The big rodeo will feature three performances beginning at 8 p.m. nightly, Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

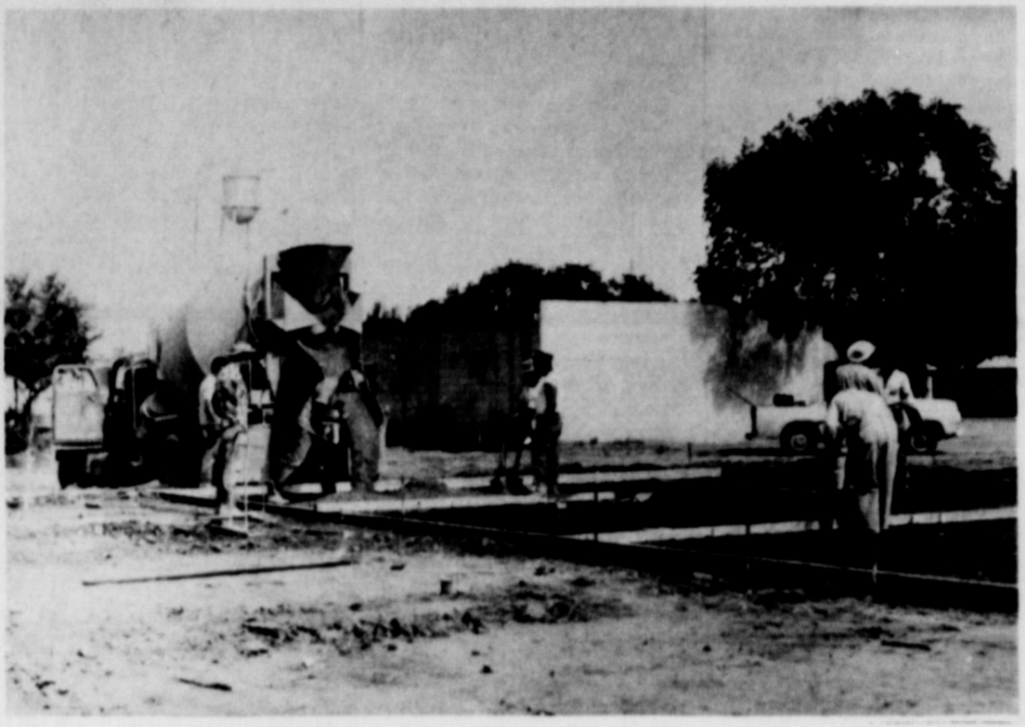

Accident Occurs At Springlake Intersection

No injuries were sustained in the collision of two automobiles at the intersection of Highway 70 and 385 in Springlake Saturday morning around 9:30.

The accident Harry T. Weimer from Carlsbad, New Mexico, driving a 1951 Oldsmobile, south on Highway 385, failed to stop at the intersection, and ran into a 1963 Ford, driven by Jim Glasscock of Earth, who was headed west. The Weimer automobile hit the Glasscock car on the left side in the intersection, and knocked it around to the right and into the signal light in the center of the highway, causing extensive damage to the Glasscock car.

Mr. Glasscock was traveling at a speed of approximately 45 miles per hour and the other driver's approximate speed was five miles an hour. The Glasscock car skidded approximately 80 feet.

Weimer was issued a ticket for failing to yield right of way by Sgt. Joaquin Jackson, who investigated the accident. There was approximately \$500 damage to each car.

Glasscock was traveling alone when the accident occurred, and Mr. Weimer, his wife and daughter were in the other car.

Recent Rains Have Caused Mosquito Growth

With the frequent heavy rains Earth has received the past few weeks, the mosquitoes have been unusually bad, which has led the City of Earth to start a massive spraying campaign, to get rid of the little pests.

Employees of the city have sprayed several times with an insecticide mixture of 350 and DDT. But the rains have been so frequent, that it has killed the effectiveness of the dust, before it has had time to kill the mosquitoes.

The city commission recently ordered 12,000 pounds of insecticide and it has already arrived for use. The city was sprayed again Monday night, and will be sprayed as often as weather permits to keep the mosquitoes down.

Numerous farmers have started the job of replanting their cotton, following the hail-storm and heavy rain that fell on the area on Tuesday of last week. Some farmers have reported to the News office that they have replanted as many as four times, only to have it washed out again. Around the fifteenth of June is the deadline for replanting cotton.

The farmers are busy in the fields either replanting or running sand-fighters.

Price Hamilton reported he has planted cotton four times and lacked about two hours getting through the fourth planting, when the Saturday storm hit.

The fourth planting is the most that farmers in the area have ever had to plant over. Some are in the process of finding out what they can plant for a crop, if it gets too late for planting cotton.

The Earth-Springlake area has received approximately five inches of rain during the past two weeks of turbulent weather.

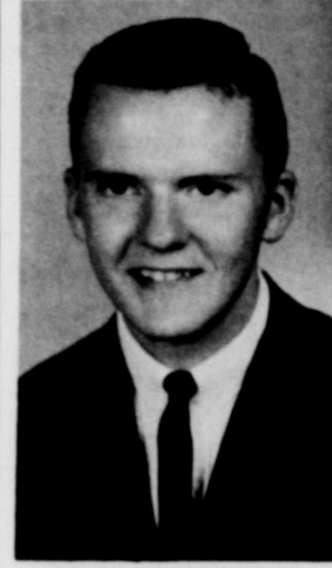

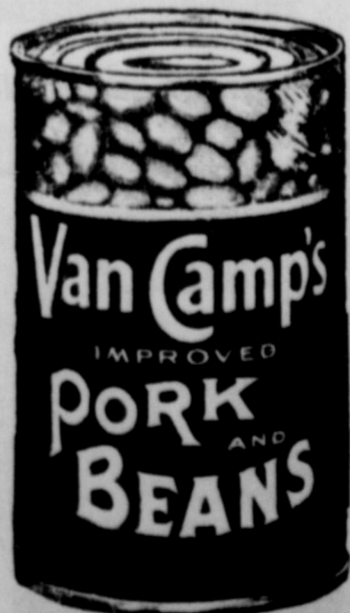

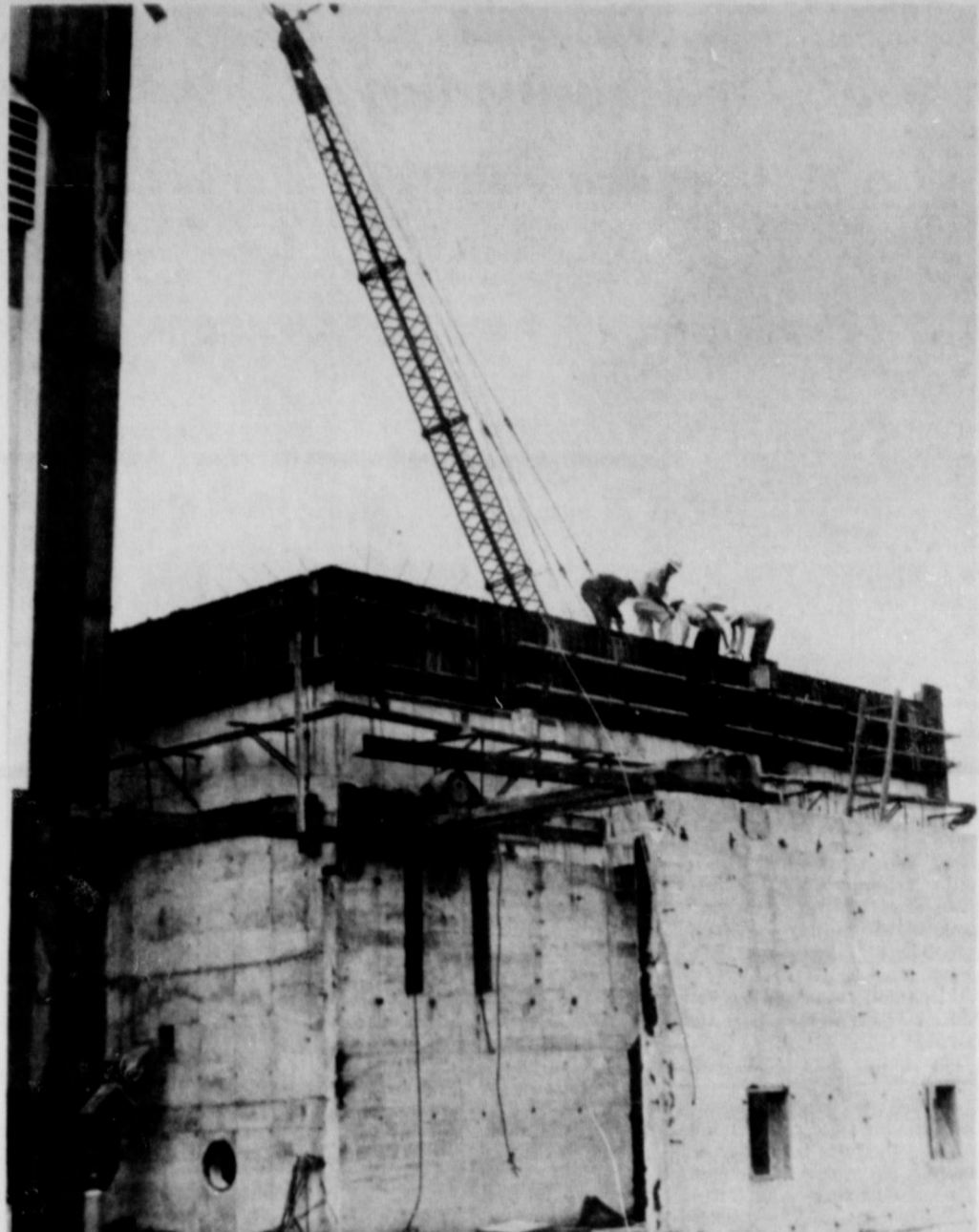
