> Canning Peaches

Do you have a surplus of peaches or can you purchase them at a reasonable price? You

can have them any time of the year by canning them. You haven't canned before? Well here is how.

Wash and peel them just as you would prepare them to be eaten fresh or plunge them in boiling water for 2 minutes or until the skins slip. They can be halved or sliced. Pack the peaches into clean jars, leaving 1/2 inch at top of jars. Cover with boiling syrup made with 2 cups sugar to 4 cups water. If you like a sweeter syrup, add more sugar. Wipe off the sealing surface of the jar and close according to the type of lid who makes the last-minute rebeing used.

Place the jars in a water bath canner which is a large container with a rack in the bottom to hold the jars about one inch from the bottom. It should be tall enough to have space to cover the jars with about one to two inches of water and about


