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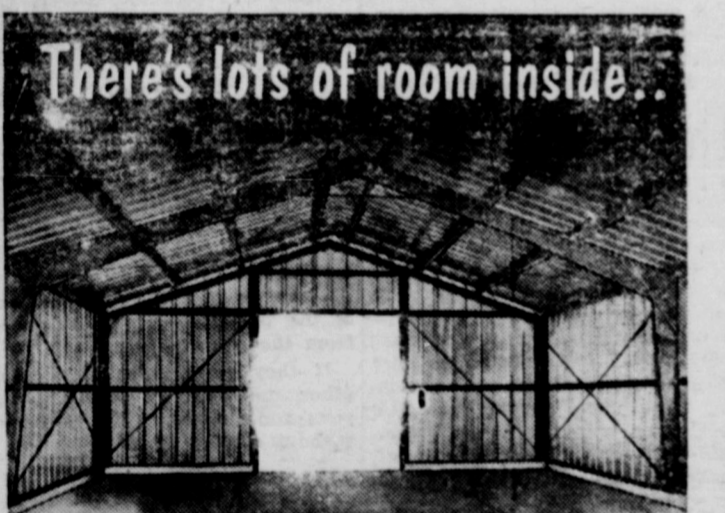

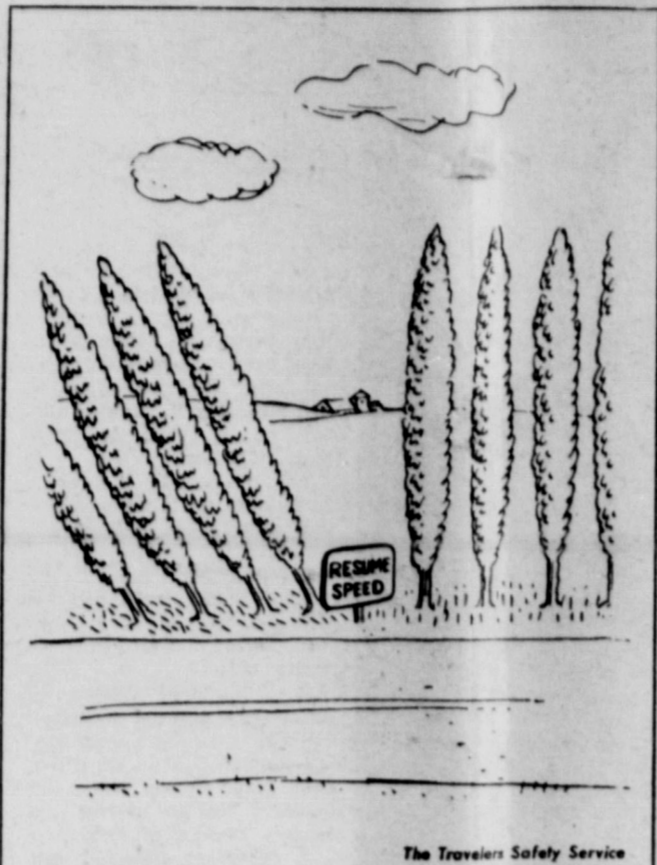

## Cotton Insects Infestations Are Reduced

Early season cotton insect infestations decreased in a majority of fields during the past week. In localities where hard rains fell populations were further reduced. Cotton generally showed improvement in appearance with satisfactory growth.

Thrips infestations were reported lighter than a week ago in most counties. In occasional plantings of cotton heavy infestations of the insects were present. Continuing strong winds hampered control applications. Under such conditions, the degree of control was often unsatisfactory.

Fleahoppers were reported on early planted cotton in most localities. Infestations were generally light. Insecticidal applications were made for control of the pest in scattered fields, particularly in the southern part of the area. As cotton reaches the fruiting stage the crop should be checked for presence of the fleahopper. Heaviest damage usually occurs soon after squaring begins.

Aphids and lygus bugs were re

ported in light infestations in occasional fields but no serious damage to cotton was reported. Everybody is urged to consult the Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects for recommended insecticides and dosages. Guides are available at county agent's offices.
