### All Amendments Get Approvals

President Eisenhower rose to another powerful victory over Democrat, Adlai Stevenson as voters all across the nation went to the polls and voiced their trust in his administration, Tuesday.

But in Lamb County voters were almost two to one in favor of Stevenson.

Texas favored Ike in the Presidential race over Stevenson for the second time.

Adlai Stevenson conceded the race near midnight, Tuesday night. The Democrats have won both the House and the Senate. It is the first time in 100 years that a President has gone into office with both houses controlled by the opposite party.

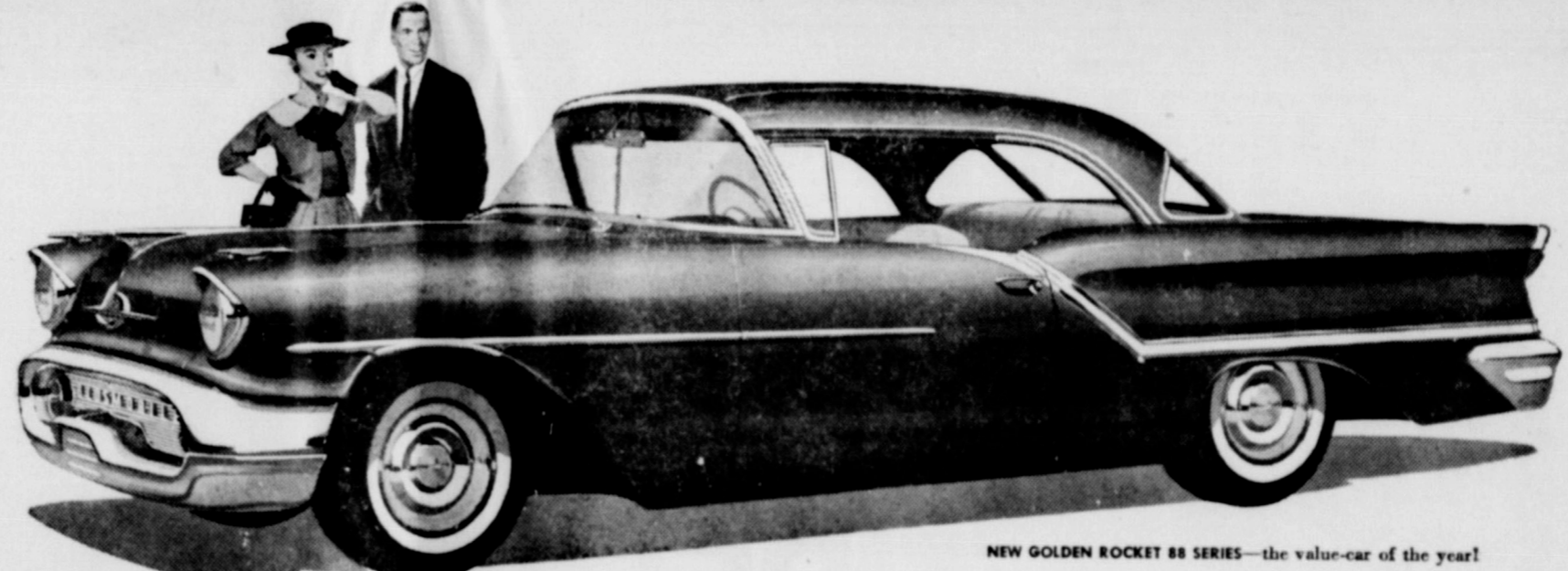

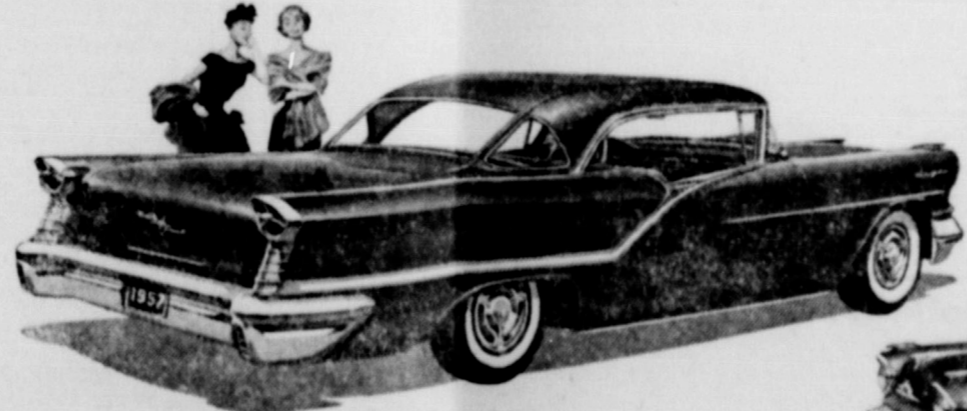

### CHRISTMAS IS WHITE HOPE

Despite a steady four-month sales decline, Texas merchants still think Christmas will cure the year's average. Opinion surveys by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research show that "typical merchants are confident that holiday business will surpass 1955 and that satisfactory volume can be expected well into 1957."

Latest figures pointed the other way. September sales were down 12 percent from a year ago, and the year as a whole was 6 percent under 1955. Slipping significantly from last year were: Automobiles, 28 percent; Food Stores, 18 percent; Furniture, 13 percent; Building Materials, 13 percent.

Bureau explanation in a nutshell: People bought so heavily in '55, they're having to use '56 income to pay off the installments.

AUSTIN, Texas — Farmers and Ranchers in the 233 drought-stricken counties of Texas will save several million dollars as the result of drastic freight rate reductions put into effect by the railroads on shipments of cattle and on carload lots of hay.

This is the third time in four years Texas railroads have slashed rates as their contribution to hard-hit ranchers and farmers. The two previous rate reductions resulted in a saving of more than \$22,000,000 to Texas agriculturists.

The freight rate reductions were made at the request of President Eisenhower. A 50 percent cut in rates for hay in carload lots was immediately put into effect.

Rates were also established for outbound movement of livestock from the drought-stricken areas to western feeding grounds which will permit free return transportation to originating points.

President Eisenhower recognized the fast action by saying: "I know that I speak for our people, especially those in the areas affected, in saying that all of us are deeply grateful to our railroads for this public spirited and prompt action."

Savings to farmers and ranchers in 1953 was \$20,000,000 when the railroads reduced freight rates on grains and dairy feeds. More than \$2,000,000 was contributed in 1954 by the various Texas railroads when they slashed rates on hay in half.

"The saving at this time will, of course, be governed by the length of the drought period," said Kenneth McCalla, general counsel for the Texas Railroad Association. "I think it is significant to note that the railroads are the only carriers which have made drastic adjustments to freight rates to aid our hard-hit farmers and ranchers."

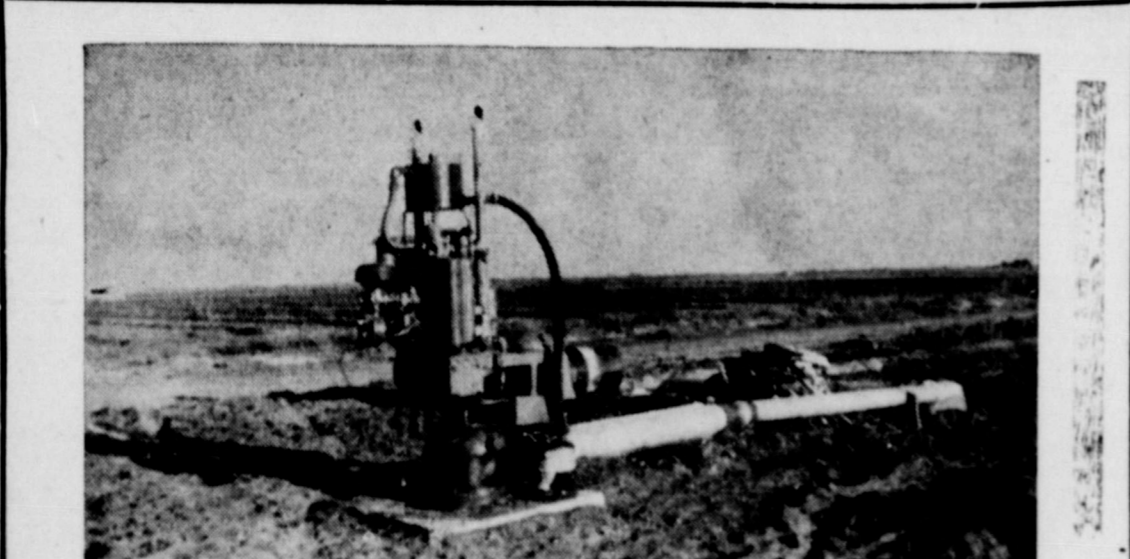

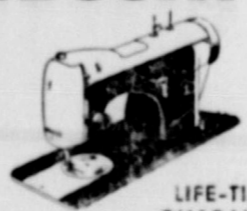

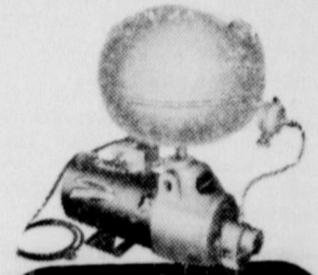

—In what areas do you feel the community life of our region needs to be revitalized? For example, is it a concern of all West Texans that many small communities are dying?

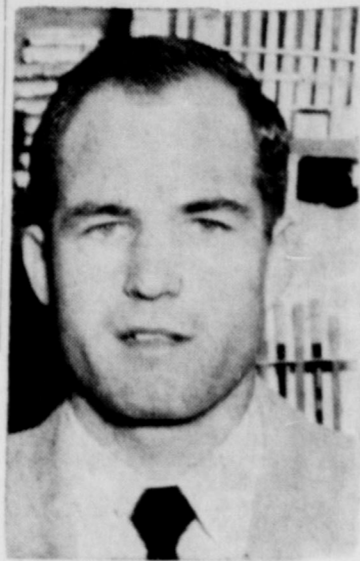
—Is there need for greater understanding, acceptance and co-operation of various segments and groups of our population?

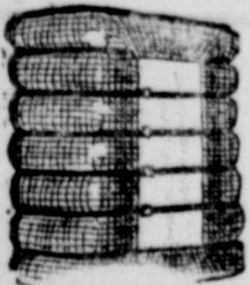
