## Postmaster's Christmas Mailing Suggestions

"Last Christmas the post office handled more mail than ever before, yet the operation was the most efficient in history". Postmaster Harold Miller said today.

Miller had advice which would help mailers prepare for the upcoming mailing season.

Update last year's address list and include ZIP codes. Prepare a gift list as soon as possible. Shop early to take advantage of full stocks. Be sure to have on hand enough shipping materials: boxes, tape, wrapping paper, etc. Use first class postage on greeting cards.

The postmaster emphasized again this year that poorly wrapped and loosely packed cartons are the major cause of parcel post damage. He urged that cartons be packed tightly by using stuffing material to fill up the empty space around the merchandise. He also asked that all mailers make an effort to address their letters, cards and packages as clearly as possible and that they make every attempt to mail often, not waiting until the last minute to deposit all their gifts and greetings.

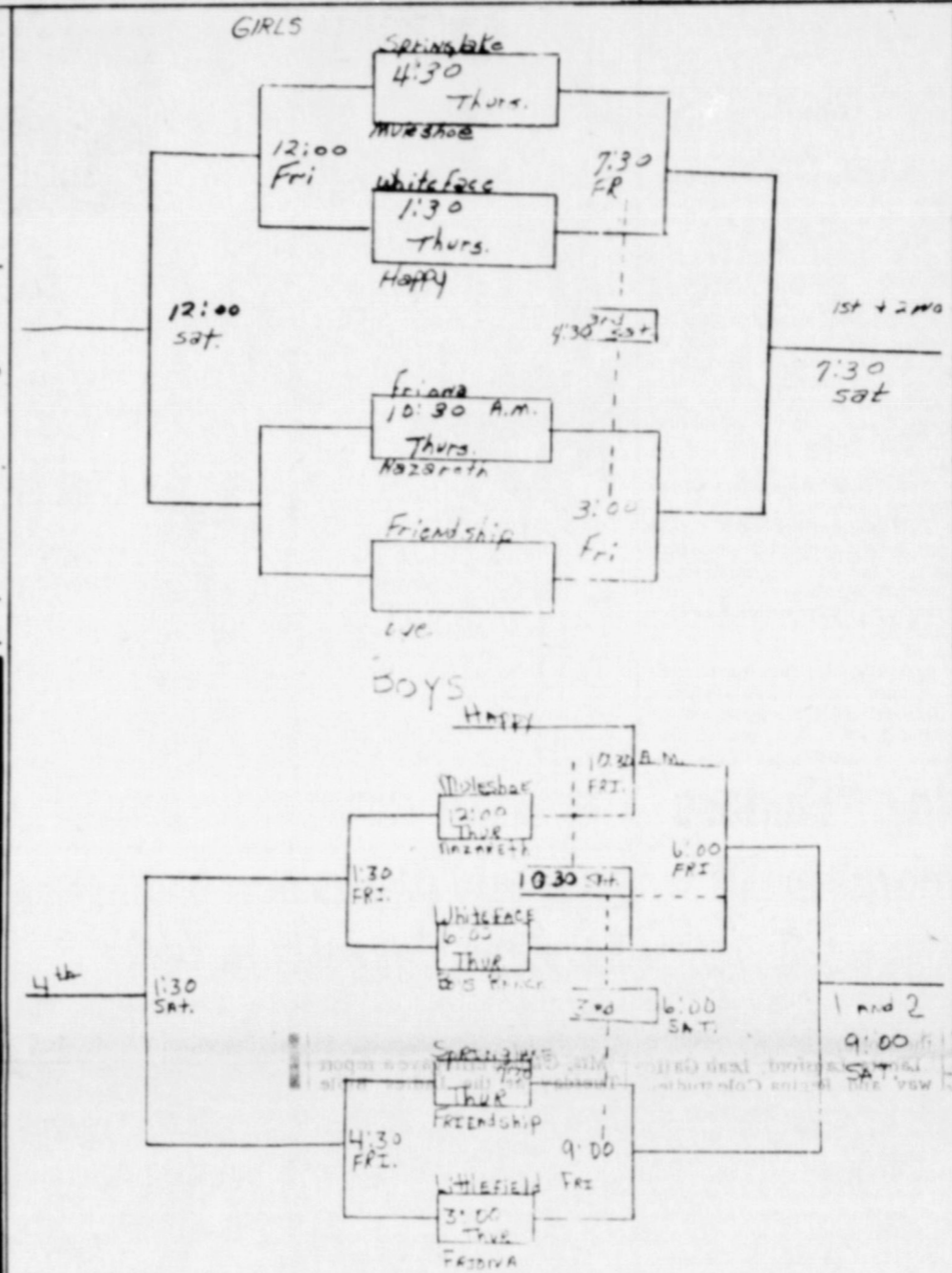

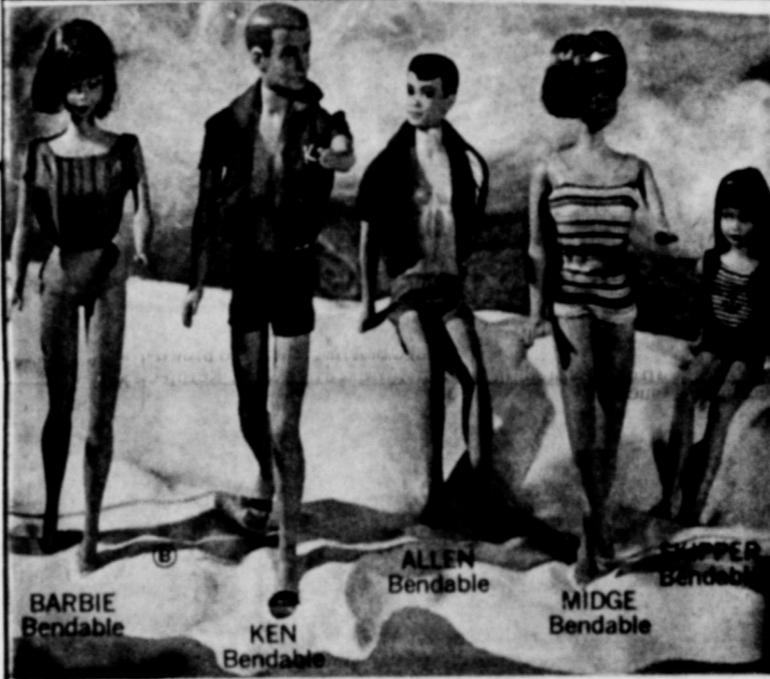

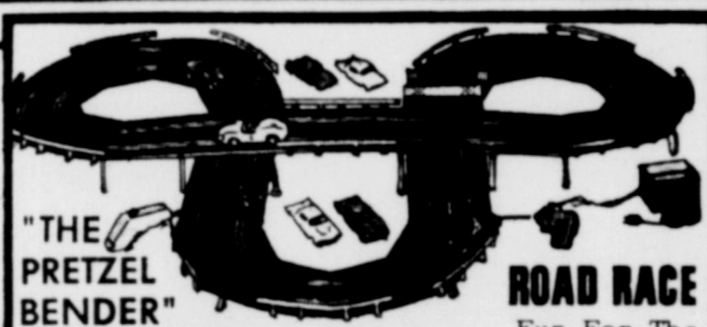

**New Control System Tried On Weevils**

COLLEGE STATION. --A concentrated insecticidal attack has been used this fall as a new approach for reducing diapausing boll weevils in the High Plains Boll Weevil Control Program.

The new approach, used in this second year's effort to keep the weevil from firmly establishing itself on about 2 million acres of High Plains cotton, was based on findings of Dr. Perry Adkisson and W. L. Sterling of the Texas A&M University Entomology Department.

Their research indicated that a two-phase program could be nine times more effective than last year's single-phase system. Phase 1 was aimed at the last reproductive generation of weevils with three applications of insecticide (undiluted technical malathion) made at five-day intervals beginning September 7th.

This phase was designed to kill newly emerging adult females before they could mate and lay eggs that could produce potentially overwintering adults. Diapause is a dormant period which allows weevils to survive the winter,

Phase 2 consists of insecticide applications at 10 to 14-day intervals which starts at completion of Phase 1 and continues until frost. The purpose is to kill any adult weevils that might have emerged from eggs laid before September 7 and to kill any adults that may have survived the September applications.

If the program succeeds, Adkisson said, 90 percent of adults of the last reproductive generation should have been killed in Phase 1, and there should have been a corresponding 90 percent decrease in egg output. This means that for each 100 diapausing weevils that would have developed under no control, only 10 will develop.

If Phase 2 treatments also kill 90 percent of the adults (mostly of the diapausing kind this time), for each 100 potentially overwintering weevils that would have formed with no control, only one should survive to leave the cotton and head for overwintering cover.

The two-phase system is a cooperative venture of Texas A&M University, the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Plains Cotton Growers Association, and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

and state are unreadable, the ZIP Code will direct the mail to the post office from which it will be delivered. Clerks in that post office, being more familiar with local residents, may be able to figure out the person to whom the mail should be delivered.

Another significant problem is the number of parcels delayed or

actually undelivered because of poor wrapping or packing. Postmaster Miller urged that special care be taken to see that each package is tightly stuffed and that nothing rattles around inside.

Parcels are generally shipped in bags and often heavier items rest on top of smaller, lighter packages. The postmaster encour-

aged mailers to be a bit cautious and insure all packages.

All parcels should be addressed only one side and should have the address written somewhere on the inside of the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off. It is a good idea to also enclose a list of the contents. Poor packaging and illegible

or incorrect addressing accounts for about half a million undelivered parcels each year.

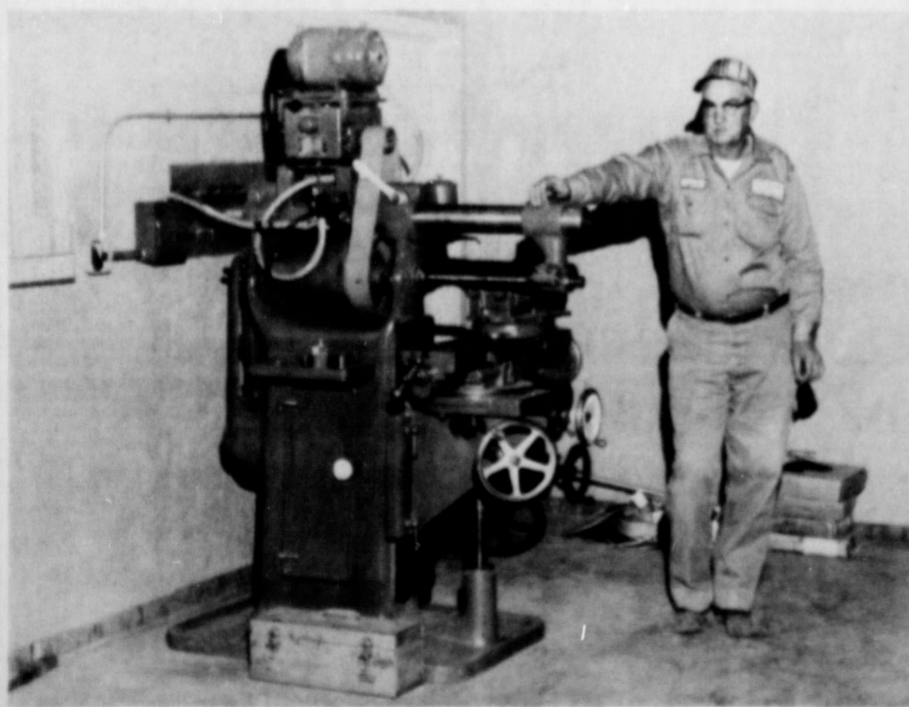

## South Plains Cotton Low In Micronaire, Staple

LUBBOCK, Friday, December 3, 1965 - Ginners and farmers across the High Plains are more than a little concerned over the big percentage of "low mike" cotton showing up in this year's crop.

The first High Plains Cotton Quality Report, published every two weeks by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., gave average micronaire of the season's first ginnings at 4.1 with almost 90 percent about the tenderable limit of 3.5.

Two weeks later, on the crop through November 12, cotton harvested milled an average of 4.9 with about 85 per cent above 3.5.

Bearing out the accuracy of the micronaire decline shown on PCG reports are reports from USDA, individual farmers, and ginners.

Anxiety over excessive low-mike cotton this year is enhanced by two things. With a record-setting late freeze it was generally expected that the 1965 crop would be well matured and therefore be a high instead of a low micronaire crop. And, this is the first year that micronaire premiums and discounts have been included in the government loan price schedule.

Beginning October 31, 1965, cotton which carries a micronaire reading below 3.3 will be discounted. Cotton miking from 3.0 through 3.2 will be discounted 60 points, from 2.7 through 2.9 will carry a discount of 165 points and all below that level will lose 300 points.

As of the third PCG quality report, probably about 23 percent of the High Plains crop for the season had fallen into these discount ranges.

But cotton ginned and classed during the last two week period, from November 12 through November 26, is more likely to indicate what can be expected from the remainder of the crop. During that time, 1.1 percent of the crop was miked at 2.6 and below, 6.6 percent miked from 2.7 through 2.9 and about 20 percent came in the 3.0 through 3.2 range—a total of almost 28 percent in the discount ranges.

Levon Ray, Agronomist at the South Plains Research and Extension Center, Lubbock, says a variety of factors have probably worked together to cause the low micronaire reading in spite of the late freeze.

Surprisingly enough, one of those factors is the late freeze itself. He explains that the lateness allowed many small, immature bolls to open which would have been killed and not harvested had the cotton plants been killed by a freeze in early November. And it has been noted by other observers that virtually all of the bolls which have opened in the past three weeks contain immature, wasty fiber.

Not to be overlooked is the fact

U. S. Commanders in Viet-Nam, impressed with the team's performance, requested more teams in addition to the ones being trained for duty throughout the United States. And the Sentry Dog School was already critically short of student dogs.

that the late freeze, while helping to lower micronaire, will also increase total yield. Ray also feels that an increase in the amount of verticillium wilt has adversely affected micronaire this season. This is especially true in the northern tier of counties on the Plains.

It is generally felt, too, that rain and cold nights in the month of September this year may have each been a factor. The rains which fell on some cotton caused increased late fruiting and a greater than normal number of late, immature bolls. And it is known that cool weather hinders the deposition of fiber and results in immaturity, which causes low micronaire.

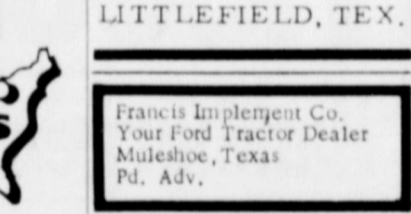

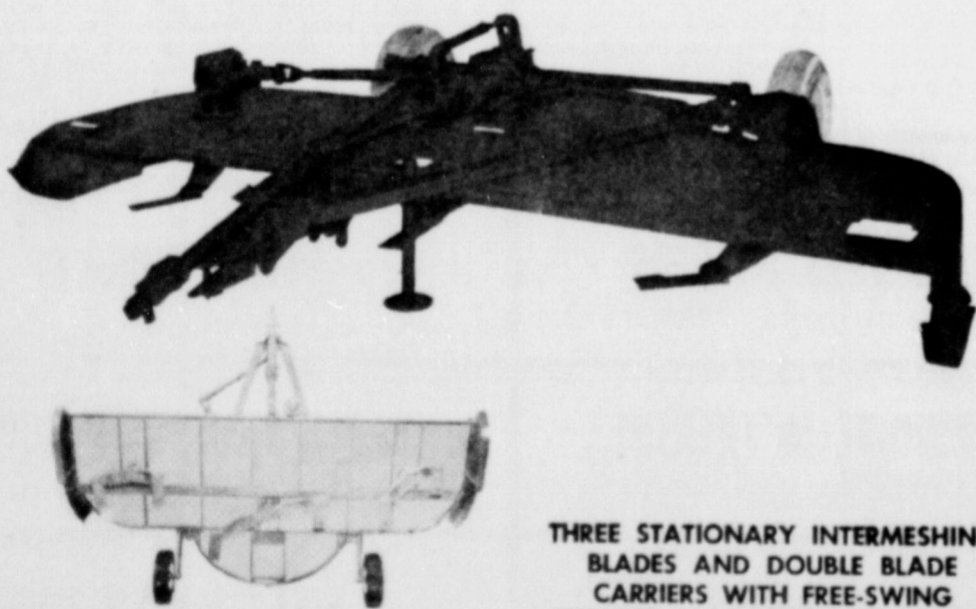
