State Hospitals In Need Of Deer Hides

The Volunteer Service Council, which serves the patients and students in all our Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools will appreciate any emphasis you can give to this annual collection of deer hides to provide buckskin for use in occupational therapy and arts and crafts work.

No money changes hands. The taxidermist, L. M. Rathbone, for years has donated the curing and storage of these hides and their preparation for shipment to the

tannery. Some of the hides are exchanged for the tanning costs. Transportation of the raw hides is provided without charge by most of the motor freight lines when the enclosed directions are followed. Three years the Alamo Wing of the Air Force Reserve has carried the shipment to the tannery on a routine mission and the years this service was not available the motor freight lines also provided this cross country hauling.

The patients and students derive both pleasure and actual benefit from working with the leather and in their behalf let me thank you for continued support of this project. More than 2500 hides were donated last year by Texas hunters.

Apply Mulches To Improve Soil And Increase Crop Yields

This being the end of the growing season many growers are interested in the application of mulches for maintaining and improving soil condition and increasing farming efficiency and crop yields. Mulches affect soil conditions and yields in several important ways by: (1) maintaining soil structure (2) conserving moisture (3) modifying temperatures (4) increasing soil nutrients and (5) preventing soil erosions due to wind and water.

Mulches protect the soil from direct impact of rainfall which fall with tremendous force. When this force strikes the bare ground, much energy is expended in breaking up soil clods and sealing and compacting the surface soil. This will return decrease the rate of water intake and increase runoff and erosion. By breaking the force and size of the rains, mulches maintain the soil in a condition to take in water and stop runoff.

Another major reason for using mulches is to make more efficient use of available moisture in producing crops. In most cases, the

moisture content of the surface soil under mulches is higher than when soil is clean cultivated. Mulches such as plant residues contain minerals that will benefit following crops. Also residues usually promote biological activity by helping to create more favorable temperature and moisture conditions. However, it is important to see that nitrogen is applied following heavy applications of mulches to see that nitrogen is not "borrowed" from the soil.

The value of mulches in controlling erosion is widely recognized. Whatever the kind of mulch material available: sorghum residues, manure, or burs their proper handling will give you greater returns. The greatest returns available to farmers in this District is their use to prevent wind erosion. Leaving residues or other mulch material on the soil surface until the end of the blow season is encouraged by the supervisors of the Lamb County Soil Conservation District.

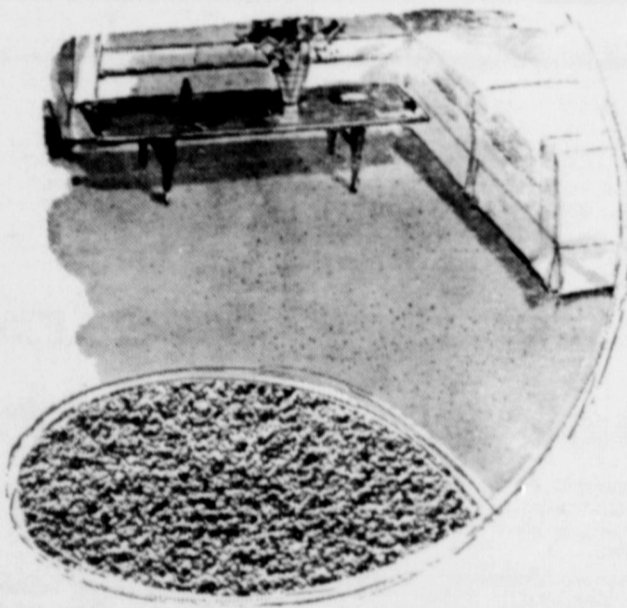

Auction Selling Brings Higher Cotton Prices

Cotton has now joined livestock, tobacco, citrus fruit, eggs and fresh vegetables in using the auction method of selling. However, the monotone chant of the auctioneer which makes livestock and tobacco sales noisy and colorful is entirely missing from a cotton auction, according to Don Davis, general manager.

Plains Cotton Cooperative Association at Lubbock is selling some \$7 million worth of cotton each week quietly and without fanfare. Daily sales catalogs listing from 7,000 to 10,000 bales are flown nightly to cotton buying centers in Dallas, Houston and Memphis and distributed in Lubbock.

Buyers examine the listings and make their bids. These may be presented in person, but many bidders make their offers by wire without leaving their offices. At 2:00 p.m. each day, Monday through Friday, the sealed bids are opened and each quality is awarded to the highest bidder. The CCC loan support and Plains Cotton Cooperative Association's own bids operate to prevent cotton from selling below market price.

Eighty-nine Plains cooperative gin associations with 137 gin plants concentrate their farmers' cotton for Plains Cotton Cooperative Association's auction sales. Farmers find a stronger market because of the economies made possible by cooperative action and

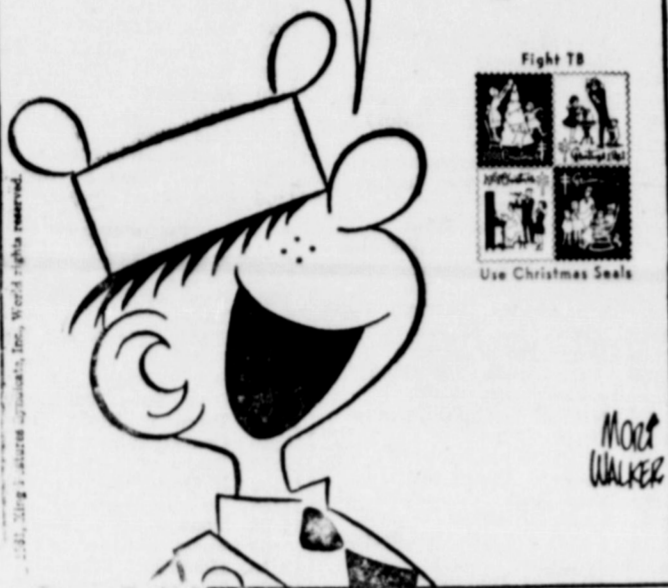

Plains Cotton Cooperative Association was organized eight years ago to find better ways to sell Plains cotton to more mills. By its aggressive sales program, it is now selling cotton in 22 foreign countries and to many mills in the United States.

Being owned by the farmers who use it, any margins made in the competitive auction sale, in merchandising and in warehousing are paid by Plains Cotton Cooperative Association to the farmers who send in their cotton. Last season, \$1,512,000 were paid as patronage refunds to some 11,000 Plains farmers.

Eighty-eight farmers, one from each gin association, sit on the board which makes policies and directs the affairs of the Marketing Association. Howard Alford, president of Plains Cotton Cooperative Association, Dan Davis is the Association's general manager.

Fertilizer Use Is Best Determined By Soil Test

College Station. — Ever wonder how a soil test can help you? W. P. Bennett, extension soil chemist, says that adding commercial fertilizers to any soil without first determining its fertility and acidity level through a planned soil-testing program is unsound, uneconomical and frequently wasteful.

Unless the acidity level of a field is at a certain point, most plants won't respond to their fullest regardless of how much fertilizer is applied. The acidity level is controlled by liming, and here's where a soil test this fall will be helpful. It will tell you what the acidity level is, thus showing whether or not you need to lime your soil.

Then, with properly limed soil, the fertilization program will be able to do the job it is supposed to, points out Bennett.

Fall tests are useful because the farmer can find out how much lime to add and get it on before winter. This saves valuable time next spring, when all effort is directed at fertilizing and planting, Bennett explains.

Lamb County To Improve Farm To Market Roads

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$15 million for additional safety features to improve Farm to Market Roads.

The 1962 Farm to Market Road Improvement Program will affect 2,943 miles of FM Roads in 183 counties. Types of safety work to be done include: reconstruction; widening; reconditioning; and resurfacing; additional surfacing; application of seal coat; work on shoulders and sodding; work on drainage structures and approaches.

The Commission said the program is designed to protect the large public investment in existing Farm to Market Roads by maintaining their traffic adequacy

and enhancing their safety for motorists.

Projects scheduled for Lamb County are:

FM 1928 from FM 54, north and east to FM 203, approximately 9.5 miles of seal coat at an estimated cost of \$8,800; FM 168 from Castro County line to Olton, approximately 8.7 miles, seal coat estimated cost \$8,000; FM 168 from Hart Camp to Hockley County line, approximately 14.0 miles, reconstruction, Gr., Strs. and surfacing, estimated cost \$280,000; FM 37 from U. S. Highway 84 at Amherst to FM 1072, approximately 12.1 miles, seal coat, estimated cost \$12,500 which is a total of 44.3 miles at an estimated cost of \$309,300.

56 Varieties Of Sorghum Tested At Research Foundation

In the 1961 season fifty-six varieties of grain sorghum were tested under dryland at the High Plains Research Foundation. The highest yielding variety in 1961 was 512 pounds above that of the highest yielding hybrid in 1960. The average yield of all hybrids and varieties included in the test was 462 pounds above the 1960 average. Dr. Earl H. Collister, Chief Agronomist, conducted the test.

The fifty-six hybrids and varieties were planted June 13 and harvested on October 3 and 17. Fifty pounds of anhydrous ammonia were applied on July 28. The dryland varieties were aided by 4.46 inches of rainfall in July and August of 1961. The area had been

planted to wheat in the 1960 season.

The first twenty-eight hybrids and varieties yielded so nearly the same that they are considered equal in ability. The least significant difference in this test was 421.34 pounds of grain per acre. This means that there must be at least this much difference between the yield of any two hybrids or varieties before one would be considered superior to the other, Dr. Collister said.
