, Ralph Douglas to get the exact requirements necessary before arriving at any concrete decision on the project.

City Dads agreed and voted to install three additional lines for fire hydrants, to be used as fire and tomato warnings. They gave consent for the Earth volunteer Fire Department to place these sirens at the locations best suited to serve the townspeople.

Dr. Bausman met with the group and discussed the need and cost of a hospital in Earth.

The group voted to purchase Tef-Lube to be placed inside the water meters with the hope of keeping maintenance cost at a minimum.

Monday Breakfast Is Kickoff For Boy Scout Financial Drive

A Breakfast at 6:30 a. m., Monday in the community building in Earth will officially serve to kick off the "Dawn to Dusk" drive to finance the Boy Scouts of America.

As the Boy Scouts begin its campaign on November 8th for funds to continue and strengthen its work here in behalf of our youth it is timely to review its operations.

The Boy Scouts of America is what may be characterized as a "character-building" organization which while probably accurate enough, it in no way imparts the tangible value of such an organization to the community.

Scouting is essentially an educational program giving boys incentive to achieve, recognizing achievement imparting skills, trains for participation citizenship teaches democracy and group action, place tangible goals before curious and ambitious minds and stresses moral values.

Who pays for Scouting? The boy pays an annual national registration fee of thirty cents. This maintains the national work. He pays for his advancement literature, his personal equipment, basic camp costs, earned awards, special unit activities, and his unit's dues from his personal funds, thus learning the lesson of self-reliance.

From members' dues and approved money earning projects that teach lessons of group responsibility, the Scout unit pays for unit meeting equipment, program supplies, leadership tools and literature, camping gear, special unit needs and its special events.

Behind every Scout and his unit stands the chartered institution and there are 85,000 such local institutions sponsoring 129,000 units. The representatives of these institutions constitute the majority of voting power in the local Scout Council.

These institutions - churches of all faiths, parent-teacher associations, service clubs, veterans groups, organizations of many kinds, use Scouting in serving their people and communities.

They furnish meeting place facilities, heat, light, leadership tools, special unit needs and recognition awards.

But after the boy, his unit and the chartered institution have done their part to make Scouting possible there are still some basic needs to be met to provide a total scouting program for each unit in every community.

A local program can not be operated by volunteers alone. The overall direction of the Council program, training of leaders, scheduling and coordination of functions in keeping the units active, well-informed, and organized requires the services of professional Scout leaders - most of whom started as Boy Scouts themselves.

Phil Raught, local drive chairman said, "The contribution you give goes to help maintain the Council Scout Camps at Tres Ritos, N. M., and Camp Post, Near Post, Texas and Camp Haynes near Silverton, Texas. The rest of the funds are used for administrative expenses and materials, professional service to the local Scout units, education and leadership training. Most of the recognition and advancement awards are furnished also.

It is the personal and group contributions of citizens in each community that make possible this full program of Scouting for every boy, regardless of race, color or creed. Here's an investment today that will pay off in tomorrow's citizens.

Mrs. Wayne Rutherford Named Heart Association Memorial Gifts Chairman For Earth Area

The appointment of Mrs. Wayne Rutherford as the Heart Association Memorial Gifts chairman of the Texas Heart Association's Earth activities was announced today by the President of the State Association, Mrs. Rutherford will serve the entire city of Earth, receiving memorial gifts which will be used to support programs aimed at conquering this Nation's Number 1 (one) Health Problem - Heart Diseases. Contributions mailed to her, care of Citizen's State Bank Earth, will be promptly acknowledged to the bereaved family and a receipt sent to the donor.

Mrs. Rutherford explained that more deaths result from heart diseases in Texas than from all other causes combined. Research has already developed much that is cutting this heavy toll. For instance, rheumatic fever is yielding to drug therapy, and we frequently read of heart operations that enable patients to live normal healthy lives. Some of the most dramatic developments have been made in the Heart research centers in Texas.

The Heart Fund, a large part of which is the income from Memorial Gifts, is now in its 7th year. More than \$100,000,000 has been provided by the Heart Association for the conquest of diseases of the heart and blood vessels.

Mrs. Rutherford is anxious to let everyone know of the Heart Association's over-all program and expressed a willingness to provide interested readers with additional information on the Texas Heart Association and the Memorial Gifts Program which she is heading.

Demo Women To Sponsor Scholarship

The Democratic Women of the 30th Senatorial District will join with Governor John Connally in sponsoring the third annual District Citation Art Exhibition and Scholarship Competition to be held at the city auditorium, Children's, November 20, according to Mary S. District winners will be entered in the finals of a statewide contest to be held in Austin in February, 1966, with over \$1000 in scholarships and prize money going to top winners.

Rep. Bill Clayton Participates In Panel Discussion

Representative Bill Clayton, of Springlake, State Representative from the 91st District, was one of nine legislators to participate in a unique panel discussion November 1 during the annual conference of the Texas Municipal League in San Antonio.

The League arranged this year's panel - "Speaking Out on Legislation" - for the stated purpose of familiarizing city officials more intimately with legislative process and the hard, practical facts involved in transforming proposed legislation into law.

Programmed for a meeting of the Association of Mayors, Councilmen and City Commissioners - a TML affiliated organization, the panel devoted in large part to impromptu questions about committee work, parliamentary procedures, infighting, and other aspects of lawmaking, not necessarily susceptible to textbook answers.

"This is the first time the League has tried so forthrightly to lay the cards about legislation on the table," said Hank Avery, mayor of Midland and president of TML, in describing the special panel session. "To accomplish the objective the League sought panelists from amonigable, experienced, and respected lawmakers who could clarify the sometimes intricate processes of passing or defeating bills. Many legislators meet these qualifications, and I wish we had time on the program to include more of them."

Representative Clayton throughout his legislative career has maintained a record of support for local self-government and those measures aimed at keeping decision as close to home as possible.

"Every two years the number of bills bearing on municipal government increases," he said. "Nearly 300 measures introduced in the 1965 Legislature affected cities and proposed some modification in the way a city could perform municipal services. Many if they had passed would have added greatly to the costs of local government. That's why it is increasingly important for the city government viewpoint to be supported and brought to bear by inform-

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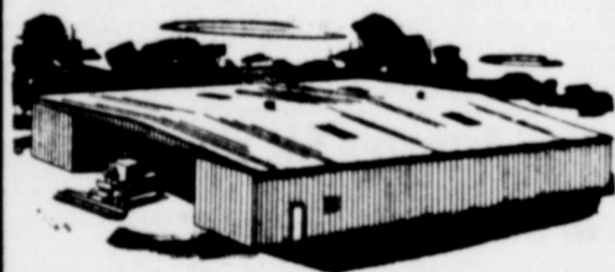

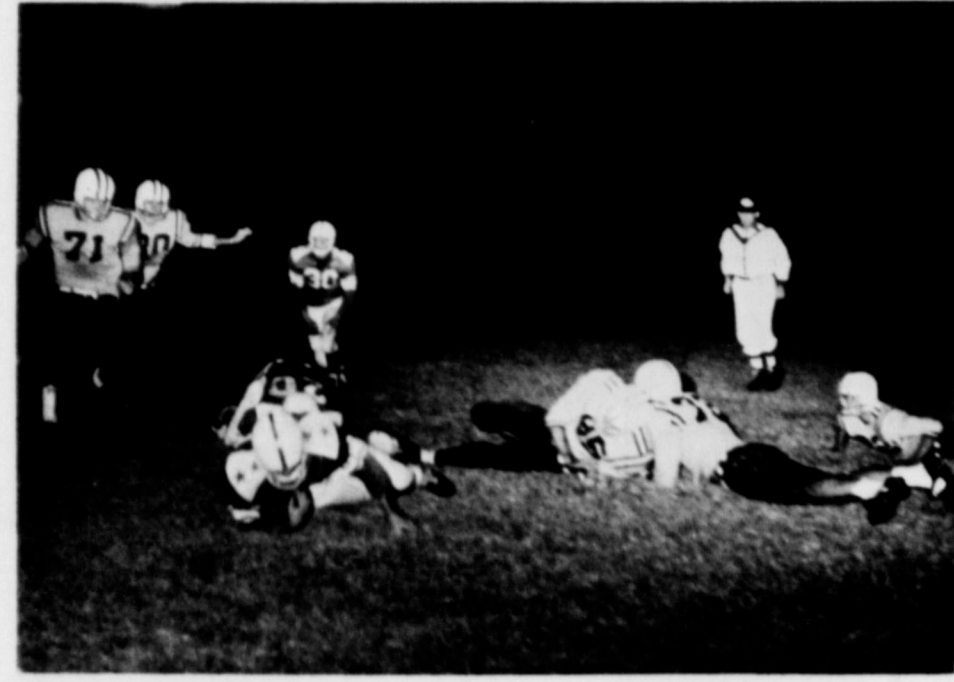
This was the last game of the season for the B Team, however, they will be suited out Friday night and hope to see action when the Wolverines meet Silvertown here at 7:30 p. m.

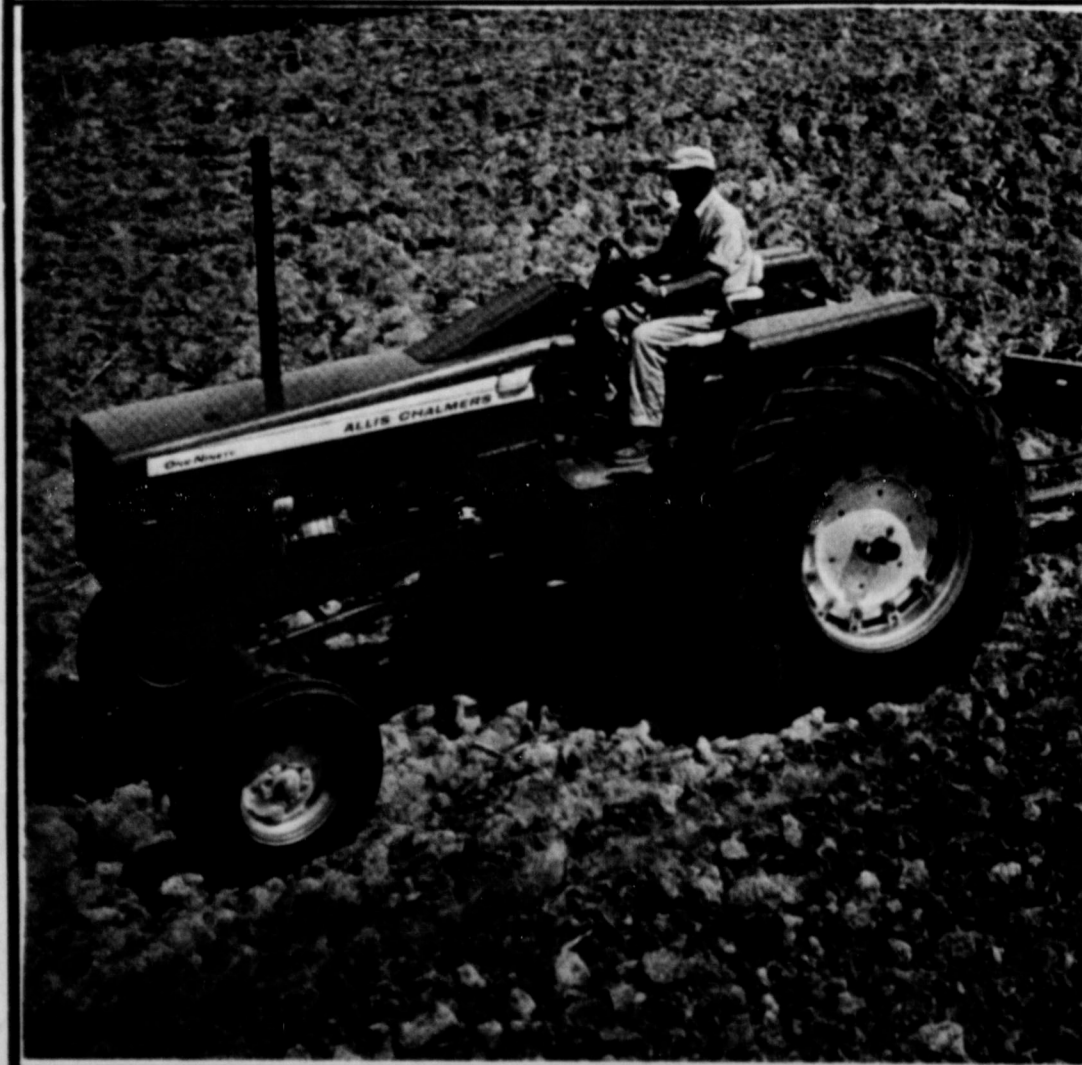

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Delayed Ginning May Help Cotton Quality

Delayed, or deferred, ginning of cotton means higher quality fiber to mills, according to research data compiled by James W. Graves, assistant professor, Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology at Texas A&M University.

Moisture levels in machine picked cotton vary within each load due to moisture differences in seed, fiber, trash content and the maturity of the cotton. This variation causes some fibers to be overheated and overried during ginning. The result is lower fiber values to mills due to greater fiber breakage and higher fiber length variation.

With this problem in mind, Texas A&M University scientists initiated a study of the effect of different harvest periods and ginning treatments on moisture

content and selected fiber properties of machine-picked cotton. Morning and afternoon harvested cotton, followed by either immediate or deferred ginning was studied over a three-year period.

No significant differences were noted between the fiber quality of cotton picked in the morning and that picked in the afternoon.

However, deferred ginning or storing seed cotton for one day prior to ginning definitely had a favorable effect on fiber quality. The moisture level of the deferred-ginned cotton was more uniform due to a moisture transfer from the seed and trash to the fiber during the storage period.

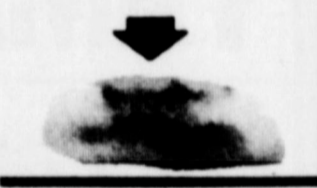

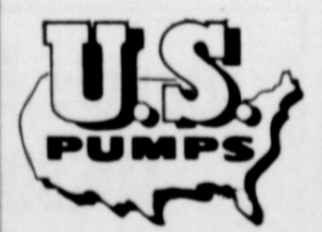

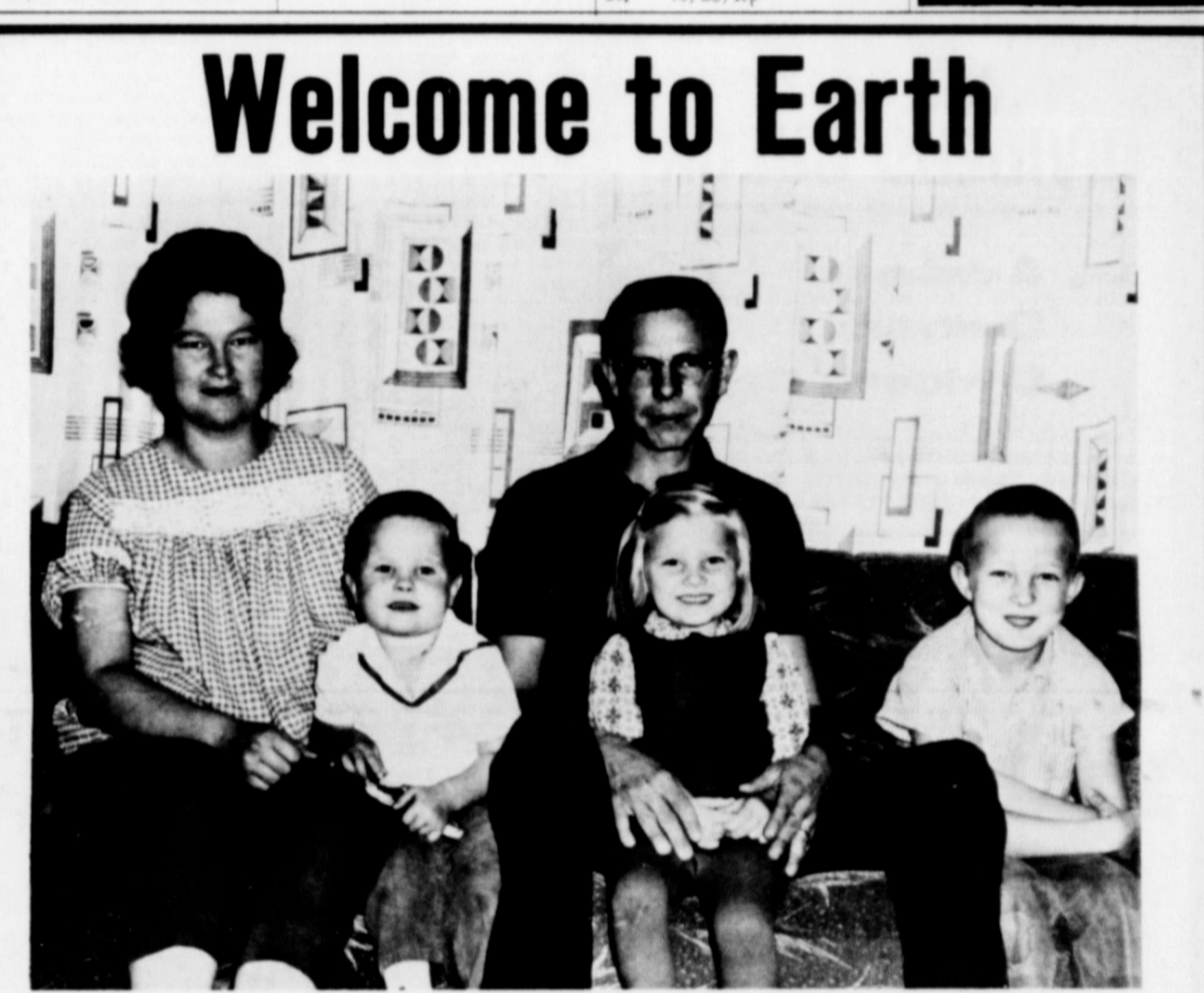
