

Wolverines Corral The Longhorns 48-0

Larry Thomas, third string quarterback, replacing injured Hoyt Glasscock, led the Wolverines to an easy 48-0 victory over the Hart Longhorns. Early in the first quarter after

an exchange of the football on fumbles by both teams, the Wolverines scored a safety with 9 minutes and 34 seconds left in the quarter to start the scoring. Following the two point safety, Tony Barton took the Longhorn kickoff and raced 70 yards for a touchdown. Barton then kicked the extra point, making the score 9-0.

Then Hart took the kickoff and after two plays from scrimmage, Guy Davis recovered a fumble for the Wolverines on the Hart 15 yard line. After being penalized 15 yards, Barton took a handoff from Thomas and scampered around end for 30 yards and another Wolverine touchdown. Barton's try for the extra point failed and the Wolverines were leading 15-0.

At the start of the second quarter the Longhorns had the ball for one play and were forced to punt to the Wolverines. Ten plays later Barton scored again from 9 yards out on a handoff from Thomas. Barton kicked the point after and the score was 22-0.

After receiving the kickoff, the Longhorns fumbled again, and on the first play Thomas kept the ball and raced around

end for another six points. Barton's try for the extra point was blocked and the score stood at 28-0.

But that wasn't all for the first half. The Longhorns lost the ball after a couple of plays via another fumble. Then the Wolverines fumbled and lost the ball to Hart after a couple of plays.

Hart tried to move the ball then, but were forced to punt to the Wolverines.

Thomas scored again from 24 yards on another keeper. Barton's try for the extra point was good. The score at the end of the first half was Wolverines 35-Longhorns 0.

The second half wasn't much different from the first half although there was no scoring in the third quarter.

In the fourth quarter, Barton plunged up the middle for 11 yards for his fourth touchdown of the night. The try for the extra point failed.

The final TD of the night was on a 50 yard scamper by Guy Davis. Barton's kick for the extra point was good, and the game ended with the final score, Wolverines 48-Longhorns 0.

The Wolverines meet the Kress Kangaroos Friday night at the Wolverine Stadium. Game time will be 7:30.

THE JOACHIMSTHALER

Did you know the term "dollar" is not American? In a sense it isn't even British.

Joachim's Dale, a mining district in Bohemia, is where the term originated. There the silver from the mines was minted into a coin called a "Joachimsthaler". The first minting was in 1516.

Within two years the coin gained widespread popularity. It appeared all over Europe and even in Britain. For semantic convenience the name was shortened to "thaler".

The British, however, found this term difficult to pronounce. So as they've done with other Continental terms, they revised the revision. The "thaler" became the "dollar" and eventu-

ally the dollar came to America. In a way it's best that we use "dollar" today anyway. Can you imagine asking someone if he'll lend you a few Joachimsthalers until payday?

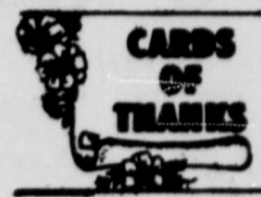

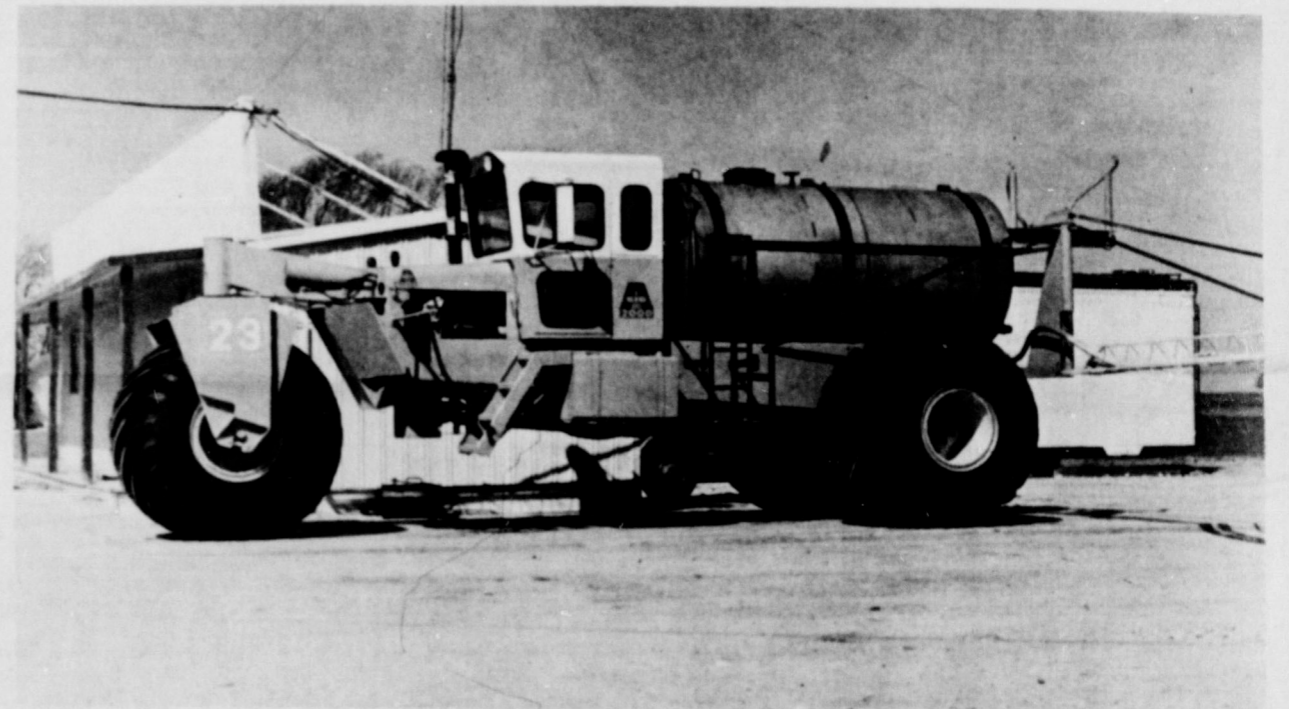
CLIFFORD BILLS HAS BACK SURGERY

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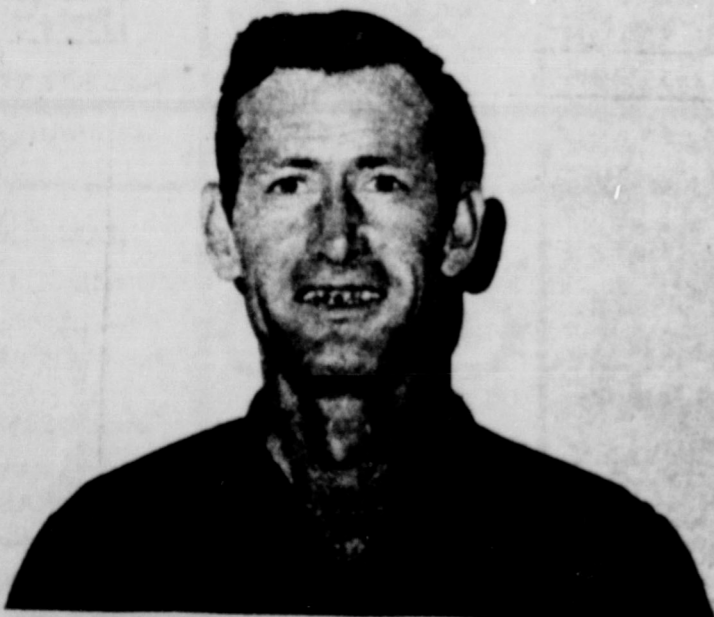
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Cub Scouts Have Fun Day
